Clifford Nelson, First Baptist pastor, spoke on "Precious the Sight of God is the Death of his Saints"-explaining that death finds the saints ready, with fixed faith, prepared for death by leaving a good example and some material goods to loved ones, and ready to receive their reward at any time.



"Who will teach Texas children n 1960 if the teaching profession is able to attract only 2,000 qualified college graduates each year and continues to lose 5,000 teachers annually?" Tennyson asked.

This, he said, is a major question to which the legislature should give serious consideration.



Circle four of the WMU of the First Baptist church had charge of the program when the circles met in joint session Monday afternoon at the church.


