## JUDGING TEAM PLACES WELL IN SONORA SHOW

Schleicher County 4-H judging team easily defended their newly won state laurels of being the best wool and mohair team in the State by scoring 54 more points at Sonora than in the state judging event. In addition to this the boys placed 3rd in plant judging and 2nd overall team of the contest, being topped by Kerrville by a close margin of only a few points. The total score being Kerrville 4343, and Schleicher 4-H 4324.

In addition to wool and mohair, 8 classes of sheep were judged, 1 class of range plots, 45 grasses too were identified.

Members of the team are: Jack Stanford, Ken Love, Ronnie Mittel and Mike Moore.

Jack Stanford was 2nd high point man in wool with a score of 343 points. Ronnie Mittel was 3rd high with 339 points.

Jack Stanford was 2nd overall high in the contest with 1499 points while Ken Love was 7th overall high with 1428 points.

This team has brought honors to themselves and to the 4-H club of Schleicher County by preparing themselves in the fundamentals of livestock, wool and mohair and range management that will go far in making successful ranchers.

Mr. Hyten left on June 12 for South America to become a drilling supervisor for an oil company, after being employed in Eldorado for Delta Gulf. Mrs. Hyten will stay here in the Emma Bradshaw house until she is notified to leave for South America.

## Oil News

The Neva West field of central-north Schleicher county received its ninth completed well this week and another test showed for production as the Huldale pool was given another new prospector.

Neva West's new oiler is Wesley W West No. 5 Christena Mittel, which was completed as a short south extension. It flowed 219.61 barrels of 45.5 gravity oil in eight hours to establish a daily potential of 621 barrels of oil plus three-eighths per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was 621-1. Production was through an 18/64 inch tubing choke and perforations from 6314-38 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing. Flowing pressure was 85 pounds on tubing and 375 pounds on the casing.

**North Extension**  
Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 3-3 Mrs. Lulalee Wilson showed prospects of a location north extension to the Neva West Strawn field in northern Schleicher County when it recovered 2,859 feet of oil on a drillstem test Tuesday.

The approximately 45 barrels of oil was recovered on a six-hour test from 6,113-33 feet through a half-inch bottom choke and one-inch top choke. There was a good blow of air and gas in nine minutes. Porosity and staining had been logged in the section tested. The test was the first since the Strawn lime was topped at 6,060 feet, 3,727 feet below sea level, 88 feet high to No. 2-1 Wilson, completed producer one location to the south.

No. 3-3 Wilson is scheduled to drill to 6,233 feet and run electric logs. It is 1,175 feet from the south, 1,247 feet from the east line of J. A. White survey 1, abstract 633.

The project which has shown for possible production in the Neva West field is Taylor Refining Co., No. 1-B Mrs. Christena Mittel, southeast offset to the discovery well of the field. A drillstem test was taken for 90 minutes in the interval from 6328 to 6357 feet. Recovery was 170 feet of gas-cut mud and 40 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. There was a slight blow of gas at the surface in 57 minutes. Operator was to re-test from 6330 to 6357 feet.

The new Huldale prospector is Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 2-2 Mrs. Viola McWhorter. It is in the south part of the field, 660 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 70, block TT, TC survey. It is a south offset to production.

Earl Fain Jr., No. 1 Mrs. Grace O'Harrow, wildcat 18 miles east of Eldorado, was bottomed at 5090 feet in lime circulating for samples. If the samples are satisfactory, operator will run a drillstem test.

Tom L. Williams, trustee for Cooper Gas Company No. 9-A Page, project at the south side of the Page field, was preparing to swab the Strawn from 5445 to 5480 feet after setting seven-inch casing at 5430 feet.

P. R. Rutherford No. 1 A. L. Baugh and others, wildcat, was drilling below 5810 feet in shale. Pure Oil Company No. 1 Mrs. R. W. Williams wildcat, was drilling below 5868 feet in shale and lime. Another Schleicher wildcat, Kewanee No. 1 Bert Page was digging below 2233 feet in shale and lime.

Pan American No. 1 Henderson, wildcat 13 1/2 miles east of Eldorado recovered 30 feet of drilling mud on a 45-minute drillstem test from 5720 to 5730 feet in sand. It was preparing to drillstem test in sand to total depth of 5751 feet.

**Williams In Canyon**  
Twelve feet of drilling mud was recovered by La Gloria Corp., and Edwin L. Cox No. 1-E, Otto Williams, eastern Schleicher County wildcat, on a 20-minute drillstem test from 4361-72 feet. There was a blow of air for four minutes. All pressures were zero.

The section tested was brown lime with a slight showing of oil. The Canyon lime was entered at 4361 feet. Top of the Palo Pinto was 4220 feet.

## PAGE COTTAGE COMPLETED

The Bert Page cottage on the Bloys Camp Grounds near Ft. Davis is undergoing completion this week, under direction of Mr. Page, who is spending the week there. The seven rooms which the Pages have built to accommodate their children and families with a room each, were furnished Monday, when Paul and James went up with a load of furniture. ## Missing Child Is Located In Levelland



**REUNITED WITH PARENTS**—Johnny Wade, 3, kidnapped son of Rev. and Mrs. Anthem Wade of Aztec, N. M., wore cowboy clothes Friday as he resumed life with his parents after 53 days of separation. He was led away May 4 from the front yard of his home and taken to Levelland.

Little three-year-old Johnny Wade, who was away from home for nearly two months while he was in the care of his kidnapers, is reunited with his parents, Rev. and Mrs. Anthem Wade of Aztec, New Mexico.

The parents had broadcast the child's diet, stating that he had a food allergy—and a chance remark overheard concerning a couple's "adopted" child's allergy to certain foods brought about the solution of the two-months' mystery. He was abducted from the front porch of his parents' home May 4.

A neighbor of the alleged kidnapers, who were in Levelland with oil field work, told Johnny's aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Wiman, about the conversation. Mrs. Wiman and a friend got into the house to see the child, by posing as takers of a religious census, and the aunt recognized the boy. Observing that he was wearing the same clothing he had been wearing when abducted, they notified officers, who arrested Mr. and Mrs. Fred Elrod, ages 25 and 22 respectively.

Charges are to be filed against the young couple, who stated that they took the child because the young wife was attracted to him, and could not have children of her own.

## Absentee Voting Starts Next Week

Absentee voting in the Democratic Primary will start next week in the county clerk's office, it was announced following recent delivery of ballots for all Schleicher county boxes to Ernest Hill, county Democratic chairman.

Pointing out that the Primary is set for Saturday, July 26, Mr. Hill said that absentee balloting is prescribed by state election laws to start 20 before that date. Absentee voting will close on July 23.

A recent resignation is that of Mrs. L. V. Newport, first grade teacher, who resigned Tuesday morning.

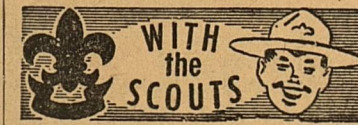

**Witnesses In Menard**  
More than 72 members of the North Unit of the San Antonio Company of Jehovah's Witnesses will begin to arrive in Menard tomorrow for a two-day assembly to be held June 28 and 29.

**Tires Tested**  
Speeds up to 120 miles per hour in the heat of the day are used by test crews for Pure Oil Company to "fail" tires, and a crew operating here this week came all the way from Chicago to Fort Stockton because a local combination of level, traffic-light highways and an even midday temperatures is ideal for testing purposes.

A four-man crew operates a Chrysler Imperial sedan on the 52-mile stretch of Highway 285 from Fort Stockton to Pecos, doing the fast driving between 11 am. and 3:30 p.m. to get a high-even temperature for testing not only tires of their own and competing brands, but oils, gear greases, and gear metals. —Fort Stockton Pioneer.

**Bronte Short On Water**  
Bronte's water supply is getting shorter by the day and the dry winds which have been blowing for the past several days are hastening the depletion of the supply, Mayor H O Whitt said Wednesday.

The Mayor has asked The Enterprise to publish the request, of the city council that all watering of yards and gardens and washing of cars be stopped immediately.

Whitt said that he hopes residents of Bronte will voluntarily cooperate in the conservation measures, so the council will not have to pass an ordinance to enforce them.

"We have about a 30-day supply of water left," the Mayor said, "and possibly it will last longer than that if everybody will do his part to save it and the wind doesn't cause too much of it to evaporate." —Bronte Enterprise.

**Interest In Gas Is "Mostly Gas"**  
According to Lions Club President A. E. Prugel, the response to the natural gas proposition presented here last week by representatives of the Lone Star Gas Company, is still "mostly gas." Prugel said several persons have mailed in coupons clipped from last week's News indicating their interest, and several have called at the office to state their interest.

On the whole, however, the response has not been too great, he added. —Devil's River News.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lucas arrived in Robert Lee more than a month ago, after traveling more than half way around the world to see their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Alfred Boykin. They've seen just about every kind of weather imaginable since they left Australia in February. That's a summer month there, and a hot one.

In Europe they hit weather that had their teeth chattering. Now, in Texas, Mr. Lucas has sweated off so many pounds he's hunting for a pair of "braces" (British for suspenders) to hold his trousers up. The first contingent of the Lucas family came to Texas seven years ago as an Australian war bride. She and Boykin had married in Melbourne in 1943 while he was serving overseas with the Army, stationed in Australia. —Robert Lee Observer.

**Farm And Ranch Homes Improved**

**COLLEGE STATION** — Extension workers and local leaders helped 40,586 rural families improve their homes in 1951, according to the statistical annual report of Bernice Claytor, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. These activities ranged from new houses built or remodeled to major repairs and the addition of furnishings and equipment.

Since World War II, adds the specialist, there has been great interest in "buying and revaluing old furniture. Last year, 20,700 major pieces were added to homes and 28,579 pieces refinished, re-seated and upholstered. Mrs. Claytor says the high price of furniture gave the incentive to the women and girls to repair and refinish the furniture they already had.

Kitchen improvement was an important phase of the home management program. The 7,040 women and girls assisted, added 18,028 pieces of major equipment such as ranges, refrigerators, home freezers and washing machines and 6,260 added built-in cabinets or permanent storage.

Improvements were also made in 10,817 living rooms; 12,671 bedrooms and 5,528 bathrooms. Sanitation was improved by the building of 890 sanitary toilets and 1,772 sewage disposal systems. Along with these improvements 21,168 families were assisted in removing fire and accident hazards.

Information on housing and on house furnishings was given by the specialist and home demonstration agents through method demonstrations, radio, press and slides. **New Gasoline Plant In Upton County**

A \$1,500,000 gasoline plant designed to conserve natural petroleum resources of Texas will be formally dedicated at special ceremonies and a barbecue to be held Saturday, July 19, on the 30-acre site of the plant located in Upton county eleven miles northeast of Crane in West Texas. The property, designated as the McElroy-Wilshire gasoline plant, was constructed in the heart of the Ellenburger-Wilshire oil field which brought in its discovery well on April 15, 1951.

Special invitations are being sent to more than 2,000 persons in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and California interested in the oil and gas industry and its conservation program.

Oil and gas conservation leaders of Texas have commended Lone Star and Wilshire for early construction of this plant in a field which has been in production only sixteen months. They point out that ordinarily such plants are not built until a field has been more nearly completely developed, usually some three or four years after discovery.

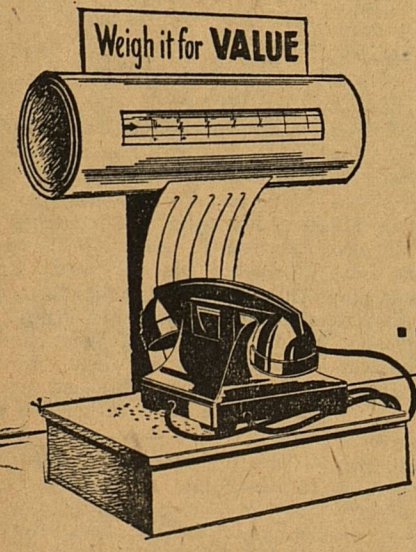

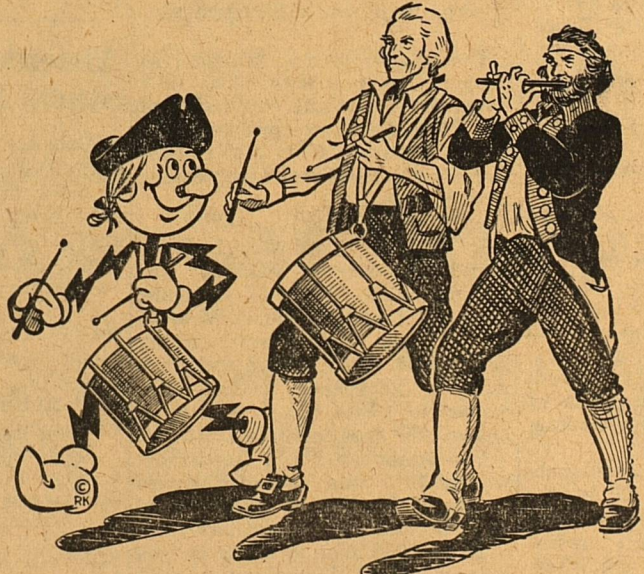

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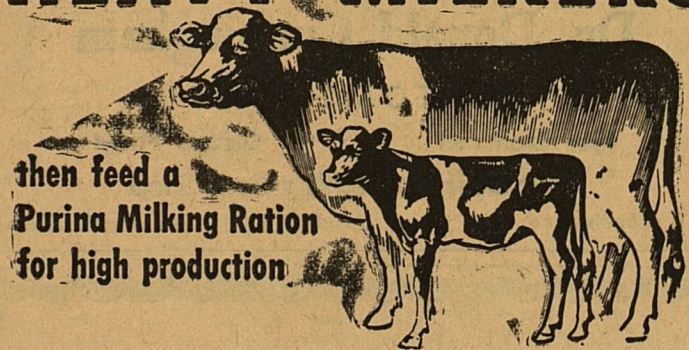

### 42 Traffic Deaths Are Predicted For July 4th Holiday

AUSTIN, July 3.—Most Texans are looking forward eagerly to the long three-day Fourth of July holiday this year but there is one group who eye the prospects with a tongue-in-cheek attitude. They are Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the personnel of his Highway Patrol Division.

Garrison pointed out today that while the nation would be celebrating the birth of its independence Americans generally would find themselves "slaves" of the traffic menace. In Texas alone, he said, 42 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents on July 4, 5, and 6.

The extra-long holiday period will flood the highways with additional automobiles filled with vacationists and pleasure seekers bound for beaches, rodeos, ball games, parks, night spots and every conceivable place of recreation. Hundreds will be hospitalized as the result of traffic injuries and the morgue will claim the total of 42.

In appealing to his fellow Texans to break the fetters of traffic "slavery" by cautious motoring, Garrison said: "There is no justifiable reason why intelligent people should slaughter themselves in their quest for a good time. We take no pride at all in the fact that our statisticians can predict with considerable accuracy the disaster on our highways. They know that lack of observance of the traffic laws is responsible for the vast majority of highway deaths and our best recourse as a preventative measure is to appeal directly to the drivers. We urgently plead that you will practice a safe and sane Fourth behind the wheel of your car. And, remember—in driving, as in a ball game, it's not how many times you start that counts but how many times you reach home safely."

### Hints On Lawn Care During Summer

COLLEGE STATION—A neat, well kept lawn will add to the value of a home, and lawns properly managed will provide a cool, restful cover for the homesteer even during summer months. J. R. Watson, Jr., of the agronomy department at Texas A&M College, says that by recognizing the basic conditions necessary for lawn care the home lawn enthusiast may have a lawn that will provide pleasant relaxation and prevent soil fro blowing and washing.

A grass should be selected that is suitable for the particular locality. Some of the grasses best suited to Texas are Bermuda, St. Augustine, and Buffalo grass. Others not so popular are Centipede and various strains of Zoysia grass. Bermuda grass is probably the most popular and best suited for all around purposes. However, St. Augustine grass is best suited for shaded areas. Watson points out that the grass selected should be adapted to your locality and one that suits you.

Lawns should be fertilized in the spring and fall with a complete fertilizer, such as 10-5-5, 5-10-5, or 8-8-8. During the summer it is not necessary to add a complete fertilizer, but nitrogen should be added every 30-40 days, for grasses are heavy nitrogen feeders. Ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate may be added at the rate of three pounds of ammonium nitrate and five pounds of ammonium sulfate per 1000 square feet of lawn. (reminder: length times width of your lawn area equals the square footage.)

Controlled watering is one of the most important considerations in care and management of lawns, Watson says. The prevailing tendency is to overwater than under-water. Excessive water, as well as too frequent applications, cause plants to develop shallow root systems.

Water should be applied to mature turf only when the plants begin to wilt. At this time, the lawn should be soaked to a depth of four to six inches. When the

water starts running off the surface, it should be cut off. If the soil is not soaked to the required depth, wait until the moisture has percolated downward and apply additional water.

Lawn turf should be mowed at about 1 to 1½ inches. Watson points out that only about ¼ to ½ inch of leaf surface should be removed at any clipping. Serious injury to the plant may result if a greater amount of leaf surface is removed at one time. A sharp, properly adjusted lawn mower is essential if the lawn is to be kept neat and trim.

Two four-month-old deer fawns will represent the Edwards Plateau in its impressive chapter in the "Story Book of Texas Agriculture" at the 1952 State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 4 through 19.

The Edwards Plateau is included in the Texas A&M College System Extension District 7, which covers the following counties: Bandera, Blanco, Coke, Coleman, Concho, Gillespie, Irion, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Nolan, Real, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling, Taylor and Tom Green.

The fawns' pen will be flanked by stuffed turkeys and quail standing in the prairie plants and grasses. A real live oak tree will be growing at one side, and an enlarged color photograph of sheep grazing on the mountains will act as backdrop for the setting, behind a transparent screen bearing a map of the region and its chief products.

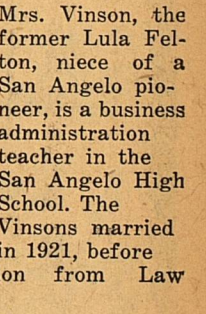

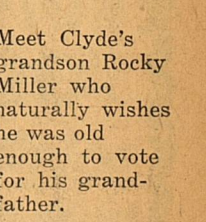

**Suits In The Bag**

COLLEGE STATION—Women's and men's suits are not hard to pack if the job is correctly done. Nena Roberson, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers a few tips on how to do the job without winding up with more creases than there should be.

Miss Roberson advises a general use of tissue paper, it helps keep the wrinkles out. Put the paper between every fold and in the sleeves.

Here is a step by step method of folding coats for packing in a suit case. Lay the coat flat on a bed or table with the collar and lapels turned up. Lap the left front over right front without wrinkling the coat.

Sleeves should lie smoothly along the coat. Turn at the elbow and fold them up. Then pick up the lower edge of the coat and fold just below the fold in the sleeves.

The same method is used when packing a gladstone bag, except you leave the sleeves straight and make two folds in the coat.

Trousers and skirts are easy to pack. Miss Roberson says for trou-

sers, make sure the creases are straight and the pockets smooth inside. Fold them over once or twice, depending on the size of the bag. For the skirt, lay it flat, fold one side over to the center and the other side to the edge. Then pick up the hem and fold to the top.



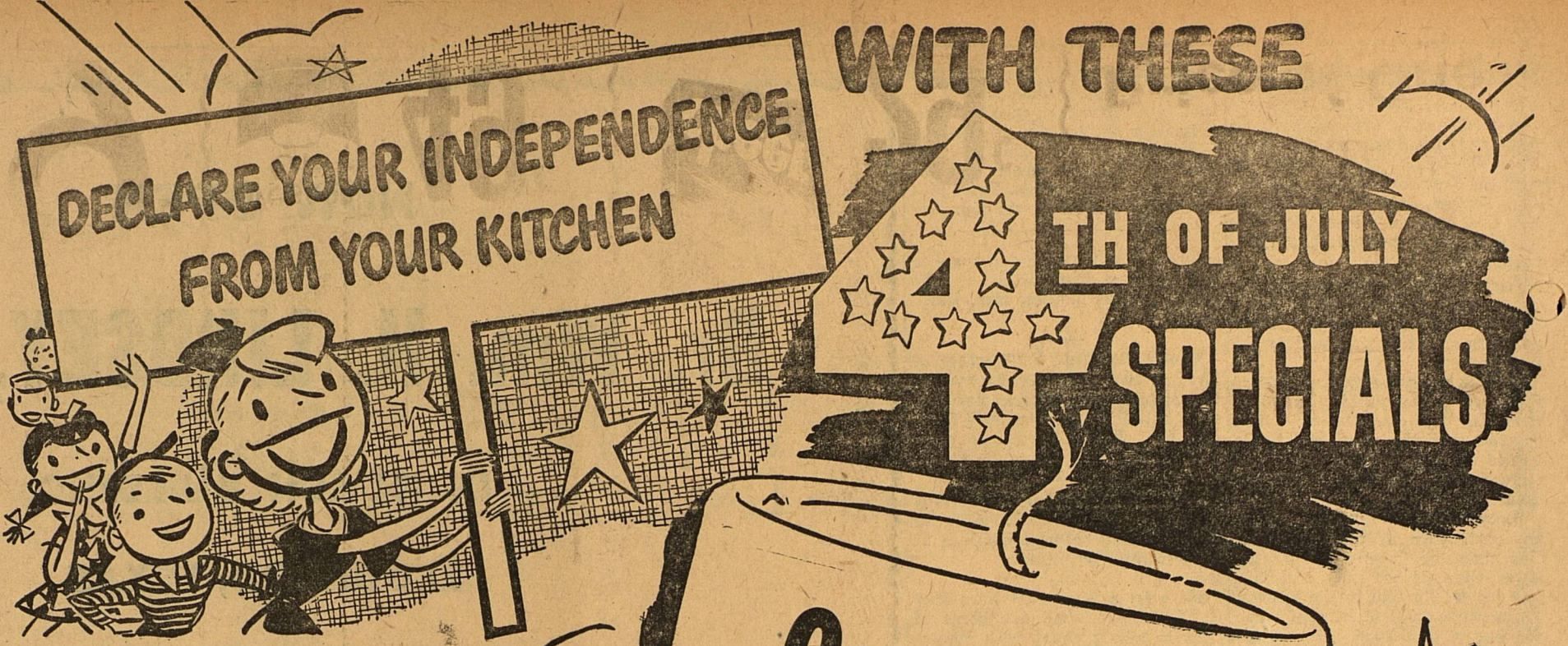
