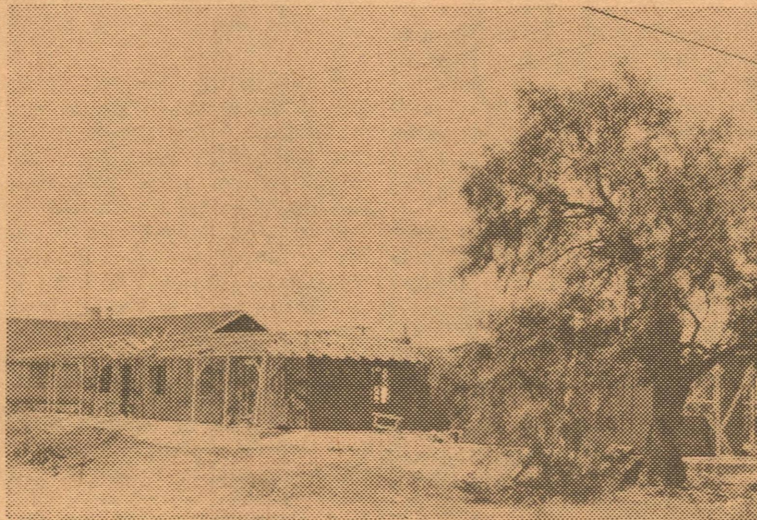

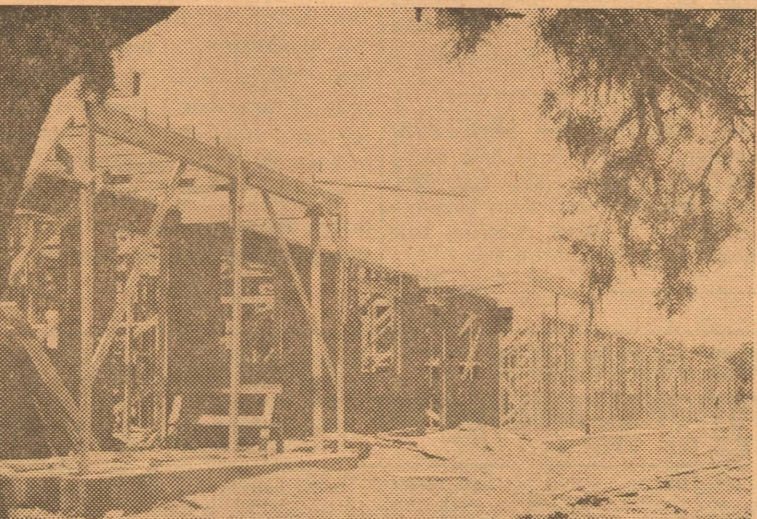

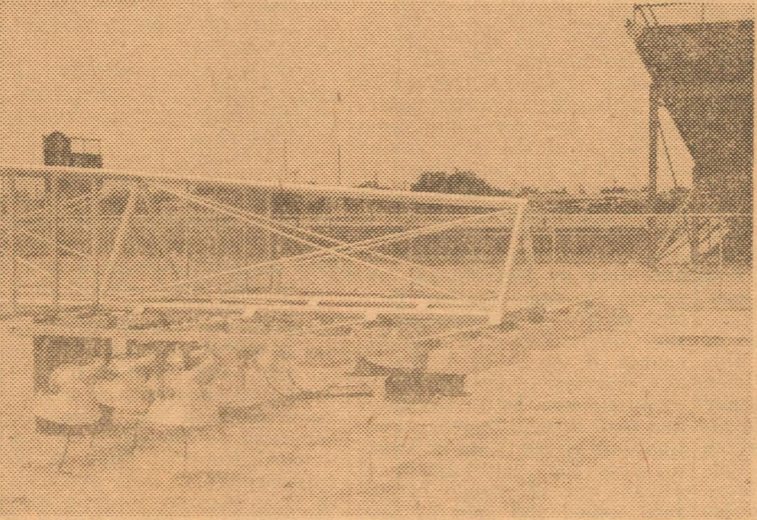


LARGE MESQUITE TREE shown at right in above photo, will become a part of public housing location a block north of the court house.



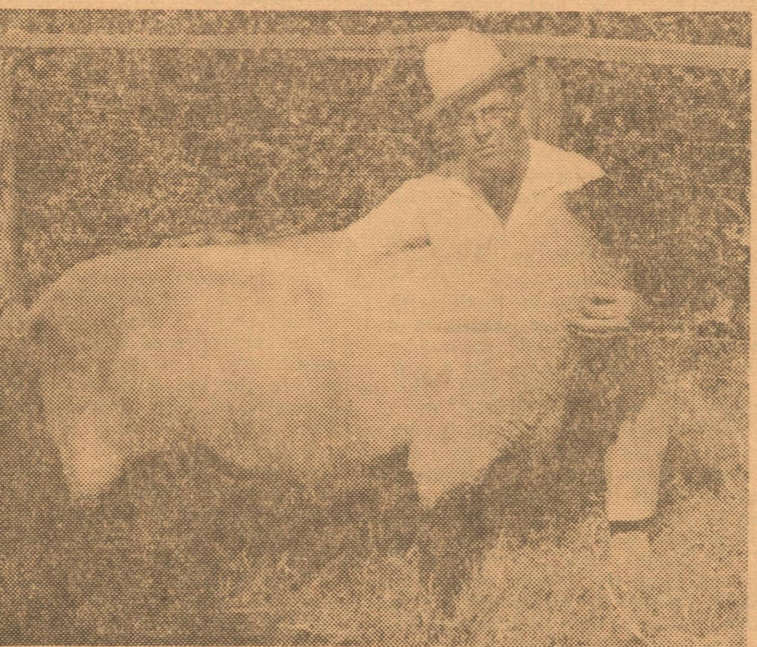
PUBLIC HOUSING units have wells being framed into place this week, as shown in this view.

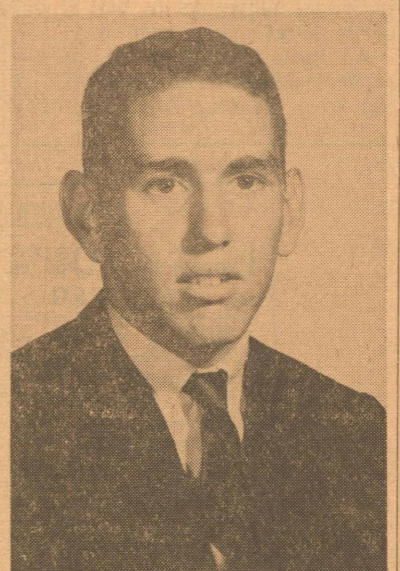
The electrical contractor from Odessa whose workmen have been wiring the six new steel lighting towers for the football field were expected to complete their work Tuesday afternoon of this week.

Golf Tournament To Start Monday

Directors of the Eldorado Golf Club announce that a golf tournament will be played here in two divisions—one during the week of August 21-27, and the other August 28 through Sept. 3rd.

Rules for the tournament are set forth as follows:

All entries must be residents of Schleicher county. There will be two divisions: adult, 18 years and up, and Junior division, 17 years and under.

Players will be placed in flights according to qualifying scores. There will be at least two flights in each division, one more flight if there are enough entries.

There will be medalist in Adult and Junior divisions. Score of qualifying round of 18 holes will determine medalist. Qualifying round must be posted at concession stand by Sunday evening, August 20, 1967. 1st matches completed by Aug. 27, final matches Sept. 3.

Tournament play will be match play. Prizes will be awarded in each division and each flight. Prizes will go to top flight winner and consolation winner in each division and each flight.

Playing rules will be posted at concession stand. Interested golfers may sign up for tournament at concession stand, turn in qualifying score, and pay entry fee of \$2.50 for adult division and \$1.50 for Junior division.

If as many as 8 sign up by August 29th, there will be a 6 hole flight for 11 years and under. Entry fee 50c. This group will play in one flight, no qualifying round will be necessary. When match is played, an adult must accompany players to help on rules and keep score.

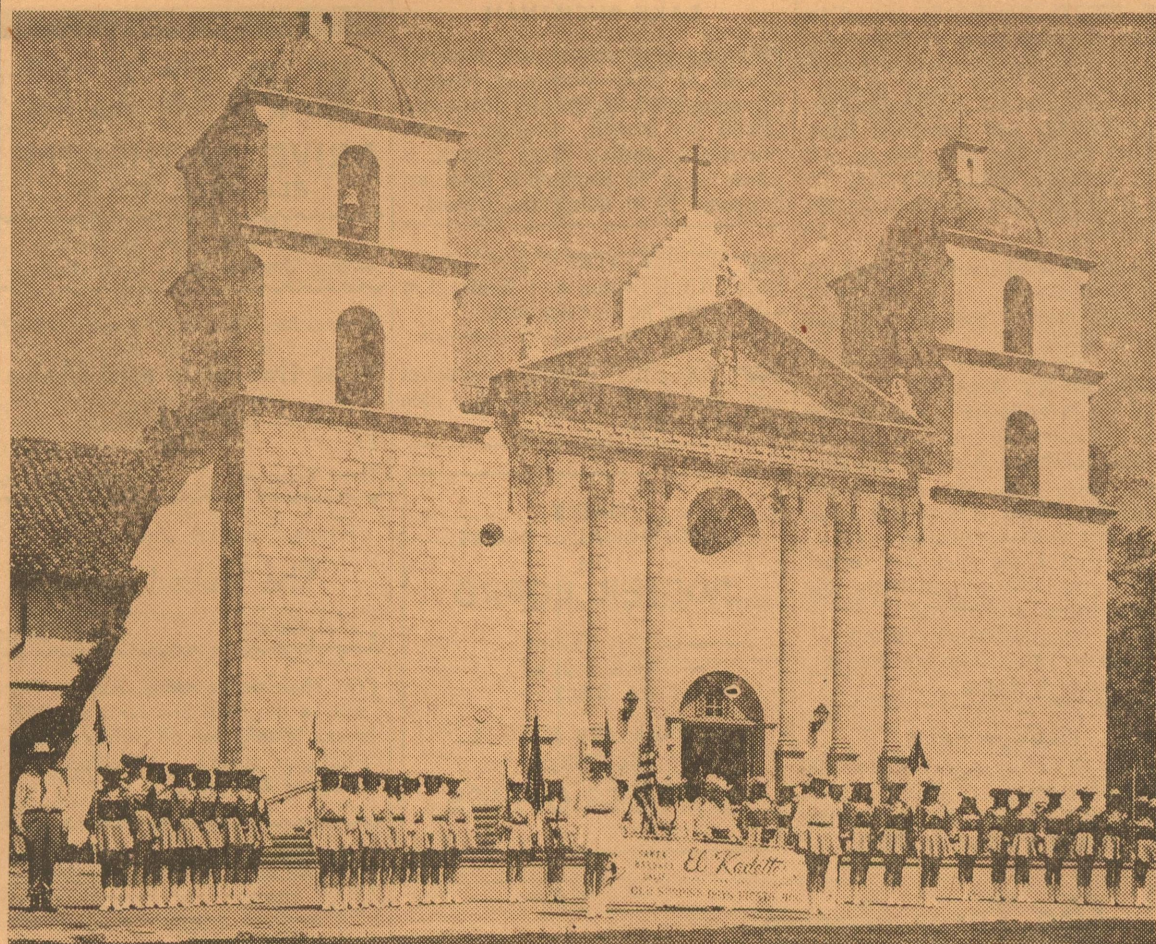
On Monday, the open sale of the tickets will begin with all unsold seats going on for open sale. The tickets are \$7.50 each.

The Texas Department of Public Safety would like to urge all licensed drivers, 14 and 15 years of age with a restricted drivers license, who have completed both phases of a driver education course, to be sure and go to your nearest Drivers License office and take your driving test and have the restriction removed before August 28. The new drivers license law changes go into effect on that date.

If the driver whose license is restricted to having a licensed driver 21 years of age or older in the front seat, fails to beat the August 28 deadline they will have to wait until their 16th birthday.

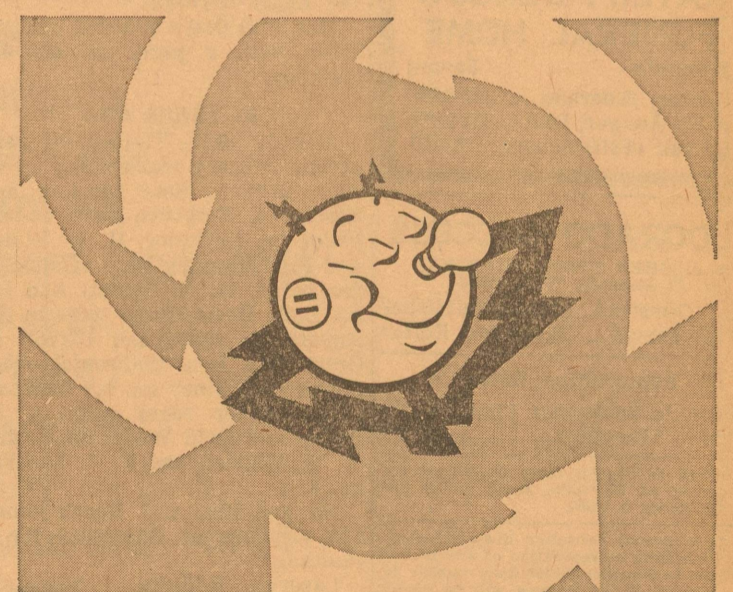

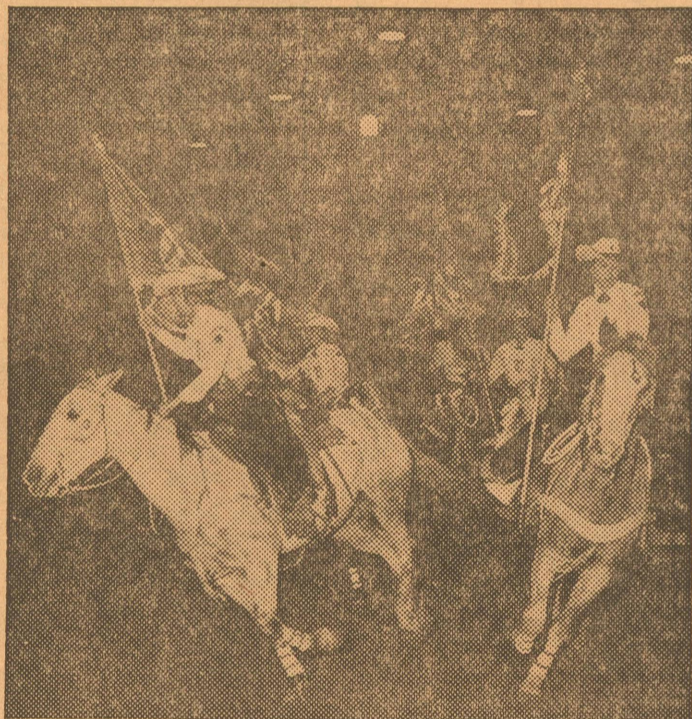

Speedy Summer Supper by Betty Crocker

Too hot to cook? Here's a cooling plot. A menu of crunchy Tuna on a Shoestring, fresh tomato slices and thick chunks of French bread with lots of butter. For dessert, serve Frosty Apricot Short Pie. It's very good for your mother image after an easy supper. Bake the pie shell in the cool of the morning, of course. Fill the shell; chill all day. Luscious! And to keep clear refreshing iced tea on tap, try this. Place two tea bags per glass into a covered glass container. Add cold water, not hot, and let it sit in the refrigerator overnight. Serve with lemon slices or sprigs of mint. Now on to the recipes.

FROSTY APRICOT SHORT PIE
9-inch Short Pie Shell (below)
1 1/4 cups apricot nectar
1 package (3 ounces) lemon-flavored gelatin
3/4 cup sugar
1 cup chilled evaporated milk
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Heat nectar to boiling. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Stir in sugar. Cool until almost stiff. Whip evaporated milk with lemon juice; pour over gelatin mixture. Beat in slowly with electric mixer on low speed. Pour into cooled baked shell. Chill at least 1 hour.

Short Pie Shell: Heat oven to 450°. Place 1 cup Bisquick and 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine in 9-inch pie pan. Add 3 tablespoons boiling water and stir vigorously with fork until dough forms a ball and cleans the pan. Dough will be puffy and soft.

With fingers and heel of hand, pat dough into pan, bringing up dough to edge of pan. Flute edges if desired. Bake 8 to 10 minutes.

TUNA ON A SHOESTRING
1 can (6 1/2 ounces) tuna, drained
1 cup shredded carrots
1 cup diced celery
3/4 to 1 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup diced onion
1 can (4 ounces) shoestring potatoes
Lettuce

Break tuna into chunks in large bowl. Mix in carrots, celery, mayonnaise and onion. Cover and chill. Just before serving, fold in potatoes. Arrange salad in bowl lined with lettuce; if desired, garnish with parsley and carrot curls. 4 to 6 servings.

Now, relax, and think up more cool thoughts. Iced coffee, cold sandwiches, chilled shrimp salad, frozen fruits, snowy parfaits...

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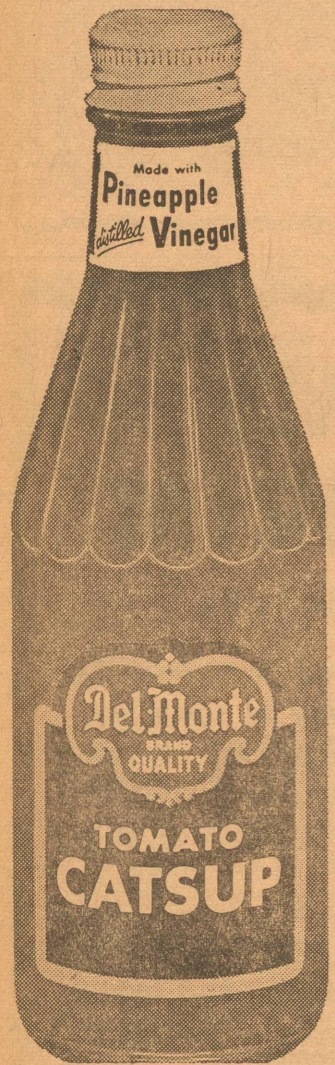

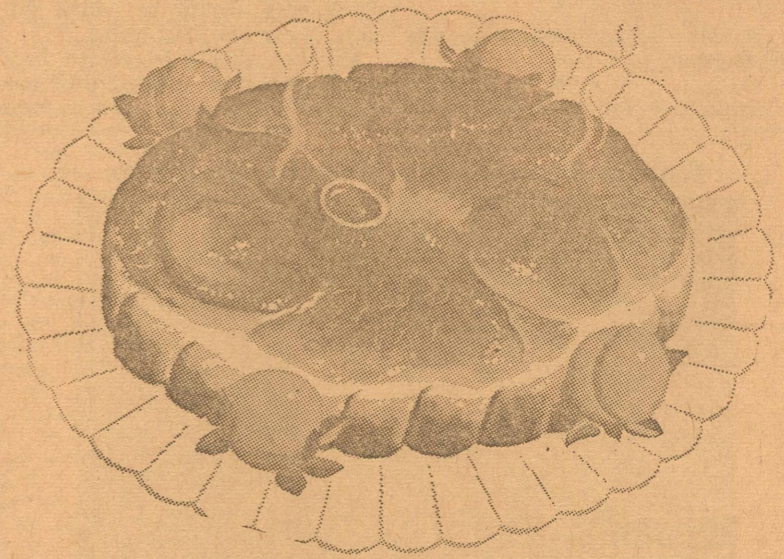
