Buying The Land Immediate Problem Of Hospital Board

The Hospital Board directors met Monday night with all members present. The board is still in the process of negotiating with owners of various lots which make up the tract of land which is first choice as location for the hospital. The site which was announced last week is still the first choice of the Board, and apparently is also approved by citizens as a whole, since no public criticism has been voiced. The problem is to make satisfactory deals with each of five owners and still stay within the amount set out in the budget for a site.

Board President Ratliff was given authority, within certain limits, to close deals with the various owners and it is expected that agreements will be made within the week.

A round table discussion of doctor prospects usually occupies a good deal of the board's time at each meeting.

Application Made For Pre-School For Five-Year-Olds

School Supt. C. T. Humphries announced that application had been made to the state office in Austin for a pre-school program for five-year-olds this coming school term. Morgan Working Eagles Into Shape

While workmen are busily putting Schleicher County High's superb new athletic field in condition for the 1967 football season, Messrs. Jack Bell who coaches offensive and defensive end activities, Kenneth Thomas with both phases of tackle play, Pete Bryan with the guards and centers as well as the team play of both offensive and defensive lines, Norman Roberts with instructing offensive and defensive tactics for backs, and Headcoach Ray Morgan to coordinate the whole are busily drilling, encouraging, and selecting the cast of characters to represent Eldorado in the 1967 football drama in rough and tumble UIL District 8A. Incidentally, last year's state champion came out of 8A so it can very justifiably be called a rough and tumble district.

Coach Morgan said that 46 lads had been undergoing the usual two-day rigorous preseason conditioning and learning routine. He continued that of the 46, eight were seniors, six were juniors, 15 were sophomores, and the rest freshmen. He explained that as a means to stimulate competitive spirit, the 1967 candidates were divided into three groups determined by the lad's performance in the training program. The color of their jerseys indicate the lad's position to date. Boys wearing green jerseys have attained top status in the



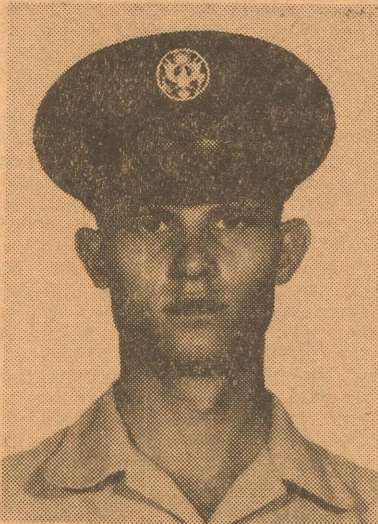

annual struggle for the 11 team positions; those with the white jerseys are in the intermediate group; while lads wearing red jerseys are the beginners or least experienced at present. He said that every boy knew that he could change the color of his jersey by his own efforts and that each Monday morning there was a good deal of swapping around accompanied by the normal reactions to success or temporary failure. He concluded that the "Red Shirts" were usually the youngsters who almost always had to undergo this rough and rugged apprenticeship before they could master enough football knowhow to compete in high school competition.

James Hight will probably report but a tonsillectomy and work have kept him out to date.

Class Rank No Longer Considered In Draft Deferments

Austin, Tex.—Scholastic deferment of undergraduate college and university students who meet the requirements of the new draft regulations now is mandatory upon request of the students.

This was the official advice of Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, recently to the state's 155 draft boards.

Class ranking and test scores in the consideration of student deferments is now "officially immaterial," Colonel Schwartz said.

The state Selective Service director said he had advised all college and university registrars that "rank-in-class information is no longer needed in the administration" of the Selective Service law.

Draft boards have been advised officially not to request any student or school in the future to furnish class-rank data.

The boards have been advised officially by Colonel Schwartz to reopen the classification of qualified undergraduate college students now classified in 1-A as available for military service, even though they may be under induction orders.

To be qualified, the student must be under 24 years old and must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction toward a baccalaureate degree.

"Such a student must be considered as qualifying even though he may be in summer vacation at this time," Colonel Schwartz said.

"Also, to qualify," he continued, "such a student must have requested deferment in Class 2-S after July 1, 1967."

The state director said that, in cases where these students have not requested deferment, he has advised local boards to postpone induction to give them an opportunity to request it. These students will be advised that their induction orders will be cancelled if scholastic deferment is requested immediately.

An undergraduate student now eligible for statutory deferment must continue satisfactorily to pursue a full-time course of instruction in order to remain eligible, Colonel Schwartz pointed out.

"If he does," the state director said, "he is deferred by law until he completes the requirements for his baccalaureate degree, or reaches his 24th birthday, whichever occurs first."

Tax Man Sam Sez

The Texas Community Property Laws can make a big difference in the amount of tax that you owe the Federal government. In Texas the husband and wife must split the income if they file separate returns. However, the extra dividend exclusion, the extra retirement income credit and the casualty loss deduction allowed under community property law can be even more important.

Document 5192, describing the community property benefits, is available at all Internal Revenue Service offices, or you can write to Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas 75221.

The new regulations governing the deferment of undergraduate students define a student's "academic year," Colonel Schwartz said. The regulations state that "a student's 'academic year' shall include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study."

The regulations also describe the conditions under which a student "shall be deemed to be 'satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction,'" the state draft director pointed out.

"A student pursuing a four-year course," Colonel Schwartz said, "should have earned 25% of the credits required for his baccalaureate degree at the end of his first academic year, 50% at the end of his second, and 75% at the end of his third."

"In the case of a baccalaureate degree for which five years of study are prescribed by the institution," he continued, "a student should earn 20% each year of the total credits required for the degree."

The student, under the new regulations, will have the duty of providing his local board each year with evidence that he is satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction at his college or university.

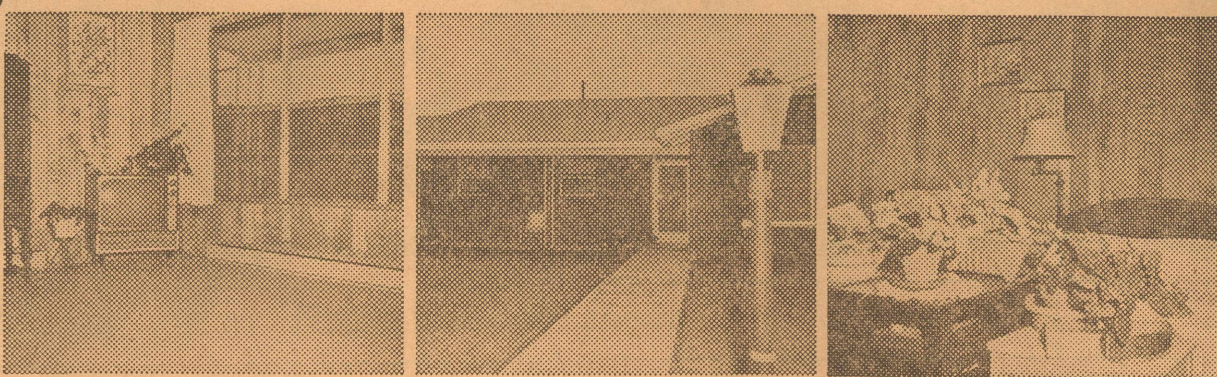
Other Special Deferments
The deferment of graduate students in medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, osteopathy, or optometry is mandatory under new amendments to the Selective Service regulations, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, has announced.

"When the Director of Selective Service identifies other studies necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest upon the advice of the National Security Council," Colonel Schwartz said, "deferment for advanced study in these subjects also will be mandatory."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

quirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Retired Eldorado Teacher Recalls Career

When the school bells ring this August 28 for school, Mrs. Oliver Teele will be absent, as she has retired from the most wonderful profession a person can have.

Mrs. Teele has been succeeded as teacher of elementary choral and music by Mrs. John Stigler.

In recalling her career as a teacher, a career which spanned more than three decades, including the past 15 years here, Mrs. Teele recalled some of her experiences over the years.

I have taught Public School Music for 34 years; my first 3 years were at Eden, my old home town where I was born and reared.

The next three years I taught in Maxwell, New Mexico, teaching every nationality on the globe and I believe they all settled in Maxwell. Of course, I couldn't understand their language, but I would let them sing in their own language which was fun. Most students could speak English, but when they talked in their own language, "me no savvy." Our superintendent was very strict and requested all teachers to attend Sunday school and Church each Sunday. I was always present every Sunday morning, playing the piano for Church and teaching a little boy's Sunday School Class. What a change as the teachers of today may do and go as they please. I enjoyed those 3 years and still have many good friends there. Above all, I enjoyed the beautiful country with snow on the mountain tops, summer and winter.

In 1928, Mr. H. I. Cravens, who was superintendent at Big Lake, Texas, school sent me a contract, asking me to come back to Texas. I was happy to come back, as I had a "guy" in Big Lake that I was very interested in. Can you guess his name? Can you? One year later, that "guy" and I were married.

I taught music for 12 years in Texon, Reagan county. Besides our class work, I had a choral club and a harmonica band.

The choir and band would practice on alternate days. There were 50 children in the Harmonica Band from the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. This little band was very popular and received invitations from numerous schools and performed in San Angelo several times. We were invited to broadcast with radio station KGKL, which was then located in the old Naylor Hotel. The Federated Music Club asked us to try out at San Antonio, which we did and won First Place.

We were due to go to Minneapolis, Minn. to compete in the National Contest. The Big Lake Oil Company offered to pay the children's expenses; I appreciated their offer but had to decline, due to the great distance and too few sponsors. I felt this was too much of a responsibility.

Each year, the choral group would give two operettas, one at Christmas and one at the end of the school year. The choir would sing for churches on special occasions. I conducted the adult choir, while living in Texon.

We competed in the Interscholastic League every year, with our Chorals winning several first places. One of the contests was a Music

Latin American group, but music was my "first love."

Mr. Joe Andrews, principal, suggested I organize a mixed choir in high school, so the boys and girls started singing together; courting, too, which made it more enjoyable. Some students remarked to me that "Mrs. Teele, you started us to falling in love," but I think that was just their excuse.

We started entering the Interscholastic League, taking the choral and vocal solos and piano solos to contest. The first year, we won first in sight reading; the second year another first place in sight reading and the rest of the year we rated first and second. Last year we won 21 firsts in I. L.

I had two girls from Eldorado to go to Texas Music Education Association in Dallas, Judy Hext and Mickey Phelps. These two girls are still in the music field. I have had several students to enter state contests, but only one to win first in the state and that was Terry Phelps who is now a Senior at Baylor University.

Each year, our Sextette performed not only at school functions, but for civic affairs as well.

The Elementary grades were always a great joy to work with. We had lots of different musical programs, using guitars and ukes which added spice and variety to these little folks' programs. There were 175 in the elementary choir, meeting three days a week. Sometimes the children would practice during the noon hour at their request.

In the fall of 1957, Mr. A. M. Whitis became superintendent and suggested we add the first three grades to the music department. A music room was built and accommodations were greatly improved. The past year, Mr. Humphries presented us with a new piano, which made me very happy.

I know you are wondering where I received my education. I graduated from Eden High School, and entered TWU at Denton for two years and one summer. Living so close to Alpine, I entered Sul Ross and received my B. S. degree there in 1934. I have attended summer music schools every year since 1952; some of the classes were at Brownwood, Sul Ross, ACC in Abilene, Western State at Gunnison, Colorado, and many others. Each year, I learned new techniques in teaching music and could see the different trend in teaching music.

I especially enjoyed the Fred Waring Clinic at SMU and a clinic taught by Laura Hoggard at Texas Tech. I never failed to attend the Texas Choral Directors Association in San Antonio, for Elementary, Jr. High and High School Chorals. I have studied under Jimmie Green and Paul Carpenter and Miss Doro-

thy McIntosh.

I regret leaving the school room, but there comes a time in life that you want to rest; an obligation you owe to yourself. There are a few things that "that guy" and I would like to do; a few places we would like to visit and look up old friends. I guess I have one fault and that is my thirst of knowledge in music. I feel that children of today enjoy music more than they did 34 years ago. Today they have music by radio, television, stereo, etc., and are certainly more informed on music of all types.

I want to thank all the people of Eldorado, for being so nice to me; for never failing to supply help, equipment, moral support, etc., for the programs and contests which wear so much of our school activities. In closing, I just want to say: Keep a song in your heart! It will lighten

The duty you hold in your hand; Its music will graciously brighten The work your high purpose has planned,

Your notes to the lives that are saddened

May make them hopefully yearn

And earth shall be wondrously gladdened

By songs they shall sing in return.

The destruction was heavy. This paper of Tom's contained much valuable and accurate information and provoked animated discussion by the members.

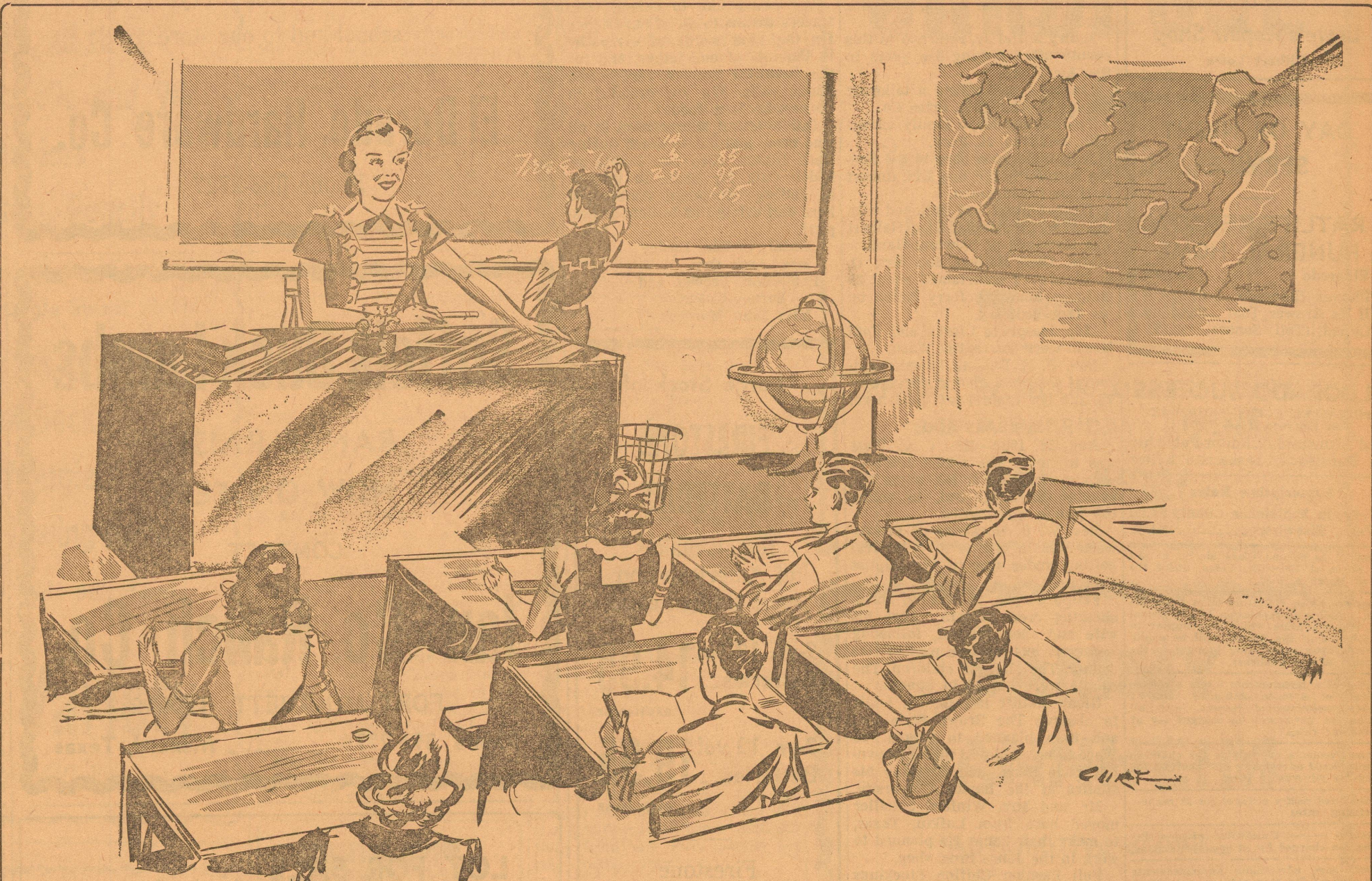

Memory test; that is, by listening to records, the pupils would have to be able to identify the composition and the composer. We won several first places in that contest. I cannot remember all the first places we won, but won several cups and plaques, and the children gave them to me to keep. I treasure these trophies which bring back fond memories of the children there. I am very proud of my pupils; most of the boys have finished college and have good jobs with oil companies or their own businesses. One of the girls is married to the principal of Big Lake high school; she is teaching piano in Big Lake. Another of my pupils taught violin in Abilene, and belonged to the San Angelo Symphony orchestra.

When I retired from Texon, I remarked that I would never teach again, but as the old saying goes, "A wise man changes his mind, but a fool never does."

Oliver and I moved to Menard and ranched in that area for several years but we longed for a place of our own so in 1951 we bought our little "nest" and settled in Schleicher county, the best county of all. As luck would have it, a drought hit and I decided to go back to teaching, realizing how fortunate I was in having my B. S. degree.


I applied for a teaching position with Mr. T. E. Holcomb, who was superintendent of Eldorado Schools at that time. He referred me to Mr. Archie Mittel, with whom I placed my application. I was accepted and began in 1952, teaching the first grade Latin Americans. I taught in that department 2 1/2 years, changing to the Music Department again, when the music director, Mr. Lewis Jordan, left at mid-term. I regretted leaving the

Austin, Tex.—Major changes in state drivers license law go into effect on August 28.

At the same time, inspection of additional auto equipment will be required, and minimum fee for vehicle inspections will be raised to \$1.75. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts will be required on all cars which have belt anchorages as part of original equipment. Steering mechanism, wheels and rims also will be added to inspection items.

Other changes effective next

week include:

- Licensing law raises minimum age to 16 for those who have completed a driver's education course and to 18 for those who have not had approved training.
- Minimum age for operating a motor scooter has been raised to 15, and a special examination will be required after January 1 to operate a motorcycle.
- All licenses issued to persons under 21 will be stamped "provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a 12-month period. (This provision effective January 1.)
- Motorists convicted of driving without a license will be subject to a fine of up to \$200 for first offense and stiffer penalties thereafter.
- Those convicted of driving while intoxicated (or similar offense) are subject to first suspension of 12 months (18 months for later offenses) and may be required to attend a program of rehabilitation for problem drivers.
- Thumb prints will be required on all original applications.
- Driving while license is suspended or revoked is punishable by fine of \$25 to \$500 or a jail sentence

of three days to six months.

- Stiff penalties are provided for counterfeiting or forging a license.
- Department of Public Safety will in the future receive from Department of Public Welfare a list of all Texans receiving aid due to visual defects.

Political Signs Emerging

First major political indicators of what is expected to be a stormy year ahead began to come into focus here last week.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith acknowledged that they sat down together to talk over their plans at length.

Barnes said Smith told him he plans to run for governor and encouraged him to seek the lieutenant governor's office.

Both declined to make any formal announcement of their plans until after Gov. John Connally's return from Africa about September 4.

"I am hoping things work out so there will be no big political turmoil, but I have stated repeatedly my plans are not dependent on what anyone else does," commented the lieutenant governor.

"I may announce in the next few weeks, but I have to think about all this," said Barnes. "This is a political decision I am not ready to make yet."

Most observers rate Governor Connally as almost certain to seek a fourth term.

—District judges and district attorneys can claim full reimbursement for official travels out of county of their residence, effective September 1.

—Railroad Commission employees assigned to a transportation conference are entitled to travel expenses, as are state employees representing their agencies at a Texas Historical Survey Committee sponsored dedication ceremony.

—A public weigher may not conduct weighing operations outside the area in which he was elected or appointed; deputy weighers need not be actual residents of the area they serve.

—Cities under 185,000 population cannot pay any portion of firemen's personal obligation as contribution to relief and retirement fund.

—Texas Employment Commission may contribute state funds to the premiums of its employees' group insurance coverage; but under these conditions, Commission must secure the contract of insurance, be the policy-holder and pay the contributions to the company.

—Writ of possession on property sold at a tax sale may be issued to the purchaser after expiration of 20 days from end of redemption period.

—State agencies must make purchases of goods manufactured by the prison system through Board of Control political subdivisions may purchase directly from prisons but Board must set manufacturing specifications.

Hospital Building Signaled

Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Board has approved \$3.2 million in construction priorities and set aside \$3 million for the Dallas Neuropsychiatric Institute.

Major items include \$500,000 for an institute for human growth and development at Austin State school; \$397,828 for a rehabilitation building at Kerrville; \$388,819 for air conditioning at a Terrell unit; and \$290,459 for a recreation building at Abilene.

Grants in aid were approved for these community health centers:

Austin-Travis County, \$392,815; Edinburg, \$102,024; Beaumont & Port Arthur, \$305,000. Contracts also were made to assist in developing community centers in Abilene, Amarillo, Brownwood, Harlingen, Texarkana, Dallas, and San Antonio. Contract services were continued with individual physicians or hospitals in Amarillo, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Houston, Lufkin and San Antonio.

Attorney General Speaks

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said it is up to each individual school district to decide if it wants to adopt the new "tenure" or "continuing contract" law for its teachers. However, once adopted, the tenure plan (protecting teachers against firing without cause) becomes mandatory.

In other recent opinions, Martin has held that:

—Insurance issued to an individual under a group policy does not become incontestable under the insurance code until two years from the date the person becomes in-

Oil Output Remains High

Texas Railroad Commission maintained August's high oil production allowable for September—54% of potential.

September figure allows for maximum production of 4,075,231 barrels daily, unchanged from August.

Allowable has zoomed following Middle East oil crisis. It was 33.8% in May, 31.9% in June, 42.0% in July and 54% in August.

Nominations to purchase oil from major buyers came to 3,406,451 barrels a day for September, an increase of 383,041 over August. Bureau of Mines predicted the demand for Texas crude in the coming month would be 3,525,000 barrels a day.

Parks and Wildlife Commission has set goose hunting dates for October 24-January 6; duck and coot season, November 16-January 6 and reduced bag and possession limits for white-fronted and Canada geese.

Lt. Gov. Smith set a special election for November 11 in Cameron county to pick a successor to veteran Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville who will become executive director of the Judicial Qualifications Commission, effective September 1.

Nine Texas colleges and universities have received more than \$12.7 million in construction funds over the last three years from the federal government.

Austin Assistant City Attorney Dudley Fowler joins the staff of Attorney General Martin as an assistant in the A. G.'s highway division.

W. Sale Lewis is new State Savings and Loan Commissioner.

Miniature citrus plants may soon be legally imported under strict controls—except in citrus-growing Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy, Starr, Dimmit and Zavala counties.

Bill Cobb, Governor Connally's budget director, has been elected president of National Association of State Budget Officers at its 23rd annual meeting in Lexington, Ky.

Some 73 applications filed by Texas towns for more than \$1 million in matching funds for airport improvements and construction will be considered here September 19 by the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

The annual state exposition in Oklahoma City is expected to attract a record number of exhibits and visitors during its nine-day run, September 23 through October 1.

Expanding again, the State Fair will open a giant new exhibit building at the 1967 exposition. Returning this year will be a colorful new Ice Capades show, and the fair's championship RCA Rodeo. A new grandstand program includes national motorcycle races, two Grand Ole Opry shows by Ernest Tubb, and the return of IMCA racing for the first time in four years.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 13. other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, and support of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

Belts are back. Women's and girls' fashions once again are calling for belts, not the narrow, unobtrusive belt but it's the big, 3 inch wide, heavy belt again.

I have saved mine; I've still got them all. I would like to think that I was foresighted and did it on purpose but I know better than that; I saved them because I can not bear to throw something away that still has some wear in it—that is the real fact about the situation.

This rather upsetting thought has just occurred to me; will we be able to use the old belts, is it possible that during the last two or three years of beltless freedom that we may have gained just a few inches at the waist line?

I simply am not in favor of the way the word "instant" is being used these days. We have instant everything according to the food manufacturers, the money lenders and scores of other people who would lead us to think that they alone have a magic direction for some terrific short cut that will solve all problems—and instantly at that.

The instant product which brought all of this up is instant flour. Watch out when you use it.

When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe. There is more instant flour in a cup than one would think. This is how it is made.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a cup. In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour and to shorten the story; the dough ends up heavy with too much flour.

Don't add extra liquid, that is no solution—the manufacturers suggest that adding extra fat might help some.

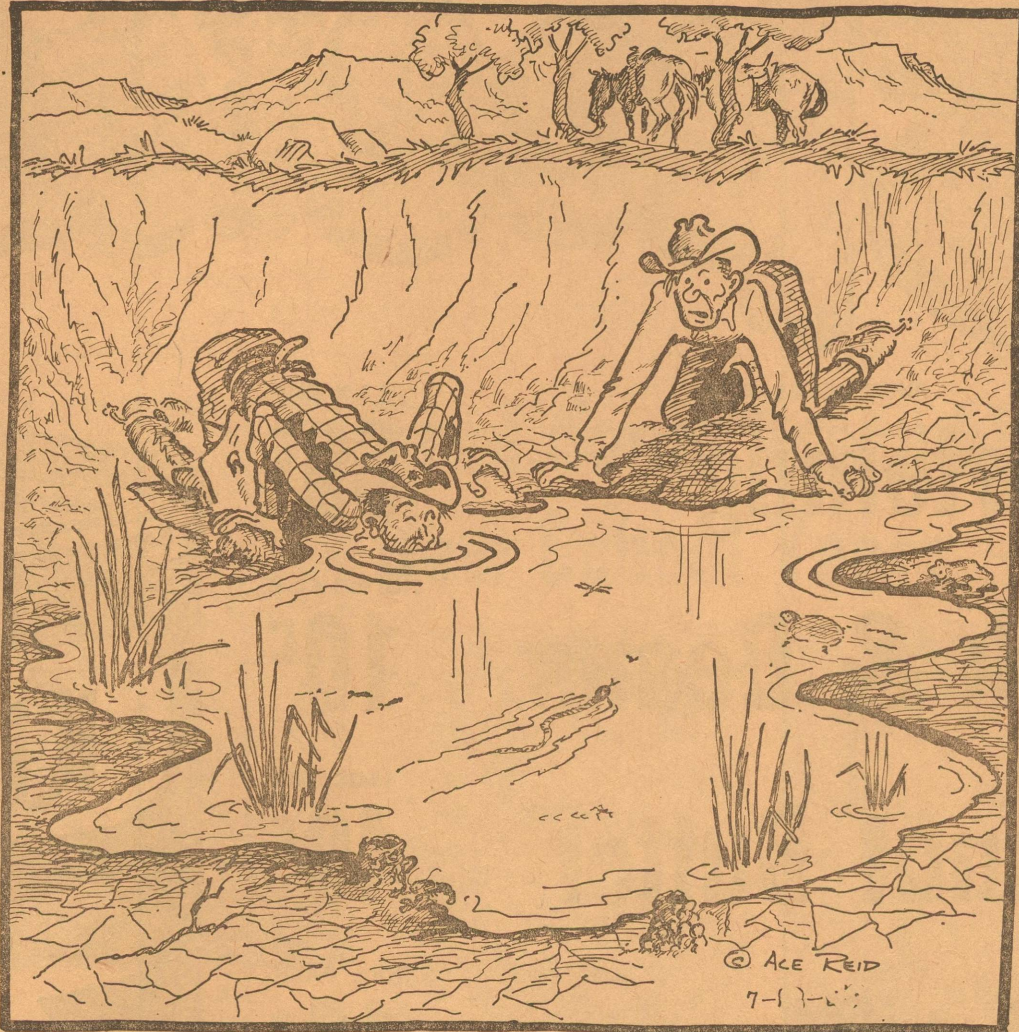
So, it is easy to see why I'm not just carried away with these "instant" products. If you are not careful you could have a new instant problem.

rugs, or wall to wall carpeting.

The canister or tank works out very well for general house cleaning, corners, stains, bare floors and "above the floor" cleaning chores.

The electric broom is great for all kinds of uncarpeted floors; it doesn't matter whether they are wood, concrete, tile, linoleum or whatever but, it was never meant to be used on a deep piled rug of any kind.

If your clothes are more modern than your washing machine a few of these tricks of the trade may help. You get along without a machine designed to help care for the durable press and wash and wear fabrics which are taking up more and more room in the laundry basket.

To keep wrinkling down as much as possible . . . —Wash in small loads using cool

or warm water for the wash cycle.

—Wash only long enough to remove soil, then rinse in cool water. —Shorten the spin cycle both after washing and after rinsing.

—Dryer-dry such items at a low or medium temperature, then let tumble for 10 minutes using just the air setting, without heat. —Remove immediately and hang or fold for storage.

Once, peanut butter was just peanut butter, but not so now. One may buy chunky, medium or fine grinds, just take your choice. Here is a recipe that will be a hit with the young and old alike:

Peanut Butter Cupcakes

- 1/3 cup fat
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/3 cups brown sugar
- 2 egg yolks, plus one egg
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 cup milk
1/2 cup chopped peanuts.
Blend fat, peanut butter, and vanilla. Gradually add 1 cup of the sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Beat eggs and remaining 1/3 cup sugar.

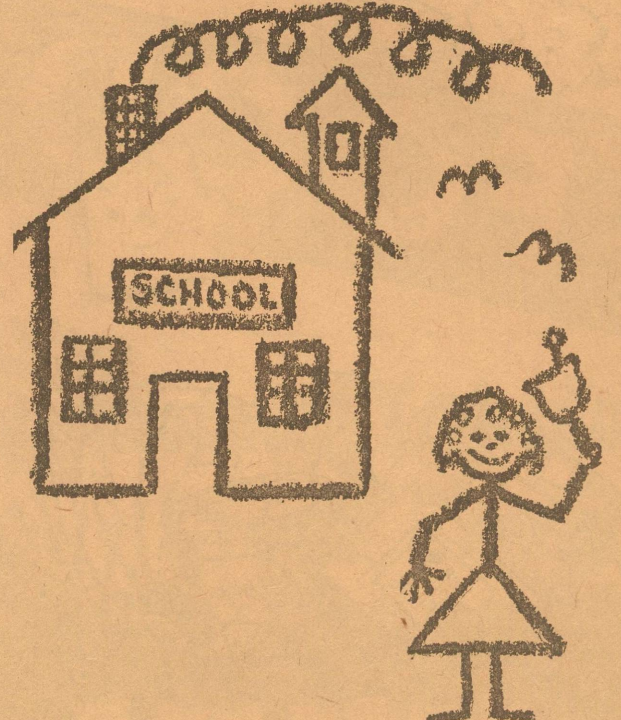
Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk to the creamed mixture. Put batter in lightly greased muffin pans, cover with meringue and sprinkle with chopped peanuts. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) for about 25 minutes. Makes 18 to 24 cupcakes.

For the meringue to top the cakes use 2 egg whites, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/2 cup brown sugar. Beat egg whites and salt until stiff but not dry and add sugar gradually. Continue beating until the mixture is stiff and glossy.

Then—if you are a real peanut butter fan but are caught short of time try this quick version . . .

Peanut Butter Sweets

Melt one cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels over hot water. Stir in 3/4 cup peanut butter, 1/2 cup honey and 2 tablespoons water. Blend all ingredients well. Spread graham crackers for a delightful cookie sandwich.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



A weird and demagogic decision was recently handed down by a Federal Judge in Washington. It invades the legislative field by outlawing the "track" system of bunting students in local schools in accordance with their mentality and learning ability. The opinion forces school authorities to mix the mentally retarded with the more alert youngsters in the same classes in the District of Columbia.

The decision, by a Judge named Skelly Wright, attempts to outdo anything the Supreme Court has ever done. It requires the bussing of students from one school to another in order to get a better mix of negroes and whites. And it forces a mixture of white and negro teachers in the district schools. It happens that 23% of the teachers here are white, and the Judge directs that they be distributed equally among all the schools in order to fully integrate the teachers.

Although the Negroes now account for 93% of school enrollment in the district, the Judge commands the 7% of white students to be bussed around the area in order that each school will have about the same percentage of whites, and/or some bussing of Negro students in order to accomplish the same purpose.

This decision was the wildest and the most unbelievable exercise of judicial power ever attempted on the subject of integration.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."
