Famine Relief Drive Launched in County

Cash UNRRA donations are to be made to committee members or businessmen, and canned goods will be placed in boxes provided for the purpose in Eldorado, states Fred Watson, county chairman, who is launching the famine-relief drive in Schleicher County.

Committees

The finance committee, members of which will have charge of money collected, are: Tiny Godwin, Mrs. John (Frankie) Williams and Mrs. S. D. Harper. The advertising committee are Rev. Jim Hays, Rev. J. A. Carriker and Rev. F. B. Faust. The food stores of Eldorado will take charge of collections of canned goods, and will maintain boxes for canned products.

It is specified that no glass jars are accepted, and that tinned food, if home canned, must be so labeled that the labels cannot be lost in transit.

It is stressed that this drive differs from the clothing drive in that this is an emergency—food must be collected and shipped out in 10 days or two weeks, for prompt action will save lives!

The depot for food thus collected will again be the store room at the rear of Ashmore's Barber Shop.

Mayor L. L. Baker, of Eldorado, has issued the following proclamation concerning the drive:

Proclamation

Whereas, the President of the United States has warned that "more people face starvation and even actual death from want of food today than in any war year, and perhaps more than in all the war years combined," and

Whereas, President Truman has also warned that "only through superhuman efforts can mass starvation be prevented" in many areas of the world which experienced the shortest crops in fifty years because of extreme droughts in 1945 and the disruption of war, and

Whereas, the President has expressed his faith that "the conscience of the American people will not permit them to withhold or stint their cooperation while their fellow-men in other lands suffer and die" and

Whereas, the American people have food to share because this country enjoyed a near-record production of food in 1945, and a record crop of wheat, and

Whereas, more than 500,000,000 men, women and children in Europe and Asia are now in dire need of food, and

Whereas, disease and unrest caused by food shortages threaten the health and peace of the entire world, and

Whereas, the Emergency Food Collection gives every American an opportunity to help prevent famine overseas,

Now, Therefore, I Leslie L. Baker Mayor of the City of Eldorado, call upon all citizens of this community, and all religious, educational, patriotic, civic, fraternal, business and labor groups to cooperate in this collection of canned food and cash contributions for the purchase of food to be shipped overseas through UNRRA for free distribution to starving people.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the City of Eldorado to be affixed on this 13th day of May, 1946.—Leslie L. Baker, Mayor of City of Eldorado.

for the Emergency Food Collection now underway in thousands of communities throughout the nation it was announced this week by Sec. of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, national chairman of the campaign to relieve hunger and starvation in famine-stricken lands. The collection of cash to buy food economically in large quantities and of gifts of food canned in tin is on behalf of UNRRA, of which F. H. LaGuardia is director general. Protestant, Catholic and Jewish leaders are giving their wholehearted support to the collection.

Mrs. W. J. McDonald, 88, mother of 10 children, pioneer resident of the Southwest, and widow of a Texas Ranger, died at 1:00 Wednesday morning of a stroke sustained the preceding Saturday morning.

Funeral are being held this afternoon, Thursday, May 16, 1946, in the First Baptist Church, of which she was a member. Officiating pastors will be Rev. J. M. Hays, pastor of the local church, and a grandson, the Rev. A. T. Nixon, pastor of the Miles Baptist Church. Pallbearers are grandsons: Charles, Bill and Erwin Mund; Edgar Spencer, Laymon and Vernon Hazelwood, Jefferson Nixon, Clovis Taylor, and Delbert and Gordon McDonald. Two grandsons, Glenn McDonald, Okinawa, and Junior McDonald, Sacramento, and one great grandson, L. D. Mund, Japan, are in service.

Music for the funeral is in charge of Mrs. Jim Hays and Mrs. Erwin Mund. Interment is to be made in the Eldorado Cemetery, with Ratliff in charge. At her request, the body remained in her home until time for the funeral.

In spite of her advanced age she retained use of her faculties and was active about her home and yard until the last.

A son, Audie, her 6th child, died in 1909, at the age of 19, and her husband preceded her in death 14 years ago. She is survived by nine children: Mrs. Henry Mund, Mrs. P. W. Hazelwood, Mrs. Frank Spencer, Mrs. A. M. Nixon, Mrs. Walter Taylor, Mrs. Roy Andrews, Mrs. Clyde Galbreath, and Marvin McDonald, all of Eldorado, and Nolen McDonald, Texarkana. Also surviving are 22 grandchildren, 42 great-grandchildren, and six great-great-grandchildren.

Pioneer Experiences

She was born Rebecca Angeline Chesser, May 14, 1858, one of the 8 children of the Chessers, residents of Burnet County, in Southwest Texas. When she was six, the family moved to Gillespie Co., where she received as much schooling as was offered children in those early days, and where, at the age of 16 she married a 17-year-old youth W. J. McDonald, April 1, 1874. The following year their first child was born. Housekeeping under primitive conditions was not a hardship to the youthful bride, who was a product of the Southwest. Her husband was for many years a Texas Ranger, and as an ordained pastor, preached as long as his heart would permit.

LEGION BARBECUE ATTENDED BY 300 SERVICEMEN AND THEIR FAMILIES & VISITING DIGNITARIES FROM ANGELO

About 300 Schleicher County servicemen from World War I and World War II attended a barbecue on the courthouse lawn Tuesday night, with the Legion, assisted by the Auxiliary, as hosts. After the supper, which included quantities of barbecue, salads, desserts and coffee, the group went to the court room where 28 servicemen were initiated into the Legion in the colorful and impressive Legion ceremony.

The post was opened by Post Commander Clyde Keeney, with Payne Robinson as sergeant at arms, Wm. Davis as chaplain, C. F. Jones as bugler, and two recruiting sergeants from Goodfellow Field, as colorbearers.

Many times when she was alone with her young children, she kept the family together and intact—though often there would be Indians prowling around the home, and panthers and wolves would be seen in the thickets as the members of the family were getting water from the spring. She had the experience of making camp in the open and putting the family to sleep in a wagon bed, and was proud of the rough picket house and log cabin in which she lived many years. During a period when her husband was blind she valiantly kept the family together until he regained his vision.

The couple kept a general store at Harper a number of years, and lived at various times around Melvin, Fredericksburg and Harper. In 1913 the couple moved to Eldorado, in 1917 to Melvin and later back to this city. Since the death of her husband Mrs. McDonald has been making her home with Mrs. C. W. Galbreath, a daughter.

At sixteen she was converted at the Spring Creek Methodist church and lived a consistent Christian life, her example exerting much influence on her large family. She later joined the Baptist church at Harper.

Commissioners Order Election on Memorial

Sofge Trial Opens Monday at Ballinger

A large number of witnesses subpoenaed in the case, and many others will go to Ballinger next week, when the trial of Carl Sofge, charged with murder in the death of his brother, Clem in Eldorado last October, will open under change of venue.

To clear up any misunderstanding as to just what witnesses are expected to be present, Judge Sutton makes the following statement:

"All witnesses subpoenaed in the Sofge case, except those special witnesses called on the application for change of venue, and for that purpose only, are expected to be in Ballinger Monday morning, May 20 at 10 a. m. Those called on the application for change of venue only, of course, are not to appear."

Proclamation

To the Citizens of the City and of the County notice is hereby given that the City and County health officers have ordered a Clean Up campaign for the purpose of preventing an outbreak of diseases which have started over the State of Texas.

At a meeting of the City and County officials together with the health officers and a committee from the Lions Club, it was deemed advisable that immediate action be taken. Infantile paralysis is becoming wide spread over the State and unless precautionary measures are taken this area may likewise become affected.

Acting upon a petition signed by the required number of qualified voters, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher Co., in regular session Monday, ordered a county bond election for June 15, for the purpose of voting on a \$50,000 bond issue for erection of a Memorial Park. The election order will be published, as required by law, three successive weeks in the Eldorado Success, probably beginning next week.

Setting of the election is the last step in a long series of discussions which have centered around this question. At first the proposed project of the American Legion, the movement to honor Schleicher's War II veterans grew until it assumed county-wide proportions. In a series of mass meetings, preference was narrowed down to two projects: a county hospital and a county recreational center. In an unofficial straw vote, the county gave a majority preference for the latter—and the question was submitted to the court Monday. The last step will be actual voting for or against the bond issue for the Memorial Park.

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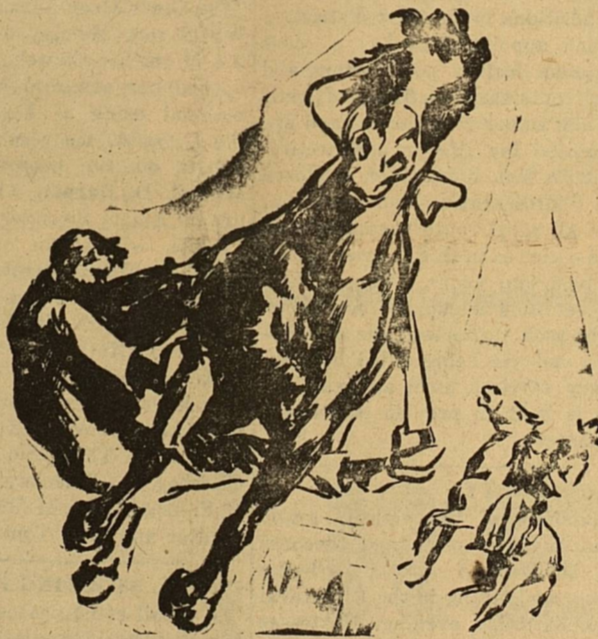

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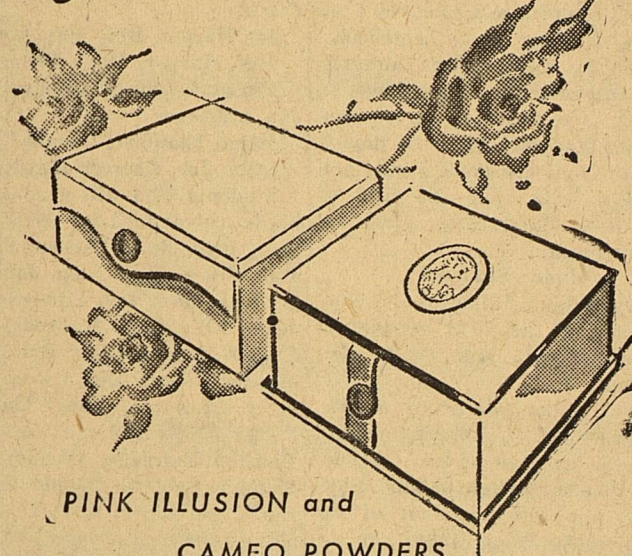

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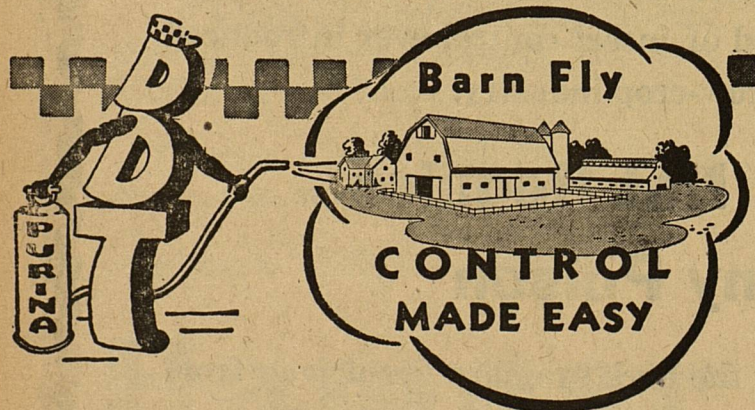

Co. Agent Explains Causes of Chlorosis

Co. Agent W. G. Godwin, in response to numerous calls received recently from Schleicher Co. residents, issues the following explanation of yellowing of vegetation:

There are several causes of the yellowing of leaves of plants, known as chlorosis. This yellowing of the foliage is caused by deficiency of iron. The iron in most alkaline soils is not available to most plants except in the presence of decaying of organic matter.

Probably all of us in Schleicher County who have planted fruit trees and especially berry vines (which calls on the soil for an excessive amount of iron) have had our trees to die, some very young and most always at five or six years of age, due to the yellowing of leaves or chlorosis.

There are several methods of treatment; namely: with iron sulphate (copperas) spray the leaves with 1 teaspoonful of iron sulphate to 1 gallon of water, adding a very little flour to make the iron sulphate stick to the leaves.

Iron sulphate may be mixed into the soil around the tree or shrub, mixing 1 part iron sulphate and 1 part commercial fertilizer. The lime in the soil will act quickly on the iron sulphate making the iron available to the plant.

Sulphur may be applied to the soil. The sulphur should be applied two months before it is expected for it to be effective, because it is first changed to acid, and then acts on the soil.

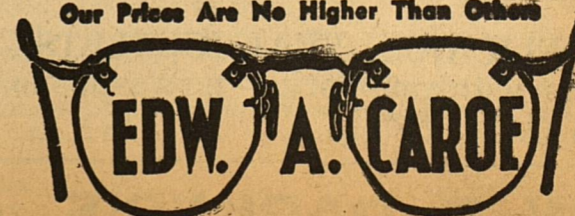

JOHNSON SHOWS USE OF DED-WEED ON RUNGE RANCH

The use of 2, 4-D was demonstrated on J. F. Runge's ranch Monday, May 13th by the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, making a total of three demonstrations conducted by the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation Service. Those present at the demonstration at Mr. Runge's were Mr. Albert Tisdale, D. C. Davis, Wesley Garrett, Earnest Nimitz and Soil Conservation Dist. Supervisor J. F. Runge.

The 2, 4-D (DeD-Weed) was furnished by the Soil Conservation Service. Three different mixtures of 2,4-D were used in the demonstration. The rates used were as follows: 1/2 oz. to 5 gallons water; 1 oz. to 5 gallons water, and 1 1/2 oz. to 5 gallons water. The solution was sprayed on various plants and

shrubs to the extent that the leaf surface was thoroughly wet. The undesirable plants and shrubs it was used on include mesquite trees, prickly pear, treadsalve, cedar, blue salvia, thistles, tasajillo, senna and bitter weed. The majority of the solution was used on undesirable plants and shrubs as an experiment, it was pointed out by Lloyd E. Johnson, Soil Conservation Service Engineering Aid. A close check will be made regularly on the plots to determine what results are obtained and to see what mixture of the three was most effective.
