Frank Prochaska Moves To Kilgore On Shell Promotion

Frank Prochaska, chief engineer at the Shell Station here 9½ years, has been promoted to another position at Kilgore, and his place at Shell is being taken temporarily by Fred Watson. New in Eldorado will be George Cales, who has been chief engineer at Austin, and later at Kilgore, and who will be chief engineer for the Bailey Station on the Rancho line.

Prochaska has gone to Kilgore to familiarize himself with his new duties. He will return Saturday, accompanied by Cales, who will look over the local field before he actually moves to this county.

As mentioned above, Mr. Watson's place as chief engineer is considered only temporary. Company officials explain that no decision has been made concerning disposition of the Shell Station after the new Rancho line and the new Bailey Station are in operation. They may sell the ten-inch line, or they may keep it—a fact which causes delay all this year in making permanent assignments.

The Kilgore position will be an advancement for Mr. Prochaska, as the station there is a gathering system, as the new Bailey station will be here, and it is also area headquarters, located on the East Texas line.

Mr. and Mrs. Prochaska and their two sons will leave Eldorado about the 28th—in time to take over in Kilgore by July 1.

Mr. and Mrs. Cales, who have a teen age daughter, will occupy the Shell house vacated by the Prochaska family, until the new chief engineer's house at the Bailey Station is completed.

He will be here while the new Bailey Station is being built, and his position here will be comparatively permanent.

While the move has been pending for Prochaska for about 6 months, the actual orders to go to Kilgore did not come through until last week. Mrs. Prochaska's relatives are in Dallas, and the Kilgore area is not only nearer to these relatives but the locality is nearer to the part of the state in which they expect to retire later. Mr. Prochaska has been with Shell 27½ years.

The move at this time has caused the family to cancel plans for their vacation for the present.

LICENSE EXAMINER TO SKIP THIS MONTH

Ray Sundry, driver's license examiner from San Angelo, will not fill his regular appointment in Eldorado on June 27, he informed county officials here this week. Sundry is regularly scheduled to be in Eldorado the fourth Friday of each month to give driver's license examinations.

The Blaylock family car, driven by Mrs. W. A. Blaylock, and another driven by a Baetge boy, collided at the King's Crown corner, injuring several, and damaging the two cars.

Most seriously injured was Mrs. Blaylock, who has been confined to her bed since the accident. Her youngest daughter, Judy, the other occupant of the car, received some head cuts and less serious injuries. Occupants of the other car, Derl Griffin and two Baetge boys, were not seriously hurt, but Derl was taken to the hospital in Sonora for treatment.

NEW BROOKSHIRE CHURCH IS OPENED SUNDAY

Friends of the Rev. and Mrs. Jim Hays will be interested in learning that the Brookshire Baptist church, of which Rev. Hays has been pastor since leaving here over a year ago, has completed its building program, and that the first services in the new church building were held Sunday.

A number of visiting dignitaries from the Baptist church organization took part in the morning and afternoon services.

The new brick veneer church has 7,056 square feet of floor space, featuring an auditorium with a seating capacity of 300, — 22 classrooms, a study, office, kitchen and dining room. There is a central heating system, and an air conditioning system also.

The church was founded in 1869. It has 153 members, with 160 in Sunday School in seven departments, and other active church organizations. A new parsonage was put up in 1947, when they first called a full time pastor. The church has been showing substantial growth. A picture of the fine new building appears in the June 12 issue of the Brookshire Times.

Schleicher County Oil News

Schleicher County received two more new wells and another prospector this week.

One of the new oilers is Wesley W. West of Houston No. 5 Mrs. Christena Mittel. It was completed in the Neva West field north of Eldorado for a daily flowing potential of 628.74 barrels of 47-gravity oil.

That flow was gauged through a 9/32-inch tubing choke and from perforations in casing at 6,312-50 feet.

Flowing pressure was 850 pounds on tubing and 290 pounds on casing. Gas-oil ratio was 858-1.

No. 5 Mittel is the eighth completed well in the Neva West field.

Skelly Oil Company, Monarch Oil & Royalty Corporation and Southland Royalty Company completed the other new well. It is No. 3 Davis in the Huldale-Strawn field.

It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 437.08 barrels of 39.4-gravity oil. That flow was through a 3/4-inch tubing choke and from casing perforations at 5,669-5,692 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 600-1 and tubing pressure was 275 pounds.

The same operators reported location for No. 4 Davis Estate. It is to be dug 467 feet from south and west lines of section 43, block M, PH&SA survey.

Pan American No. 1 Tom R. Henderson, wildcat 13½ miles east of Eldorado, was drilling below 4,701 feet in lime after a drillstem test from 4,688 to 4,698 failed to develop shows of oil. Recovery on the test was 30 feet of very slightly gas-cut mud.

The Pure Oil Company No. 1 Mrs. R. S. Williams, another Schleicher wildcat, was making hole below 6,100 feet in shale.

American Republics No. 3 W. H. McClathry, south outpost to the Huldale-Strawn field, was bottomed in lime preparing to test through perforations in seven-inch casing from 5,725 to 5,745 feet. This well is reported to be making a lot of gas.

T. L. Williams No. 9-A Bert Page, project at the south side of the Page-Strawn field, was digging below 5,290 feet in Strawn lime.

Anton Oil Corporation No. 1 Mrs. Hallie Manton Reynolds, Schleicher wildcat, has been plugged and abandoned on total depth of 7,976 feet. No other details were reported.

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 3-3 Wilson, stepout from production in the Neva West field, was drilling at 4,050 feet in lime and shale.

C. R. Rutherford No. 1 Baugh, stepout to production in the Baugh-Strawn field, was drilling below 4,535 feet in lime.

Two Teachers Leave For Brady Jobs

Two Eldorado teachers, Wayne Griffin, shop teacher, and Mrs. Griffin, physical ed., have resigned to accept positions in Brady. Mr. Griffin will teach shop for the Brady Aviation Corporation, and Mrs. Griffin will teach in the Brady school system.

Among teachers working on their Masters are Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Price, who are both in North Texas, Denton.

Janitors are at work on routine summer jobs, on yards and buildings. Installing of additional new green chalk boards for the old building, and renovating of the floors, will be among the larger summer projects.

All floors throughout the school system will be cleaned and waxed, and other routine improvements will be made before the new year starts.

No new teachers have been employed to date, though the superintendent has been assembling credentials for several, and will also have the usual "teacher hunt" trips to make before the corps of teachers will be completed.

MISS SHELTON IN DENTON

Mrs. Wade's Niece Killed In Fort Worth; Mrs. Wade At Funeral

Dorothy Sue McKnight Scott, pretty 22-year-old Fort Worth divorcee, who was killed instantly by her former husband who then fatally injured himself, was a niece of Mrs. Marion Wade of this city, who is attending the funeral in Bangs today.

The shooting occurred when the girl's former husband, M. D. Scott, 27, entered the office in which she worked and drew the gun on her, shooting six times, then killing himself. The tragedy was not at first noticed, as it happened during the noon hour, and the sound of shots went unheeded in the noon traffic noise, and lull from work on that floor.

The couple were divorced after about two years of marriage.

Primary purpose of the meeting is to study ways and means of establishing a sustained program of national advertising of what West Texas has to offer tourists and industry.

Assessments Are Set For Local Candidates

Assessments of Democratic candidates were set at \$100 for county offices and at \$50 for county precinct offices (commissioners) at the meeting Monday of the county Democratic committee, it was announced by E. C. Hill, chairman. These assessments will cover both the July 26 and August 23 primaries, Mr. Hill said.

Names of candidates for the various offices were drawn to determine the order in which they will appear on the ballot.

About 2,000 ballots will be printed and will be available for absentee voting by July 5, which is the prescribed 20 days before election.

The committee pointed out that two voting places would be especially crowded this year, the court house and the school house. In order to save time all voters should bring poll tax receipts or exemption certificates, as required by law.

Legislation Asked Raising Minimum On Teacher Salaries

A minimum beginning salary of \$3,000 instead of the present \$2,403 for public school teachers will be asked of the next legislature by the Texas State Teachers Association. "Texas annually must have nearly 5,000 new teachers either as replacements or to take care of the rapidly increasing enrollment," Charles H. Tenyson, executive secretary of the association, said in making the announcement here recently.

SAN ANGELO RAM SALE TO TRY NEW PLAN

The sixteenth annual Registered Rambouillet Ram Sale in San Angelo, Texas, this year will have no show connected with the sale. As in previous years, a Stud Ram Selecting Committee of five registered Rambouillet breeders will decide which rams are of stud caliber; but the 1952 Sale will see this Committee rate the rams as blue, red, or white ribbon studs—No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3 in quality.

The Sale Committee and Management uses this committee to pass on the stud rams as a guarantee to buyers that a ram bought as a stud will actually be of stud quality.

Dates for the Sale will be July 21, 22, and 23rd. The rams will be in the barns at the San Angelo Fairgrounds northwest of the city by 8:00 p.m., Sunday, July 20th.

FAIR WILL OPEN WITH PRESS DAY ON OCTOBER 4TH

HOUSTON, June 18—The traditional Press, Radio and Television Day at the State Fair of Texas again will be on opening day of the fair, Saturday, October 4. The announcement was made here at the annual convention of the Texas Press Association.

For many decades newspaper men have gathered at the fair on opening day to see the sights and take home a report on the exposition to their readers. In recent years, Press Day has grown until it has embraced representatives of radio, and, now, television.

More than 2,000 publishers and radio and TV executives and their families are expected for Press, Radio and TV Day this year. They will be guests of the fair at more major attractions than ever before.
