According to a London film critic, no man in history ever inspired such adoration from women as did Rudolph Valentino, the famed Italian-born film star who died in 1926 at the age of

Five years ago his admirers among English women formed the Valentino Association, which now has branches in many countries. By these women, few of whom ever saw him except on the screen, he has been elevated end. to something like sainthood since his death and his memory is kept alive among them by making gifts in his name, distributing his photographs, through correspondence and in other ways.

Valentino received a good education in his native Italy and came to the United States in 1913, first appearing as a dancer, then in musical comedy, and after being stranded in San Francisco he entered motion pictures at Hollywood, taking minor parts. He scored his first great success in "The Four Horsemen" after which his career until his death was a succession of tri umphs. He was twice married and twice divorced. He died from peritonitis following operations for gastric ulcer and appen

Land clearing practices were used on 100 acres. There has been much interest shown toward the practices of terracing, strip-cropping and contouring, as the land is composed of light valera soil, well areoiated and under ground drainage is excellent, the idea being to hold every drop of moisture possible on this land as it will not bake or become tight after heavy rains.

Poultry, in Schleicher County, as a rule, has a very poor quality but it has a place in the County. Improved methods in culling, rations and housing were studied by farm families of Schelicher County. Blood testing for PWD has been encouraged and the majority of eggs that are set will come from blood tested stock.

A total of 2,839 goats were dipped in Schleicher County with wettable sulphur, using ten pounds of sulphur to every one hundred gallons of water. These goats were placed in a vat, allowed to stay two minutes, ducked at least four times. At eleven day intervals they were gathered again, dipped the same way as the first demonstration. The results were as follows:




