## REA CoOp Meeting Is Scheduled For Tuesday

There will be hundreds of people in attendance when the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op holds its regular annual meeting next Tuesday, August 12, in Eldorado. The crowd will converge on the Memorial Building for the business session, which will follow the 6:30 p.m. barbecue on the courthouse lawn.

This will be the seventh annual meeting for the Co-Op. As the Co-Op family grows by virtue of its year-by-year expansion, there are more in attendance each year than were present the preceding year.

All of the meetings to date have featured the barbecue at the courthouse but because the county has not always had the Memorial building as a meeting place, various other places were utilized until the Memorial Building was completed.

A high point of the business session will be the election of officers. The 1952 nominating committee met at the office in Eldorado on July 10, with all members present: Bill Seahorn, of Ozona; John Williams, Eldorado; Edwin E. Sawyer, Sonora; George W. Kothman, Menard, and C. H. Kenley, San Angelo. They worked out a slate of officers to present to the members at the business session next Tuesday evening.

Co-Op Manager Don McCormick, who has headed the organization nearly seven years, stresses the importance of attendance at the business session. Personnel of the Co-Op are anxious that officers chosen represent vote of a large number of members—"That is the democratic way to carry it on," states the manager.

The office force is composed of Don McCormick, manager, Mrs. Margaret Tinning, book keeper, Jack Logan, material man, and Elton McGinnis, line foreman; J. C. Schooley, Fred Butler and A. E. Atkinson, linemen; also S. G. Mitchell, L. L. Kinsler, Earl Hicks, as regular employees in construction and maintenance; and several others part time; Billy Ray Jones, Truman Biggs, Joe Griffin, Ross McAngus, and Victor Sauer.

## Primitive Baptist Association Meets During Weekend

Representation from five churches, and a top attendance of 250, is the report from the Primitive Baptist Association which closed out a three-day associational meeting Sunday evening in Schleicher county.

At the Joseph Faulk farm, a brush arbor was set up, to protect the benches from the sun, and out-of-town visitors camped on the grounds, many of them from Thursday through Sunday.

In official attendance were three messengers from each of the five member-churches. Moderator W. M. Lykens of Lometa officiated at the meetings with Bob Faught as clerk. Old officers were re-elected to their posts at a business session.

Preaching services were held at 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 and 8:00 p.m. Five ministers, Elders H. A. Patterson of Vera, C. H. Richards of Santa Anna who is also regular minister here, W. M. Lykens of Lometa, C. T. Nowlin of Quemado Valley and S. P. Flowers of Oklahoma took turns preaching at the services according to assignment by the general committee.

The Little Vine church at Fort Worth was selected as the next meeting place. The Association meets regularly the first Sunday in August and the preceding Friday and Saturday. Many arrive at the camp grounds each year on Thursday night to avoid missing the opening service Friday morning.

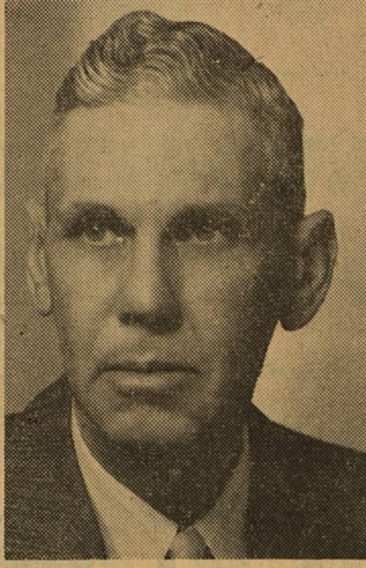
The meeting was carried out according to established procedure. The host church provided the meals with Orland Harris cooking, and the dinners featured barbecue, all cooked at the camp grounds.

## Post Script

Jimmie West's experience with water wells bears out the oft-heard observation that you never know where you will get water in Schleicher county.

The original well, serving the home place, had dwindled down to a couple of gallons a minute. He moved over 25 feet and got such weak production that it could almost be called a dry hole; he went down to 340 feet with this one. Next, he moved only five feet away from the original well, and got a good well, producing 15 gallons per minute. He got this one at 243 feet as compared with 230 feet depth for the original well.

Ranchers all over the county are reporting water problems—if they aren't short of water right now they fear that they will be if this drought continues.

There are now three State Highway Department employees living in Eldorado, since Albert Alexander moved here to start work. He and his wife, the former Frances Lee Bauguess, have an apartment at the Halbert place.

With Eldorado thermometers registering 107 Wednesday after a series of hot days, Schleicherites are beginning to realize that this is a hot August. It's still dry too.

A 27-inch "saw" from a sawfish is the unusual souvenir brought in this week by John Miller, upon his return from a deep-sea fishing trip off the Texas coast. Miller was accompanied by his brother Robert of College Station and they reported quite a struggle landing the 12-foot 300-pound specimen. They also caught a manta ray, in addition to other more edible fish.

## Lions Hear Report On Bailey Station

Members of the Lions club at their meeting yesterday heard further plans and specifications of the Bailey pumping station, now being built south of town, presented by George Cales, who will be chief engineer at the new Rancho Pipe Line System's Bailey Station.

Mr. Cales explained that the Rancho pipeline system is being built as the project of a number of companies to deliver more crude oil from the Permian Basin area near McCamey to the refineries near Houston. The new line consists of 455 miles of 24-inch line and will parallel the old Shell 10-inch line.

The line is being laid with three initial pumping stations, including the Bailey station near here, the Mesa station at McCamey and the Garfield station near Austin, which will pump a capacity of approximately 210,000 barrels per day through the line. Capacity of the line can be increased by adding more stations later, Mr. Cales pointed out.

Each of the three stations will be modern in design and operation. Four centrifugal pumps will be installed at the Bailey station, and six houses will be built for the station personnel.

Mr. Cales was introduced by Palmer West, Lions club president. In other business the club heard a report by Gus Love, finance chairman, and admitted Bro. Dunn, new minister of the Rock Church of Christ, as a new member.

## Changes Are Made In Shell Personnel

Some changes have been made in Eldorado Shell pipeline crews.

Dell Boothe retired July 30th. His job was bid in by Ben Isaacs of Houston Tank farm, and he then swapped jobs with Ben Hext of Fredericksburg—so Isaacs moved this week to Fredericksburg and Hext moved to Eldorado.

Ralph Waldron, who was in Jack Smith's gang at Eldorado bid in a station engineer's job at Fredericksburg and moved into a company house there this week.

D. Smith retired July 31st. His engineer's job was bid in by E. W. Perry who will now become station engineer at Eldorado.

Bill Mund has accepted Fred Watson's engineer's job at the Eldorado station, leaving a vacancy in the tank farm job which was bid in by Grover Lee Johnson who moves back to Eldorado from Big Lake. He is awaiting call to service.

The utility job created by Perry's move, was filled by E. H. Sweatt, Jr.

Mr. Leavell, here with Shell, is now utility man at Big Lake and has moved there.

Many more changes will be made by the time the new multiple-owned Rancho is open.

George Cales who is senior inspector on the new Bailey station will leave Monday on his vacation.

## All Set For Homecoming of Eldorado Exes Saturday

### STORES WILL BE CLOSED FROM TEN UNTIL TWO SAT.

To enable business people to attend the Homecoming program and picnic, business houses except the cafes will close for business between the hours of 10:00 a.m. Saturday and 2:00 p.m. This will make it possible for owners and employees to be present when the crowd assembles in the morning, and stay until the lunch period is over.

### DATE SET FOR BOND ELECTION FOR NEW ROAD

The Schleicher County Commissioners court met Monday and took formal action on the matter of providing funds for right-of-way for the proposed new Mertzon highway.

The notice of election, which appears on another page of this paper, provides for a \$75,000.00 bond issue to be voted upon by the "resident qualified property tax-paying voters." Saturday, September 6th, is the day set for the election.

This will be the third bond issue for roads in this county since the war. In 1946 bonds were voted for right-of-way purposes on the Menard road. About three years later another bond issue took care of the expenses for the new highway to the west. Now comes the Mertzon road which would give Eldorado a paved-road connection with another county-seat town. In both of the other elections the bonds carried with nice majorities and it is predicted that the present one will carry also, in spite of the drought.

### Schleicher County Oil News

Austral Oil Exploration Company, Inc., No. 1 Russell, wildcat in Northeast Schleicher County, topped the Strawn at 4,630 feet, on minus datum point of 2,22 feet.

That makes the prospector 57 feet higher on top of the Strawn than Delta Gulf Drilling Company No. 1 Blair M. Boyd, small pumping discovery one and three-quarter miles to the northwest, on the same formation. Operator was drilling below 4,640 feet in lime.

The Gray Wolf Company No. 1 T. A. Thomson, wildcat in Central Schleicher County two and one-quarter miles southeast of Eldorado, had spudded to 384 feet and was awaiting moving in of rotary equipment by Morgan Drilling Company of Midland.

Ralph Lowe of Midland No. 1 M. Reynolds, wildcat in Northeast Schleicher County, 18 miles northeast of Eldorado, was drilling below 3,526 feet in lime and chert.

The Pure Oil Company No. 1 Mrs. R. S. Williams, wildcat in Northwest Schleicher County, was digging below 7726 feet in dolomite.

Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 3-4 Mrs. Lulalee Wilson wildcat, project in the Neva West Strawn field, was making progress below 4,734 feet in shale.

Standard No. 2-2 McWhorter, project in the Huldale Strawn field, was temporarily abandoned on total depth of 1,500 feet. Operator had cemented 9 5/8-inch casing at 1,198 feet.

Tucker Drilling Company No. 1 Jeff Harkey, project in Northwest Schleicher County, and indicated discovery from the Canyon sand, flowed by heads through perforations at 4,851-55 feet and made 19 barrels of oil in 10 hours. It is understood that operator was in the process of swabbing to test the wildcat at last report.

T. L. Williams, trustee for Cooper Gas Company, No. 2 10-A Bert Page, project in the southeast side of the Page (Strawn) field, was drilling below 2,250 feet in lime and shale.

Delta Gulf No. 2-C H. F. Thomson Estate, project in the Huldale field, was preparing to take a drill-stem test from 5,727-23 and 5,714-20 feet, through perforations. This project, which has shown as a possible producer, is at plugged back total depth of 5,733 feet.

The Strawn was topped at 5,460 feet, elevation 2,930 feet.

The Exes of Schleicher County schools, and there are many of them, will hold their third annual Homecoming in Eldorado next Saturday.

Lots of planning has been done, under the able direction of Chairman Mrs. Gus Love and her assistants, to make this affair the biggest ever held in this city.

Last minute details have been attended to, and today the committeemen state that everything has been done that can be done to make the affair a success. Local people have done their best to aid committeemen in contacting exes in their own families and a big crowd from out of town is expected.

### Register At School

Beginning with registration at 9:00 a.m. at the school, there will be a full day of entertainment. Mrs. Leslie Baker is chairman of the registration committee, and she will be assisted by Mrs. Robert Baker.

There will be two registration books, one for teachers and the other for students and others. The committee will have a map on hand; using registration cards for information on name, address, and year attended, they can assemble information for awards: oldest student and teacher, those who came farthest, etc.

Registration will start at the school house promptly at 9:00 Saturday morning. Some visitors will be in town the preceding night—others will be arriving from then on for the day.

All visitors are asked to register. As Mrs. Love points out, this may not seem necessary, but the register will be a popular place as various home folks go there to find out who is in town.

### Assembly At 10:00

For the assembly which starts at 10:00, Carrol Ratliff will be master of ceremonies, and Mrs. James Page pianist for musical numbers.

Awards will be made to oldest student, student who came farthest, oldest teacher, teacher who came farthest, and oldest report card issued in local schools.

Edwin Jackson will introduce the speaker, R. D. Holt, superintendent of schools in Eldorado from 1927 to 1935, who will be the speaker at 11:00. Mr. Holt, who now lives near Santa Anna on a stock farm, will bring his family to take in the Homecoming.

### Barbecue At Noon

At 12:15, after the assembly is dismissed, barbecue at \$1.00 per plate will be served on the courthouse lawn. Anyone in the county is eligible to attend this barbecue which will be a convenience to Schleicherites as well as to their guests.

### Stores To Close

To enable business people and their help to attend the program and picnic, businesses in Eldorado will close between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Only cafes will be open during that time.

### Parade At 5:00

Time has been allowed to complete the floats by the various classes in the afternoon, and at 5:00 there will be the parade, which will start at the schoolhouse and go down Main street to the feed store corner, then turn right and circle around the block, re-entering the main drag at Charlie Trigg's corner. It will go on back over the same route, back to the schoolhouse, its starting place. This gives onlookers and judges two chances to see the entries.

Mrs. Love urged all those in charge of floats to please have the floats at the north side of the schoolhouse by 4:00 o'clock, so that the parade could start from there promptly at 5:00.

C. F. Jones will bring about 20 pieces from his Lakeview band, San Angelo, to join Ludwig's Eldorado band. There will be practice at 9:00 at the band hall for all players.

It is expected that every class including this year the Mias Amigas, will have entries, making a total of at least 35. In addition anyone else who wishes to enter may do so—there are rumors of at least one such.

Palmer West is in general charge of the parade. It will include everything from fire trucks to riders on horseback. All members of the various classes are urged to ride with their class floats.

West and Mrs. Love stress the fact that if an ex can't find his own class, then ride on the float of the class nearest—everybody is expected to be in the parade.

In various back yards here may be seen the beginnings of what looks like a float—some local exes are starting on theirs already; a three-seated hack of very ancient vintage is being put back on its wheels so that it can carry one of the classes. Other interesting ideas are already emerging from the planning stage.

It is stressed that the parade—and the whole Homecoming—are not for graduates only. Any person who went to school in this county even for a day is expected to be here, as he is labeled an ex. Various students from the rural schools which have closed are expected, of course—whether they ever went to the Eldorado schools or not.

### Prizes For Floats

Prizes for winning floats will be awarded: the plaque for first prize, which may be kept after it is won three times in succession, \$5 for second prize and \$2 for third.

Last year the Class of 1930 won the plaque, which will be on exhibition in the window of Bauer Jewelry all day.

### Big Free Dance

A dance at 9:00 p.m. will be free to everyone, with Harrison Texans furnishing music. Panchy Bradley and Billy McCravey will have charge of the concession stand, which is a Homecoming benefit. There will be some fans in the Memorial Building where the dance is to be held—though the evenings are usually cool here from 9:00 on.

## Two Amendments Submitted To Vote In November Election

A smaller number of amendments than usual will be submitted this year to the voters of Texas. There are only two, and these were published for the first time last week. Voters are urged to familiarize themselves with these amendments before the election.

House Joint Resolution Number 38 provides an amendment to Article III of the constitution of Texas, to establish a state medical board of not more than six members, and a state medical scholarship from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring help on a medical course—with the stipulation that he must practice in rural areas.

Number 20 proposes an amendment to Article III of the Constitution to authorize cities, towns and villages to provide workman's compensation and the right to provide their own insurance risk for their employees, the Legislature to enact laws for the administration of such insurance.

Voters will go to the polls the first Monday in November.

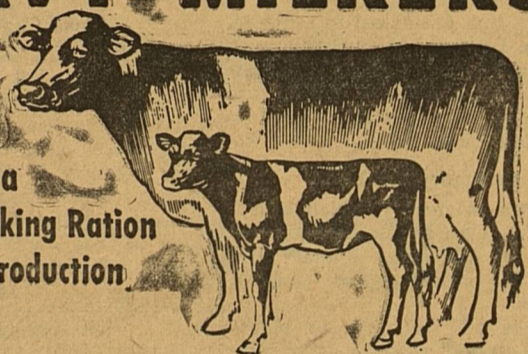

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NUMBER 20**

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

Be It Resolved By the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Ft Worth: The Monday trade on cattle and calves at Fort Worth was very slow with a weak to unevenly lower undertone. Some of the best fed cattle and fat calves held about steady with other slaughter classes weak to 50 cents, spots \$1, and more lower. Stockers and feeders were the slowest in several weeks. Some feeder heifers and thin stocker cows sold near steady but other stockers, and especially calves, were sharply lower, some drastic declines in effect later in the day.

Butcher hogs advanced 50 cents per hundred and sows were 50 cents to \$1 higher. The restriction on sending feeder pigs back to the country was still in effect and any pigs that were on the market had to sell for slaughter at sharply reduced prices.

Sheep and lambs generally held steady prices as compared with the previous week's close. Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$26 to \$32.50. Plain and medium slaughter kinds sold at \$15 to \$27 and cull yearlings \$12 to \$14.

Fat cows brought \$14 to \$17, and canners and cutters cashed at \$8 to \$14, some old shells down under \$8. Bulls drew \$13 to \$22. Good and choice slaughter calves sold at \$25 to \$28 and plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$16 to \$24, with culls from \$12 to \$15.

Good and choice stocker calves drew \$24 to \$29 and plain to medium quality sold for \$16 to \$22. Stocker and feeder steers and yearlings of good and choice kinds sold at \$22 to \$25.50, and common to medium sorts sold at \$15 to \$20. Stocker cofs drew \$14 to \$18.

Good and choice butcher hogs reached a top of \$23.25, most sales \$23 down. Sows cashed at \$16 to \$19. Pigs sold at \$10 to \$12.

Medium, good and choice fat spring lambs sold at \$20 to \$27 and stocker and feeder lambs sold at \$12 to \$20. Stocker and feeder yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$15. Old wethers sold from \$10 down. Two-year-old sold from \$12 downward. Slaughter ewes cashed at \$6 to \$7.50.

**HOME FREEZING OF PEACHES**

COLLEGE STATION—Although the Texas peach crop is below normal, reports show that peaches will be plentiful in other parts of the nation. Indications are there will be peaches on the local markets but at higher prices than last season.

Now is the time to make plans for including peaches in the family canning budget. Food specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service point out that ceiling prices have been taken off canned fruits, which may mean higher prices. In view of this, homemakers may find it profitable to preserve a supply of peaches.

Here are suggestions from the specialists on freezing peaches. Use only sound ripe peaches. They should be slightly ripener than for canning but not soft or mushy. To prevent discoloration, the specialists say, use 125 mg. of ascorbic acid, tablet or powdered, for each pint of fruit. Dissolve the ascorbic acid in the sugar syrup which is to cover the fruit or dissolve ¼ teaspoon citric acid in 1 quart cool water. Leave the peaches in the solution only 15 to 20 minutes before packing in sugar syrup. Use about 1 gallon of the solution for a bushel of peaches. The specialists recommend the Dixigem, Triogem, Golden Jubilee, Hale Haven, Fair Beauty, J. H. Hale and Elberta varieties for freezing. Wash and peel the firm, ripe peaches. Treat as directed above, to prevent discoloration. Then cover the fruit with sugar syrup, 3 cups of sugar to 1 quart of water. Pack in moisture-vapor-proof containers to prevent loss of color, flavor, food value and change of texture. Pack and freeze immediately. For further information on freezing foods and cooking frozen foods, the specialists suggest a copy of B-175, FROZEN FOODS, which may be obtained from the local county home demonstration agent.

**MRS. ISAACS VERY ILL**

As this newspaper goes to press Thursday morning, the condition of Mrs. Alice Lee (J. F.) Isaacs remains the same. She is very critically ill at her home here. Her son Johnnie and his son Harold of Sierra Blanca arrived here yesterday to be with her, and other relatives are expected. Mrs. Isaacs is in her 93rd year.

**Quality Eggs Can Be Produced In Hot Weather**

COLLEGE STATION — Quality eggs bring more money. This is especially true in the areas of the state where producers have an opportunity to sell on the basis of grade. According to F. Z. Beamblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the supply of quality eggs in the state at the present time is far below the demand. He urges egg producers to improve their egg handling practices so more quality eggs can be marketed.

The temperature of the freshly laid egg, he says, is above 100 degrees Fahrenheit and if the quality is to be maintained, rapid and thorough cooling is a must. Eggs will cool from 100 to 50 degrees in three hours when spread on a wire tray. It will take five hours for them to cool if held in a wire basket, twelve hours when held in solid pails and eighteen to twenty hours when held in an egg case.

Beamblossom explains the effect of heat upon the quality of eggs this way. He says eggs 100 days old may be better than some eggs that are only three days old because eggs held at 99.6 degrees drop to "B" grade in three days or less. Eggs held at 77 degrees will usually hold up for at least eight days; when held at 45 degrees they are still tops at 65 days and they retain their top quality for 100 days when held at 37 degrees. This, he points out, clearly indicates that age does not effect the quality of eggs as directly as does the environment the egg receives.

The importance of humidity in the egg holding room is reflected in the fact that only 31 per cent of the top grade eggs will be maintained when the humidity is allowed to drop below 75 per cent and the temperature to rise above 65 degrees Fahrenheit. The failure of egg producers and handlers to pre-cool egg cases, casing eggs before the animal heat is removed and marketing eggs less than twice per week greatly effects the percentage of high quality eggs marketed, says the specialist and thus reduces the economic return to both producers and handlers.

Here is another item that is often overlooked. It does make a difference whether the big or little end of the egg is placed down in the case. Research shows that only 73 out of 200 improperly packed eggs graded "A" or better when the eggs rode to town on the big end; while 164 graded "A" or better out of 200 when packed and transported with the large end up. Beamblossom says egg producers are doing something about getting quality eggs to market in the summertime and cites figures from the areas in which grading programs are operating to prove that it pays to produce and market quality eggs. Right now he says, producers are averaging better than five cents per dozen more for their eggs where they are graded. He urges producers to participate in a quality egg program because it's a sure way to increase the returns from the poultry flock.

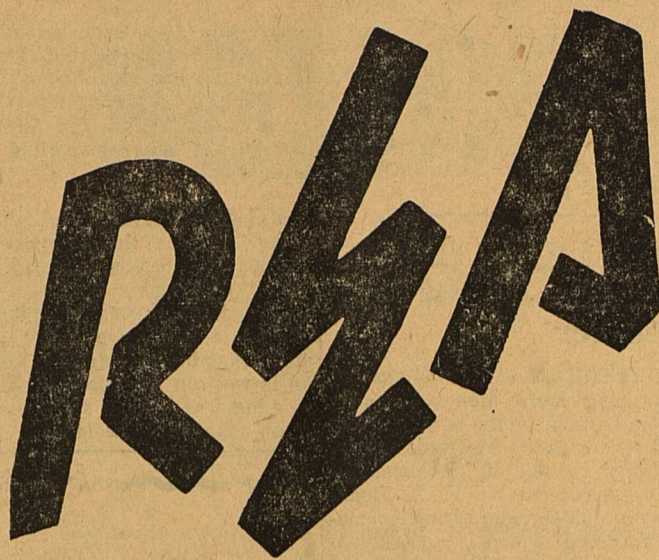

# CoOp Has Large Crew To Service Network of Lines

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op is a big concern, handling a large amount of money in the course of a year, maintaining a good-sized payroll, reaching out to bring comfort and pleasure to rural dwellers from the lowliest ranch hand to the wealthy rancher, marking a forward step in Schleicher County's growth.

## Distant Members

Poles of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op fan out in all directions from Eldorado, bringing current to distant members. Farthest away in a northeasterly direction is Mrs. Grace Herring, who lives on a Tom Green County ranch, 48 1/2 miles from Eldorado by electric line and 55 miles by road.

Mrs. Irene Ruff, 58 miles away, is no longer farthest east—her neighbor Gene Whitehead, 2 1/2 miles east of her place, and about 10 miles northeast of Menard, now holds the record in that direction.

A record distance in pole miles may not be the record distance counting by road miles, as is shown by the cases of two members. Farthest to the southwest by pole miles is Bill Carson, who is 63.4 pole miles from the Sonora Sub-Station. He lives 90 miles away by road, west of Juno. George Bean has him bested by pole miles—he lives southwest of Ozona, 72 pole line miles from the Sonora sub-station!

The Co-Op covers Schleicher County and parts of Sutton, Menard, Crockett, Irion, Tom Green and Val Verde Counties.

## It's Still Expanding

Section G of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op is in the limelight—and will continue to be there for many months to come. Staking and clearing of the right-of-way on this 108-mile section is now going on, and construction is supposed to start about the 15th on this section. Men and equipment will be employed to supplement the Co-Op's regular crew to build this stretch—a method of construction called "force account"—employed on much of the previous construction, especially in the past several years.

Of this stretch of 108 miles, 38 miles are out of the Midway Lane Sub-Station. The extreme point is the Price Miller Ranch, three miles east of Big Lake.

An additional 70 miles will come from the sub-station near Sheffield, located in Pecos County. The line will run up the river about four miles, then cross into Crockett county going to the A. C. Hoover quarters ranch; from there a line turns south to serve the A. C. Hoover farms, and the Amos Owens and Jeff Owens ranches. One line will go north to serve McMullen Brothers, Harris Brothers, Lewis Hersey and Clayton Smith ranches.

Section G will serve 24 ranches, including six large irrigation motors on the A. C. Hoover place in West Crockett.

The above explanation points out the fact that growth has largely gone to the southwest in the past year, and will continue in that direction.

## Many Appliances In Use

To gain maximum use of the REA current, Manager Don McCormick states, years are often required before all of the desired appliances can be installed.

The average housewife likes to start out with lights, iron, radio and refrigerator, when the current is first turned on. The family then looks ahead to the other appliances, which are gradually added, the deep freeze, ranges, water heaters. Out of doors there are things to buy too—pumps, or electric welders, or shop tools, to mention a few.

The number of air conditioning units is astounding, states Manager McCormick. These units range from the one-room conditioners, to the complete heating and refrigerating system which cools and heats the entire house according to season. Throughout the REA system, these conditioners are being put in.

Another trend is use of electric pumps, which are growing increasingly popular. It is understood that one pump will do away with three windmills.

A list of these conveniences and comforts points out the fact that REA has brought pleasure to ranch life heretofore unknown.

## Average Electric Bill

That the average monthly REA bill is not excessively large is shown by figures in the office of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op. For June the average member's bill was \$11.69; for May it was \$11.89. In the overall system there are four peak months; July and August, and December and January.

Less Members Than Meters  
Figures shown in the year's total reveal the fact that there are 476 REA members served by the local co-Op and 656 meters. This is accounted for by the fact that many ranches have more than one meter, and some have several. Last year there were 596 meters at the time the annual meeting was held and annual reports submitted.

Further comparisons are these:

there are now 1021 miles of energized lines, and last August there were 924.

## Two Miles Per Member

The Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op is still the sparsest in the Southwest, with an average of two miles per member. Another in Texas has a similar record—the Rio Grande Electric Co-Op at Brackettville. This tops even Nevada—there may be one or two in Montana sparser, but the local co-op is well up in the national list for the record.

Shame On Woody Woodpecker  
The REA counts its poles as valuable property, which must be maintained in top condition to give maximum service to members. Strange things happen sometimes to those poles—people or the weather cause a little damage with the passing years.

But the greatest hazard to poles comes from an unexpected source: the woodpecker! The bird is not often seen around Eldorado, but in the Juno area he causes extensive damage by eating holes in the poles and cross arms. Repairs for this particular damage run up a bigger total for the year than any other one cause.

The crew watch the lines carefully at all times, and make trouble calls at night sometimes, putting in an entire night at the job if the trouble is difficult to locate.

## This Is The Crew

A large crew keeps the Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op functioning at maximum efficiency. Heading the organization is Don McCormick, who assumed office in September, 1945. He is a World War I veteran, active in work of the American Legion for many years, and has been an Eldorado businessman and Schleicher rancher in years past. The post-war growth of the Co-Op has all gone on under his able direction.

Longest service of all is the record of Mrs. Margaret Tinning, the only original employee left. Starting as bookkeeper during the organization stages, she has learned about the Co-Op's books the thorough way—by experience. She has college and business training for her job.

April, 1946, was starting time for Elton McGinnes, a veteran of World War II, line foreman. He has a wife and three children. Jack Logan, ex-service man, lineman whose work centers around work orders and materials, has been with the Co-Op since July, 1948. He is a married man also.

Jerome Mitchell, veteran of World War I, is with the construction crew, joining the force in December, 1947. L. L. Kinser is compressor man and truck driver, who has been with the crew since August 1949.

J. C. Schooley has been with the Co-Op over five years. A veteran of World War II, he has a wife and one child.

Alvin Atkinson, lineman, a family man with wife and three children, has been with REA about two years, moving to Eldorado from a ranch to start out with the Co-Op. Earl Hicks, ground man, has been with the Co-Op about one year; he has a wife and one son.

Fred Butler, now a lineman, was reared in Eldorado, is a graduate of EHS, and is one of the few single men on the force.

Local men who are on the job part time, as college work or farm work or other jobs permit, include Billy Ray Jones, Truman Biggs, Joe Griffin, Ross McAngus, and Victor Sauer.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 6th day of September, 1952, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 4th day of August, 1952, which is as follows:

"On this the 4th day of August, 1952, the Commissioners Court of Schleicher County, Texas, convened in regular session at a Special Term thereof in the Courthouse at Eldorado, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit: E. W. Craig, County Judge, A. J. Halbert, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, L. G. Edmiston, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, Carrol White, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, H. A. Belk, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, Ida C. Neill, Deputy, County Clerk,

being present, came on to be considered the petition of Edgar F. Sauer and 72 other persons, praying that an election be ordered to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the sum of Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed two and one-half (2 1/2%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twelve (12) years from date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Schleicher County for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity;

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Schleicher County, Texas, who own taxable property within said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation;

And it further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Schleicher County;

IT IS THEREFORE CONSIDERED AND ORDERED by the Court that an election be held in said County on the 6th day of September, 1952, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed two and one-half (2 1/2%) per cent per annum, maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twelve (12) years from date thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Schleicher County for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, and only legally qualified voters of this State and of this County, who own taxable property within said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote.



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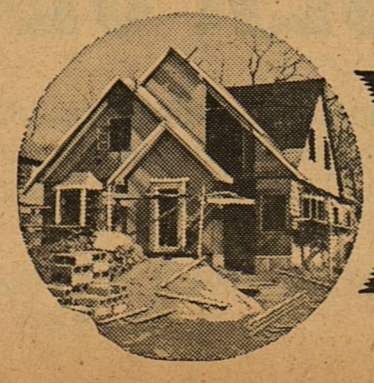

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
NUMBER 38**

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become

a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid for out of proper appropriation made by law.

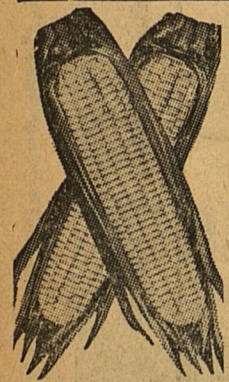

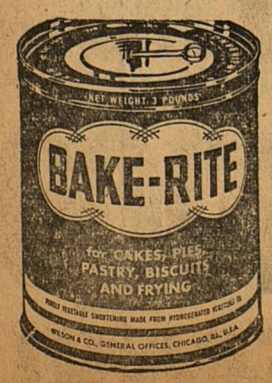
