Deadline Nears For Special Enrollment Exam Says IRS

Ellis Campbell, Jr. Director of Internal Revenue Service for the Dallas District, today reminded persons planning to take the Special Enrollment Examination in September, that their applications must be postmarked no later than midnight Aug. 31, 1967. The examination is to qualify persons, other than certified public accountants and attorneys, who wish to represent clients in tax matters before the Internal Revenue Service. Mr. Campbell said the examination will be held in this District on Sept. 25 and 26. 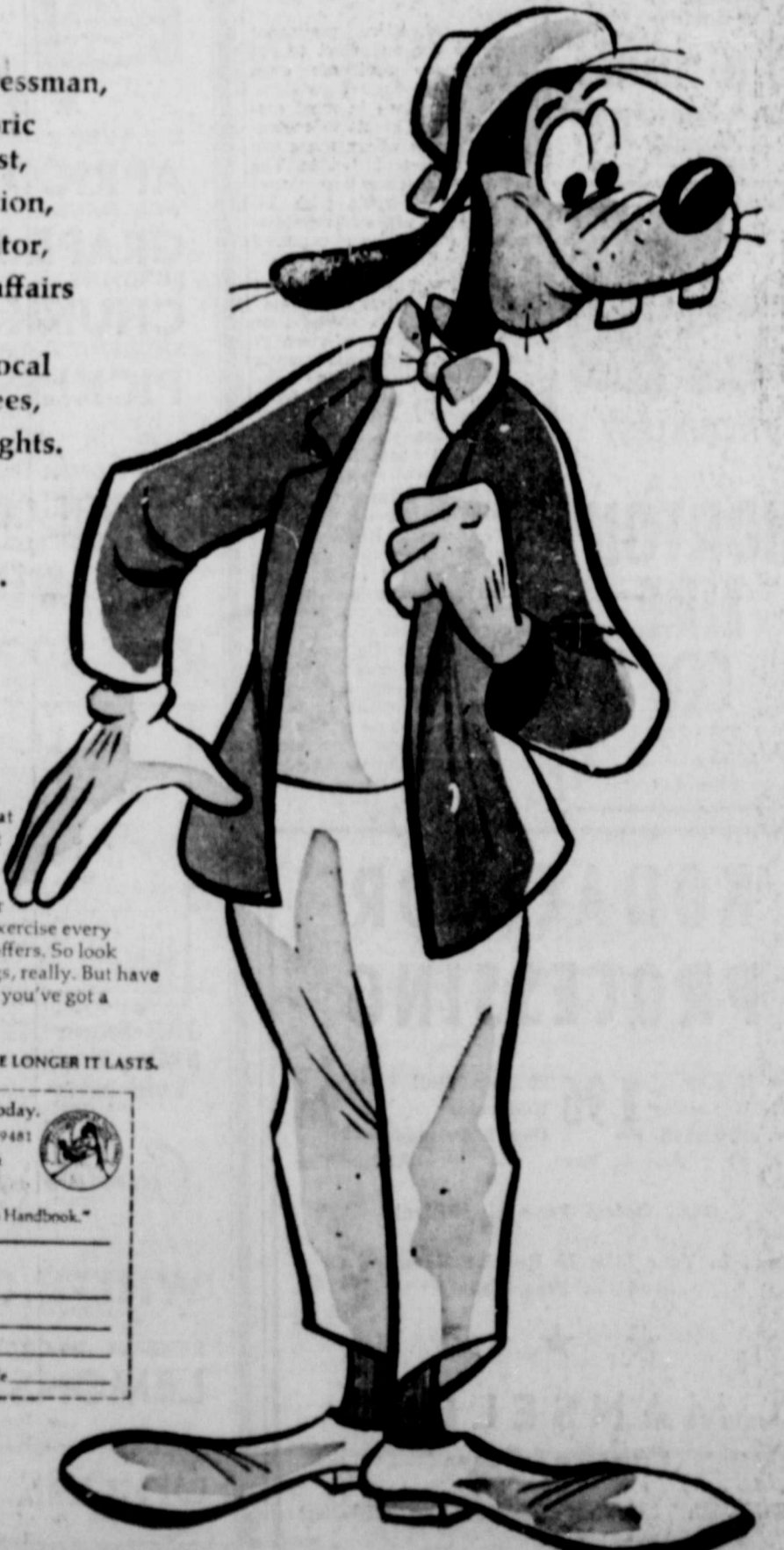

Plans Are Formulating For Annual Peanut Bowl

The least hint of fall is enough to set Eastland Countians thinking about Peanut Bowl time.

And the recent low temperatures (down to the 60s, and Tuesday morning's light shower) are reason enough to consider the Peanut Festival Upcoming.

And as usual, one finds that the sponsoring Eastland Jaycees are busy as ever, making plans and setting the stage for their annual spectacle.

Date for the celebration that pays homage to the important peanut industry in the county is Sept. 23, according to Special Events Chairman Bill Halden. Highlight of the day will be the traditional grid-iron crash between the Cisco Junior College Wranglers and the Ranger Junior College Rangers.

Both teams are "home folks" and the rivalry is fierce.

Dale Bakker is president of the Eastland Jaycees.

The game is held in Eastland's Mave Rick's Stadium and pre-game festivities include a beauty pageant at which a Miss Peanut Bowl will be picked and a gigantic parade through the streets of Eastland.

Already set for appearance as special events are the 328th Army Band from Fort Wolters at Mineral Wells, with a special color guard coming

from Dyess AFB at Abilene, and a special appearance of the famous Owens Country Sausage display of eight Belgian horses and converted barnum and Bailey circus wagon which will be on display and in the parade.

PRICE OF STUDENT MEALS TO REMAIN SAME AS LAST TERM

The price of student meals in the lunchrooms of the Ranger Public Schools will remain at 35 cents at Hodges School and 40 cents for Young School students Supt. James R. Clark reports.

Adult school employees and teachers will pay 45 cents again. They pay more since the school is not reimbursed on their milk and meal.

Outside visitors will be charged 75 cents again. Clark explained that visitors are always welcome so that the public may know what is being served the children. Visitors are asked to wait until the students are served and not to break into the student line.

Students desiring extra milk at their meals or at recess or milk break are encouraged to pay by the week although extra milk may be purchased with the meal.

The first milk is free as it goes with the meal and is included in the price of the meal. The State reimburses the school over three cents for extra milk sold. Since the milk costs the school seven cents on a bid purchase, the school may lose money counting the cost of operating the milk coolers, straws, and other loss.

Clark said he expects about half of the total student enrollment to eat their noon meal in the lunchrooms. This is about 180 at Hodges and 125 at Young or a total of 305 each day.

The Junior-Senior High School is included in the Hodges figure and will run from 60 to 80 students each day. They ride buses to Hodges.

The only way the lunchrooms can serve meals as cheaply as they do is to buy wholesale or on bid basis and receive over \$4,178 worth of commodities from the State Department of Public Welfare at Brownwood.

Over \$1,285 worth of meat was received last year. This consisted of frozen turkey, frozen cutup chickens, frozen ground beef, and canned beef with natural juices.

Also received was dry milk, rice, cornmeal, flour, shortening, lard, rolled wheat, dry beans, country butter, process cheese, peanut butter, canned applesauce.

Canned sweet potatoes, canned green beans, canned peas,

canned tomatoes, canned apricots, peaches and plums, ninety pounds of honey, 150 pounds raisins, grapefruit sections, frozen orange juice, fresh pears and canned pears.

The wholesale value of the above commodities was \$4,178.25 Clark said. This helped the lunchroom finances very much he said.

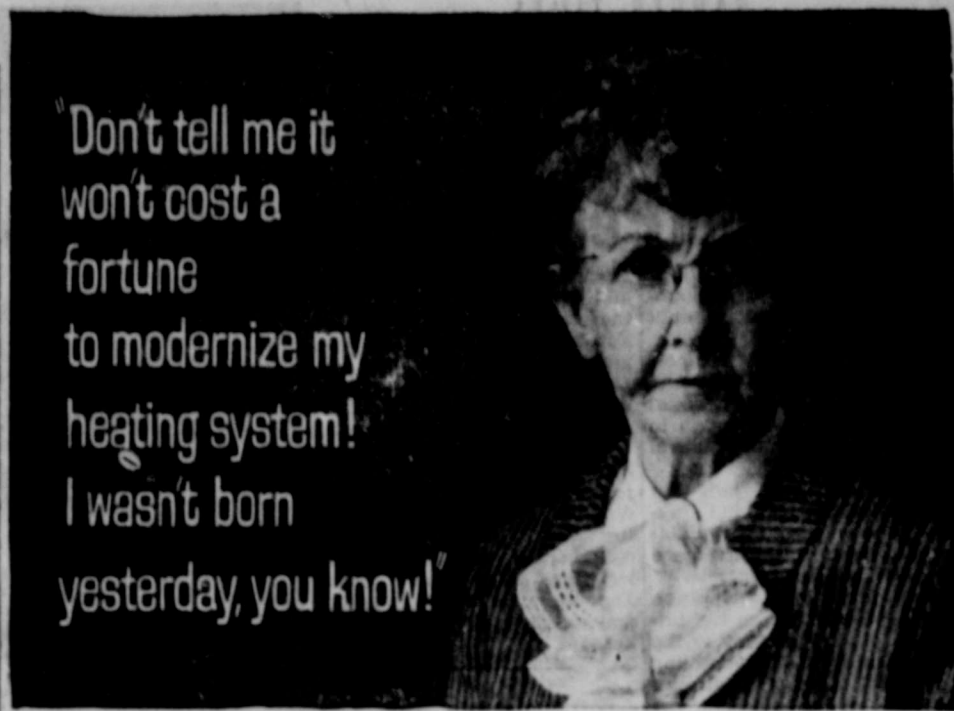
B'wood Auction

The Brownwood Cattle Auction report for August 16th showed a steady market on most classes of cattle. Packer cows showed some strength compared to last week. Stocker and feeder stock was fully steady with some heifer calves stronger. Bulls and fat calves were steady, and pairs were active.

Receipts were estimated at 1,510 head.

Prices were reported as follows: stocker steer calves, 28.50 to 35.50; stocker heifer calves, 24.50 to 30; steer yearlings, 24 to 27.50; heifer yearlings, 23 to 26; plain feeder steers, 22.50 to 25.50; plain feeder heifers, 21 to 23.50 cows and calves pairs, good \$200 to \$250; plain, \$150 to \$200.
