**RELATIVE OF McDONALD  
DIES AT BRADY**

J. W. Alexander, West Texas centurian, who died at Brady Oct. 27, was an uncle of Ira McDonald of the Bailey Ranch community. Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning from the Hext Baptist Tabernacle and burial was in the Hext cemetery. His six sons were pallbearers.

Mr. Alexander passed the century mark, celebrating his 100th birthday last April 25. He was born in Bellview, Iowa, and at the age of 15 ran away from home and joined the Union Army, serving until his discharge in 1864. During that time he was taken prisoner by the Confederate Army, later returning home in an exchange of prisoners. He rejoined his old regiment which was engaged in struggles from Savannah through Georgia. At that time he was not quite 20 years old.

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


