### ORIGINS OF CHRISTMAS

As everyone knows, Christmas is celebrated as the anniversary of the birth of Christ, although the actual date of that august event is not really known. In the early years of Christianity | Scouts Assist this festival was observed conjointly with the feast of the Eurphany, on January 6.

December 25 was finally agreed upon about five centuries after Christ's ministry on earth and is a date arbitrarily set, like that of Easter, for the commemoration of an event, rather than as an actual anniversary. St. Chrysostom speaks of this date having been first observed by the Christians of the West.

The Christmas Tree, now an almost universal symbol, was adapted from the use of a palm branch with twelve shoots to signify the completed year, as was the custom of the Egyptians. long before the Christian era. The present significance of the Christmas Tree is by some thought to have originated in Germany.

### A PHOTO PIONEER

In a recently published article it is revealed that a pioneer photographer, who has been taking pictures almost ever since the art was first developed, is still living in New York at the age of

He is William H. Jackson, born in Keesville, N. Y., in 1843, who began taking pictures in 1858, shortly after the "tin type" photograph was invented. Much of his early work was done in the West, and his pictures of the Yellowstone county are said to have aided in influencing Congress to establish the great Yellowstone national park.

Many pictures of that region were made between 1870 and 1879, when Jackson was the official photographer for a party of the United States Geological Survey. Later he made many pictures for the earliest transcontinental railroads, showing the scenic beauty along their routes through the Rocky Mountains.

His notable collection of some 10,000 early photographs was recently brought to public attention when the negatives were purchased for the Ford museum, along with about 30,000 by oth-

### OX BLOOD TREATMENT

Amazing results in the treatment of pneumonia patients with injections of a new chemical derived from warm ox blood were reported by Dr. Clyde Brooks of the medical school of Louisiana State University before the Southern Medical Association's recetn meeting in New Orleans.

The greatest succss of the new treatment has been attained in pneumonia in infants and old people, Dr. Brooks said, and it has also proved very beneficial in influenza cases. An interesting comparison of results by percentages of deaths was given, covering methods employed in a series of 800 pneumonia cases.

Of children one year old o: less having lobar pneumonia 55 per cent died under serum or other treatments heretofore employed, while only 6 percent died when treated with the new chmical which is calld "deutero-pro-

Among pneumonia patients over 50 years old 75 per cent died under usual treatments, while only 15 epr cent died when the new chemical was used.

If subsequent results maintain the record reported by Dr. Brooks, the new discovery will mark and epoch in the battle against one of mankind's most deadly enemies.





### **Texas Population Growth Bolsters** Bid For Industry

State Still Fifth In Nation Though California Made Greater Gains

Dallas, Dec. 22. (Special)-Census figures showing Texas retaining its hold on fifth rank in population among the states against the challenge of California -which has narrowed the gap decidedly since the 1930 tabulation- bolster the Lone Star development, says a report of the All-South Development Council.

gain for the 12 months ending June 30 was 55,000, second only to California's 95,000 increase, with Pennsylvania gaining 40,000 for third place. 



### Range Feature Of Agricultural Conservation **Program To Be Continued In 1938**

started in Texas in 1937, will be and son, Bobby. continued in 1938, according to Geo. Slaughter, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The 1938 program will be similar in most respects to the preceding plan, Slaughter said. Some practices have ben dropped from the present plan, and others have been added.

The deferred grazing practice whereby part of the range is withheld from grazing for a six months period to allow natural reseeding, long recommeded by Texas A. & M. College pasture authorities, was popular with will be placed on this practice and ranchmen in 1938 may earn 60 percent of their range building allowance by this method instead of 33 percent in 1937, Slaughter indicated.

The range building allowance has been changed from a straight \$1.50 per animal unit to \$1 per animal unit plus two cents per acre of range land.

Erosion and runoff control will again be featuerd through payments for contour listing, furrowing, or subsoiling, and by construction of spreader dams and terraces.

The construction of dams for water reservoirs, one of the most universally popular practices this year, will be continued under the 1938 program and will be enlarged to include payments for drilling wells, which cannot, however, be located at the range headquarters.

Slaughter indicated that all points of the proposed program were subject to change by Congress in its present session, although only minor details are expected to be affected by such changes.



1. More and better uniform traffic laws, especially in the matters of standard signs and signals and drivers' licensing requirements.

2. Stricter, fairer and more intelligent enforcement.

3. Efficient safety organizations in every state, county and

4. More and better traffic engineering, resulting in safer high-

5. Periodic inspection of all motor vehicles by properly equipped stations operated or closely supervised by state or city. 6. Intelligent safety instruction

7. More research into the physical causes and precentatives of accidents.

Here is the way to make our streets and highways—which are today more dangerous than a battlefield—safe. There is no road to safety, but neither is there any mystery about it. Good drivers, operating good cars, under proper regulations, on well designed ateries, aren't likely to cause death, injury or property damage.
