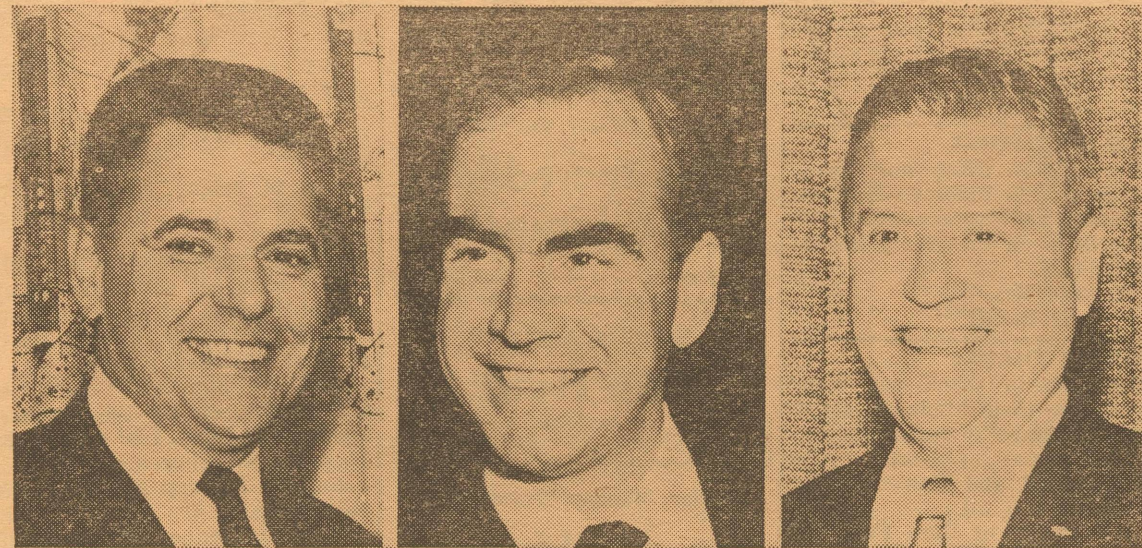

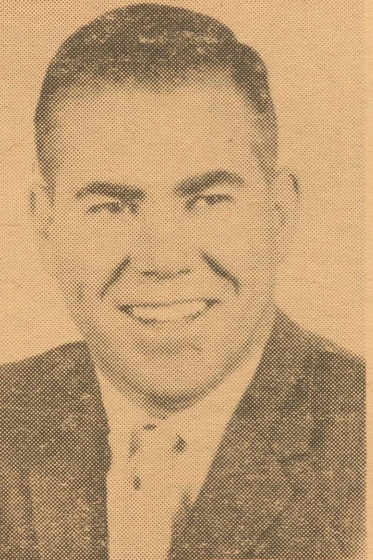
Youthful leaders in rural areas will be featured and honored at the meeting.

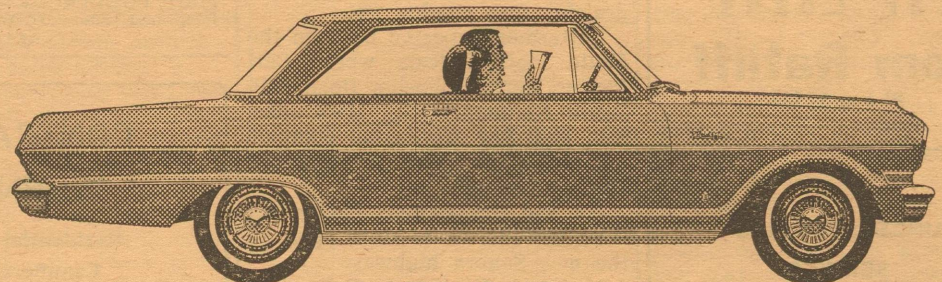
During the past 13 years the number of flags has increased from 81,000 annually to the more than 164,000 figure, he said.  
 The flags are used to drape the caskets of veterans with wartime service who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, or who served at least one enlistment during peacetime, unless discharged or released from duty for disability in line of service.

Flags may be obtained from VA offices and at some 15,400 post offices in the country as well as embassies and missions overseas through arrangements made with the State Department.

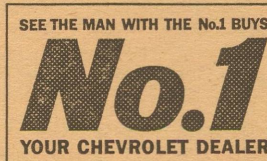

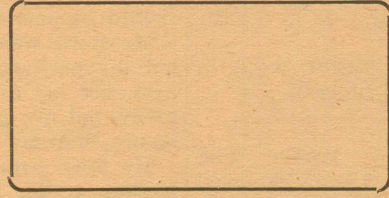

**Texas State Fair Set October 10-25**

Dallas.—Big Tex will add a multitude of lights and flowers to his State Fair of Texas this October to carry out the theme of the 1964 edition.

The big cowboy will decorate the 200-acre State Fair Park in Dallas with 70,000 individual lights in trees and on buildings, and 7,000 chrysanthemum plants.

The nation's largest annual exposition in terms of attendance will run October 10 through 25 in Dallas.

Fairgoers will be introduced to the "Lights and Flowers" theme at the main entrance where large concrete planters filled with chrysanthemums will be just outside the gates.

On the entrance plaza 5,760 twinkling lights will illuminate 21 big trees and down the plaza's center will be a 200-foot long bed of deep red chrysanthemums bordered in white. Vari-colored flowers will fill planter boxes under the trees.

A 70-foot bed of orange-bronze chrysanthemums and a large bed of lavender flowers will be at opposite ends of the Esplanada reflecting pool.

Encircling the newly painted Automobile Building will be strings of 42,000 lights in five colors.

Another major area to glow with twinkling lights will be the lagoon where 100 trees will be festooned with 21,600 individual lights.

On the plaza in front of the Coliseum will be a 30-foot ring of purple and white flowers surrounding a 20-foot high fountain.

In front of the Varied Industries and Agriculture Buildings will be 12-foot fountains set in beds of pink and purple flowers.

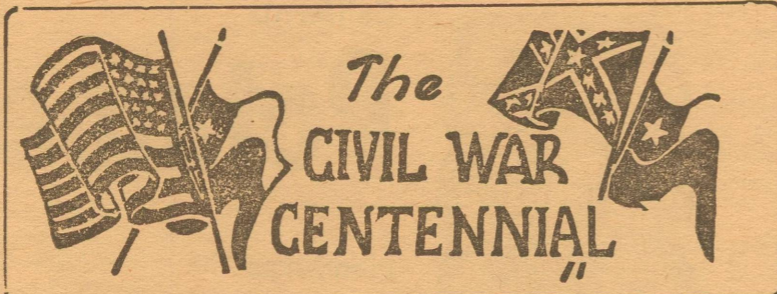

Civil War briefs: For Yankees—We seem to recall reading somewhere that Rep. Charles A. Halleck, the Republican leader of the House of Representatives, is a descendant of General Henry W. Halleck, President Lincoln's Chief

of Staff who was known as "Old Brains." We thought some of our readers might enlighten us a bit on this matter.

For Confederates — We don't know if our suggestion in this column some time ago had anything to do with it, but there is now an imposing monument to Gen. B. F. Terry in Glenwood cemetery in Houston, erected recently as a part of the Harris County Texas Civil War Centennial observance. The monument, dedicated by the Albert Sidney Johnston Camp of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, corrects a long-neglected "oversight" on the part of Texans who had already honored many of their Confederate heroes.

ALSO FOR CONFEDERATES — Thirty-six Texas Counties were named for prominent Texas Confederates and this department has compiled a list of those men, together with a brief biography, the location of the county and the county seat towns. We will send copies of the list to readers who desire them and who will send a stamped and addressed envelope with their request.

Recommended Reading for This Week: A new book to be published soon by Bobbs-Merrill treats of the unusual Port Royal Experiment of 1861 when Federal troops occupied the Sea Islands of South Carolina. More than 10,000 slaves were left on the islands by their Confederate masters who fled before the invading army. According to the author, Willie Lee Rose in her book "Rehearsal for Reconstruction," this was the first opportunity for Northern interests to gain status for the slaves and her treatment of the delicate subject is a praiseworthy one.

Another Southern state much in the news these days is Mississippi which is treated rather uniquely in the two volume set issued by Louisiana State University Press entitled "Mississippi in the Confederacy." Volume one, edited by John K. Bettersworth, is entitled "As They Saw It," and the second volume, edited by James W. Silver, is subtitled "As Seen In Retrospect."

"The Military Record of Louisiana," written by Napier Bartlett in 1875 and now republished by Louisiana State University Press with the assistance of the Louisiana Civil War Centennial Commission, was called by Palmer Bradley of Houston, a noted collector of rare items relating to the Confederacy, "probably the best Louisiana Civil War book . . ." the Commission could reprint. We think our readers will agree with Mr. Bradley.

And an older, more unusual item we've enjoyed recently is F. Stansbury Haydon's "Aeronautics in the Union and Confederate Armies," published by Johns Hopkins University Press.

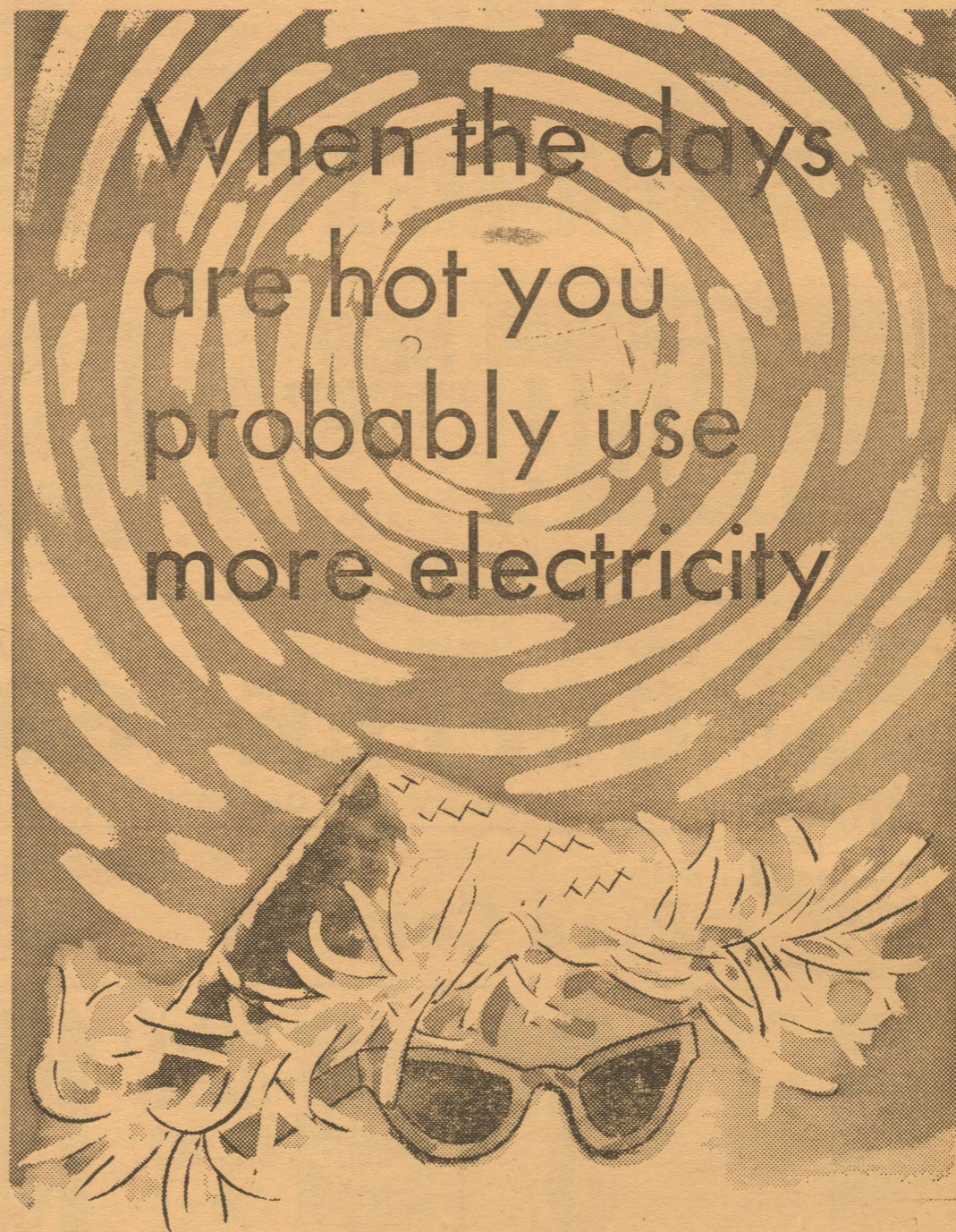


