Change of Venue to be Asked in Sofge Trial

Defense attorneys for Carl Sofge, charged with the murder of his brother Clem in Eldorado on October 22, have filed application for change of venue, alleging ill feeling against the defendant in Schleicher County.

After postponement last month the trial is scheduled to open next Monday, Jan. 28. According to legal procedure, the plea for change of venue will be heard, and the judge will render a decision.

Clem Sofge, 43, died at about 1:30 Monday afternoon, Oct. 22 of gunshot wounds received when he was standing near the Eldo Hotel. After the shooting his brother Carl surrendered to authorities and was taken to the Schleicher County courthouse. He was later released on \$10,000 bail. On Nov. 8 the 51st grand jury indicted him for the murder of his brother and remanded him to jail without bond pending further investigation. A new bond of \$15,000 was made, and date of trial was set for Dec. 17. On that day continuance was granted upon motion of defense attorneys, who asked for delay because of absence of material witnesses, both in the armed services. The trial was re-set for Jan. 28, next Monday.

Fires, extinguished before much damage was done, caused firemen to make two runs Tuesday. The back room of the Williams and McAngus Hardware was filed with soot and smoke when an old coal stove with kerosene burner exploded. The damage was small.

A gas hose on a heater in the home of Mrs. J. Luedecke loosened, causing fire which burned window drapes but was extinguished before arrival of the fire truck.

Big Snow Benefits Southwest

Heavy snow, some of which melted as it fell, brought welcome moisture to Schleicher County and the Southwest this week and practically assured a good crop of range grass for early spring.

The amount of snow varied in Schleicher County from about five inches in Eldorado to about ten inches in the eastern section of the county. The snow followed a light rain, and part of it melted as it fell Monday morning. Later the temperature dropped, and the snow was light enough to pile up in small drifts as it was whipped around by the high winds.

The snow provided a field day for Schleicher's small fry, many of whom had not seen a real snow in several years. School children and older young people enjoyed hours of snowball fights, and rolled each other in the snow to make up for lost time.

While there may be scattered loss to Schleicher livestock, the loss (if any) is thought to be negligible, as the cold snap was not prolonged, and the range was covered with snow for only a day or two. The light loss was much more than offset by the gain, ranchers state.

The moisture will be of benefit to winter wheat and small grains of which acreage is small in this county.

As the snow drifted boot high in places ranchers experienced some inconvenience in feeding their stock, they report. Both farmers and ranchers were bogging down also in the mud which followed the melting snow. All trace of the snow was gone by Wednesday noon, and Eldoradoans, in the mud during the past week, joyfully noted that streets were beginning to dry.

During Monday and Tuesday motorists were inconvenienced by freezing of sleet on their windshields, but as far as is known there was no major automobile accident in this locality. Buses throughout West Hexas and S. W. Texas ran late during the 2-day snowstorm, but train service was about normal.

10th Month Added to Home Ec

Another step forward for the Eldorado High School has been made upon receiving approval last week from the State Education Department for the addition of a tenth month in the Home Economics Department.

The approval of the State Dept. enabling the vocational education program here to expand to a tenth month, culminates a dream of approximately five years standing for Supt. C. A. Reynolds and members of the school board, who have been attempting for at least that long to get the go-ahead signal on this project.

With the addition of the tenth month, the girls will receive an extra one-half credit for their work at home under the direction of the H. E. teacher, who will visit with and advise the students. The same number of hours will be put in at home as at school during the regular nine months period, and the project for each girl may be one of her own choosing providing it meets with the approval of the instructor.

Most schools are already using this plan, Supt. Reynolds state, and he feels that it is a step ahead in our educational program.

There are 25 girls in the Home Making department this year, under the direction of Miss Lucille Rumsey, practically all of whom will take advantage of this summer work.

OIL TEST DRILLING REACHES 4675 FEET

The Geo. P. Livermore wildcat, on the Tom Henderson ranch in Schleicher County is down about 4675 feet in a lime formation.

Dr. H. Z. Pennington appeared before the Lions Club at their regular meeting yesterday, and pointed out the need of a small but well equipped hospital for this county, and said that Schleicher County people were spending enough money in Angelo hospitals to build one here of their own.

In letters to their parents received Monday of this week, Pvts. Bud Davidson and Hensel Mathews, Jr. stated that they landed at Bremerhaven, Germany on Dec. 31 after a very pleasant voyage across the water.

On Christmas Day, the 6000 troops aboard the ship were served a turkey dinner and each boy presented with a gift. The boys stated that after landing they were taken about five or six miles inland, and had not yet been assigned to a definite post. Weather Man's Tools
 Some of the instruments used in studying the weather include the barometer which records atmospheric pressure used in forecasting the weather, the thermometer for recording temperature, hygrometers and psychrometers for measuring humidity, altimeters which measure evaporation, nephoscopes which trace the movement of the clouds, and various gauges used in measuring precipitation and weighing snow.

New Shrubbery

S. W. LIVESTOCK SHOW TO BE STAGED AT EL PASO

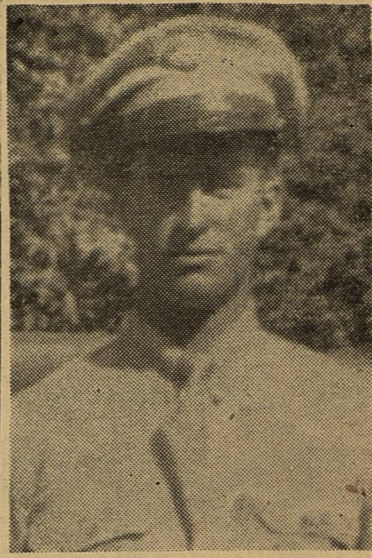

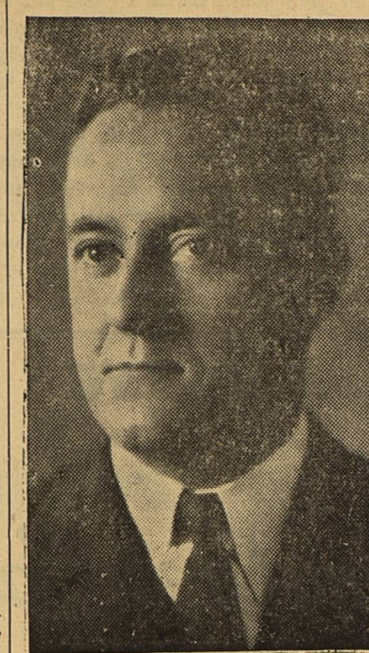
