The booming world population makes it vital that we conserve our natural resources for future generations. According to statistics, our population will increase seventy per cent between 1960 and 1980. If we don't conserve our resources today, we may find ourselves lacking in the major necessities of life tomorrow.

President Theodore Roosevelt once made the observation, "When Army Reserve Unit the soil is gone, man must go. And the process does not take long. More than fifty million acres of farm land has been destroyed by erosion in the United States alone since Colonial days. Another fifty million acres have been partially destroyed, while one hundred million acres are being threatened now.

In 1950, we in the United States were consuming ten per cent more than we were producing.
