

#### Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Last Thursday it was summer. By Friday night fall had set in. I always think that the first cool spell will last and that we will have no more hot weather. But I am usually wrong and we do, but it never will be as hot as it was before fall fluttered in.

Cooler weather brings about a change in thinking about food. Soup, chili, bubbling casseroles and hot breads sound good, again. The hot bread recipe I'm giving today is a re run! Two or three years ago I got this recipe from Mississippi. Now, from another source, I get it again and it is good enough to do over; for those who may have lost the original and for any new readers (welcome!) who may have just joined us.

#### Angel Biscuits

- package yeast tablespoons warm water
- cup shortening
- cups unsifted flour 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon soda
- 2 cups buttermilk

Dissolve yeast in luke warm wacut in shortening; add yeast mixture and buttermilk to flour mixture. Knead enough to hold together. Roll out to ½ inch thicketbook, rolls. Bake at 400 F. for 18-20 minutes.

> Hint on pie making: to prevent bottom crust of custard or cream with melted butter before adding pecan squares. filling. This applies to pies that call for filling and crust to be cooked at the same time.

Do you know why pie crust is sometimes tough? Usually too much water in the dough. If the crust rolls and handles too easily, beware—it may be too tough.

And thinking of custard piesdo you know that a custard is a mixture of eggs and mlik and that neither of the two can be cooked at a high temperature?

High temperatures cause the solids and liquids to separate and if this happens a "curdled" custard results. So in the vernacular of the street speech today, "Cool it-cool it."

Custard Pie

(9 inch) 3 eggs

½ cup sugar

½ teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

2 2/3 cups milk

Pastry for one pie:

cream. Serves 6.

1 cup flour cup snortening

2 to 3 tablespoons ice water. Beat eggs slightly; gradually add the sugar and continue beating until thick and lemon-colored. Add salt, nutmeg and milk and pour into chilled pastry-lined pie pan. Bake at 400 F. for 10 minutes, reduce oven to 300 F. and continue baking for 40 minutes or until a silver knife inserted in filling comes out clean. Serve warm or cold garnished with whipped

This chicken or turkey salad answers many needs. A dish needs to be good — or should I say being good to eat is demanded. It is good and I can guarantee that. It needs to be easy to make. It is after the chicken or turkey is cooked about the only thing left to do is measure the ingredients. It needs to be special and it is special enough for any company occasion. If you use canned turkey or chicken all the ingredients stand ready to be put together on short notice. Tape the recipe on the pantry door, check on the needed supplies and when unexpected company comes you can act like you expected them all the time.
