Eldorado Wins Bi-District Over Marfa Go to Eden for Final Game Tomorrow

ELDORADO DOWNS MARFA 28-0 HERE IN FRIDAY GAME

Following the terrific battle they underwent with Junction two weeks previously, the bi-district game with Marfa came as a sort of anticlimax here last Friday night, when the Eldorado Eagles shut out their opponents by a score of 28 to 0.

It was Eldorado's game all the way, and at no time were the Eagles in any danger.

The score at the first quarter was 14-0 and at the half stood 21-0. In the 4th quarter Eldorado picked up another touchdown. All four of Nixon's place kicks were good and the final score was 28 to 0. Marfa had only one first-down to its credit in the entire game, while Eldorado racked up 19.

By the middle of the last quarter fans began filtering their way out of the grounds to avoid the traffic jam. An unusually large crowd was present.

Half-Time Events

Marfa's Shorthorn Band marched on to the field to get half-time events under way. The band went the length of the field then back to center where they faced both stands with a HI formation, as they played "Howdy Do." Then they formed a sombrero and played "I'm An Old Cow Hand."

Ralph Pauley's Eagle Band took over the field with more marching and exhibition. They formed a Stairway to the Stars, and while the field was darkened and a large light was lighted, Charles Gary narrated the series of victories during the season that had brought the District crown to Eldorado.

Half-time ended as a large bell was lighted on the darkened field and the Eagle band played "The Bells of St. Mary's."

Small colored flashlights showed up well on the Eagle band whenever the field was darkened.

Williams Producer Is Finaled This Week

Official test of Frankel and Frankel's No. 1 R. S. Williams producer showed production of 92 barrels flowing naturally in 10 hours.

Production is through perforations from 5520 to 40 feet in 5½-inch casing cemented at 5606 feet. It plugged back to 5606 after encountering sulphur water in the Ellenburger. This producer is on the edge of Schleicher County, near the Prion line, two miles south of the Tankersley Strawn pool.

Testing of Westbrooks No. 1 A. L. Baugh, in section 8, block M, is under way. Schlumberger has been run at 5728 feet. The test is about a mile from the Baugh producer.

TEMPERATURES ARE HIGHER AFTER BIG COLD SNAP

Temperatures are rising today after a cold snap which sent the thermometer down to about 12 above.

Heavy demands were made on the gas distribution system in Eldorado, and stockmen were on hand to look after stock which might be suffering from the low temperatures.

The worst of the "spell of weather" was its beginning—Tuesday night, when the thermometer stood at about 12 above all night, and not much higher throughout the following day. Wednesday night saw rising temperatures, and today the sun is out again and prospects are bright for a warm afternoon.

Let's Put Safety Into Santa's Pack

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 7.—Christmas time is always looked forward to as a joyous season, but unless safety is considered in choosing Christmas toys, the surprises left by Santa may prove tragic. Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, specialist in family life education with the A&M College Extension Service, gives a few pointers for buyers of children's toys.

Remember the child's age, his interest, and stage of development, Mrs. Johnson reminds, because children naturally are curious and constant supervision is not always possible. A two-year-old in the hand-to-mouth age should have washable toys with no sharp points or edges and nothing flammable nor with poisonous paint should be included.

Stuffed animals, the specialist points out, sometimes offer hazards if they have glass eyes or buttons which may come off. She suggests rubber balls, plastic bathtub toys, solid wood toys, or light weight hollow blocks.

For children between the ages of six and eight, electrical toys are popular. Mrs. Johnson advises, however, that these should have the seal of approval from Underwriter Laboratories—a guarantee of proper construction against fire hazard and shock.

A place to keep toys can be a safety measure. A box, cupboard or open shelf is handier than drawers or a cabinet with doors which are hard to manage and sometimes stick. "Playthings are the tools which help children to learn," says Mrs. Johnson, "so it is an important job to select safe toys and teach safe habits in using them."

Closing out the football season, the football banquet will be held in the school cafeteria Saturday night. There will be an out of town speaker, and other program numbers are also planned.

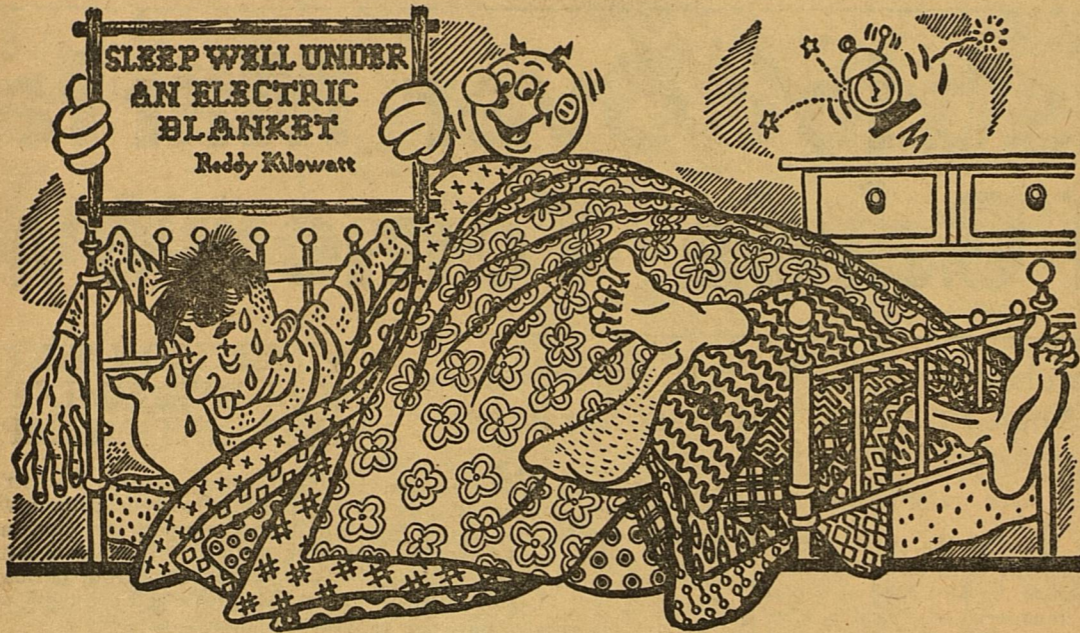

Questions, Answers, On Veteran Problems

Q—My uncle, a World War II veteran, died in 1947, leaving my aunt a \$10,000 GI Insurance policy paid in a lump sum. The policy also listed two contingent beneficiaries. My aunt died in 1949, before receiving the special NSLI dividend. To whom will the dividend be paid?

A—The dividend will be paid to your aunt's estate, and not to the contingent beneficiaries. When your uncle died, your aunt was vested with the right to all benefits of the policy including the dividend—thus precluding the possibility of the dividend going to the contingent beneficiaries.

Q—I was in the Army for only two months, when I was discharged for a service-connected disability. Am I eligible for VA hospital care?

A—Yes. Apply at the nearest VA regional office.

Q—I am an ex-WAVE, in need of hospitalization for a nonservice-connected ailment. There are no beds for me at the VA hospital near my home, and my physician says I am in no condition to travel long distances to another VA hospital. What can I do?

A—Contact your VA regional office. VA may authorize treatment for women war veterans in a private hospital without regard to service-connection, if beds are not available in a VA hospital.

Q—Should a claim for disability compensation ever be filed by a veteran with a dishonorable discharge?

A—A veteran always has the privilege of filing a claim. In this case, to show entitlement, he would have to prove he was insane at the time he committed the act for which he was discharged dishonorably.

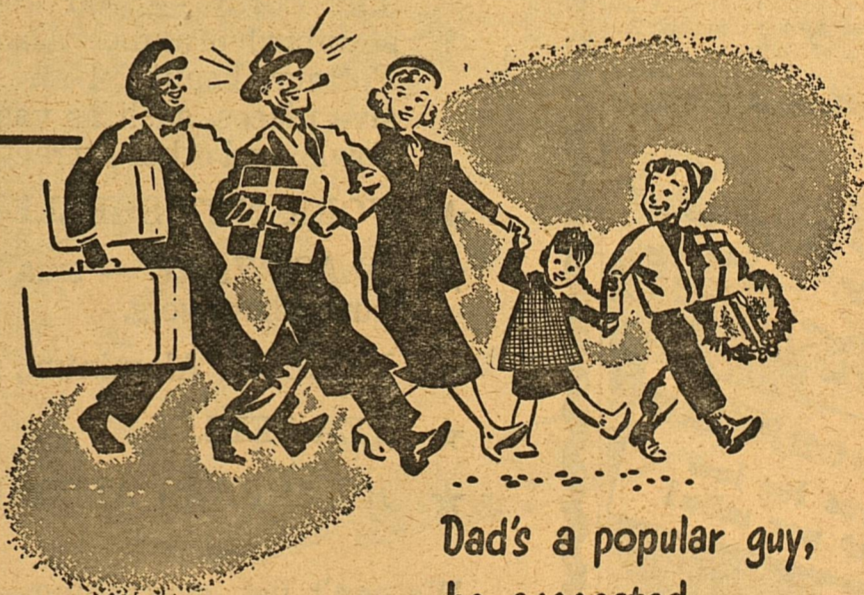

Recipe of the Week

Stir-N-Roll Biscuits
 2 cups sifted flour
 3 teaspoons double-action baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/3 cup salad oil
 2/3 cup milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt into a bowl. Pour milk and oil into a measuring cup, but don't mix together. Pour all at once into the dry ingredients.

Stir with a fork until mixture cleans sides of bowl and rounds up into a ball. Smooth up by kneading about ten times without additional flour.

With the dough on waxed paper, press out 1/4 inch thick with hands, or roll out between waxed papers. For a higher biscuit roll dough 1/2 inch thick. Cut with unfloured biscuit cutter. For drop biscuits, after dough rounds up into ball, drop with fork on cooky sheet.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes on ungreased cooky sheet on very hot oven (475 deg. F.) Makes about 20 medium biscuits.

For Stir-N-Roll biscuits made with buttermilk instead of sweet milk, use only 2 teaspoons double-action baking powder and add 1/4 teaspoon of soda.

If you are doubling or tripling the recipe, measure milk and oil into a bowl, then pour all at once into the flour.

- 1 teaspoon salt.

Method

In frying pan, cook bacon until grease is almost cooked out. Drain off fat. Add butter and onion, cooking until onion is transparent. Add rice, and allow to brown. Rice will look somewhat like nuts. Butter casserole and pour in bouillon, water and add salt. Add rice mixture and nuts. Bake one hour in 350-degree F. oven. This will serve six persons.

Hosiery An Item That Comes High

COLLEGE STATION—More money is spent for hosiery than for any other one item in the clothing budget. Mary Routh, extension clothing specialist of Texas A&M College, says the reason may be due to the fact that not enough attention is given to the size and kind of hosiery bought nor to proper care and laundering.

She says hosiery, just the same as any other wearing apparel, should be selected for the occasion or for a particular use and different type hose should be used with different costumes. For example she says, ultra sheer hose should be reserved for special dress occasions because they are too fragile for everyday use. Sheer hose, on the other hand, are suitable for both dress and general wear, but are out of place on people who are active in sports and the like. Heavier weight hose are appropriate for household, active sports and winter wear.

Price alone, says Miss Routh, is not a guide to hosiery quality. Some medium and low priced hose may have the wearing qualities sought while other higher priced hose may give poor service because durability was sacrificed for sheerness by the manufacturer.

Miss Routh says hosiery buyers should become familiar with the terms used to designate quality in the finished product. First quality in hosiery indicates a stocking without flaws or irregularities. All hosiery not thus designated is classified substandard and includes irregulars, seconds and thirds. The hose of substandard quality must each be marked to show how they are classified.

Irregular refers to hosiery that contain imperfections or irregularities in size, color or fabric but neither stocking in the pair has noticeable mends, runs, tears, or breaks. They could give very satisfactory wear and be a good buy. They should be carefully examined before they are bought. Seconds and thirds are hose in which one or both stockings of a pair contain noticeable mends, runs, tears, breaks or defects. Seconds contain shorter mends or breaks than do the thirds.

Miss Routh says the hosiery must fit well if the buyer is to get the most service and wear from them. Buyers should consider foot and leg length, foot and leg width, and calf and ankle measurements because all influence correct fitting. Generally the foot of the stocking when measured flat should be one-half inch longer than the foot and a fleshy foot may require a longer foot length to allow for extra take up.

The best quality and best fitting hose will not give satisfactory service unless they are properly cared for and laundered after each time they are worn. Miss Routh says most people can reduce their hosi-

ery bill by just being a little more careful with their selections, using the type of hose best suited for the occasion and by giving proper attention to the care, handling and laundering of their hosiery.

ROAD WORK UNDER WAY IN REAGAN COUNTY

Grading of the road to the Benedum Field is due to get under way by the middle of December, it has been learned from H. L. Bailey, resident engineer of the State Highway Department. Two bridges are now under construction and two more remain to be completed before the grade work starts. Mr. Bailey stated that the road will probably be ready for topping by April. Beginning at a point about half of a mile west of Texon on Highway 67, this new road extends approximately 10 miles to the Upton County line, near the center of the Benedum Field.

Future State Highway plans for the county include the paving of the spurs leading from Highway 67 into Texon, Santa Rita and Kemper Station, and repair work on the highway west of Big Lake, Mr. Bailey announced.

Highway 33, which is a continuation of the Big Spring highway leading from Big Lake into Crockett County toward the southeast, has been completed to Midway Lane, a distance of 20 miles. Plans call for a contract to be let in January for the construction of a 17-mile stretch that will extend the road to the Ozona-Barnhart highway, and another contract later for the remaining stretch to the Schleicher County line, Mr. Bailey stated. Work is already in progress on the construction of the road through Schleicher County. Upon the completion of Highway 33, travelers from West Texas will be afforded a much shorter route to Austin and other southeast points. —Big Lake Wildcat.

Nut Brown Pudding
1 1/2 cups 1/2-in. bread cubes (2 days old)
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1/2 cup finely cut nuts
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/2 cup water
3 tablespoons soft butter
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1 unbeaten egg
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
4 teaspoons water
Turn on oven; set at very slow (300°). Grease a qt. baking dish. Mix bread cubes with raisins, nuts, milk and 1/2 cup water. Let stand. Put butter into bowl; blend in mixture of sugar, salt and spices. Beat in egg. Stir in bread mixture. Then stir in mixture of soda and 4 teasp. water. Put into greased baking dish. Bake 25 min., then stir; bake about 35 min. longer, or until firm and brown. Serve warm. Makes 4 servings.
