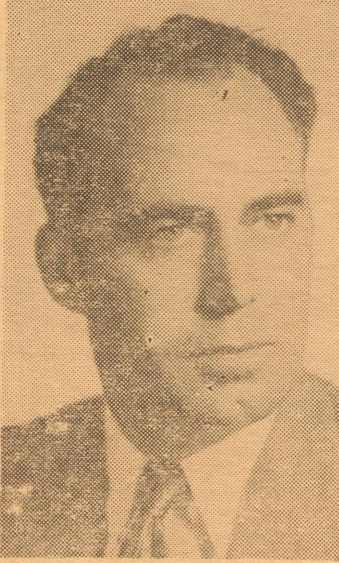

## Right-Of-Way Deeds Are Being Prepared

Frank Jordan, right-of-way man with the Highway department, was here last week and reported that deeds for the initial 8½ miles of new highway to San Angelo are being prepared and will be ready Oct. 1st. Then will follow letting of contract and fencing of right-of-way.

Plans call for a mile and a half of the new highway to be built from the Gulf station north to Joe Wagley's, mostly along the present right-of-way and this stretch will be curbed and guttered in the city limits, and will be topped. The remainder, about seven miles, will follow a new route west of the railroad tracks. It will call for new structure, foundation, base and grading and will not be topped until the second job is done later on in the Huldale area.

Herb Nelson of San Angelo was apparent low bidder when bids were opened Tuesday morning of this week for the 6-mile Toenail Trail link, between Jim O'Harrow's and Thomerson's. When completed, this link will provide a paved road across the northeast part of the county.

Slated to be included in the 1963 road program is reconstructing 9 miles of highway from Eldorado east (the Menard road). This project will include improving the grade line, widening the base, and new surface. Curbing and guttering will be included in the city limits and the entire job will be done on the present right-of-way.

## Records Show Extent of Drouth

It will come as no surprise to county residents to be told that the month of July was another dry one, continuing the summer dry spell.

Records from the county agent and Soil Conservation offices reveal that the average rainfall for July was no more than one-half inch. The figures are taken from several points over the county from which an average is arrived at. One check point showed over half an inch and another slightly less than that.

With the month of August entering into its last week and nothing more than a trace to show all month, it forces one to the hard conclusion that we are in a drouth area.

The lamb and calf crop has been going to market about two months ahead of time, as revealed by the reports from Hartgraves stock yards in the past several weeks.

**Cotton Crop Hit**  
The cotton crop in Schleicher county has been hit badly according to men connected with the

Mikeska Gin. Where the crop last year came to about 5,400 bales, the ginning this year will do well to come to half that amount. And the disappointment this year will include irrigated cotton as well as the dryland crop.

George Mikeska even went so far as to say that if it didn't rain BEFORE September 1st he would not expect any more than 2,000 bales from the whole county.

But that again was only one person's opinion. Another promptly offered to bet him a pair of used knee pads that he would be wrong.

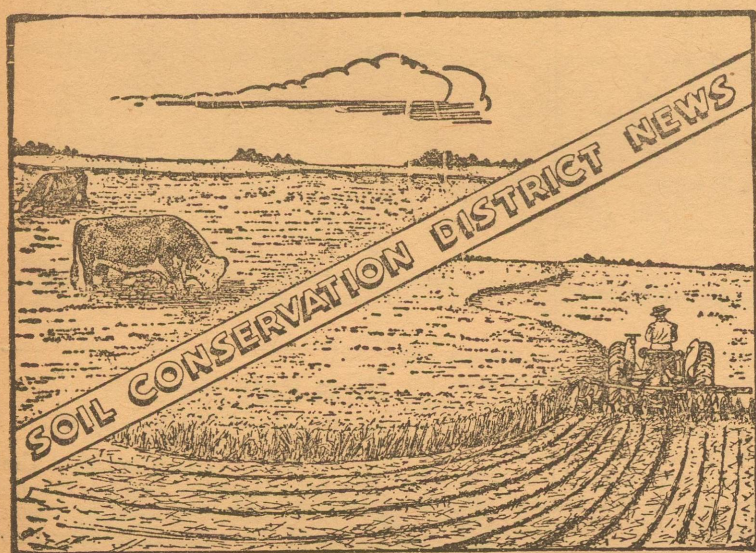

The completion of 1759 feet of underground irrigation pipeline on Pete and Glenn Parker's farm is the first delivery system of its kind in Schleicher county. Friday afternoon of last week, for the first time since the Parkers started irrigating several years ago, all the water from the outlet on the irrigation reservoir was delivered to the field without any water loss. The 1759 feet of completed pipeline and approximately 2400 feet remaining to be done, will deliver water to approximately 49 acres.

The water will gravity flow thru the pipeline from the irrigation reservoir at the rate of 600 gallons per minute. Outlet valves are spaced 200 feet apart and will be connected to 8-inch aluminum gated pipe to deliver the water into level borders. Two sections of the 100 feet aluminum line will be used to facilitate the changing of water from one outlet valve to another without having to cut the water off to do so. While one of the gated lines is in use the other

gated line can be put in position to water the next setting.

The advantages of an underground irrigation pipeline are numerous. Water loss is literally nothing in underground irrigation pipelines as compared to 33% or more water loss in earthen ditches of considerable length. The ease of irrigating from an irrigation pipe over earthen ditches could be compared to the difference in driving a modern automobile and a team of oxen. The overall efficiency is increased whereby more acres can be irrigated per day and additional acres can be irrigated with water normally lost in earthen ditches.

The irrigation pipeline was designed, laid out and checked for completion by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. The irrigation pipeline is one of the soil and water conservation practices planned on Parker's irrigated land. Cost share for the irrigation pipeline was received under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

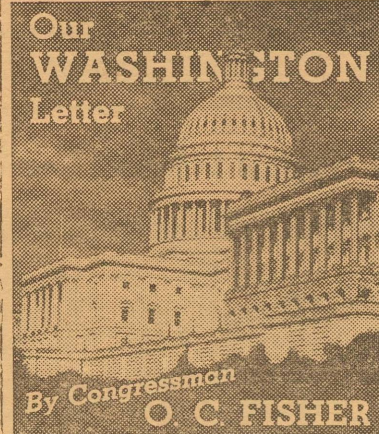

A strange paradox has developed out of the 5.3% unemployment in the country and the fact that many jobs are unfilled because they do not suit the people who are out of work.

A recent national survey has revealed a multitude of jobs remain unfilled because no one will take them. For example, in Cleveland, the State Employment Service has failed for six months to fill 100 job openings for waitresses. In San Francisco some financial firms are finding it difficult to locate clerical help despite a plentiful supply of unemployed looking for office jobs. The problem is reported to be that the jobless are too "choosy" about what they do and how much they get paid.

In Los Angeles an Employment Service has an order for 50 odd-job workers, but cannot fill them. Temporary jobs on farms are almost impossible to fill.

In Houston, an Employment Service tried to get some unemployed job-seekers to work as dishwashers. "They tell me I'm drawing \$29 a week unemployment now; why should I take a \$30 job?" reports an official.

In Cleveland an order for a busboy to work in a private club at \$50 a week and meals goes unfilled.

And the report goes on at length listing job opportunities that can't be filled because the unemployed don't like that kind of work or else they think they are better off drawing unemployment compensation.

Yet, in Chicago, last week the AFL-CIO's 29-man Executive Council, viewing with alarm the unemployment, opened a massive drive to reduce work weeks to 35 hours and require double pay (instead of

1½) for overtime, without any reduction in the income of workers. A task force was set up to draft legislation and turn the heat on Congress to pass legislation next year along this line.

Obviously, this would be highly inflationary and by increasing prices any gain the workers might achieve, viewed from any stand-

point, would be eaten away by increased prices. And the entire nation would suffer.

Actually, there is nothing particularly alarming about the present statistics who have not had time to get themselves established, including many living at home and are in no big hurry about it. Moreover, who simply don't want to work. Others are unemployed during a

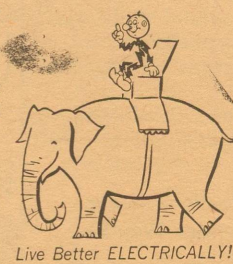

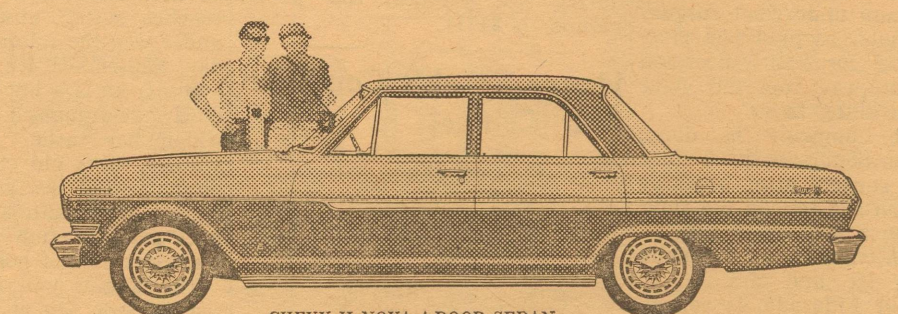
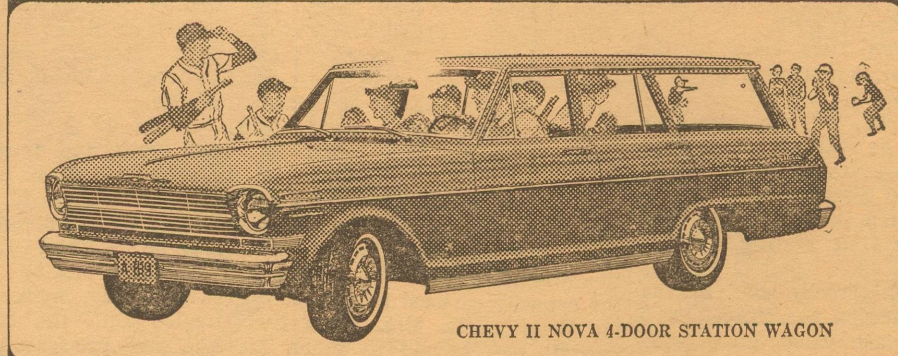

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

Little things remembered from the vacation:

1. Authentic highway sign in Arizona which said "Warning—this road is patrolled from the air." Then I spent the next 20 miles trying to figure out how the man in the air would describe a speeding car to the man on the road. All cars these days look alike when seen from the top.
2. Even the oil companies are becoming beauty conscious in the west. I saw a "tank farm" which was done completely in pastel colors. One storage tank was robin's egg blue, one light pink, one pale green and another a taffy tan. I just wonder what the men who put the paint on really thought. I thought it was beautiful. Even the pump jacks were of delicate color.
3. No wonder our shipped in tomatoes don't taste any better than they do. One time on the highway I was sure we were passing a truck load of green apples. But they were tomatoes.
4. If a person isn't prepared for it, the Los Angeles freeway could be a nightmare. Lloyd Johnson told me that when his family were in California they heard about the experience of two couples on the freeway which could happen to anybody.
5. There are no guard rails on the mountain road leading over Tioga Pass in the Sierra Nevada range of Yosemite. A park ranger said that the accident rate is very low—people have no false sense of security from a guard rail & drive accordingly.
6. We were pretty well impressed with the heat of the Mojave Desert only to find when we got home that it had been just about as hot right here.
7. Dates were getting ripe in California and we stopped by a big packing shed and got 5 pounds for 89 cents. The wonderful taste of fresh dates and the price both tickled me.
8. The Fairmount Hotel in San Francisco has installed an elevator which apparently climbs an outside wall. Actually about 2/3 is inside the building structure but the remaining third is glassed in and at night it is a little startling to see this lighted box creeping up and down the walls of a tall hotel.
9. Some of the streets in San Francisco are so steep that instead of sidewalks there are steps.
10. Going is always fun to me but oh! Getting home is wonderful.

The club voted to give a prize to the grower of the first bale of cotton brought in to the gin, and the directors voted to give a hat as prize.

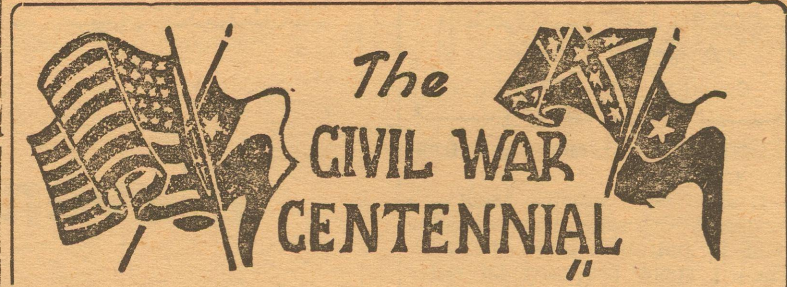

Just a hundred years ago a battery of three Confederate artillery pieces held off the first of two attacks by Federal ships during the bombardment of Corpus Christi, Aug. 16 and 18, 1862.

The Federal forces, commanded by Lieutenant J. W. Kittredge and consisting of four vessels, including the steam-powered gunboat Sachem, had sailed into Corpus Christi Bay on August 12 after gaining control of Aransas Bay the previous month.

During a 48-hour truce, Confederate forces commanded by Major A. M. Hobby evacuated the women and children from the city and threw up fortifications for their artillery. Major Hobby's small command consisted of five companies of infantry and a company of cavalry led by Captain James A. Ware. One of the infantry companies commanded was commanded by Captain John Ireland who later became governor of Texas.

Both the Federals and Confederates hurled hundreds of artillery shells at each other during the first day of the bombardment on August 16, resulting in the wounding of only one man on each side. The next day, a Sunday, was observed as a holy day and neither side opened fire.

On the 16th, however, the Federals landed a small force of men on the island but they were soon forced back aboard ship by an infantry and cavalry charge led by Major Hobby and Captain Ware. The Confederates suffered the only fatality of the two-day bombardment during this charge when Private Henry Mote was killed.

The discouraged Federal sailors gave up the assault and retired to their base in Aransas Bay and after September of that same year, no naval forces attacked Corpus Christi. However, in November of 1863, Federal troops under Gen. N. P. Banks captured Mustang Island and occupied what is now the site of Port Aransas for several months. Since there were no Confederate troops in South Texas at that time, the Union soldiers came and went at will between Mustang Island and Corpus Christi.

During these visits to the city, the soldiers carried away food and other necessities and their plundering, combined with a bitterly cold winter that year, resulted in the virtual abandonment of the city by the civilian population.

By the end of the War, Corpus Christi had almost ceased to exist.

A special attraction for Texans attending the "Confederate Day" ceremonies Sunday, August 19, in the Vicksburg National Military Park was the Texans at Vicksburg monument erected by the State of Texas near the site where a few men from Gen. T. N. Waul's Texas Legion sealed a breach in Confederate lines during the siege of Vicksburg.

The Confederate Day program featured an address by Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina. The program honored the Southern states whose troops served at Vicksburg and followed a commemorative program held last year in honor of the Northern and Midwestern states whose men made up the Union army under General Grant which laid siege to the city in 1863.

# Sterile Flies to Be Released In 'Hot Spots' of the County

"Hot spots" of the most highly infested areas of screwworm infestation have been pinpointed in the county for release of sterile flies.

Livestock producers of Schleicher continue to do a fine job of cooperation with the Southwest screwworm eradication program by (1) sending in samples of screwworms to the laboratory at Mission, Texas, and (2) by putting to use a good spray program.

Areas pin pointed from and declared "hot spots" from producers' samples sent in to Mission are:

Area I: The heaviest area in this are the Duncan Wilson, Walter Pope, Jimmie Powell, Howard Derrick, McGregor and John Webster area.

Area II: Includes the area of the Henderson Ranch, Figure 3, Page Ranch, and Jess Koy.

Area III: The heaviest infestation of screwworms in this area are on the Carrol White, Jim O'Harrow, Jim Martin and Bob Sykes ranches.

Area IV: Includes the area of Cecil Meador, Edmiston Bros., and the DeLong Estate.

Area V: The vicinity of L. Steen, the old Thomson Bros. & Lawhon ranch, and Atkin Bros. ranches.

Area VI: Includes the area of Ford Oglesby Jr., Elizabeth Powell Ranch, Sam Oglesby, Willoughby, Speck Ranch and Coupe ranches.

Only 3 to 5 producers are named in each area for "pin pointing" the area so all will receive the benefits.

Production of sterile flies will be 75 million weekly within the next few days at the screwworm production plants in Kerrville and Mission. Sterile flies are being released under Plan I or in the area from a line from Del Rio to Comanche, Texas, thence south to Fort O'Connell on the coast. This is the band being laid down & saturated with sterile flies which migrate into this area.

In order to cut down on expense and transportation time, trailers pulled by tractor trucks, obtained from government surplus, are being stripped, air conditioned and insulation installed. Each trailer will store 2 million flies.

These trailers will be pulled to the zones or hot spots and moved to new locations on short notices speeding the screwworm eradication program. A plane will operate in dispersing sterile flies within a radius of 140 miles of these large trailers. A minimum of 20 planes will be covering zones or hot spots in the state by September 1 of this year, and 800 sterile flies per section will be released.

Your Animal Livestock Committee asks your continued co-operation by (1) keeping samples of screwworms when they occur on your farm or ranch and sending to the Screwworm Eradication Program, P.O. Box 969, Mission, Tex. Ample supply of vials are always at the County Agent's office for your use. By (2) maintaining a good spray program and close watch on livestock for screwworm cases and report the cases by sending samples to the correct source as specified in (1) above.

This being a co-operative program whereby all producers receive benefit in screwworm program, the committee further asks this of all producers: "Regardless of whether you have paid into this program 50c per head on horses, cattle, deer, etc., and 10c per head on sheep and goats, secure vials from your county agent and turn in to the screwworm program your cases of worms. By doing this you help yourself, your neighbor and the livestock industry."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 3-b, providing that school taxes therefor voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but issued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district, as changed, providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in the boundaries thereof. After any annexation, consolidation or other change of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against it, as adjusted, by any change in boundaries, and any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, in the manner authorized by the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds were issued, and the laws such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds of the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and any bond, but unissued, bonds of other school districts voted in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49-d authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 49-d, as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its Successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in or from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed, or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any territory constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by the State of Texas, in which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations."

State bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. Storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the State's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized by said Section 49-c, and any other bonds authorized hereunder, shall not exceed the Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution."

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or right to use such storage facilities at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the State that are stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a payment from the Board of Water Engineers or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water intended therefor. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities shall be used to pay principal and interest on State bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further moneys received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and the Legislature may provide principal and interest on debt incurred."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36** proposing an Amendment to Section 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who have served for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision of this State, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 16 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by the Amendment to this Constitution. No person shall qualify for benefits under this program who has served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons who are appointed to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the county and any other political subdivision shall be as follows:

"(1) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child over the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9** proposing an amendment to Section 51a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to raise the limit on use of state funds for financial assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) a year to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000) a year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read:

"Section 51a. Payment of Assistance to Needy Aged, Needy Blind and Needy Children.

The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed appropriate, for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person, who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance; and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such applications; provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further, that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to any individual, unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government."

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person, who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously

for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child over the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer under such restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisting shall not exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the amount of money received from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000) per year. The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder, and to insure that under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Constance Ford plays a dumb bunny. Al Hirt is a tiresome student of the Etruscans.

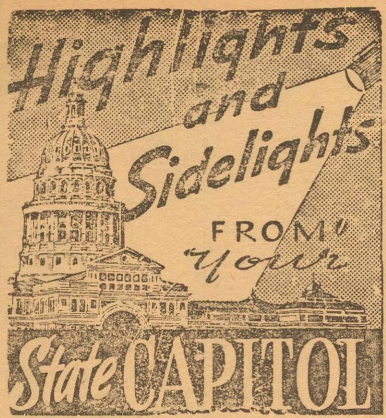

Austin.—When Jim Leonard, executive secretary of the Republican party of Texas, asked Atty. Gen. Will Wilson to impound ballots in Duval, Zapata and Starr counties, after the general election in November, the Fall political campaign immediately got under way.

It was a quaint, but telling, legal order of impoundment that Wilson filed in the 98th District Court in Austin. It cited the vaults of Duval county's district and county clerks as "not as adequate, accessible and safe" as the vault of the Corpus Christi State Bank. Same charge was levied against county vaults in Starr and Zapata counties.

The court order instructs election judges and officials in the three South Texas counties to turn ballots, poll lists and all other election records over to a Texas Ranger. He then would deliver them to the Corpus Christi bank for safe keeping until the 98th District Judge, or his appointed representative, could examine them. With this sort of preamble, it looks like the Fall campaign might be a little more exciting than the Democrat-dominated ones in past years.

Texas in Top Three

Texas returned to the No. 3 spot among the "top ten" states, in industrial expansion, as the Texas Industrial Commission announced the addition of 28 new industries. Although the Big Houston and Dallas areas captured 17 of the new plants, 11 companies picked non-metropolitan towns as industrial sites: Bushland, Comfort, Crockett, Denton, Jacksonville, Kaufman, Lewisville, Ma lakoff, Marfa, Mount Pleasant and Quanah reported new industries. TIC is a state agency dedicated to stimulating more business in Texas by cooperating with chambers of commerce and other local level groups in bringing more industries to the state. Allen Searight, the commission's coordinator, will speak at several industrial development meetings over the state during the next month.

Double Taxation

The Texas Commission on state and local tax policy has suggested that virtually all intangible personal property held by Texans be exempt from taxation. This includes taxes on bank accounts, securities, mortgages and similar financial assets.

Highway Costs Low

Texas is building its Interstate Highway system for almost \$400,000 a mile less than the national average, according to the Texas Highway Department. The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads figures show that Texas will complete its portion of the interstate system at an estimated \$600,000 per mile, compared to the national average of about \$1,000,000.

Mental Hospitals Crowded

County judges are blamed for cramming state mental hospitals by committing too many old people who really just need rest-home

care. The board for State Hospitals reports that some mental institutions—especially the Kerrville and the Confederate Home at Austin—are so crowded with old people there isn't enough room to care for the state's mentally ill.

Board member W. G. Kirklind of Odessa said that he has been told that some juvenile delinquents, who aren't mentally ill, are also being routed into mental hospitals by judges. Corrective legislation is being studied.

Dr. C. J. Ruilman, director, says facilities for 9,000 elderly people would be needed if the Legislature decides to care for them somewhere other than the mental hospitals.

Parks Plan Debated

State budget officials and parks differed on the popularity of the state's fifty public parks. Board members told the Legislative Budget Board it wants \$2,100,000 to improve four parks and increase funds for others. Reese Martin, vice chairman of the board, claims record attendance. His optimism about public use of state parks was shared by Elo Urbanovsky and Charles Doell of Texas Tech, who are working on a master plan for Texas' recreation facilities.

But Jess M. Irvin Jr., the governor's budget director, and Vernon McGee, director of the Legislative budget board, were reluctant to recommend the approval of a plan to: Spend \$600,000 to improve the newly donated Wheatley Ranch in Blanco county (which already has state park); \$550,000 at Lake Whitney State Park; \$650,000 for a new park in the Big Thicket; and \$300,000 for a new park at Falcon Lake.

Wildlife Show Fares Well

The State Game and Fish Commission's wildlife exhibit is such a prized attraction at fairs, and other community events that it is being booked on a first-come, first-served basis so everyone will have a chance to see it. T. D. Carroll, G&F Commission's coordinator of information, said the exhibit, made up of live birds, mammals, reptiles and fish of Texas, will go on the road September 4. First showing is scheduled for the Floyd County Fair of September 6-8. The exhibit will travel west from Floyd county; then move to East Texas for October dates; and to South Texas in November.

A&M Gets Reprieve

"For Men Only" apparently will continue to be the policy, for at least one more year, at Texas A&M College. The touchy matter of admitting women students has been temporarily side-stepped by the Texas Commission on Higher Education. Another school year will be underway before the matter can be given any further consideration.

Amendments Stir Campaigns

At least two of the 14 proposed constitutional amendments Texas voters will consider on November 6 appear to be firing campaigns.

Proposal No. 14 appears to be stirring opposition from the Texas Municipal League which asserts that this amendment as presently written "could virtually destroy municipal government in Texas, except for certain of its police powers."

Proposal No. 4 on the ballot would permit the state to buy conservation storage in locally or federally-owned reservoirs. Gov. Price Daniel has called a special meeting of his statewide water advisory committee for September 10, for the express purpose of organizing support for the amendment.

School Prayer Ruling

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has been asked to advise Texas public schools regarding the U. S. Supreme Court's highly controversial prayer opinion.

Request for an interpretation from Wilson came through Dr. J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education, on a query from school officials at Port Arthur.

Wilson was asked:

1. Whether a school board can permit a student or teacher to say the blessing before meals in a public school, without running afoul of the Supreme Court decision.

ion? 2. Whether school may authorize "a period of silent meditation" during the meal period? 3. Whether Bible-reading is permissible in homerooms or on assembly programs? 4. Whether the court's opinion permits public prayers at football games involving public school teams, or at other school-sponsored events?

Whopper Drought

Texas will have another mighty drought by 1970, is the prediction of Judge J. E. Sturrock, of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

Gigantic sunspots, many months old, still are raging at the center of our solar system, says Judge Sturrock.

When the great gusty winds of the universe die down, and the solar tumbleweeds stop tumbling, about 1970, Texas will have another mighty drought.

Meanwhile, Texas' rains and its "little droughts" like the current one, will follow each other in their normal seasons, says this leading authority on Texas water.

Gold Plush

House members returning to the Capitol this winter will be walking softly in the House chamber whether they intended to or not.

A plush new gold carpet is replacing the old tattered and threadbare one.

Plyboard was laid over the 1,000 square feet of floor to add strength and provide a smooth, even base for the new carpet.

In addition to the carpets and fresh paint, the ancient oak paneling has been restored to its natural finish.

More Road Funds

Contracts for building Texas highways may be stepped up by \$5 million a month under an order unfreezing \$1.9 billion from a backlog in the federal highway trust fund.

J. C. Dingwall, assistant chief highway engineer, estimates that \$91 million more federal funds will be released to Texas as a result.

Not A Fair Deal

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler opposes renewing the state lease of Matagorda Island to the federal government for a bombing range.

Of the 15,250 acres the U. S. Corps of Engineers has leased through condemnation since 1950 (for a rental of 6¢ per acre), the Air Force has subleased 13,842 acres of the tract to an individual for 19¢ per acre.

Stocks And Bonds

When you buy a share of stock, you own an interest in every single thing a firm has; when you buy one of its bonds, you don't own any part of the company. The bond or debenture is merely a promise to pay.

Suppose out of 1,000 shares outstanding, you own one share. Then you have an undivided one-thousandth share in the company, not in any particular thing but in every piece.

When you buy a bond, you own no part of the company. The firm promises to pay the loan back when the bond matures.

As a rule, bondholders have little say directly about the firm or how it picks its officers and manages its business. Of course, lenders exercise indirect influence since they must have confidence in the firm and its management before they will part with their money.

Bondholders get their interest before any stockholder gets his dividends; and should the firm go broke, they get paid out of its assets before the stockholders get a nickel.

Preferred stock, as a rule, yields fixed dividends before the common stockholders get anything, but preferred stock dividends are payable only if declared by the corporation.

As a rule, common stockholders risk more and therefore stand to make greater profit (or loss).

The legal invention of the entity called a corporation has made vast public investment in industry and commerce possible. By allowing anybody to buy in or to lend to the firm, a corporation has made large scale research, production, and marketing possible while each investor can study and decide where he wants to risk his capital.

That Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows: "Section 51-b-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the total and permanent disability of persons by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and no feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is re-

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution so as to provide that state employees may be employed in an advisory capacity or appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest.

Air Force and Coast Guard. It is further provided, that state employees may serve in an advisory capacity or be appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting state employees to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency, or any political subdivision thereof, or the Federal Government, if approved by administrative head or governing board of such employee and there is no conflict of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this state shall neither directly nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing or paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps,

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, timing and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II, a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

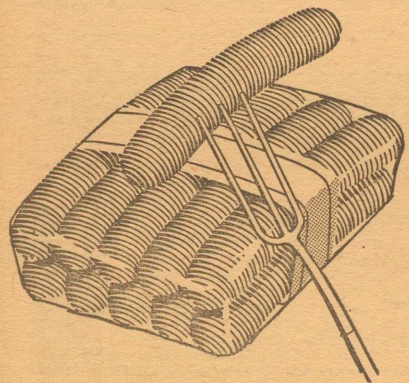
"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the condi-
