The seven men who have been appointed as directors for this first year are going to have the biggest job and will need the continued support of our citizenship.

If you like to play around with figures you might use the tabulated election box and try to figure out just how many cast ballots Saturday.

There were two propositions on the ballot—one for the district—one for the bonds.

586 voted for the district and 198 voted against. That's a total of 784.

576 voted for the bonds and 198 against. That's a total of 777. What became of the other seven?

The Frieske box was the only one that was consistent. They voted 5 for, and 14 against, on both propositions.

Last week we reported 147 votes had been cast absentee. The tabulation shows only 140 in the district column, 114 for, and 26 against. For the bonds, 110 for and 25 against—total 135. What became of the others?

Careless marking of ballots accounts for some of it. Some folks didn't mark both propositions.

You will notice, too, that only two boxes showed a majority against the hospital—2b and No. 3.

After an 8-month publicity campaign which brought out considerable opposition in its last week, nearly 800 voters went to the polls Saturday and voted in favor of establishing a Hospital District and issuing \$450,000 in bonds—by a vote that was nearly three to one.

The vote Saturday comes as the first concrete step by citizens of the county showing their willingness to provide ample financing for necessary medical facilities.

Polls closed at 7:00 o'clock and by 8:00 o'clock six of the seven voting box totals were posted a downtown window. Due to unsatisfactory phone connections, returns from the Frieske box were delayed until 8:30.

Commissioners Court convened Monday morning and canvassed the vote returns and found everything in order by 10:00 a. m.

Shortly thereafter they announced the names of the seven hospital directors who will now assume duties as a governing body. Named to hold office from now until next April are:
