All of us Irishmen know anothat today is Saint Patrick's day, volla day on which a few of us Wedrink green beer, march in lifwparades, or merely celebrate our ancient homeland by helping a few illegal immigrants find jobs in New York. It might interest you to know that the next largest group of illegal aliens after hispanics is the Irish.

St Patrick, whose origins reseem to be shrouded in legend, of may have be of celtic blood orthimself, going to Europe to become a priest and returning to the emerald Isle to convert the natives. He is often credited

In the spectacle of the Tonya Harding case we have been shown the dark side of athletics in America. I fear much of America has been so consumed with sports that ethics and character building are secondary to "my child's" success as an athlete and a "winner." There are no laurels given out for those who come in second or give their best. We do not reward those who are growing and achieving. We only have blame for them or debilitating criticism for what they did not accomplish. Can we really be surprised when we see people who are willing to do anything to win?

I am cognizant that there are positives to sports-building endurance, strength, esponsibility to a team (sometimes), discipline, and perhaps the ability to take orders. I believe, however, that in many cases the benefits are

lost as other more important areas of life are relegated to second place or lost altogether. For many, school and the learning process are not emphasized except for the purpose of making the grade to stay on the team. Spiritual matters are seen as an addendum to life rather than the center of meaning. Winning replaces sportsmanship. We no emphasize importance of allowing all of the children involved to take part and have a sense of worth

and accomplishment. I know coaches who have their emphases in the proper place. I know some parents who do. But many do not. When anger and profanity are exhibited at small children's games, what kind of signal are we sending our children? That if you do not get your way it is fine to be rude and antagonistic? If you do not succeed it is always someone else's fault

rather than your lack of ability, practice, or intensity? I think we can see the evidences of what that mentality is doing to our

Sports can add many positive aspects to our children's lives and to the community. May we keep the positives without surrendering our values and character in the process. May we as adults keep our lives in perspective that we may pass it on to our children.

VVA has and does strongly oppose the decision to lift the trade embargo with Vietnam. However, regardless of the President's decision, the search for answers must and will continue no matter where those answers may lie, both in our government and that of

For the past seven months we have been laying the groundwork for a veteran-toveteran exchange of information that we believe will help clear up what became of America's over 2,200 POW/MIAs and Vietnam's 300,000 missing. We have been pledged the support of other American veterans groups, President Clinton, members of Congress of both parties, and the Vietnamese Veterans Association.

We have already gathered identity cards, letters and photographs held as souvenirs for two decades that will positively identify Vietnamese soldiers whose fate remains unknown to their families. From these items we will learn things about what became of the missing that neither government may know.


