

Murray's answer was that he grew up in the oil fields, was educated in petroleum engineering and it was the only business in which he had any practical experience.

He admitted his investments and pointed out that hey were a matter of record, in his own name and he had nothing to hide. He stated that he resigned his post as a commission member because he felt that "harmful publicity' might lessen his effectiveness. Murray hinted that the investi-

gation into his past investments was prompted by his refusal to call off the East Texas slant-hole, well-drilling investigations, in which he played an active part.

Murray's attorney, Les Procter, submitted the former RR commissioner's personal financial records to Travis county District Attorney Tom Blackwell for checking. They are being examined by Blackwell Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and State Auditor C. H. Cavness.





If you are nearing retirement, Ellington suggests that you get in touch with your social security office, and take some proof of your age with you. Have a member of his staff examine whatever proof you may have to see if it will be acceptable when you do retire.

Should you need better evidence of your date of birth, you will be given information to help you get that additional evidence.

If you are within three months of retirement age, the social security office can take your application for benefits now. Go to the social security office and take with you proof of your age and your social security card of course. Ellington said that even though you are still working and are 65 years old, you can apply at any time. Many people think that you have to retire completely to get

any benefits. This is not true, Ellington said.

The 2,421 motorcides were 107 or five per cent more than in 1961. Motor vehicles traveled 94,907 miles each minute during the year, for a total of almost 50 billion

The death rate increased from 4.8 deaths per hundred million miles in 1961—the lowest in history-to 4.9 in 1962.

June was the deadliest month since November 1956. There were 258 motorcides in each of those months. Friday, June 1, took the greatest toll of any single day in the year with 22 fatalities.


Tuesday, October 16, was the only day during the year in which there were no fatal accidents. During 1962 there were five

accidents that killed seven persons each and three accidents that killed six each. In these eight accidents there were 53 deaths.

On an average in Texas traffic during 1962, a person was killed every three hours and 37 minutes, a person was injured every three and one-half minutes and an accident occurred every 87 seconds. The economic loss from traffic accidents in Texas is estimated to

Garrison pointed out that it is significant that in every single fatal accident in which more than one vehicle was involved there were one or more violations of Texas traffic laws. In the one-car accidents there were only 10% of the total accidents in which no

Driving too fast for conditions led the list of violations contributing to accidents, being listed as a causative factor in 51% of the fatal accidents. Driving while drinking figured in 37% of the fatal crashes, while being on the wrong side of the road was present in 17%.




