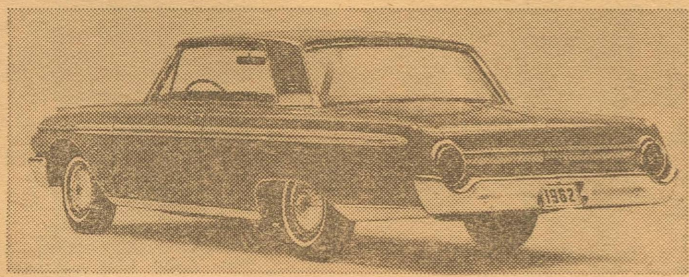
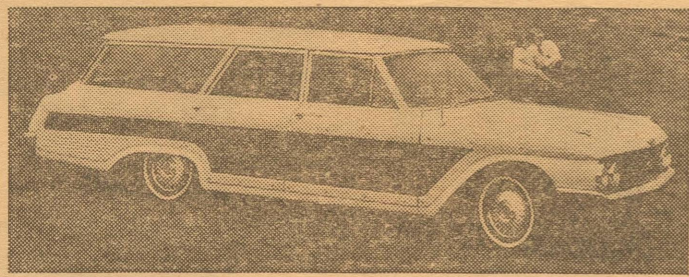

Hard-Fought Game Gives Eagles Narrow Victory Over Red Devils Here Last Friday

An Eagle lineman and John McGregor's gifted toe gave Eldorado a slim victory margin for three long quarters 7-6 in Friday night's contest with Rankin's "red hot" Red Devils until Big Donnie Holden climaxed an Eagle drive to give the Eagles six more cushion points in the fourth quarter and John McGregor cinched it with another perfect try for the extra point; so the Eagles could leave the field with a respectable 14-6 win.

The lineman was High School Junior Ray Lewis Ballew, one of the "up front" Eagles who takes a bump on every play and his sparking six-point contribution to his team's treasury came when he cracked through the Red Devil line into their backfield just in time to take the pithout intended for Red Devil Halfback Linthicum. Without missing a stride, he proved that a surprised backfield can't outrun a good guard; so he took a brisk and pleasant 40-yard dash into Red Devil vital territory for the Eagles' only touchdown for a long 30 minutes of playing time.

John McGregor then stepped up and in spite of frenzied Red Devil effort applied his gifted toe for a successful extra point to put some added pressure on Rankin.

After a first quarter quick kick which netted the Eagles 55 yards, they settled down to a little Russian Roulette, not punting on fourth down several times until the Red Devils got the ball near mid-field. An Eagle posse of linemen couldn't catch the Red Devil's surprising passer, Sammy Aguilar, who hurled a long and apparently desperation pass in a southeasterly direction. The Eagle defenders who had been admiring the Pete Logan, Jurecek Brothers, and Company chase Aguilar suddenly discovered that Rankin's L'mnie Ferrell was right behind them from which advantageous position he gathered in the ball and scampered a yard or so into the Eagles' best country to put Rankin only one point behind the shaken Eagles.

The Red Devils quickly decided to do away with the Ballew-McGregor 7-point situation by rushing the ball over for two points, thereby putting the Eagles at an 8-7 disadvantage. But Logan, Jurecek,

Meador, and Company would not hear to the Rankin proposal; so the Red Devil's gamble failed, leaving the Eagles still out front the length of John McGregor's toe.

Apparently Jim Cheek, the Eagle CO, knew what he was about with his fourth-down gambles to earn necessary yardage for first downs because he consistently shattered Red Devil backs with his vicious tackles. But late in the game, a directive from his bench led to Eldorado's second punt, a booming 50-yarder and an unpredictable bounce which Logan and Associates took full advantage of.

The Eagle ground game caught fire several times but two penalties ended a fine surge. The Red Devils' scout reports had led them to focus too much attention on Big Donnie Holden so that Diminutive Denzil Fisher and John McGregor broke away for long gains. Rankin's failure to examine the Eagle backfield accurately eventually led to Fisher and McGregor's putting the ball in scoring position.

so that Donnie Holden rammed over for Eldorado's second touchdown.

McGregor applied his toe to put another handicap in the Red Devils' way; and the score stood at 14-6, with time running out on Rankin.

Eldorado's second and third lines of resistance featuring Jim Cheek, Lynn Meador, and Affiliates all did yeoman's service in stopping Rankin's swift and competent backs who penetrated Eldorado's forward area repeatedly.

Rocksprings, Robert Lee, Big Lake, Sonora, Junction, and Ozona scouts had an uneasy time evaluating a single Cheek-Logan short pass exchange which looked too easy for comfort as well as Cheek's tremendous 45-yard aerial which three desperate Red Devils barely knocked down on their own goal line.

It was a fine football game in many ways: beautiful weather, a fierce and capable opponent, no peace of mind for the many spectators, fine bands, few penalties; but a chill breeze swept across the field on the last play when Eagle Quarterback tried to score with a keeper and the Red Devils took the opportunity to treat him to some of his own shattering stops. An eager Red Devil perhaps overdid it in the split second before the referee ended the game, giving prostrate Cheek such a buffet that he was stunned for a long 60 or 80 seconds during which time many people on the Eagle side of the stadium waited—and shivered a bit.

But soon he was on his feet and "All's well that ends well."

Game statistics show that the Eagles really beat the Red Devils and the ground by 243 to 140 yards rushing. Rankin evened it up a bit with 119 yards through the air to 37 for Eldorado. It was the first game in some time where no Eagle was able to intercept an enemy aerial; Rankin completed five out of 10 tries; Eldorado, two of nine.

Rankin fumbled once to Eldorado's none and lost no ground via the "red flag" route while Eldorado lost 20 on an offside and an over-zealous block which was ruled as a clip.

ZONE 3 SOIL CONSERVATION ELECTION SET; DEFERRED ROTATION GRAZING EXHIBITED

Zone 3 residents of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District have an election date to keep on October 3. Zone 3 comprises all land north and west from the county line on Highway 277 to Eldorado, thence highway 33 from Eldorado to county line. This is a very important election and all eligible voters are urged to cast their vote.

Zone 3 voters of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation district will elect a farmer or rancher who will serve as supervisor and representative of the Soil Conservation district board for the next five years. Time and place for the October 3rd balloting is at the W. R. Bearce ranch at 4:00 p.m.

A qualified voter is a zone 3 landowner who is 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible land owners can vote and should do so

Rocksprings Here Tomorrow

The Eldorado Eagles host Rocksprings tomorrow night at Eagle stadium, at 8:00 o'clock, in a game which sees the Eagles again carrying the "upper dog" handicap. Last year the Eagles downed Rocksprings 6 to 0.

Vital statistics on Rocksprings are that the total school enrollment for last year was 344 pupils or approximately 75 or 80 in high school. Their district valuation for school purposes is \$5,198,228 with \$1.22 for routine school expenditures and with 28c for indebtedness on their fine new school buildings.

It is difficult for a high school the size of Rocksprings to qualify for membership in the Southern Association and Rocksprings has not qualified. It is accredited as a four-year high school with Texas Education Agency.

But big strong boys go to small schools and if there are enough of them, small schools sometimes do surprising things. Rocksprings over the years has been this sort of school. And certainly, they have never been called "sissies."

The Eagles can expect a spirited contest tomorrow night although spectators may be able to take it a little easier than when the Eagles met the Red Devils last Friday night.

Sonora will be in town tonight as the Eaglets try for their third win. Game time is 7:00 o'clock.

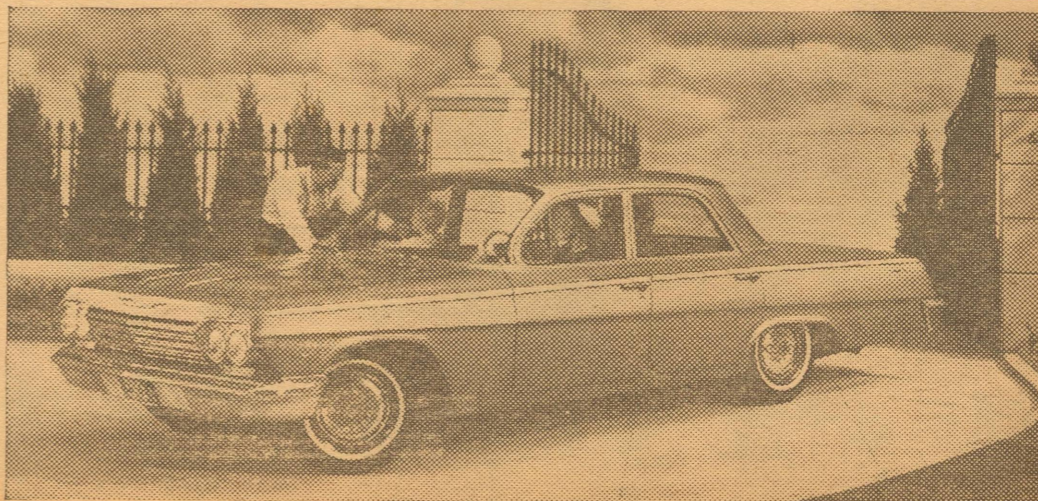
WILLIAMS SELLS PLACE

Citation For West

Austin. — "Excellent performance of a vital community service" has earned an official State Health Department citation for Palmer West, an Eldorado city utilities specialist, who has charge of the gas department.

The impressively designed document, signed by the commissioner of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, is sparingly awarded only to those who can demonstrate "skill and knowledge of water treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work."

Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their work's influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

The Texas general sanitation law requires that at least one plant operator per shift be certified by the state health agency, but other plant personnel and persons in related fields frequently seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to advance themselves professionally and to increase their efficiency.

"The recipients of these certificates are a credit to their profession and to their communities," sponsors of the certification program said.

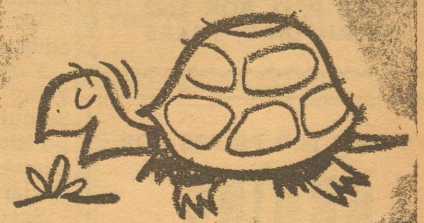
Points toward certification are earned through actual work experience and by attendance at annual district and state short schools sponsored and conducted by the Texas State Department of Health, the engineering extension service of Texas A&M College, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

Schleicher Included In 1961 FM Road Program

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$126,000 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in Schleicher county as part of the 1961 FM Road Program, announced District Highway Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo.

The District Engineer said 6.3 miles in this county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of R. A. McCulloch, senior resident engineer of Sonora.

The work authorized for this county is part of the \$15 million FM Road Construction Program which will involve 133 counties throughout the state. Some 600 miles of new farm roads will be built under the program.

Unlike previous farm road construction programs, this one is for one year instead of two years. The Highway Commission said the reduced one-year program is the result of Governor Price Daniel's recent veto of a \$15 million farm road appropriation which would have come to the Highway Department next year.

The Governor recently vetoed the Colson-Briscoe farm roads allocation for the second year of the current biennium on the grounds that there should be more flexibility in the use of the funds in order to provide for proper maintenance of the farm roads system. In approving the 1961 farm roads program, the Commission said it is vital that the 1962 Colson-Briscoe appropriation be reinstated at the forthcoming special legislative session if the Highway Department is to continue the Farm to Market Road Program at the current pace.

The Commission reiterated its hope and belief that the Legislature at the special session will see fit to reinstate the second-year farm roads appropriation together with statutory provision for adequate flexibility in the use of farm road funds for maintenance, as recommended by Governor

Daniel.

The Commission said that maintenance of all FM Roads had been paid for out of trunk highway funds since the inception of the Colson-Briscoe program in 1949, and that this was advisable during this period due to the necessity for construction of many new miles of FM roads. However, the Commission pointed out that the problem now is the adequate maintenance, improvement and reconstruction of the 34,000 miles of Farm to Market Roads that have already been built. The Department has now reached the point where a portion of the total earmarked FM road funds must be used for maintenance purposes, the Commission said.

District Engineer Snell said a total of 23.9 miles in this highway district would be involved in the program at a total cost of \$471,000. The following project will take place in Schleicher County:

From end of RM 2084, 2.0 Miles South of Tom Green County Line, South to end of FM 2479, 6.8 Miles North of St. 29, a distance of 6.3 miles; Grading, Structures & Surfacing.
