## **Clocks Go Back An** Hour This Sunday

Turnabout is fair play, the old saw says, and Oct. 29 will be turnabout day for opponents and proponents of Daylight Saving Time. The opponents, who for six months have complained because there was an extra hour tacked onto the end of the day, will re-sume living by "sun time" instead of "clock time."

And those who preferred the longer afternoons will have six months' equal time to complain about the short winter days.

The switch will take place in the pre-dawn hours of Sunday, Oct. 29, and may prove a little less painful to some than the switch of April 27. You'll be able to sleep an hour later in the morning. And parents who grumbled about difficulties in getting their child-ren in bed when the sun was shining won't have that for an excuse any longer.

Workers who complained about driving to work in the dark will still have that complaint, however, as the winter days get shorter. The switch probably will be a

gentle jolt to most. On Oct. 28, the sun will rise at

7:43 a.m. and set at 6:42 p.m. by the clock. On Oct. 29, after the 2:00 a.m.

## **Big Job Being** Done On Airport

All of the county road equipment has been employed for sevewhere a complete rebuilding job is being done on the runway which is nearly three-quarters of a mile in length.

The airport here has been closed for several weeks and warning signs are posted at each each and will continue to be until it is back in safe condition.

The runway is being bulldozed out to a width of 50 feet and a caliche base is being laid to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. County Road Foreman Jack Griffin said Monday the caliche hauling would be completed this week. This is followed by watering and packing and finally black-topped. He estimated two weeks to complete the job where planes would again be permitted to land.

In addition to the 50-ft. blacktop runway, there will be a 6-ft. caliche shoulder on each side which will prevent weeds from growing close to the edge. Schleicher county is well sup-

plied with road equipment and the four county commissioners have a gentleman's agreement whereby they take turns using the road crews.

At the present time it's the turn for Commissioner Kinser of Precinct One and the airport job is under his jurisdiction. In addition several city streets have been rebuilt. While all the equipment is being tied up here on this big job, Kinser is expressing appreciation to the other three commissioners for their co-operation.

The upsurge in immigration is causing concern even among the supporters of the 1965 Great Society Act which removed most of the restrictions which had previously held the annual intake to about 300,000 a year. The great influx during the past year has caused plans to be made for Congressional hearings on the subject early next year.

In accordance with the new law, Army Spec. 4 John W. Hawkins fewer people are now being admithas completed a course at the ted from Britain and Germany, and Engineer Equipment School at more than ever from southern Eu-China, for example, which under the old law could send only trickle to this country, under the new law provided 19,329 new im migrants this past year.

Italy, which could send no more than 5,666 under the old system, accounted for 9,986 the past year -and has a waiting list of a quarter of a million. In fact, the State Department estimates that next year Italy will send us 26,300, admissible under the new program. The Portuguese also like this country. Formerly only 438 from Portugal could come in, but with restrictions removed, 5,258 of that country's surplus came to the U. . A. this past year and will, according to the State Department, increase that number to 21,100

Greece upped their number from their quota of 308 under the old law to 13,322 this past year, and has promised to send 22,300 next

The Philippines upped theirs from 100 to 9,817; Yugoslavia from 969 to 4,615: and India sent 4,337, previously limited to only 100 a year. Philippine entries are due to total 16,000 next year.

Thus, under this new Great Society concept there is a big shift away from Western Europe, in fa vor of more admi. sions from southern Europe and Asia. With limitations and restrictions removed on many categories, there is every indication that it will not be long until a half million of the population surpluses around the world will be dumped into this country annually.
