ELDER OIL CO. **BREAKS GROUND** FOR NEW STATION

Elder Oil Company have started construction of a new service station on lots in Block Y, north of the Woolen Mills, and announce that they hope to have the place ready for occupancy by March 15, in time to celebrate their second

anniversary, in new quarters. Jack Elder has completed the purchase of the lots and leveling of the three corner lots, on which the service station will be located, is under way. The station will house the Elders' wholesale and retail business, modern washing and greasing facilities, the bus station, and servicing equipment of all

feet wide extending the entire length of the front. The Elder Cafe building will be moved on the lot next to the Woolen Mill, leaving ample parking space between it and the filling

station. Mr. Elder states that he plans to enlarge and remodel it before summer.

In buying these lots, the new owners have accomplished something that several others before them had thought to be impossible. The six lots were owned by seven different individuals, none of whom are now alive, and none of the surviving heirs knew any of the other heirs. As there are no. up-to-date records of addresses of these people on the county tax books or the city tax office, many hours were spent in contacting these people and clearing the titles to the lots This is the first transfer of the property since 1909.






