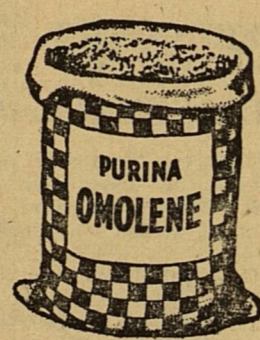
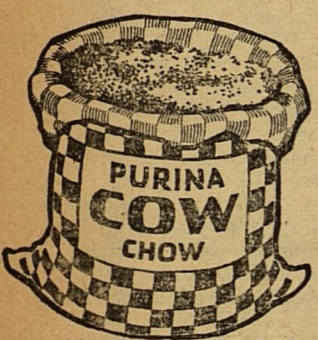

NOTED RANCHER PASSES AWAY; FUNERAL SUNDAY

Funeral services for George Williams, well known Schleicher County ranchman, farmer and breeder of fine Rambouillet sheep, were held from the First Baptist Church at 3 p. m. Sunday with the Rev. J. L. Ratliff, officiating, assisted by the Rev. J. M. Hays, local pastor.

Mr. Williams, who would have been 79 years of age on Feb. 20, died about 5:35 p. m. Friday in a Big Spring hospital, after being seriously ill for about three weeks. He had been in failing health for the past several years. Death was caused by hardening of the arteries.

Mr. Williams was born in Manchester, England, coming to America at the age of 10. He had lived in West Texas since that time. He was credited with having introduced Rambouillet sheep in Texas, and had won many prizes for his fine sheep in various shows. He bred his ewes to lamb in November and December, believing early lambs made finer and better sheep.

Mr. Williams was active in civic affairs of the community until recent years, and was a member of the school board for several years, having served at the time the present high school was erected in 1925. He enjoyed talking with people and had many friends throughout this section.

Immediate survivors include the widow; four daughters, Mrs. F. A. Westfall, Phoenix, Ariz., Mrs. R. E. Crouch, Glendale, Ariz., Mrs. D. K. Neill, College Station, and Mrs. Marvin McAngus of Eldorado; four sons, John of Eldorado, Joe of Las Vegas, George, Jr. of San Antonio, and Lt. Robert H. Williams, now in Nuernberg, Germany; one sister, Mrs. Arthur Real of San Antonio; a step-son, Albert McGinty, Asherton; a step-daughter, Mrs. Paul Craig of Long Beach, Calif.; 13 grandchildren, and one great-granddaughter.

Interment was in the local cemetery with the Ratliff Funeral Home in charge. Pallbearers were Clyde Keeney, Leslie Baker, Jack Ratliff, Don McCormick, E. H. Sweatt, W. F. Meador, Ray Jones, and Payne Robinson.

All of the children and their families were present for the services with the exception of Lt. Williams and Mrs. Craig. Other relatives present included Mr. and Mrs. Rack Green and family of Christoval and Dr. and Mrs. Ray Boster of Sanatorium.

A&M Training School Dairy Improvement

A training school to qualify individuals as technicians in the artificial insemination of dairy cattle will be held at Texas A&M College Feb. 4-14.

Richard E. Bursleson, assistant dairy husbandman of the Texas A&M College Extension Service, states that the school will be open only to those who will become available as technicians in Texas artificial breeding associations. Enrollment will be limited to ten students.

Qualifications for a technician's position include dairy or farm experience, an interest in dairying, and a high school education.

Bursleson announces that prospective artificial breeding technicians who wish to take the training course should send an enrollment application, along with their qualifications, to the Dairy Husbandry Dept., Texas A&M, College Station, Texas. Individuals accepted for enrollment will be notified.

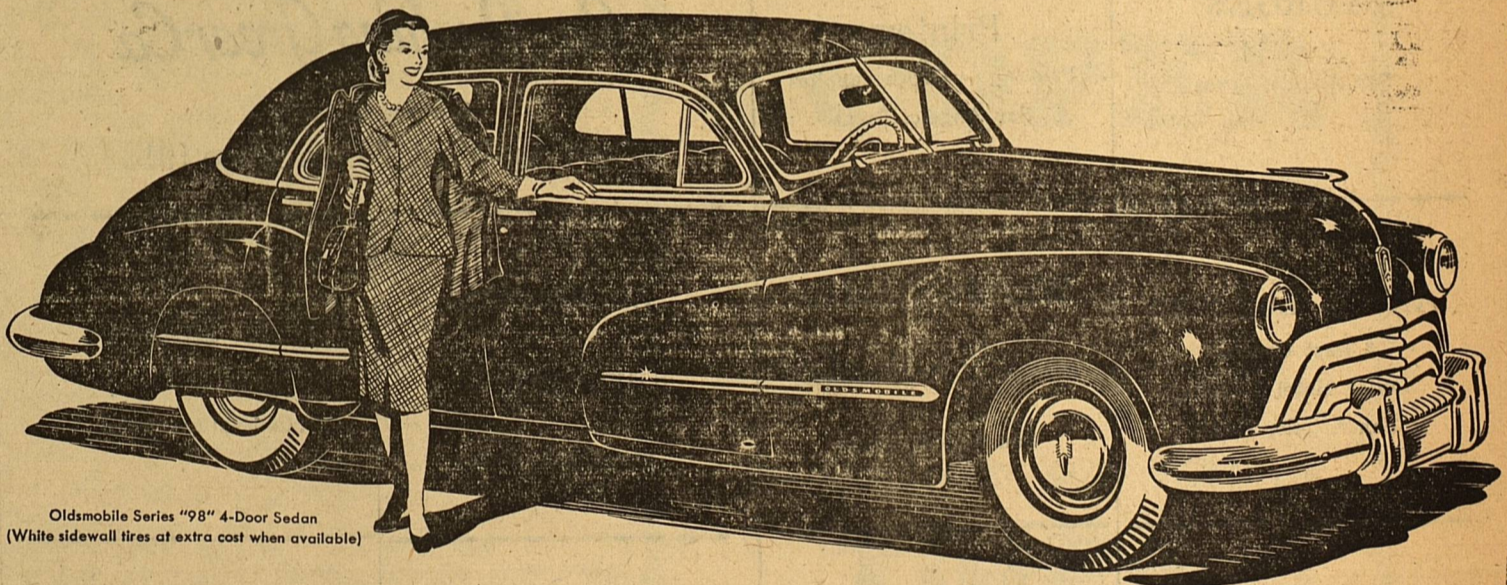

Ed Peel has rented the Arthur Montgomery house, and is moving there.

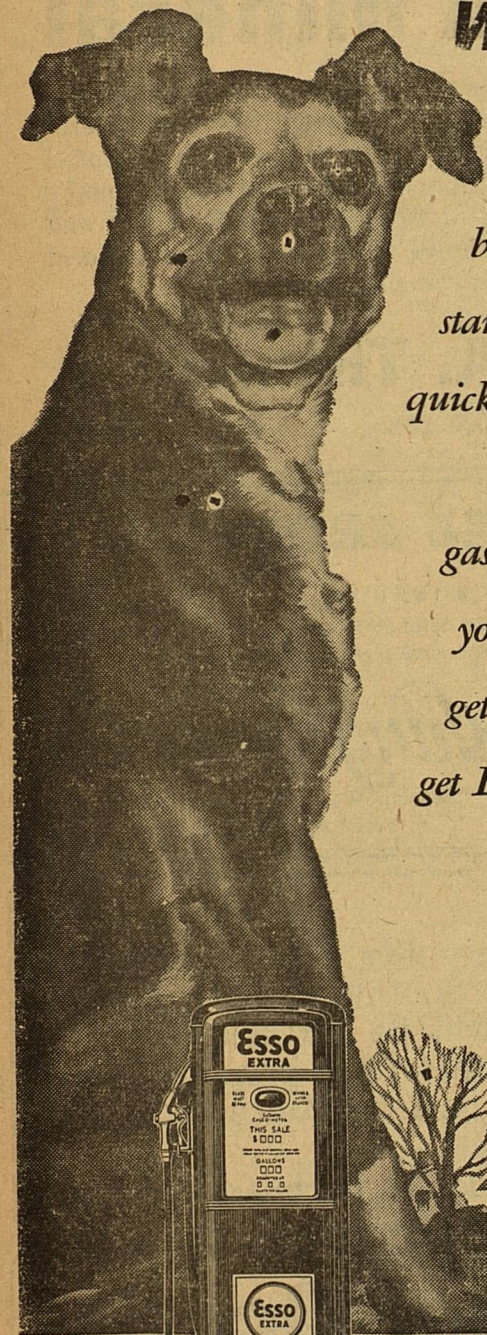

Dr. Cox Discusses Responsibilities of the Average Driver

An automobile collision can kill a human being just as certainly as cancer, and a traffic accident can cripple just as badly as poliomyelitis, and for this reason Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges Texans to protect their health and lives by using the utmost care of highways.

"It is the duty of the state Health Dept. to do everything in its power to foster good health and prevent as many needless deaths as possible," Dr. Cox said, "and because so many Texans each year are killed, permanently crippled, or disabled through preventable accidents, I earnestly urge every driver in the State to do his conscientious best to help reduce the number of these tragic and often fatal smash-ups."

Dr. Cox said that it was a driver's responsibility to know that his lights, tires and brakes are in good condition; that he pay proper attention to traffic signals and road signs; that he give due regard to pedestrians and other drivers; "and above all," he urged, "use common sense and follow a live-and-let-live policy when in your car, whether driving to the corner grocery, or going from coast to coast."


