## Election Returns Oked By Court

When election returns were posted Saturday night, October 7th it was pointed out that the results would not be declared official until they had been canvassed by the Commissioners Court.

Court met in special session Monday for this purpose and issued an order declaring—

“that said election was in all respects legally held, and that said returns were duly and legally made . . .

“That a majority of the legalized voters in said election voted to LEGALIZE the sale of alcoholic beverages . . .”

The order was signed by all members of the Court and becomes a part of the minutes, and is certified to the Texas Liquor Control Board.

The way is now open for prospective dealers to apply to the Control Board for package store licenses. Since this requires about two weeks, it is possible that a package store may be in operation here about the end of this month.

## First Applications For Off-Premises Licenses Filed

On page 4 of this issue appear legal notices from two prospective dealers making application for a license for off-premises sale of alcoholic beverages.

Application No. 1 comes from McCormick's Drive-In Grocery and is for a license to sell beer only at their store on North Divide Street.

Application No. 2 comes from Glynn Edmondson and is for a package store on South Divide Street.

These notices will appear again next week after which clippings of the notices will be attached to the formal applications, which are approved, first by the County Court on Oct. 26th, next by the district Liquor Control Board office in Angelo, and finally by the State Board in Austin where license is issued.

November 1st is regarded as a possible date when sales may begin.

Edmondson has leased the Southwestern Fence Co., steel office building located on Highway 277 from Rusty Gibson, and plans to remodel the property and have it ready for occupancy by the time his license is issued. Remodeling will include a new ceiling and paneling of the interior walls. A show window will be installed on the side facing the highway.

Gibson has stated that a new white fence will isolate the store from his fence business which will continue on the location.

Edmondson was here Tuesday morning and he and Gibson were making plans for the remodeling project. There will be parking space in front, as well as off the highway on the lot at the rear of the building.

## Eagles To Be Underdogs With Sonora Here Friday

The Eldorado Eagles play host tomorrow night at 8:00 o'clock to one of their ancient Edwards Plateau adversaries. This opponent is the Defending State Champion Sonora. It will be a strenuous evening for the Eagles.

The Sonora Broncos have a season's record of four wins and one loss, the loss being to Ballinger High School. In Conference 3A the Broncos boast an unsullied slate of three wins and no losses.

Their combined offensive and defensive lineup consists of nine seniors, five juniors, and one sophomore.

Last week they crushed the Rankin Red Devils by a decisive 36-14 score. The Eldorado Eagles should take no particular comfort from the story that the Broncos' stellar halfback, 180-pound Ed Lee Renfro injured his knee in the Rankin game. He will be ready for Eldorado in tomorrow night's game.

The Eagles will be called on again to oppose a strong, mature, and merciless set of adversaries with a varied, polished, and effective offensive stance. They employ the best features of "T" formation, with or without the "split

end", the "winged T", the "slot T", and even "I" formation. Their offensive efforts are spearheaded by No. 22, Ed Lee Renfro and No. 30, their fullback Mike Gosney, along with the passing and running ability of their seasoned quarterback J. B. Cook, No. 10, a competent senior at 160 pounds.

The Broncos utilize a five-man front with four linebackers and the two defensive halfbacks as usual. What makes their five-man line quite imposing is the fact that their huge Russell Miers, a senior at 250 pounds, will take position immediately in front of the opposing center. This is the shadow that

Jim McGinnes must work in tomorrow night. Other defensive changes see No. 80, Noriega at 185; No. 52, Thorpe at 150; and Mata at 140, these three with Miers replace Bill Green, and the others Richard Perez, Mark Jacoby, and Ernest Barrera.

This is a tough defensive alignment which has held opponents in five games to a total of 60 points. But 39 of these were scored by Ballinger in the opening game for the Broncos. Another way of saying it is that the Broncos have held four Class A teams to 21 points in four contests. These schools include Rankin, Junction, Ozona, and Mason. Mason and Junction were held scoreless.

Eldorado came out of the Iraan contest with one member only shaken up, this being Sophomore Wayne Doyle who stopped Iraan's senior, Ricky Rylander in a rather emphatic head bumping episode. Doyle had to sit out the rest of the game. Medics said Doyle suffered no serious injury and that he will be able to participate this week. The Eagles plan to recover from another continually tough opponent: "Plant Geometry," and will be at full strength for tomorrow night's hassle.

Last Friday night the Eagles stunned the Iraan Braves and with only a small amount of good fortune could have kept "the Indians on the reservation." It is entirely possible for them to rise up in strong effort and defeat Sonora tomorrow night; but it will take maximum effort. It would be worth a great deal in self respect could the youthful Eagles down the elderly Broncos.

The Eagles offensive lineup will see Mike Olson, Paul Page, or Buff Whitten at ends, Ross Whitten, Allan Corbell, or John Danford at tackles; Mickey Pennington, Lloyd Torres, Robledo or Hight at guards, Jim McGinnes will probably start at offensive center with Roy Davidson at one halfback, Dwain (Pinky) Dempsey, or Jim Mann at the other with Mickey Clark or John Mayo at fullback, and Bob Page at Quarterback.

Defensive setup will probably feature Paul Page and Bob Page at ends, R. Whitten and M. Pennington at tackles, John Mayo and Allan Corbell at guards, Jim Mann and Pinky Dempsey at left and right linebackers respectively, Joel Muzquiz as a possible Eagle Backer, and with Roy Davidson and James L. Davis as halfbacks.

Game time is 8:00 o'clock. Only one other 8A contest is set for this starting time, this being the games for Friday, October 27. The last two games will revert to the originally scheduled 7:30 starting time but there will be little actual difference due to the impending change from Daylight Saving Time.

## Friday's Game To Feature Homecoming

The Sonora Broncos' game here with the Eagles Friday night will be the highlight of the season, and will be the Homecoming to which all ex-students of Eldorado High School are invited.

Special activities at the game will include the crowning of the Football and Band Sweethearts. Things get under way with the coin toss at 7:40 p. m., followed at 7:45 with crowning of the Football Sweetheart by one of the team captains. Game time will be 8:00.

During half-time, the Band Sweetheart will be crowned by Rusty Meador, president of the band. Identities of both these young ladies is kept secret until game time.

The Seniors have been conducting a mum sale for this game, and they will also have charge of the concession stand.





Austin, Texas.—A multi-million-dollar Texas tidelands case once more is before the highest court in the land. It involves 37,000 acres of oil-rich offshore territory.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and his aides have presented the state's arguments to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Key question is whether Texas coastline includes its jetties as part of the permanent harbor system. Jetties in question are at Port Isabel, Port Mansfield, Port Aransas, Matagorda, Freeport, Galveston and Sabine Pass. They extend as far as 4 1/2 miles into the Gulf of Mexico.

Decision for Texas would add 4 1/2 miles to the three marine leagues (10.35) offshore boundaries allowed by the federal submerged lands act of 1953.

New case is the latest round in legal exchanges dating back to 1950. Then the Supreme Court held that the federal government had paramount rights over submerged lands. Later the submerged lands act reversed the decision and granted Texas title to all lands reaching three marine leagues into the Gulf.

Present controversy arose when the Texas School Land Board advertised a lease sale of mineral rights under a 1965 Supreme Court decision which established the California coastline as including "outermost permanent harbor works that form an integral part of the harbor system".

U. S. Government filed an injunction to prevent Texas from leasing, contending that the Texas shoreline was defined by the 1845 annexation agreement under which the state joined the union.

Texas claims jetties are a part of the permanent harbor system and to determine where the shoreline was in 1845 would be impossible.

**Political Pot Boils**

Political pot continues to boil at the state capital:

As expected, 29-year-old House Speaker Ben Barnes announced for lieutenant governor. He said his move should not be interpreted as a tipoff to Gov. John Connally's plans. He stated that he would run as an independent, with no "ticket" affiliation with Connally or anyone else. Barnes immediately opened his statewide campaign headquarters in Austin.

Governor John Connally left for Canada and the National Governor's Conference in the Virgin Islands without revealing his decision as to retiring or running for a fourth term.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith already is campaigning for governor. He predicts that Governor Connally will not run for an unprecedented fourth term and submits as evidence Connally's 1962 pledge not to do so.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr called on all three—Connally, Smith, and Barnes—to run for reelection. In a letter to Connally

he said he may run for governor if Connally doesn't or for lieutenant governor if the governor seeks a fourth term.

Supreme Court races continue to draw increasing attention. Declared candidates are Houston District Judge Sears McGee, Texas-Kana Court of Civil Appeals Associate Justice Matt Davis, Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals Chief Justice James G. Denton and Austin District Judge Tom Reavley.

**Water Board Meets**

Texas Water Development Board met here Monday to review a variety of loan eligibility matters and a bond ordinance.

Titus County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 is seeking eligibility finding for a \$2.2 million loan to pay its share of the cost of the Titus County Dam and Reservoir near Mt. Pleasant.

City of Thorndale wants a \$130,000 loan to provide municipal water from a Soil Conservation Service reservoir.

Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority seeks a \$1.1 million loan for facilities to provide Port Lavaca with water from the Guadalupe River.

Wichita County WID No. 2 requested a \$1.5 million loan for rehabilitating Lake Kemp.

San Patricio Municipal Water District requests formal approval of a \$900,000 loan application for treatment, pipeline, pumping and water storage facilities.

Terrell asks approval of a bond ordinance so the city can go ahead with its application for a \$750,000 state loan for the first phase of a water improvement program which contemplates taking water from nearby Lake Tawakoni.

**Park Grants Approved**

Three new federal grants for park improvement or development have been announced by the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

City of Diboll will receive \$174,500 (to be matched by equal amount of local funds) for buying 175 acres of land and to develop the city park.

A grant of \$211,214 from the federal land and water fund program will go to Waco for a \$422,428 jointly-financed 35-acre park on the banks of the Brazos River.

A \$39,550 grant will go to Webb county toward a \$139,100 park program, covering 218 acres, four miles east of Laredo on the banks of Lake Casa Blanca.

**Courts Speak**

A proposed state constitutional amendment to wipe out the poll tax as a voting requirement and require annual voter registration is headed for a U. S. Supreme Court test.

State Supreme Court declined to alter an earlier ruling that an election which approved the amendment last November should stand.

AFL-CIO challenged the outcome of the vote, contending that voters did not realize that an annual registration feature was involved. Union promises to take the case to Washington.

Texas high court agreed to review the case of four Houston lawyers who contend that free legal service to the poor, under the War on Poverty, program unfairly deprives attorneys of fees. Court of Civil Appeals had upheld the district court's summary judgment against the group.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the 99-year prison sentence assessed Goliad rancher Shaper Taylor on charges of killing his

38-year-old former "girl-friend" and her elderly husband.

Austin District Judge Mace Thurman Jr. is presiding over the court of inquiry here to look into allegations of malpractices by home improvement contractors and their agents.

**Voter Registration**

Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill is warning persons who are 60 years of age or older and live outside cities of 10,000 or more population that this year, for the first time, they must register to vote.

Hill said that a special provision has been made for such persons to register during the period October 1 to January 31, 1968 at the county tax office or by mail to the county tax assessor collector.

**73 Run For Legislature**

Seventy-three have filed as special election candidates for six vacant House seats and one Senate vacancy. Seven elections are scheduled for November 11, general election day, when six proposed constitutional amendments will also be voted on.

Twenty-one seek the senate place long held by the late Sen. George Parkhouse in Dallas.

Seventeen filed for the House post of the late Rep. Ira Kohler of Houston; 12 for former Rep. Lee Duggan Jr.'s House seat; nine for former Rep. Pat Cain's Travis County House place; six for the Cameron County seat of former Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville; five for the post formerly held by Otha Birkner, representing Wharton and Matagorda counties; and three for the place vacated by former Rep. Jesse George who served Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

Duggan, Cain, Pipkin, Birkner and George resigned to accept other offices or positions.

**Beach Study Launched**

Speaker Ben Barnes named three coastal House members to serve on a joint interim committee which will make a new study of Texas beaches.

They are Reps. Rufus Kilpatrick of Beaumont, Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi and Russell Cummings of Houston.

Three Senate members (selected by the lieutenant governor), the land commissioner, highway department chief engineer (or their representatives) and a citizen named by the governor also will serve.

Purpose of the body is to facilitate development of beaches as public recreational areas and tourist attractions. Group also will determine the best method of obtaining rights-of-way and easements for needed highway and parking areas.

**Attorney General Rules**

A county tax assessor-collector is not authorized to accept applications for voter registration certificates mailed or delivered to him by some one other than the applicant . . . or the husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter of an applicant. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin advised Secretary of State John L. Hill of the opinion.

Martin also ruled that bonds voted in a Sherman County election, held before creation of the Texhoma Memorial Hospital District, will not become obligations of the district.





**Eagles Bow To Iraan By Score Of 34-7**

The Iraan Braves pulled out all the stops last Friday night for their crucial contest with the Eldorado Eagles. They resuscitated the "Pulsing drum" bit and pounded a drum for 24 hours preceding the game; they held an all-day pep rally the day of the game on October 13. Shortly before dark they sent up a huge black smoke signal from the small but sharply defined mountain southwest of the football field. Their combined efforts were enough to defeat the Eldorado Eagles 34-7. Statistics reflect the Brave superiority but not in proportion to the score.

The Eagles took over a full contingent of devoted fans, a superb band, and a great effort; but it is only rarely in the books for sophomores to outlast seniors. After a hard fought and scoreless first quarter for both teams, the Eagles stunned the Indians just 15 seconds into the second quarter when Bob Page fired a 25-yard bomb to Wayne Doyle whose flashing heels were too much for the heavier Indians for another 40 yards to put the Eagles on the scoreboard.

The kicking team of Davidson and Bob Page scored the extra point and the Eagles were out front 7-0.

The Eagles then fought off Indian raids for nine minutes in the second quarter. But the Braves finally cranked up and drove nearly 70 yards in six consecutive down series to cross the Eagle goal line just 199 seconds before the end of the first half. Iraan tried to run over for two extra points but failed and the score stood 7-6 for Eldorado.

Then the things that break the hearts of teams, fans, and coaches happened. Iraan was forced to punt and Eagle Wayne Doyle took the ball on a fine runback from the 15 to the 35-yard line. An Eagle blocker had laid a devastating block into an Iraan forward. Movie replays of this event demonstrate that this block and its classification depend strictly on the thinking of the viewer; but the Umpire happened to see only the complete block and the sprawling Indian and he concluded that no legal block could so completely demolish a would-be tackler; so the umpire threw down his flag. This nullified the fine runback and the Eagles were penalized back within their

10-yard line. An excellent 1st down play netted 8 yards but the second down play resulted in a fumble which was captured by Iraan. The Braves' workhorse Roger Wortham battered over in four consecutive downs and Iraan had scored a second time in an interval of less than two minutes and with only 83 seconds left on the clock. The Braves then succeeded in running over for two points and the scoreboard showed Iraan 14 and Eldorado 7.

It was too heavy a load for the youthful Eagles and Iraan was able to score three more touchdowns in the last half, two in the third quarter and one in the 4th. They kicked two of the three extra points and the final score stood 34-7 for the Indians.

A number of Eagles distinguished themselves in the contest. Jim McGinnes played both offensive and defensive roles. Roy Davidson smeared repeated passes and run efforts from his halfback post, as did Sophomore James L. Davis with his uncompromising stops on Iraan's Roger Wortham. Dwain (Pinky) Dempsey and Mickey Clark penetrated a strong Iraan line behind blocking provided by John Danford and Ross Whiten as well as A. Torres, David Lloyd, and J. Robledo at guards. Mike Olson who was pretty thoroughly ill the week end of October 7-10 and Buff Whitten at ends worked hard against tough opposition.

Offensively Paul Page, Bob Page, Jim Mann, Ross Whitten, and Mickey Pennington along with Allan Corbell did yeoman's service in the contest.

But it just isn't often that a team with as many as five sophomores on the field as one time can panic and crush a team made up of seven seniors and four juniors.

**Positions Available For Game Warden**

Austin, Tex.—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting applications to fill the 22nd Game Warden Training School to begin in February at Texas A&M University, College Station, according to J. D. Archer, personnel director.

Under acts passed by the 60th Legislature, the starting salary for game warden trainees will be \$468 per month, a significant increase over the \$397 paid to earlier trainees. Final deadline for applications will be 5:00 p.m. October 23.

Following application, applicants will be notified when and where to report for competitive written examinations which will be held in eight major cities across the state during November.

Applicants should be 21 to 40 years old, be in good physical condition, have a high school diploma with some college preferred, of high moral character and must stand a minimum of five feet, eight inches tall, weigh at least two pounds per inch and not more than three pounds per inch of height and pass a competitive written and oral examination.

Applicants must have at least 20/40 vision in each eye without corrective lenses and vision must be correctable to 20/20 acuity binocularly.

Upon completion of five months intensive training at Texas A&M University, applicants will be commissioned game wardens and may be stationed anywhere in Texas.

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

Dear Citizen: The Schleicher County Historical Survey Committee was reorganized last January, for the purpose of Recordation, Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Survey, RAMPS in their relationship to this County. This organization is a branch of the State Historical Survey Committee, that was set up by the State Officials approved by the Governor, and which has local branches in each of the Counties.

Therefore, the Schleicher County Historical Survey Committee is asking you to give something to sustain the history, the memorials, the papers and the artifacts, all of which are the essential heritage of our County. We need money for another marker right away. Your contribution, in any amount will be greatly appreciated.

## COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

by Tiny Godwin

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

From a quality standpoint, the basic objective in cotton harvesting is to keep moisture and trash content to a minimum.

Their removal at the gin creates a major quality preservation problem. Excessive moisture and the presence of green leaves also cause quality losses in storage.

The moisture and trash content factor in seed cotton is related to prevailing weather, plant condition, and machine adjustment and operation.

Important guidelines to consider are:

1. Moisture of seed cotton in the field should be 10% or less.
2. Machines must be conditioned prior to harvesting and kept in adjustment as dictated by plant and field conditions.
3. Operators must be trained and supervised.
4. Only enough water to keep spindles clean should be used.
5. A specific service program should be followed.
6. Excess lubrication should be removed.
7. Seed cotton of varying trash and moisture content should not be mixed in the same trailer.
8. Keep the cotton loose, clean and dry.

County horse owners, including 4-H Club members, should be interested in a new publication just released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The publication, MP-333, "Insect, Mite and Tick Parasites of Texas Horses" is available at my office. It is designed to furnish handy reference information on the common parasites which attack horses in the state.

Included are discussion on the life history, habits and damage done by horse bot flies, horse lice, mange mites, ticks and biting flies. Because of the frequent changes in control recommendations, no control measures are given in the publication. These are available in another publication, MP-691, which is also available at the office.

Horse owners are invited to come by this office for a copy of the new publication as well as the one on control recommendations.

Winter temporary pastures are a dependable source of green grazing for livestock in the late fall, winter and early spring.

Green grazing puts more pounds on beef cattle and sheep and reduces hay, grain and veterinary bills.

More than one variety or type of small grain should be planted, if maximum grazing is needed. Adapted early types of rye, barley and oats may provide grazing 4 to 6 weeks earlier than cold-resistant winter types; however, they usu-

ally do not give sustained production through the winter.

Proper seedbed preparation and fertilization are musts for successful winter temporary pasture production. A soil test is the best method for determining the kind and amount of fertilization needed.

Small grains should be planted at the proper time. When maximum grazing or early grazing is needed, and soil moisture is adequate, the use of higher rates of fertilization is suggested. Top dressing with nitrogen one or more times is suggested to stimulate growth when moisture and temperatures are favorable.

Small grain should be well established before it is grazed. Grazing oats too early and keeping them closely grazed can reduce forage production. Oats should have 4 to 5 weeks for regrowth after being grazed down. Rotational grazing allows time for regrowth and insures top production from winter temporary pastures.

Information on time of planting, varieties, and grazing suggestions is available from the county agent's office.

Money may not buy happiness, but it helps you for it in interesting places.

Make a plan before doing any landscape work around your home. A good plan allows work to be carried out over a period of years and perhaps in keeping with available funds.

Guard against landscaping with so-called cheap fast growing trees and shrubs. It is far better to establish a few highly desirable ornamental trees and shrubs and add to the plan over a period of time.

Top priority should be given to establishing the lawn area and the planting of permanent shade trees. With a well developed landscape plan, the trees will have adequate room for growth and development and provide shade for your lawn rather than for a neighboring yard.

Remember to use plants, fences and walls to screen out unattractive views and to provide background, privacy and enclosures. Use trees and shrubs to frame the house or attractive views. Plants should be used to enhance or beautify the home—not hide it.



Portugal joins previously announced Belgium, Bolivia, Canada, Republic of China, Colombia, El Salvador, France, Germany, Honduras, Italy, Korea, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, the Philippines, Spain, Switzerland, Tunisia, Venezuela, United States, Texas and Arkansas.

### An Apple a Day by Betty Crocker

Use them in this Brunch Cake that will bring Saturday sleepy-heads running or will wait a special "glad you came" to that committee you've invited to meet in your living room.

#### APPLE CHIP BRUNCH CAKE

1/4 cup sugar  
1 egg  
3/4 cup milk  
2 tablespoons salad oil or shortening  
2 cups Bisquick  
1 cup finely chopped pared apples

#### Topping (below)

Heat oven to 400°. Grease layer pan, 9x1 1/2 inches, or square pan, 9x9x2 inches. Mix all ingredients except apples and Topping. Beat vigorously 30 seconds. Fold in apples. Spread in prepared pan. Sprinkle with Topping. Bake 20 to 25 minutes. 9 servings.

Topping: Mix with fork 1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons Bisquick, 2 teaspoons cinnamon and 2 tablespoons soft butter until crumbly.

How many apples for a recipe? One pound of apples (3 medium apples) yields about 3 cups of diced apple. To store apples, place in a plastic bag in your refrigerator. They'll keep 2 to 3 weeks.

But first, do an autumn centerpiece of bright red apples in a wooden bowl. Then for dessert, try this:

#### APPLE BETTY

Heat oven to 375°. Place apples in loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches. Mix Bisquick, sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. Bake about 30 minutes. Serve warm with cream. 4 servings.






