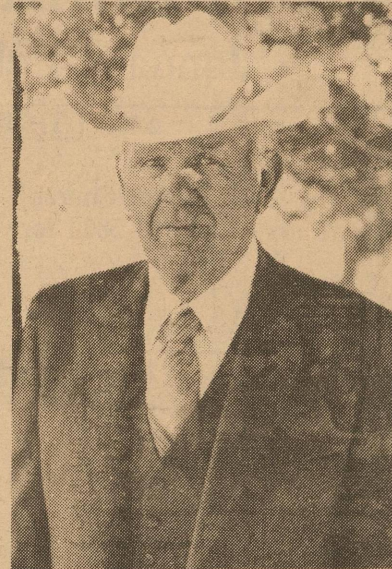
High School Athletes Participate In Powerlifting

Editor's Note: The following letter was written to the family of Henry Moore by Ilse Williams. The family would like to share this act of kindness with the community.

Dear Florence, Christie, Mike, and families,

There it was, the notice in the Standard Times, that Henry had died. Of course we all knew that his health had its ups and downs, but one is never quite ready for the inevitable last step. I can't even say that I am such a "close" friend of your families that I would know very much about Henry, not withstanding the fact that I have only been around here for twenty years-- when I came to Schleicher County Henry was already an "old" man of 66! I am certainly not one of the old-timers that has seen him weather the toughest economic times of the thirties and the fifties, so I really don't have any stories to tell!

But you know, whatever I have seen of him struck me quite a bit, and I thought I ought to let you know about that. To me, Henry has always been the embodiment of ingenuity and grit. For several years (it hasn't been that long ago) Steve and I sold our maize to the Moore Ranch, and we hauled load after load over there to weigh it (on

home-made scales) and unload it. So I spent quite a bit of time waiting, together with Henry, for the grain to run out of the back of the truck or trailer, listening to the clank and the clatter of the (home-made) auger that carried it up into the (home-made) tanks. We would try to get out of the wind and chaff, but of course, had to be close enough to shut the auger off when it stopped up--which it did on a regular basis! To me, it seemed as if this were an operation that ran on sheer determination, dedication, and most of all, inventive spirit. From the feedlot to the hog operation to the grain flakes to the scales and the roaring, rattling old pick-ups, it seemed there was nothing that could not be thought of, built, or fixed on this place, and all of this without great financial expense. you know, when you come from a country with professional traditions that are centuries old, with special trades for any and every product or service, someone like Henry is bound to impress you. He seemed to say in everything he did that if there was a will, there was a way!

During the last few years I also saw another side of Henry. As the election judge of our precinct, I was almost in awe to see how seriously he (and his family) took his civic responsibilities. Not being able to drive, much less hold a pen to write, he came to vote every time. I would go out to the car, ballots and pen in hand, record his (quite definite) decisions, talk with him a little, and return to the building wishing there were more voters like him!

So you see, Henry left me (and I would assume plenty of others, too) with quite a bit of inspiration about a life in the "west" lived in an admirable fashion. And knowing this will perhaps make letting go of him a little easier for you all.

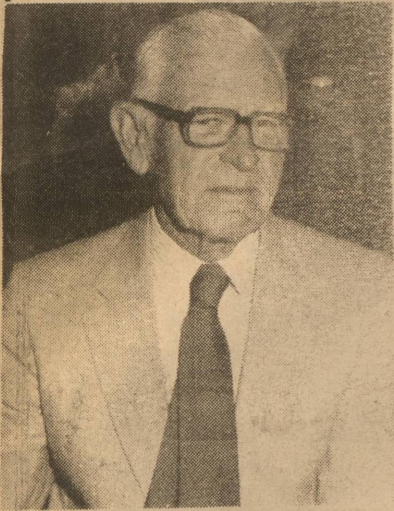

Archie "Arch" Mittel of Eldorado died in the Schleicher County Medical Center on Wednesday, January 12, 1994. Funeral service in his honor was held at 10 a.m. Friday, January 14th, at the First Baptist Church of Eldorado. Cemetery under the direction of Kerbow Funeral Home.

Arch was born August 31, 1908, in Sutton County to William and Christina Mittel, early day ranchers. He was the youngest of eight children, all now deceased. He is survived by his wife, Gladys; a son and daughter-in-law, Ronnie and Sharon Mittel of Eldorado; a daughter and son-in-law, Margo and Bill Harrison of Eagle Lake; four grandchildren, Ron and Melanie Mittel of Dallas, Mitzi and Chuck Mayfield of Lubbock, Billy Harrison of Louisville, Ky., Leslie and Jim Philips of Fort Worth; and numerous relatives and friends.

Pallbearers were nephews, Howard Mittel of Dripping Springs, Henry Mittel of Arlington, Raymond Mittel of Eldorado, Dan Mittel of Fredericksburg, Ben R. Mittel of San Angelo, Jerry Jordan of San Antonio and Charles Mangum of Dallas. Honorary pallbearers were the deacons of the First Baptist Church.

Their main purpose (I think) is to put a little clean humor in our lives, which seems to be giving way to the raunchy, obnoxious, insulting and offensive kind of humor being aired by such people as Howard Stern.

We seem to be letting our moral standards give way to political correctness.
