Reynolds is Elected to Head District

Supt. C. A. Reynolds and Coach Al Vance went to Sonora Saturday night to attend a District executive meeting, held for the purpose of organizing the group and completing plans for the fall football season for the district. Rules were adopted, and the schedule for the season was completed. C. A. Reynolds was elected chairman to replace the former chairman, Supt. Stringer of Sonora, and Coach Vance was elected secretary of the organization. It was voted to give an award each year for district championship, instead of each 3 years as heretofore. Officials are in possession of the complete schedule for the entire district.

Reynolds reports that other schools have expressed their interest in the project and promise to play at night if the lighting project is carried through before the season is over.

Two Real Estate Deals Are Made

Schleicher County real estate deals made recently include the following transactions:

S. D. Harper, Sr. Estate, lands situated in Schleicher County, comprising 2365 acres, has been sold to Will Lovelace of Eden, Texas, for a consideration of \$26.25 per acre. The deal was made by Commissioners G. W. Galbreath, Bill Locklear, and Robert Sprouls. The land is situated about 8 miles northeast of Eldorado. It has been leased for three years to Bill Locklear.

The R. A. Evans and Bud Kerr Commission Co. has sold a house and lot for Mrs. J. D. Ramsey, for a consideration of \$2,000. The deal comprised lots number 2B and 2C in Block 29 of the town of Eldorado.

Clean-up Campaign On in Eldorado

A Clean-up Campaign for the city of Eldorado began Monday, and will last on through next week, with city trucks hauling away trash from premises of business houses and residences. Those who have not done so are urged to place the trash so that it is accessible from the roads and alleys; only by complete cooperation of business men and householders of Eldorado can the city be made clean and sanitary in this Clean-up drive.

Small Cotton Crop Starts to Market

Probably the smallest cotton crop ever harvested in Schleicher County will move toward the gins soon, as pickers prepare themselves with pick sacks and scatter to the cotton fields. The crop is small in point both of yield and of acreage. Only 12 to 15 farms in the county at the most are planted in cotton; of these, a few, such as one at Reynolds, have fairly good yield, but most of them were badly damaged by the drouth. Cotton is bringing from 19 to 21 cents, but there is no top grade in Schleicher County this year, growers report, and consequently no 21 cent cotton

Soil Conservation Feature at Service Honoring Rural Life

Roy Gough, assistant state soil conservationist of Temple, will be guest speaker at a special worship service in the Methodist Church Sunday morning, Sept. 23 in observance of rural life Sunday.

Mr. Gough, whose home is in Temple, will bring the chief message on soil conservation. Another honored guest on this occasion will be J. F. Rungo, who will direct the supervisors of the district in planning for the event and in giving it publicity by sending out announcements to cooperators inviting them to attend. Two other supervisors of the district, both of whom will attend the meeting, are B. E. Moore of Eldorado and E. E. Foster of Knickerbocker, Tom Green County. An active participant in the making of plans will be Olen Fenner of San Angelo, district conservationist, and also N. E. Britten, acting soil conservationist of Eldorado.

The entire service will feature the soil and man's relation to it. Hymns, Scripture passages, and prayers will all be in keeping with the spirit of the entire devotional service. All who are interested in this subject are urged to attend and participate in this Rural Life Program. The date will be one week from Sunday.

Commissioners Set 1945 Tax Discounts

The Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session Monday canvassed the returns of an election on amendments, which was held in Texas August 25, and found that only 86 votes had been cast, and that Amendments Number 1, 2, and 4 carried and No. 3 was defeated in this county.

A discount to encourage early and prompt payment of taxes was agreed upon as before: 3 per cent if paid in October, 2 in November, and 1 in December.

War Time to End By September 30

Congressional leaders promised Saturday to set the nation's clocks back an hour by Sept. 30.

This will be done by having Congress abolish what is known as daylight saving or war time, under which the clocks were moved ahead an hour in 1942. The idea then was to provide more day time for war work.

Chairman Cannon of the House Appropriations Committee and Chairman Boren of a House interstate commerce subcommittee said the repealer would pass quickly.

Both remarked that they didn't expect "a single vote" against the action in either the Senate or House.

They also said that mail was flooding in demanding the change.

Lions Still Pushing Football Field Lights

Agitation to raise funds for the lighting of the football field has been gaining momentum as football fans of Eldorado take stock of their resources and reach the unanimous conclusion, "It can be done."

Ways and means of raising money to provide electricity for the field so that it may be used for night games have been discussed by business men and friends of the school, and it seems probable that the project can be handled. The Lions would probably sponsor the project, and they would conduct a drive to raise part of the funds by private subscription, and part by donation from interested organizations.

There is no doubt in the minds of those who have studied the question concerning the soundness of the project from a financial viewpoint. Gate receipts are much larger in neighboring towns which have prepared their fields for night playing, it is reported. It is considered advisable, also, to get early action on this proposed project, if it is to be done this season it is pointed out.

At the regular meeting of the Lions Club Wednesday it was reported that the dial telephone system was assured and that the equipment had been ordered. Committee men report that everything was "all set" for the barbecue and lamb sale here Saturday

Work Starts on Locker Building

Lane Spurgers of San Angelo is foreman of a crew of work of carpenters who started work this week on the Richey building, which John B. Stribling has bought as a location for his new frozen food locker.

Old partitions had been removed by Wednesday noon. The complete renovating project calls laying of cement floor throughout; re-inforcing of floor where weight will be greatest; wiring of the entire interior for convenience of clerks and customers; installing of modern new plumbing; installing of about 400 food lockers at the rear; adding of a new roof; building of new partitions as needed for offices and lockers; and general repairing of entire interior and exterior, including painting. The Eldorado Beauty Shop will continue to rent the east end of the building.

Carpenters are prepared for delays in securing of materials. At the best it will be well over a month before the building is ready for a formal opening. The lockers have been shipped from the factory, Mr. Stribling has been in formed. The building was put up by the late Finis Keele, for the Richeys, who operated a grocery store there and later bought the building.

Another Week Completed by School

Two down and only 34 more to go—that is the report today from the Eldorado school, now nearing the close of its second week. There have been no last-minute resignations, attendance and enrollment are satisfactory, and the various departments of the school are functioning as planned.

School starts each morning at 8:20, starting time which will be continued when clocks are back on the old time.

Two new courses have been added this year—health, which will give 1-2 credit, and junior business, a full credit. The latter is a freshman subject.

With 150 grade and high school students patronizing the lunchroom, the school cafeteria is making a good start toward a successful season. This is the largest number the lunchroom has ever served.

Enrollment remains at the figure previously announced, 112 for high school and 213 for the grades. This year's graduating class will include 16 seniors.

The Mexican school reports a total of 63 pupils, with a faculty of two teachers, Mrs. Davis and Mrs. McFarland. There are 15 pupils enrolled in the negro school, with one teacher. Another school in the system, the Reynolds school, in a rural district, also has one teacher, Mrs. Clark.

East-and-West Highway Bond Election Called for October 13th

The long-planned east and west highway project, which proposes to give Eldorado an outlet direct to Central Texas, was this week taken out of the realm of planning and is being set squarely before the people of the county for direct action.

On Monday morning a committee consisting of John F. Webster, T. K. Jones and Jerry Pennington appeared before the Commissioners Court with a petition signed by 63 qualified tax payers, asking that an election be called for the

purpose of issuing bonds for the purchase of right-of-way for the new road.

The answer of the Court appears in a legal notice on page two of this issue of the Success. . . . It is an order for a special election to be held on Saturday, October 13th to determine whether or not the county shall issue bonds to the amount of \$50,000 for the new road from here to Menard.

Business men, ranchers and other property owners are of the opinion that the bond issue will be

enthusiastically carried, and Schleicher County will then have done its part in securing this vital artery of travel. Passage of the bond issue will not necessarily mean that construction of the road will start this year. That matter will be in the hands of the State Highway Commission and they will order construction only when vital materials have been released and are made available. However it is understood that the State had a huge highway program planned for the post-war period and it is not likely that the delay

will be long. This particular road has already received the approval of highway engineers.

Eldorado and Schleicher county laid plans for this east-and-west highway years ago. In fact, December 10th 1941 was set as the date for an election, but Pearl Harbor day on December 7th, put a stop to all that. Now, with the Japs defeated and the war officially over, Schleicher county property owners are to be congratulated for taking prompt and decisive action on this important project.

Order of Road Bond Election

On this the 10th day of September, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Schleicher County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court house at Eldorado, Texas, the following members of said Court, to-wit:

C. L. Meador Jr., County Judge, presiding; and,

C. A. Graves, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1;

John Irvin King, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2;

Pat Martin Commissioner, Precinct No. 3;

J. A. Enochs, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4;

being present and participating, came on to be considered the petition of Jno. F. Webster and 82 other persons, for an election to be held in Schleicher County, Texas, to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the total principal sum of \$50,000, for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity; and,

It appearing to this Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) qualified resident property taxpaying voters of Schleicher County, Texas; and,

It further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Schleicher County, Texas;

It is, therefore, considered and ordered by the commissioners' Court of Schleicher County, Texas:

1. That, pursuant to the aforesaid petition, an election shall be held in said County on the 13th day of October, 1945, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not bonds shall be issued on the faith and credit of said County, in the total principal sum of \$50,000, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied, annually, on all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity, under authority of the Constitution and laws of the state of Texas, particularly Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution, and Chapter 16, Acts 1926, First Called Session, as amended; such bonds, if issued, will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 5 per cent per annum, and shall mature at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than twenty-five (25) years from their date.

2. In the event said bonds are authorized by the necessary favorable vote of the qualified electors of said County, Voting at such election, the proceeds from the sale thereof shall be applied to the purchase of right-of-way, construction of fences, maintenance and operation, and to pay all necessary damages incident to the Construction of the following roads in said County as follows.

A road running east and west through the county, and also through the city of Eldorado, from county line to county line and designated by The State Highway Department of Texas, as Highway No. 151.

3. All persons who are legally qualified voters of said Schleicher County, Texas, who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

4. All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And, those opposed to the proposition shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

5. The polling places and Presiding Officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows:

Eldorado, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 1, at Court House, J. F. Isaacs, Presiding Judge.

Eldorado, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 1-A, High School Building, W. N. Ramsey, Presiding Judge.

Mayer Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 2, Mayer School House No. 1, Harry Freund Presiding Judge.

Rudd Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 3, Adams School House, Webb Montgomery Presiding Judge.

Vermont Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 4, Finnigan Ranch House, Ed Finnigan, Presiding Judge.

Mayer Community No. 2, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 5, Mayer School House No. 2, Joe Ruff, Presiding Judge.

Alexander Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 6, Alexander School House, E. F. Ramsel, Presiding Judge.

Cliff Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 8, Cliff School House, J. Forrest Runge, Presiding Judge.

Reynolds Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 9, Reynolds School House, E. W. Craig, Presiding Judge.

6. The County Clerk of Schleicher County, Texas, is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of said election to be published once each week for three consecutive weeks, in some newspaper of general circulation that has been continuously and regularly published for more than one year previous to the date of this order, in Schleicher County, Texas, and, in addition thereto, by posting notices of such election at four public places in Schleicher County, Texas, one of which shall be at the courthouse door of said County, for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

7. A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of Schleicher County, Texas, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Jno. Irvin King and seconded by Commissioner C. A. Graves that the same be passed and adopted. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of said Court voted "Aye": Commissioners Graves, King, Martin and Enochs; and the following voted "No": None.

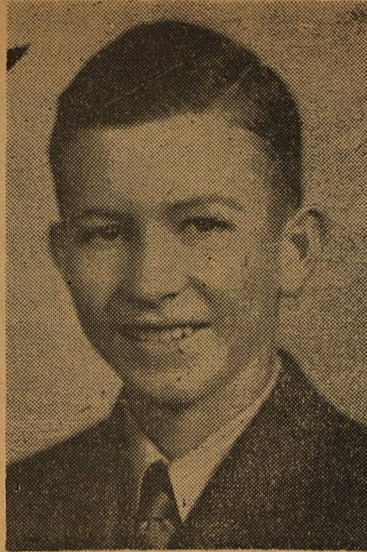

Texans Asked to Check Up on Drivers' Licenses

Better check up on your driver's license. Under the impetus of mounting traffic fatalities, the Department of Public Safety is about to begin a vigorous enforcement campaign against unlicensed drivers, Director Homer Garrison said recently.

"This isn't a red tape or revenue proposition," Garrison. "We are trying to keep people from being maimed and killed."

Estimating that Texas now has 250,000 drivers who either have no licenses or whose licenses have expired, Garrison said:

"The deliberately evasive person is likely to be dangerous, either because of known incompetence or in the case of many new residents and new drivers, ignorance of Texas safety rules.

"Of those who have expired licenses, probably a considerable number have developed defects or attitudes, or records of traffic violation and accident, that give them cause to fear examination.

"Of course most delinquents are merely lazy or negligent.

"But whatever the reason, the impressive facts remain that 15 per cent of drivers cause 85 per cent of collisions, and unlicensed drivers figure in more than a proportionate share of them. As traffic volume and fatalities continue to increase, the citizen's obligation to comply with regulatory measures likewise increases. We are headed for a toll of ten lives lost daily to traffic in Texas and it will require drastic action to hold the figure that low when post-war traffic gets into full swing."

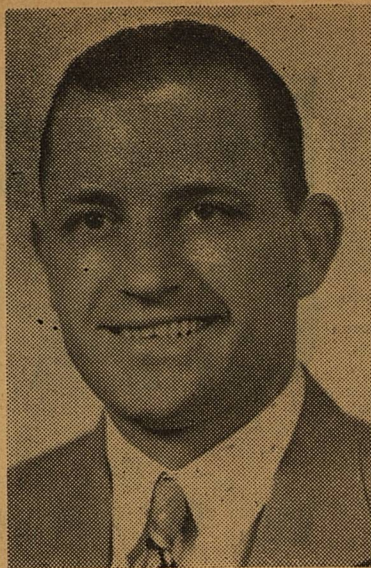

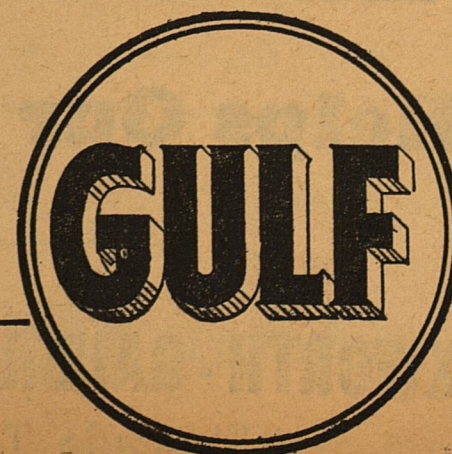

Reporters of County Meet for Instructions

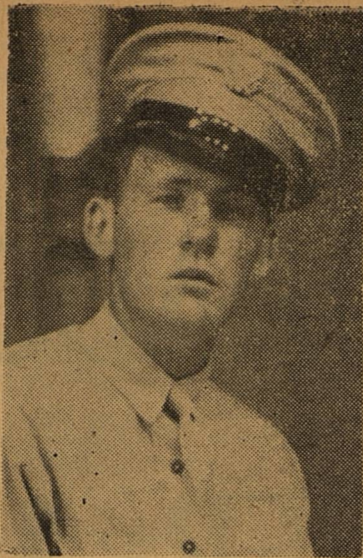

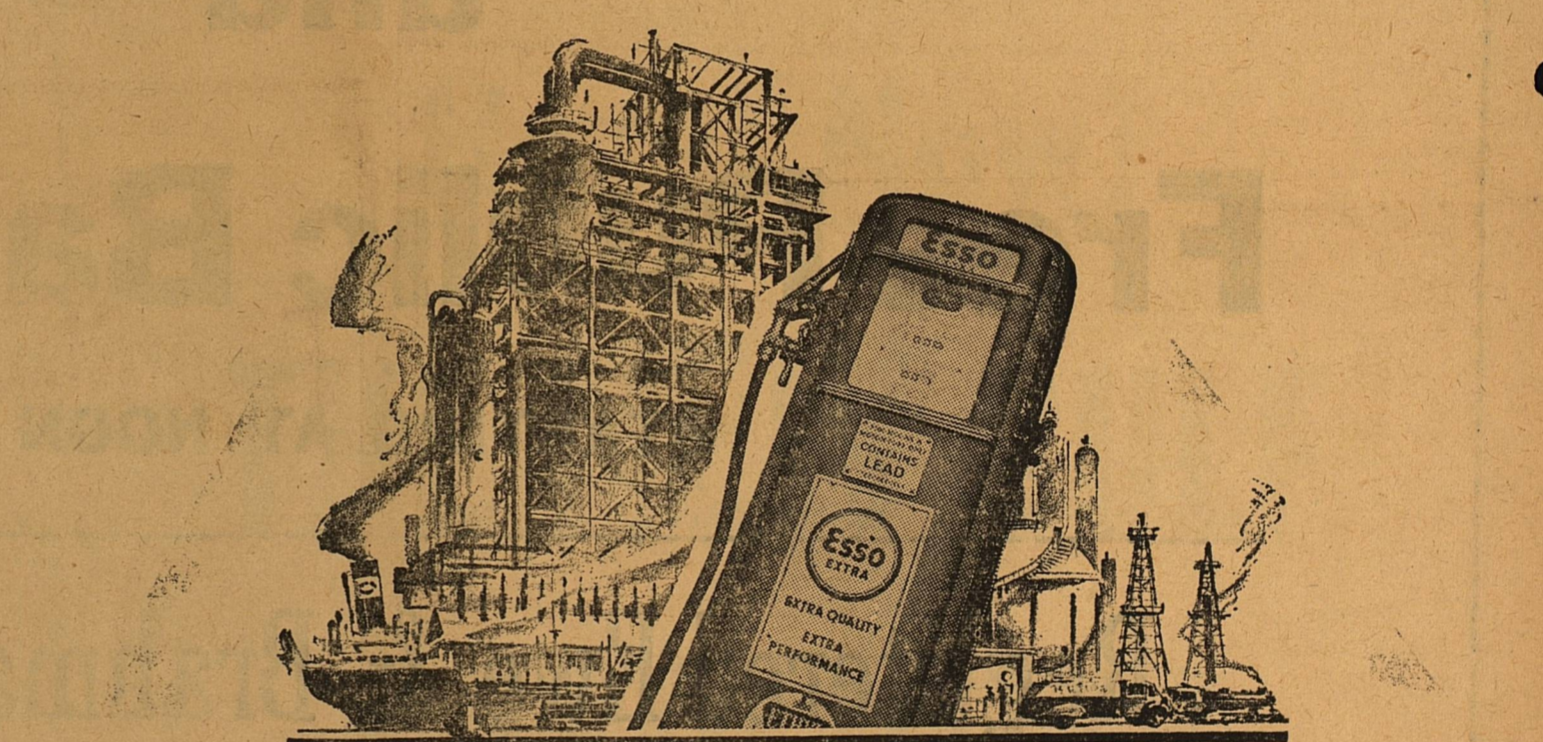
