Eagle Band places 3rd at State marching contest

Relaxing after the preliminaries — Moments after posing for their formal photo, the Mighty Eagle Marching Band posed for this "informal" shot Monday afternoon shortly after competing in the preliminary round of the State Marching Band Contest. The band advanced to the finals where they placed 3rd — the highest ever finish for an Eldorado band.

The Mighty Eagle Marching Band did something Monday night that no other Eldorado band has ever done...it earned a 3rd Place bronze medal at the Class 2-A State Marching Band Contest in Mesquite. That's the highest achievement in the Eagle Band's long history. The band from Holliday finished 1st in the contest while Howe placed 2nd.

The Eagle Band was one of fif-

teen to advance to the State marching contest where they marched first in the preliminary round. Then came a long wait as the remaining bands competed for eight slots in the finals. When the announcement finally came, Eldorado advanced to the final round in 5th place. By the time the finals began Monday evening, a cold front had dropped the temperature in the stadium considerably and winds gusting as high

as 35 mph presented new challenges for the bands, their twirlers and flag corps.

The Eagle Band's performance in the finals was nearly flawless and the band moved up two slots in the ranking to finish 3rd. During the award presentation, the band received an impressive plaque denoting their accomplishment. Also, each member of the 100+ strong Eagle Band will receive a 3rd Place bronze medal.

The rankings in both the preliminary and final round were determined by a panel of five judges, three of which judged the music. The other two judges scored the marching. Judges for the preliminary round were: Tom Caneva, University of Illinois; Paula Crider, University of Texas, retired; Arturo Valdez, Ft. Worth I.S.D.; Dale Barnett, Union High School, Oklahoma; and Phil Geiger, Westfield High School.

Judging the final round were: Mike Brashear, Berkner High

School; James Keene, University of Illinois; Gary Sousa, University of Tennessee; Glen Adsit, University of New Mexico; and Bill Watson, Richland High School.

Judge Arturo Valdez commented in his critique, "Excellent teaching and learning are evident in this band."

In his critique, judge Bill Watson said, "Fine individual fun-

damentals. Fine set marching. Clear sets - great intervals. Excellent color guard - many times integrated into the wind."

Judge James Keene commented, "Nice depth of sound. Nice balance top to bottom!"

Gonzales sentenced to 7 years for indecency with a child

Auden Gonzales, Jr., 21, of Eldorado was sentenced last Thursday to 7 years in the Texas Department of Corrections (TDC) for indecency with a child by contact. Gonzales entered a guilty plea before 51st District Court Judge Barbara Walther in her San Angelo courtroom. He wept openly as the judge handed down the verdict.

The case against Gonzales stemmed from an incident reported

to the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department last year. Chief Deputy George Arispe investigated the case and arrested Gonzales on the charge.

Gonzales, who was free on bail was taken into custody by Arispe after the sentencing. He was transported back to the Schleicher County Jail where he awaits transport to a TDC facility. Gonzales will be eligible for parole in 4 years.

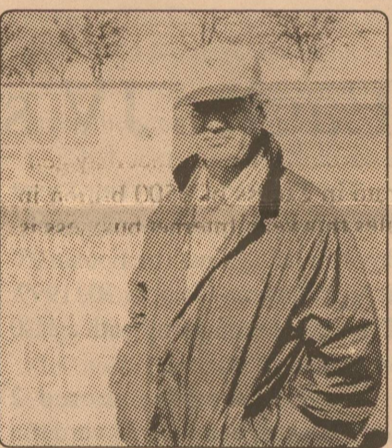

Then next Play Day will be on Sunday, November 28th. There is also a 2- person tournament scheduled for the first Sunday of the month on December 5th.

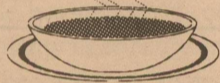

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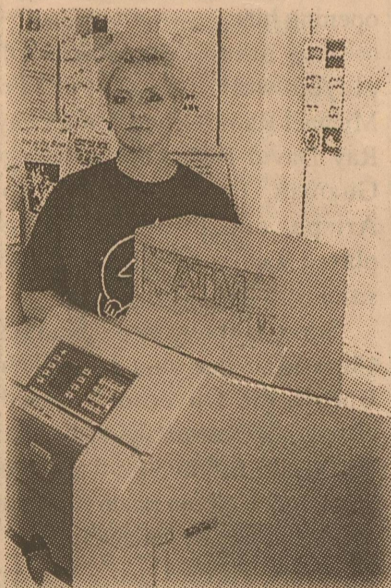
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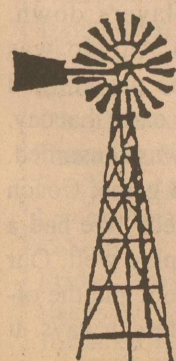

Win over Forsan puts Eagles in playoffs for 6th straight year

The Eldorado Eagles secured their sixth consecutive playoff berth by defeating the Forsan Buffaloes 18-7 last Friday night at Eagle Stadium. Eldorado came away with the victory in spite of several Eagles being out of the game due to injuries. At times, it appeared that there were more green jerseys in street clothes than actually suited out for the game.

Coach Fryar commented, "We are really proud of the kids hanging in there with all the injuries and continuing the tradition of playoff football in Eldorado."

The first quarter saw both clubs trading punts and never getting untracked offensively. However, with 10:26 remaining in the 2nd quarter, Lance Mitchel found the end zone on an 11 yard run. The PAT was blocked and the Eagles led 6-0. After the score, neither team could put any sustained drive together for the rest of the half.

Forsan got on the board with 9:14 left in the third and made the PAT to take the lead 7-6.

Eldorado finally got the offensive unit going in the fourth quarter as Mitchel scored on a 2 yard dive with 10:20 left. The pass failed for the PAT and Eldorado led 12-7. Then, with 7:36 left in the game, Joey Bullard found Kenny Covarubiaz on a 26 yard pass for a TD. The run for PAT failed and Eldorado had the margin of victory at 18-6.

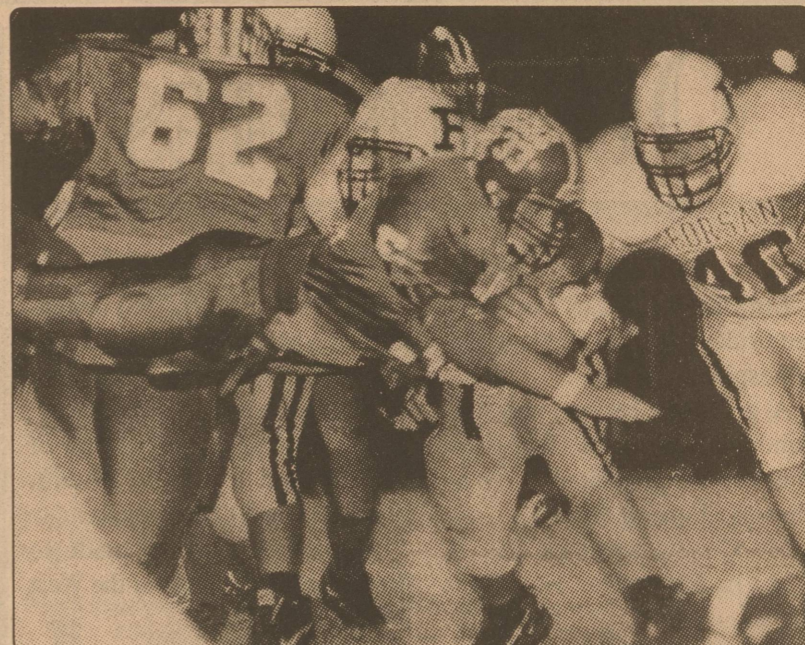
Lance Mitchel led EHS rushers with 76 yards, followed by Louis Santellano with 39, and Casey Poynor with 34. Covarubiaz led receivers with 33 yards, followed by Poynor with 26, and Mitchel had 12. Bullard finished

the night 4 of 10 for 71 yards. Defensively, the Eagles were led by Rocky Robles, Ben Edmiston, Casey Poynor, and Cory Lloyd. The defensive line continues to stifle the opponent's running game, much as it has done all season.

Eldorado travels to Sonora tomorrow night for the regular season finale. Kick off is scheduled for 8 p.m.

Sonora is leading the district and is undefeated on the season. Coach Fryar commented, "This is the best 2A offensive line I've ever seen. We will need to play mistake free football tomorrow night."

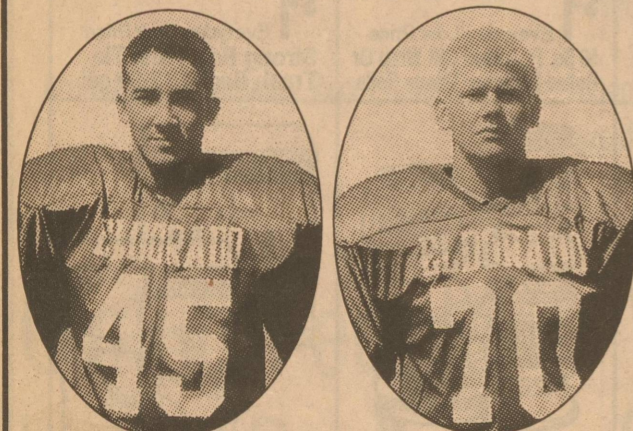
