A representative of one of the companies operating in the Huldale field said this week that, "the last pipe we used came from Germany," and went on to say that their next shipment of casing pipe was due to come from Italy.

## Ram Sale and Show July 21-23 at Angelo

The 16th annual San Angelo Rambouillet sale will be held at the Fair Grounds, San Angelo, July 21, 22, and 23. July 21 and 22 will be classification and exhibition days. The sale is Wednesday morning, July 23rd, at 10 a.m. 338 top Rambouillet rams have been consigned by leading breeders from Texas, Utah and New York. The stud rams will be carefully selected by a committee of five breeders. Stud rams will be classified blue ribbon, red ribbon, and white ribbon rams and sold as such. Also, not to exceed ten A-B-C pens of three rams will be selected and sold. The remaining rams will be inspected and sifted by a committee to insure top grade rams and sold as pens of five and ten. All rams will be registered in the consignors name and bred by him.

## Oil News

Although rotary drilling operations steadily have been dropping off in West Texas due to the prolonged steel strike, Schleicher Co. operations have not been curtailed to a great extent.

On June 25, Schleicher was reported to have 12 rotaries in operation. The same number was going on July 10. That two-week period saw the Permian Basin lose 57 rigs.

T. L. Williams of San Angelo, Cooper Gas Co. trustee, No. 9-A Bert Page on the southeast side of the Page (Strawn) field in Schleicher County has been completed with a daily flowing potential of 482 barrels of 41 gravity oil.

The rating was based on a flow of 144 barrels of oil in eight hours. Gas-oil ratio was 990-1. The gauge was through open 2-inch tubing from two open-hole zones, the first topped at 5,442 feet, the second at 5,508 feet. Each zone had been treated with 2,000 gallons of acid. With ground elevation 2,258 feet, the well topped the Strawn lime at 5,157, drilled to 5,560 and cemented 7-inch casing at 5,445.

34th Producer No. 9-A Page is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 32-L-GH&SA, 9 1/2 miles east-southeast of Eldorado. It is a south offset to No. 8-A Page and an east offset to No. 6-A Page, both producers. Before completion of No. 9-A Page, T. L. Williams, Cooper Gas Co. trustee, had 33 wells on seven leases in the field with total daily allowable of 785 barrels.

One of Schleicher County's wildcats, La Gloria Corporation and Edwin L. Cox No. 1 E. Otto Williams, in the northeast portion of the county, was progressing below 5876 feet in dolomite and chert. A tentative top of the Ellenburger was called at 5781 feet. Samples in drilling to present depth did not show signs of oil. Elevation at drillsite is 2290 feet.

Earl Fain Jr., No. 1 Mrs. Grace O'Harrow, wildcat in Schleicher, was drilling below 5834 feet in Strawn lime.

W. W. Carter and others No. 1 M. L. Jackson and others, wildcat five and three-quarters miles southwest of the Page (Strawn) field, was drilling below 5524 feet in sandy shale.

Taylor Refining No. 1-B Mittel, southeast offset to the opener of the Neva West field, was re-perforated from 6382 to 6388 feet and drillstem test was to be made thru that set. A drillstem test was taken in the interval from 6393 to 6397 feet, through perforations. Gas surfaced in eight minutes. Recovery was 90 feet of pipeline oil, 290 feet of heavily oil-cut mud and 250 feet of salt water.

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 3-4 Lulalee Wilson, project in the Neva West field, was drilling below 615 feet in lime. Operator had set surface pipe at 604 feet.

The Pure Oil Company No. 1 Williams, Schleicher wildcat, was bottomed at 6800 feet in an unidentified formation, with operator awaiting orders.

Kewanee Oil Company No. 1 Page, was drilling below 4555 feet in lime and shale.

## J. L. Ratliff Starts Building of New Apartment House

A crew was at work yesterday cutting trenches for foundations for a new 4-unit apartment house being built by J. L. Ratliff. The structure will be on a lot which Ratliff purchased recently from Vernie Humphrey, located about a block south of the school house. Logan Bros. have the construction contract and the building is expected to be ready by September 1st.

Overall size of the building will be 32x80. There will be four apartments, each having kitchen, living room, 1 bedroom and bath with both shower and tub. Each will be completely furnished. Construction will be frame and the outside finish will be siding.

An unusual feature of the new building will be the roof, which is to be perfectly level with a 2-inch rise at the four sides. There will be two inches of water standing on the roof at all times. This is a new idea in insulation, which has been tried out by builders and found to be very satisfactory. This new roof may well start a new trend in Eldorado as it has in other places where it has been introduced.

Ratliff, a San Angelo resident at present, is in Eldorado looking after this project.

## Primary No Bar To Voting For Ike

Folks who want to vote for General Eisenhower for president in November, but would also like to have a voice in the election of county, district and state officers, may participate in the July 26 primary without violating their pledge.

Saturday, July 26, is the date of the first Democratic primary—an election set up and financed by the Democratic Party of Texas. When you vote in this primary you take the following pledge:

"I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominee of this primary." The pledge says nothing about supporting the nominee of the national Democratic convention, and there are no presidential nominees listed on the primary ballot. Thus there is no legal or moral barrier, as far as the party pledge is concerned, to prevent a person from voting in the Democratic primaries in July and August and voting for the Republican candidate for President in November.

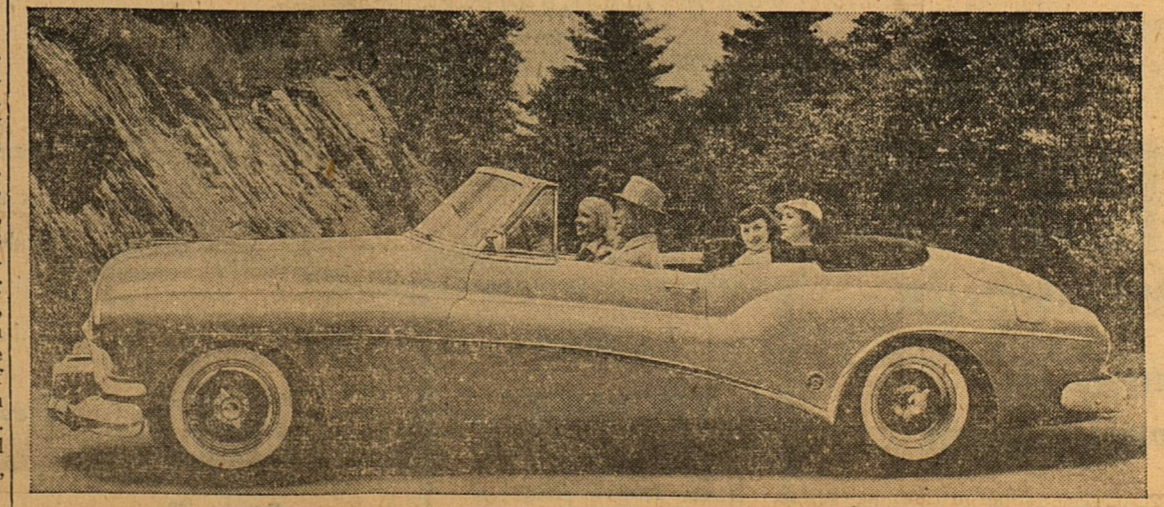
## Reserve Training Unit For Sonora Area

**WATER INTAKE IS INCREASED BY CLOVER**

The intake of water into the soil, on the A. R. Parker farm, in the Reynolds Community, has been increased by Albert Ray and A. P. Thigpen by use of a good crop of clover.

In the spring of 1950 the Thigpens planted 15 acres of Hubam clover. The clover came up to a good stand and made a good crop. In the fall the clover was cut with a rotary stalk cutter and all the residue returned to the soil. Mr. Thigpen estimates the residue turned back to the soil to have been from 1½ to 2 tons per acre. The field was broken and bedded that fall. In the spring of 1951 cotton was planted and came up, but died due to no moisture. In the fall of 1951 the land was bedded. Albert Ray states "that he noticed a remarked difference in bedding the clover land and land where no clover had been." He states, "that the cloverland did not clod up and he ran his plow as deep as he wanted to. The remaining part of the field, where clover had not been planted bedded up cloddy and the plows would hardly go into the ground."

Albert Ray states that after a 2.6 inch rain this spring, water stood above the terraces for 36 hours where no clover was planted, and that water stood for only 18 hours on land where clover had been planted.

To determine how much faster the clover land would take water into the soil, technicians of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation

District made infiltration tests with Mr. Thigpen and Albert Ray observing. In the tests a big difference was noticed from start to finish. The rate that water went into the clover land was outstanding compared to land where no clover was planted. In the test the clover land took 4 inches of water per hour. Where no clover was planted the water intake was only 1 inch per hour. The 4 inches of water on clover land penetrated to a depth of 24 inches. The inch of water where clover had not been planted penetrated 12 inches. This shows that the water holding capacity on clover land has also been increased. This means that more water can be stored per foot for plant use.

Other benefits received from a good crop of clover in a well rounded soil and water conservation program are:

1. A good crop of clover adds approximately 200 lbs. of nitrogen per acre to the soil.
2. Good amounts of stubble left on top of soil to help hold water on land.
3. Breaks up hard pan.
4. Prevents hardpan from forming when used in a good crop rotation.

With the above mentioned benefits it is easy to understand why clover along with other conservation practices increases per acre yields. Mr. Thigpen states that there is no doubt in his mind that a good clover crop will pay in a crop rotation.

**Range Notes**

**EAR TICKS**

Ear ticks (ornithodoros megnini duges) in Schleicher county are bothering livestock more than ever has been known, causing loss of flesh, taking more feed to keep cattle and sheep in condition and above all causing some loss in livestock that the blame is placed elsewhere.

Ear ticks are concentrated around water troughs, feeding places and salt troughs. Only 5% of the ear ticks are to be found in the pasture.

A mixture of equal parts of kerosene and burnt lube oil is highly effective against all stages of the tick. This should be sprayed around all water troughs, feeding places and salt troughs.

Stock 1029 should be applied to the ears of livestock by means of a one-inch paint brush. A brushful of the mixture should be inserted well down into the outer ear and rubbed about to ensure complete coverage of the inner surface of the outer ear.

1029 contains pyridine and rosin 45%, hercolyn 40%, dibutyl phthalate 15%.

Why use 1029 when other ear tick killers on the market are much easier to apply? 1029 contains rosin and will remain in the ear for long periods of time and do an effective job of killing ear ticks—while other killers will do just an effective job of killing but do not give the added protection of killing over a long period of time.

**STATE BAR FOR LOAN LAW TO GET RID OF SHARKS**

HOUSTON—Declaring that loan sharks in Texas "in numbers and nuisance are now more in evidence than ever before," the State Bar of Texas has thrown its support behind a proposed small loan law. The measure, modeled from laws already in effect in almost all other states, provides for licensing and supervising the small loan industry, with both civil and criminal penalties, and for a maximum charge for loans "that will be fair to both borrower and lender."

Action by the State Bar at its recent convention in Houston was based upon a year's study of the problem by a special committee headed by District Judge W. S. Barron of Bryan and Tom Reavley, Lufkin attorney. Hearings were held and attorneys and executives of lending companies were heard.

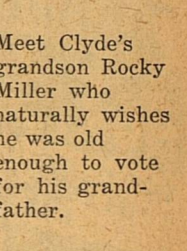

**Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law; "Shall Change It Or Repeal It" He Says**

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one state in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)
