The Eldorado Woolen Mill Tuesday made shipment on its last run of army blankets, and has turned again to production of civilian goods. For the first time in several years colors other than khaki are going through the looms, as employees start on several months of back orders from civilians.

Lights Are Assured For Football Field

"They will be playing under lights before the season is over," so promise the Lions who are fathering the proposed project of lighting the football field. Committee Chairman Dogey Finley reported Wednesday at Lions Club that arrangements had already been made for poles and other materials, that Taylor Construction Co., has been employed to do the work, and that dirt had begun to fly from the first post holes Wednesday. A little nestegg of a few hundred dollars from unsolicited donations from within and out of Schleicher County will be used as a nucleus by committee members who expect to canvass the territory.

Reports from the most successful lamb sale the community has ever had, and discussion of the football field lighting project occupied much of the attention of the Lions at their regular meeting Wednesday. J. D. Ashmore was taken in as a new member. Misses Prescott and Johnson, of the Concho Red Chapter, talked on Junior Red cross work, and Supt. Reynolds talked on football and called on Coach Al Vance, who conducted a football quiz. A committee to see about business houses closing for football games was appointed, and included Lions Patterson, Mace and Alexander.

Work for Sanitation Commended by State

For his efforts to make Eldorado free of sanitary hazards, City Health Officer, Dr. Pennington has received the following letter of commendation and suggestion from the state health department:

Dear Doctor Pennington: We certainly appreciate the interest you have expressed in your letter of September 4 with reference to taking precautionary measures so as to minimize sanitary hazards and prevent the spread of disease. The recommendations you have made to your Mayor and the citizens are good; a clean-up program is always in line with good public health practice.

The kerosene that you mention has been used very successfully in connection with flea control work. Within a short time DDT will be available to the public. This has been found to be a very good insecticide when properly used and properly applied. A 5 per cent solution of DDT will have a residual effect and is being used in our storm areas. The walls and floors are sprayed with 1 tablespoon of 100 per cent DDT to 1 pint of ordinary commercial spray on the market and is applied to the walls by means of an ordinary hand spray, which can be purchased at most drug stores or filling stations. DDT 10 per cent dust, when placed in rat runs, has been found to be very effective in reducing flea menace. After the runs have been dusted then poison should be put out.

If you care to put on a poisoning program it is possible that the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service may be in a position to help you organize such a program. Powdered borax has been found to be quite effective when sprayed in garbage pails and privie vaults in keeping down fly breeding. By all means, your outdoor toilets should be sanitized. Under separate cover we are sending you several leaflets on common diseases and we hope that you will be successful in getting your program under way.

Don McCormick Chosen For R. E. A. Managership

Don McCormick becomes new manager of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op on October 1, according to announcement made this week, following the St. Louis office's approval of his selection by the REA board. He has tendered his resignation as civilian motor dispatcher at the bombardier school in San Angelo, and will be released in time to take over the REA managership by the first of the month.

Mr. McCormick is not a stranger in Schleicher County. He accompanied his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. H. McCormick, to Eldorado 45 years ago. He received his edu-

cation in the Eldorado schools, after his graduation attending college a year at A & M.

He has had a varied business experience. He was associated with his brother, Van, as a partner in the ginning business several years, was tax assessor of Schleicher County 12 years, ranching 11 years, and 32 months ago went to San Angelo to accept a position at Concho Field, which he leaves to return to Eldorado. He is a veteran of World War I and a charter member of the Eldorado Lions Club. He, his wife, and his 8-year-old daughter Donna Beth, are making their home in the McCormick home place.

Sixty New Users Place Application For Dial Phones

At least 450 families will be telephone subscribers on the local exchange when installation of the dial system has been effected in Eldorado and Schleicher County, judging by the number of new users who have asked for service. The exchange serves about 385 to date, and at least 60 names of new users have already been added, these to receive service when the new system is installed.

A hindrance to rapid completion of the work is the current labor shortage. A crew is now working out of Angelo, but as there are only six men in this crew, the work cannot proceed rapidly. It is possible that due to the size of the project—complete rebuilding of the lines and house to house installation of new dial phones—from four to six months may be required.

The new station will specialize in fixing of flats and in grocery service, both being lines which Mrs. Elder had not previously operated, and in washing and greasing.

Securing of Westinghouse dealership and designation of the Elder station as a bus stop has caused her to feel the need of more room, and carpenters began work Monday on a new 12x30 foot building located beside the filling station, to be used as a Snack Bar. Mrs. Elder states that she will serve coffee and chili, and the wrapped sandwiches which bus passengers often buy.

Lamb Sale Total Is Over \$3000

Last year's totals of \$1100 were practically tripled at the 1945 P. T. A. & Lions Club Lamb Sale, report jubilant committee members, who expect to drop \$3000 over and above expenses into their club treasuries, after staging Saturday the most successful benefit auction the city has ever known.

The sale included mostly lambs—about 48 of them, all donated, each of which was sold several times; also a goat, two turkeys, flowers, a blanket, and many other commodities. A water fight staged during the afternoon with much balleyhoo by the fire boys, numerous cake walks, bingo games, and free barbecue for 600 at noon were among the entertainment features which helped to make the affair an outstanding success.

Visitors were present from all over Schleicher County, and from neighboring counties, especially from San Angelo and Sonora. Merchandise was donated from everywhere, and auctioneer's services were donated by the popular Nelson Johnson of San Angelo.

The almost superhuman task of staging this enormous show required the time and talents of a large number of men and women from this locality, who handled an enormous amount of activity with the maximum amount of teamwork. Plans and preparations had had been made weeks in advance, which partly accounted for the smoothness with which the affair was presented.

Many Show Interest In New Menard Road

Interested Schleicher County officials, businessmen, ranchers and farmers are hoping soon to hear that the proposed Eldorado-Menard road is receiving the go-ahead signal from the state highway department. Nothing new has been heard this week, but there is much interest in the \$50,000 bond election which will be held in the county on October 13, a petition for this election having been presented last week to the Commissioners Court.

Order of Road Bond Election

The State of Texas)
County of Schleicher)

On this the 10th day of September, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Schleicher County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court house at Eldorado, Texas, the following members of said Court, to-wit:

C. L. Meador Jr., County Judge, presiding; and,
C. A. Graves, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1;
John Irvin King, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2;
Pat Martin Commissioner, Precinct No. 3;
J. A. Enochs, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4;

being present and participating, came on to be considered the petition of Jno. F. Webster and 62 other persons, for an election to be held in Schleicher County, Texas, to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the total principal sum of \$50,000, for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity; and,

It appearing to this Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) qualified resident property taxpaying voters of Schleicher County, Texas; and,

It further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Schleicher County, Texas; It is, therefore, considered and ordered by the commissioners' Court of Schleicher County, Texas:

1. That, pursuant to the aforesaid petition, an election shall be held in said County on the 13th day of October, 1945, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not bonds shall be issued on the faith and credit of said County, in the total principal sum of \$50,000, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied, annually, on all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity, under authority of the Constitution and laws of the state of Texas, particularly Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution, and Chapter 16, Acts 1926, First Called Session, as amended; such bonds, if issued, will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 5 per cent per annum, and shall mature at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than twenty-five (25) years from their date.

2. In the event said bonds are authorized by the necessary favorable vote of the qualified electors of said County, Voting at such election, the proceeds from the sale thereof shall be applied to the purchase of right-of-way, construction of fences, maintenance and operation, and to pay all necessary damages incident to the construction of the following roads in said County as follows.

A road running east and west through the county, and also through the city of Eldorado, from county line to county line and designated by The State Highway Department of Texas, as Highway No. 151.

3. All persons who are legally qualified voters of said Schleicher County, Texas, who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

4. All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And, those opposed to the proposition shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

5. The polling places and Presiding Officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows:

Eldorado, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 1, at Court House, J. F. Isaacs, Presiding Judge.

Eldorado, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 1-A, High School Building, W. N. Ramsey, Presiding Judge.

Mayer Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 2, Mayer School House No. 1, Harry Freund Presiding Judge.

Rudd Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 3, Adams School House, Webb Montgomery Presiding Judge.

Vermont Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 4, Finnigan Ranch House, Ed Finnigan, Presiding Judge.

Mayer Community No. 2, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 5, Mayer School House No. 2, Joe Ruff, Presiding Judge.

Alexander Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 6, Alexander School House, E. F. Ramsel, Presiding Judge.

Cliff Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 8, Cliff School House, J. Forrest Runge, Presiding Judge.

Reynolds Community, Texas, Voting Precinct Number 9, Reynolds School House, E. W. Craig, Presiding Judge.

6. The County Clerk of Schleicher County, Texas, is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of said election to be published once each week for three consecutive weeks, in some newspaper of general circulation that has been continuously and regularly published for more than one year previous to the date of this order, in Schleicher County, Texas, and, in addition thereto, by posting notices of such election at four public places in Schleicher County, Texas, one of which shall be at the courthouse door of said County, for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

7. A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of Schleicher County, Texas, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Jno. Irvin King and seconded by Commissioner C. A. Graves that the same be passed and adopted. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of said Court voted "Aye": Commissioners Graves, King, Martin and Enochs; and the following voted "No": None.

Country Woman's Club Has Meeting

"A scrupulously clean bed is the pride of most homemakers," was the theme of the demonstration and talk given to The Country Woman's Club by our County Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Fannie Pittman, in the home of Mrs. Savola Bolt, Wednesday, Sept. 5th. Mrs. Pittman talked on the care of the bed, and gave instructions on how to make inexpensive covers for the bed springs and mattresses, and how to make a mattress pad, all of which are easily made and are worth many times their original cost in the years they add to the life of a mattress and the help they give in keeping a bed fresh, clean and inviting.

Mrs. Pittman showed a finished item of each of the articles discussed. She also discussed the protection of pillows and demonstrated a finished protector made of a soft pliable and washable material which would not interfere with the softness and smoothness of the pillow. To prevent the comfort from becoming soiled at the end which is at the head of the bed a comfort protector was demonstrated.

During the business session of the meeting it was discussed and voted upon to cooperate with the P. T. A. and the Lions Club at the Lamb Sale on Sept. 15, by each member of the club donating

a gift or some gifts for the Bingo table.

Also during the meeting Mrs. Pittman brought to our attention the benefit to be derived by the club members taking advantage of the work being done by The Canning Research Project for Texas sponsored by the University of Texas and A & M College. Anyone who is being troubled with the spoilage of some of their canned products may send in one con container of the spoiled vegetable or fruit and one or two good containers of the same product which was canned at the same time and under the same conditions to be analyzed. Later the sender will receive a report as to the cause of spoilage and will also receive reimbursement for the good containers sent in with the same amount of the product sent in or of a similar product. The sender is not required to pay the postage on the products sent or received; they may be sent postage collect. If additional information is desired on this matter it may be obtained by contacting Mrs. Pittman at her office in the Court House.

Present for this meeting were five members, namely: Mrs. Gordie Alexander, Mrs. Fred Watson, Mrs. Raymond Dickens, Mrs. F. O. Prochaska, the hostess Mrs. Savola Bolt, and the agent, Mrs. Fannie Pittman.

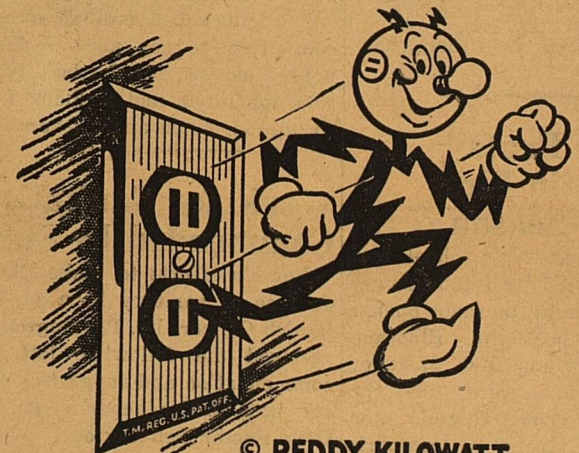

Parks-Williams

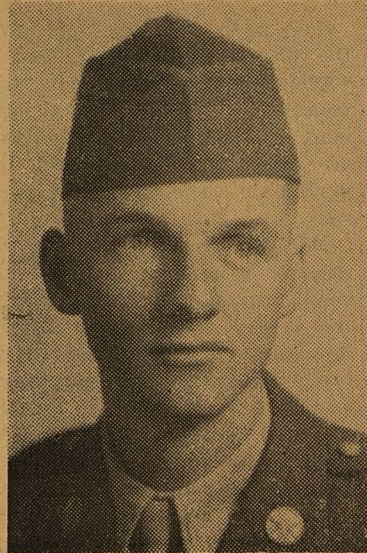

AAA News

Prior Approval

Now is about the time for farmers to begin seeding of small grains for this fall. Those who plan to qualify their small grain, except wheat, as a winter cover crop under the 1946 program must have prior written approval of the Co. Committee before they begin seeding of the grain. The local office has recently been advised that no payment will be made for a practice in 1946 for which prior written approval of the committee was not obtained before institution of the practice.

Sheep and Lamb Subsidy

The local office has been advised to accept applications for the sheep and lamb subsidy payment of those having sufficient evidence of sales. Payment of same by the County Committee will begin as soon as the drafts are received from the state office.

Directions Given for Oversea Packages

The war's end has not solved the problem of sending food to servicemen overseas and "food from home" is the first thought most of the boys have when they are asked what they would like to find in their Christmas packages.

Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, who recently resigned when her husband returned from overseas from the office of Extension Service Specialist in Food Preservation says, "Experience last year taught us to use foods canned in tin cans if at all possible. At least, it is essential to pack the foods in tight metal containers.

Reports from servicemen indicate that food not sealed in cans was usually molded, infested with insects, soaked in oil or water, or it was dried out and old.

Proper canning will be even more important this year with the bulk of the packages going to the Pacific, where the climate and distance of travel will be harder on the contents.

"When sending food to the servicemen, it is best to send a variety of things unless he has asked for one specific food," says Mrs. Leverenz. "Some women planned a menu on this order: I can turkey, I can cranberry sauce, I can nuts, I can plum pudding. Another sent 1 can cheese, 1 can pickles, and 1 can crackers at one time. A meat, a vegetable, a fruit, a relish and a sweet which go together well might make make a whole meal," recommends Mrs. Leverenz.

Fruit cakes were among the most popular items sent last year. It is one of the most desirable products; therefore, Mrs. Leverenz advises that we continue to send fruit cakes even if sugar substitutes have to be used.

Other items which have been canned and sent overseas successfully are: cookies, candies, baked or fried fruit pies, breads, preserves and jellies, well-cured meats, fruits and potato chips, pickled boiled eggs and many other types of cake in addition to fruit cake. Your Home Demonstration Agent has recently received a compiled list of foods the women over the state successfully sent to the boys overseas last year. The recipe and method for canning these foods are given. For details on canning and packing these items see your Home Demonstration Agent.

Navy to Conduct Recruiting Drive

Houston.—Men to man history's mightiest fleet as it prowls the world to maintain peace will be recruited in an immediate national drive according to Lt. Comdr. Jack Beebe, Officer in Charge of Navy Recruiting in Southern Texas.

Commander Beebe announced that voluntary enlistments again are being received directly by the Navy, in accordance with a recent presidential edict. Enlistments are being accepted for the regular Navy from those 17 to 30 years of age for four-year terms and from those 17 to 50 1-2 for the Naval Reserve for the duration of the national emergency plus six months.

For those men who have not yet reached 18, and enlist with the consent of their parents, the term of enlistment is only until they reach majority on their twenty-first birthday.
