Further Instructions on Use of DDT Given

By Co. Agent Godwin

In general a water spray made by using 1 lb. of 50% DDT powder in 100 gals, of water gives control of most flower and ornamental insect pests without injuring the plant or flowers.

DDT is not effective on these pests: red spider, mealy bugs, and aphids. These insects are mostly Smeer No. 62 is better. . the ones playing havoc to shrubs, garden plants and in some instances, fruit trees.

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


