This year's good cotton yield, in to add more of the needed residue frost does. to their fields. With more acres planted than in the past several years, and good yields expected, the supply of cotton burs should exceed that of last year. Last year's cotton yield was 4964 bales from approximately 6556 acres. This year's yield from approximately 8390 acres is expected to exceed last year's yield in total bales produced.

Water has again been one of the most important factors in crop production this year. The use of cotton burs will enable crops to make better use of moisture received. Cotton burs applied at the rate of 2 tons or more per acre will help prevent soil erosion by wind and water. Fields with good residue on the soil, with part on top and part incorporated in the soil will absorb water faster than soil low in organic matter. Good crop residue protects the soil from the direct force of raindrops and thereby prevents displacement of soil particles and thus helps prevent erosion. The good residue also helps hold the rain where it falls which results in better distribution of moisture. Moisture loss by evaporation is greatly re-

duced when fields are protected by a good cover of residue. Each bale of cotton harvested by hand pulling or stripping produces approximately 675 pounds of burs, stems and other waste. With the removal of the burs, stems and other waste from the field plant nutrients needed for good crop production is also removed. With continued removal of cotton burs or any crop residue, the crop yield will decrease. When good crop residue is added to the soil by residue producing crops or by cotton burs, soil condition and fertility

can be maintained at a high level for good crop yields. To obtain maximum benefits from cotton burs applied to cropland the burs should be applied uniformly over the field at about two tons per acre. To help decompose the burs and provide the needed nitrogen for the crop to be grown, 12 to 15 pounds of nitrogen should be applied for each ton of burs. After cotton burs have been applied seedbed preparation can be started. No special farming

implements are needed. Farmers in the district that put cotton burs on cropland from last year's cotton crop, state that they have benefitted this year's crop. 'There is definitely less dead cotton this year than last year on the land where 2 to 4 tons of cotton burs per acre was applied," Truett C. Stanford stated this week. Stanford put the burs on one of his older fields because he felt they were needed more on the old field than on a field that has not been

in cropland very long. Wayne Mikeska states, "Where we put cotton burs, the cotton looks like it will make ¼ bale more per acre than where we did not put any burs." He plans to put more burs on his cropland from

this year's cotton crop. "How much the yields will be increased by applying cotton burs, along with all the needed soil, water and plant conservation practices is not known," states Lloyd B. Johnson of the Soil Conservation Servcie. However, it is known that soils in good condition will produce more under the same moisture conditions and farming operations than soils in poor condition. By utilizing all cotton burs produced each year more acres of cropland can be kept in a better condition than before burs were used for soil improvement.

No attempt was made to compare harvesting costs between ownership of equipment and custom hiring the work done. The method of figuring the costs under farmer owned and operated equipment could form the basis for making your decision, however.

With the great build-up of cotton insects, especially pink bollworm and boll weevil in 1961-what should be done to insure the great est profit this year and protect the economy of cotton production in the future?

1. Early stalk destruction and farm clean-up are valuable tools to use in controlling the pink bollworm and the boll weevil.

2. Late irrigated fields and the late fall crops are expensive in most cases because of the large build-up of cotton insects.

3. Use a dessicant or defoliant as early as practicable-strip, hand pick or pull-or machine harvest.

Plentiful Foods Are Listed For October

College Station.—Grocery shop ping can be truly pleasurable when there's an abundance of many items. That will be the case in October, when Texas food markets will abound with nearly every item that makes up the average food shopper's needs, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's official plentiful foods list for October features apples, potatoes, and broiler-fryers. It also points to huge supplies of six other important foods: cheese, rice turkeys, beef, cranberries, and vegetable fats and oils.

These foods are cited from among the many items in fall abundance because USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service expects supplies of each to exceed normal demand. That means you, as a consumer, will find available a greater choice of quality, and you can expect prices on these items to be lower, in keeping with the huge

Fall shipments of apples will reach their peak in October. And this year's crop is estimated at 15% more than last year. October 12 to 21 is National Apple Week.

Potatoes will continue plentiful at low to moderate prices. The fall crop is 10% greater than in 1960. Broiler-fryers, of course, have been plentiful and low-priced all summer.

There's plenty of cheese to make October Cheese Festival exactly that. Stocks of American cheese are almost a third greater than they were this time last year. Similar supply conditions exist for all other plentifuls on the list.
