tor and his family.

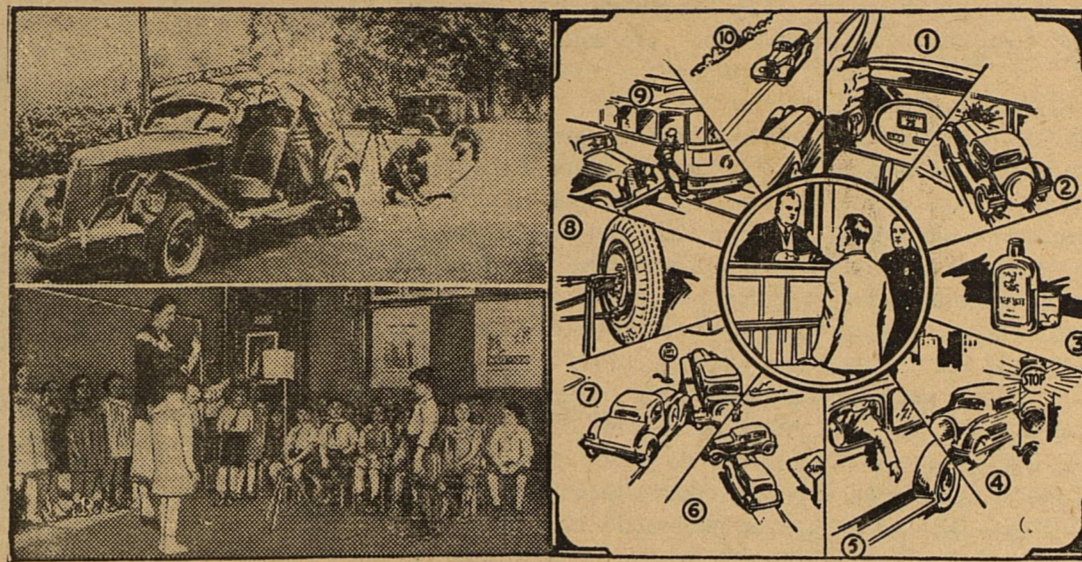
In commenting on the pounding next morning, Rev. Leggitt said it was the second largest he had received since entering the ministry.

TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE ISSUES NEW SAFETY MANUAL

Urges All Towns To Organize Safety Councils For "Creating Safer Communities"

Austin, July 20—Governor Allred announced this week the publication by the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee of a traffic manual, "Creating Safer Communities," and urged the cooperation of all towns in organizing local safety councils.

The fifty page manual is an exhaustive treatment of every phase of the traffic control problem and is the result of a five

months' study by the Governor's Committee to determine the best method of traffic control application in cities, towns, and counties. With illustrations showing a variety of recommended safety procedures, the publication is divided into six parts: organization of local committee, preparation and use of accident facts, the educational program, enforcement, engineering, and the rural problem.

"I have been repeatedly asked," Governor Allred said, "what can our community do about traffic accidents and how shall we do it?" The manual answers this question.

"I hope the mayor and civic organizations in every town where there is no local safety council will back me in this state wide traffic safety campaign by writing for this manual and organizing to combat traffic accidents.

"The problem of traffic control cannot be solved overnight. The solution of our Texas problem, however, is contained in this manual published by the Governor's Safety Committee. It is now up to the individual committees to apply the recommended safety procedure and thus create safer communities."

STORY OF BEDROOM DEMONSTRATION

"Before I entered the bedroom work, I had no bedroom of my own," says Helen Thompson, the second place winner of the Bedroom Contest for 4-H Club girls. The family was going to remodel the house and Helen saw an excellent chance to begin her bedroom work. She was given a room that measures 12 x 14 feet. It had large cracks in the floor and both the floor and the woodwork was unfinished. There was no closet in the room. Only two small windows provided ventilation and there was a drop light in the center of the room for artificial illumination. The furniture was of odd pieces and was finished in a variety of colors.

As a part of the remodeling plan of the family, a new window was added to the room and the other two were enlarged. A new closet was built and Helen made shoe racks and hat racks to make the closet more usable. She went to the lumber yard and chose the paper for her room. It was hung in exchange for milk that the family had as surplus. Next, Helen washed the floor with lye water and her father planed it down smooth for her. She applied two coats of linseed oil and finished it with wax. The woodwork was painted with ordinary house paint tinted the desired color with oil paint.

Mr. Thompson wired the room for a ceiling lamp in the center of the room and installed a plug

for a desk lamp. Helen painted her bed, desk, dresser, bookcase, and an easy chair. Her father made her a straight desk chair and she painted it and the waste basket to contrast with the other pieces of furniture. She made a cushion for her chair and a scarf for her dresser of printed chintz. Helen added new shades, curtains, tufted bedspread, and two rugs for the room and had her mattress remade. Her room is now comfortable and she likes to stay in it. Her father has completed two frames for some pictures that Helen has. These were made from scrap material and will add interest to her walls. The work, including the cost of the mattress, cost \$15.59.
