Having returned Sunday from their trip to Bandera and San Antonio, there are several more parties in the offing before diplomas are awarded Tuesday night at Commencement exercises.

This Saturday a class party will be held at the Joe Muller Christians, with the Eldon Calks and Kenneth Cheeks as co-hosts.

The following day, Sunday, Capt. and Mrs. Thad A. Thomson and

Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Willoughby will honor the class with a barbecue at 6:00 o'clock at the Memorial Building. The Baccalaureate service will be held at 8:00 o'clock, with most Eldorado churches dispensing with their regular services that evening in order for their congregations to attend.

Following the Commencement Vesper Service, the class will have a get-together at the P. S. Dudley home.

Monday morning, the Presbyterians will give their traditional breakfast for the grads at 7:00 o'clock.

Commencement exercises at 8:00 o'clock Tuesday will officially close the school year.

In The Beginning

It was during World War II that this year's classmen were born. Many were sons and daughters of war brides, with the fathers serving in the armed forces to help win history's longest and costliest war. Here in Eldorado in the fall of 1943, and on into 1944, rationing was at its height with shortages of many goods, housing scarce, public transportation unreliable, and gasoline and tires rationed.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Forrest Runige announce the arrival of a son born Wednesday evening at 6:30 in a San Angelo hospital. The young man weighed 7 lbs. 15 oz. and has been named J. Forrest Jr. —Sept. 10, 1943.

Robert Milligans Have New Granddaughter

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Topliffe of Baytown are the parents of a baby daughter, born Wednesday, March 1, in a Goosecreek hospital. The 'topliffes have one other child, a daughter, Myrta Ann, who was born at 9:00 o'clock three years ago to the day before the arrival of the new daughter Wednesday. The new daughter has been named Martha Ellen. —March 3, 1944.

Sgt. Delbert Edmiston Writes From German P.O.W. Camp

Mr. and Mrs. F. A. (Bill) Edmiston have received their first letter from their son, T-Sgt. Delbert E. Edmiston, who is a prisoner of war in Germany.

Sergeant and Mrs. Edmiston are the parents of a baby girl born April 26 in a San Angelo hospital. She weighed 7 lbs. and has been named Genelle Sue. Mrs. Edmiston and the baby are residing in Mertzon where they are making their home with Mrs. Edmiston's parents. —May 5, 1944.

They Start To School

Back in the fall of 1950, this year's grads comprised the initial crop of first graders to start to school in the newly completed and furnished school plant. The preceding summer had seen the razing of the old red brick high school on the Angelo highway and the completion of the new single-story facilities. C. A. Reynolds was superintendent of schools and Wyndell Hall was grade school principal. First grade teachers were Mrs. L. V. Newport and Mrs. Nancy Thompson.

Over in the high school Jack Black was principal and Ted Kirby was coach of the Eldorado Eagles.

On To High School

The fall of '58 found the class starting to high school as freshmen. The preceding summer Joe R. Andrews had resigned as high school principal and was succeeded by Frank Kemble. Coach Jim Herridge was lining up the Eagles for their '58 season with the assistance of Earl Barnett and Guy Whitaker. Then as now, A. M. Whitis was school superintendent.

Also during this period: Permian Basin Pipeline continued construction of their new compressor plant in the Reynolds area, the Palmer Wests and H. A. Belks were honored on their 25th wedding anniversaries, A. P. Fambrough sold the Chevrolet dealership to J. D. Huckaby and Paul Page, and black topping of the airport and parking area around the swimming pool

Surveying Is Under Way On New Angelo Highway

Surveyors from the Highway Department have been at work surveying the new route of Highway 277 north to the Tom Green county line, which will eventually become part of a new, modern highway to San Angelo.

The new route will do away with the two rail crossings in Schleicher county by staying west of the Santa Fe line for much of the distance. This will call for acquiring several miles of new right of way.

The new route is being surveyed west of Joe Wagley's and will stay west of the railroad line on high ground. The line will pass west of the Lavelle Meckel house and will come near the tracks at Ernest Finnigan's and Jess Blaylock's.

The new route will come back into part of the present route north of the Huldale rail crossing.

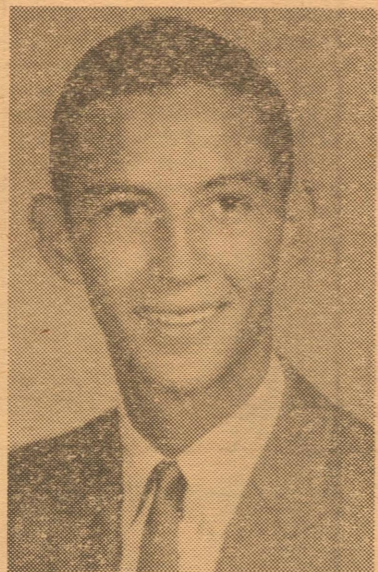
Schleicher County Commissioners will begin negotiations soon with affected landowners for purchase of the new right of way. Then will follow fencing of the new route.

It is expected to be sometime next year before the Highway Department asks for contractors' bids for actual construction of the new road.

When completed in the future, the new highway will provide a high speed road, modern in every respect, without any sharp curves.

The present San Angelo highway was built back in the early 1920's, and follows much of the wagon trail route of still earlier days.

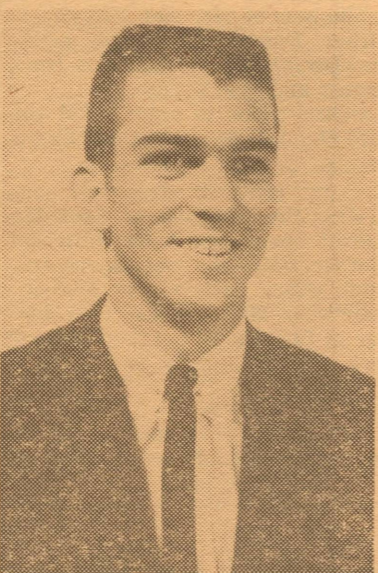

Eldorado ASCS Office Planning New Building

On May 10th a notice was posted in several public buildings by R. J. Cardwell, acting office manager of the ASCS, stating that the local office was interested in renting or leasing a newly constructed office building.

The notice states that the location must be suitably located in relation to the court house and postoffice and have ample parking area.

The notice is an invitation to local builders to submit proposals. Further details, available at the office, specify that the building should have a total of 1550 feet of floor space, and that the ASCS is limited to a maximum rent of \$125 per month, and that their leases are granted for only one year at a time.

Proposals will be accepted by the ASCS for a period of ten days which puts it up to May 20. At this writing only one proposal has been received which is from Ed Meador who has offered to put up a new building at the rear of his present office, and fronting on Callender avenue.

In the event this proposal is accepted, Meador will probably build a second structure alongside the new ASCS office as a location for a service establishment of some kind.

The present ASCS office is the old Wiedenmann doctor office and is also Meador property. Future plans, which are more or less indefinite at this time, call for the removal of this old structure and a new building erected on the lot.

Texas' new sales tax which was enacted last year must have exerted a subtle influence in the recent Democratic Primary which saw Don Yarborough and John Connally emerge as top contenders, and the two now face each other in the run-off on June 2nd.

Governor Daniel was a long-time foe of the sales tax and he let it become law without his signature, but because it was enacted in his administration he caught some of the blame, and failed to become this state's first four-term governor.

One of the planks in Will Wilson's platform called for reducing the sales tax from 2% to 1% and placing it "straight across the board" on all retail sales including groceries and prescription drugs and other items exempted under the present measure. Texans apparently don't want the tax extended to "everything" because Wilson came in fourth when the votes were counted.

Don Yarborough must have picked up some extra votes as the only one of the six in the race favoring repeal of the sales tax. Now that he is in the run-off with Connally, the sales tax will continue to be an issue, although a less emphasized one.

The "liberal" and "conservative" Democrats will split more openly on the two contenders.

5TH SHUT-IN GASSER MADE IN SOUTH DOVE CREEK AREA

The South Dove Creek area, 15 miles northwest of Eldorado, got its fifth shut-in gasser last week and brought it that much closer to becoming a producing field, which is a matter still hinging on pipeline outlets.

The new producer has a Railroad Commission designation as Medco Properties of Midland No. 1 T. C. Meador. It was finished over the week end with a potential of 11,500,000 cubic feet of gas, and a gas-oil ratio of 13,000 to 1. Top of the pay was 6600 feet.

The new well is a re-entry and is located one mile west of the TGL No. 1 Henderson which was brought in last year with a rating of 55 million cubic feet of gas per day.

In 1952 Stanolind drilled the T. C. Meador well to a depth of 7440 feet and abandoned it as a dry hole and allowed its leases to expire. Interest in the project as a possible gasser was awakened with the discovery of the prolific Henderson well and the re-entry was scheduled by Medco Properties, a new company in which we understand local people are interested.

TXL has three shut-in gassers in the area, and Bright and Schiff have one on the Roach ranch. The new Medco discovery makes the fifth. Renewed efforts are now being made to secure pipeline connections for the area.

Murder Charged In Monahans Death Of Former Local Woman

Funeral services were held in Monahans Monday for Bessie Ray Lovelace, 43, who died Friday as a result of a beating. Originally from Eldorado, the victim was known here years ago by her maiden name of Bessie Mercer, and attended the Eldorado schools in her girlhood days.

Mrs. B. A. Whitten, sister of the deceased, and Mr. Whitten, and Mr. and Mrs. John Mormon, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Davis, Tommy Whitten, Lisa Whitten, Mrs. L. L. Harris all of Eldorado, and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Mercer of Oregon, attended the funeral Monday in the Barnes Funeral Home in Monahans. Mrs. Charlie Kennedy of Los Angeles, California, was unable to attend. Interment was made in the cemetery at Monahans.

According to a news item in daily papers, Richard Lovelace, about 44, an unemployed laborer, Saturday was charged with murder in the beating death Friday of his wife, Bessie Ray Lovelace, 43.

Lovelace was remanded to Ward county jail when he was unable to make \$5,000 bond. Charge was filed before Peace Justice Fred Snelson.

Dist. Atty. R. A. McGowen Saturday said an autopsy showed death was result of a blow to the woman's head. The doctor who performed the autopsy said she died of a blood clot in the skull.

The woman's body was found sprawled on the floor of her two-room home in Southeast Monahans about 5:00 p.m. Friday by a daughter, Sharon, 11, and a neighbor, Mrs. "Midget" Fannin.

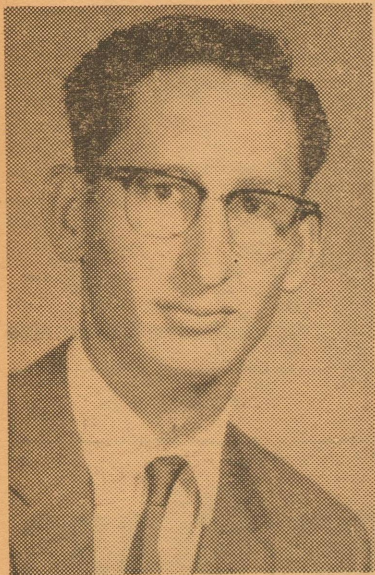
Born In Kerrville

During Frank's freshman year, he was elected class favorite. He was also an active member of the FFA and football team.

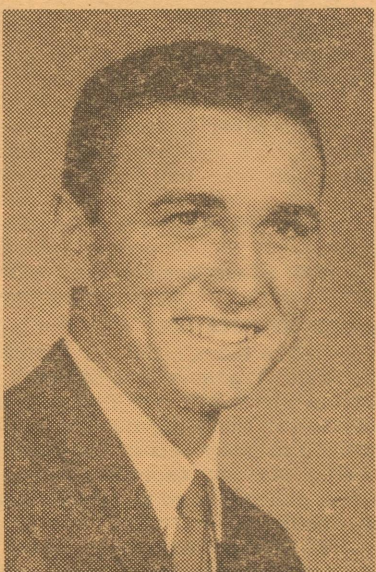
Frank is the son of Mrs. J. Tom Williams, and he plans to go on active duty in the Navy.

Herman was parliamentarian of the Student Council during his Junior year. He was also a member of the choral, FFA, and speech clubs, and the basketball and track teams.

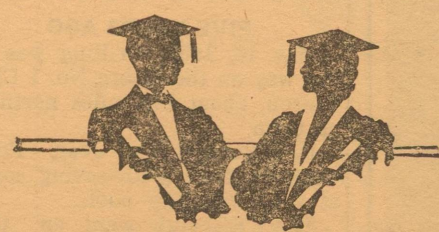

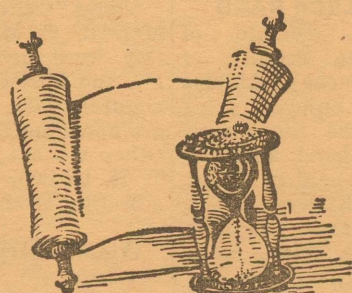

STERILE FLIES RELEASED IN THE COUNTY TO LESSEN SCREWORM INFESTATION

Livestockmen are to be commended for their cooperation in the screwworm eradication program, by treating, spraying and sending in maggots and screwworm for positive identification. This co-operation will continue to lessen the spread of the pest.

The County Livestock Committee urges those who have not paid into the eradication program to cooperate in this undertaking. You may obtain the vials at the county agent's office. By co-operating with county committee and the officials of the screwworm eradication program—the job will be made easier—not only helping yourself but your neighbor and other friends as well.

At present the zone control method, an alternate method, is in effect rather than dropping sterile male flies on the individual ranch. This zone extends from Fort Stockton to Possum Kingdom Dam, then extends straight down to Baytown.

It was clear that Texas Democrats were ready for a change, and that they felt experience in state government was not the important factor.

Jack Cox won the Republican primary and will take on the Democratic nominee on Nov. 6.

Speaker Jimmy Turman of the Texas House of Representatives led five candidates in the race for lieutenant governor. State Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock faces Turman in the runoff.

The GOP will have no runoff for state office on June 2.

**High Court Upholds
Scnieicher Verdict**

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed that Carl Emory Sides of San Antonio must serve a 3-year prison term for passing a check on Mrs. D. C. Williams of Eldorado, a conviction by a jury in Schleicher county.

The high court held that the jury had resolved the disputed evidence against Sides and that there was sufficient evidence to sustain the verdict, so it refused the effort by Sides to bring the case up for rehearing.

The check involved was for \$2,690 on the First National Bank of Eldorado. Mrs. Williams testified that she gave Sides a check for \$25 for cleaning up her fire extinguishers and denied giving him one for \$2,690.

A hand-writing expert testified that it was not her signature on the check.

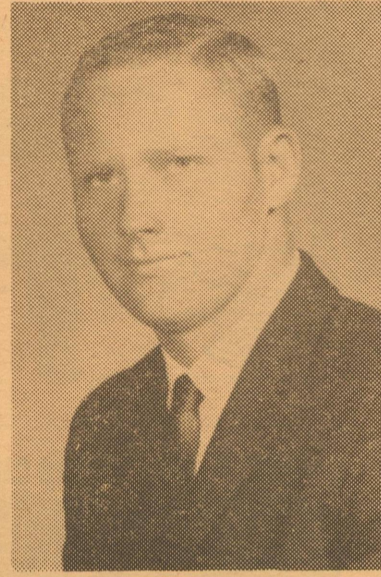

On The Screen . . . 'The Innocents' Based on 'Turn Of The Screw'

Henry James' 1898 novelette, "The Turn of the Screw," is re-enacted in the current movie version entitled, "The Innocents," which will be shown Sunday and Monday nights at the Eagle Drive-In Theatre.

Deborah Kerr is the fear-wracked governess in this tale which is the chiller of the year. She has a role that is a demanding one that rarely fails to reward its possessor.

The boxoffice pay-off on "The Innocents" is a four-way proposition: the work of Miss Kerr, on camera almost constantly; the direction of Jack ("Room at the Top") Clayton, and the near-uncanny abilities of two remarkable child stars, Martin Stephens and Pamela Franklin.

Henry James' "The Turn of the Screw" was always a puzzling book, never quite spelling out what the governess thought was happening to the children. It was no more clear in the Bergman TV version of some time ago, but the undeniable plus of a visual presentation left no doubt as to its horror impact. The questions began to be answered more clearly in William Archibald's stage version, which he renamed "The Innocents."

In the movie version, Clayton makes it explicit: The two small children Miss Kerr is retained to rear are having their souls possessed by an unsavory valet and the former governess, a pair of clandestine lovers who are now dead—and who need to enter living forms to continue their existence. The only way to destroy the specters is for the children to face finally the apparitions at the windows and rid themselves of them by admitting their existence.

Playing it more as a straight dramatic piece rather than a creaking-door shocker, Clayton uses moods and lighting more than screams and shadows to achieve his desired effects. If you don't believe there can be horror in a sunlit, bird-twittering garden, then see what happens when the birds suddenly stop twittering.

Miss Kerr is flawless as the terrified but determined governess—a perfect study in trembling lip but jutting chin.

As for the rest of the cast, everybody did humanly what Jack Clayton asked of them. The children were erratic. Young Master Martin Stephens is a mite more consistent than young Mistress Pamela Franklin.

Micro-Film Equipment To Be Labor-Saver At Abstract Office

The Ed Meador Agency is displaying a new piece of equipment which is designed to speed-up the work of copying legal instruments and do away with many hours of a typist's time.

It is a micro-film process and consists of two units: a camera and a printer. The camera unit is now set up at the court house where it is being used to make copies of all instruments on file in the clerk's office.

With this system a legal size page of typing is transferred to a film about half the size of a postage stamp. All the records in two of the large books in the clerk's office can be copied on one small roll of film, and it takes only a second for each page.

As in every other business, labor is the big problem in abstracting, according to Mrs. Bobby Henderson, chief secretary at the office. "Just about the time we'd get a girl trained to do the work, she'd up and quit," she said.

And the photographic system of copying leaves no chance for errors—a page is reproduced exactly as it is, signatures and all.
