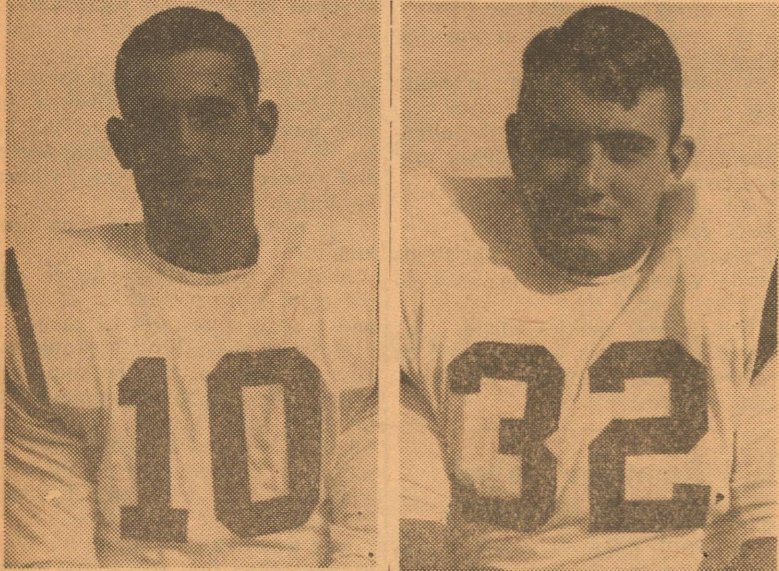

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

It seems that the pleasures of life always come with built in price tags. The feasts of Thanksgiving and Christmas are glorious but the rules of the cooking game call for extreme carefulness both in the preparation of food beforehand and the care of leftovers when the holiday meals are over.

Thanksgiving has gone for this year but Christmas is not too far away as the calendar flies these days. Read the following statement prepared by a foods and nutrition specialist concerning the handling of food, especially poultry, and some of the results of improper food care. Read as if your family's

health depends on every word—it just might, at that.

"It's just another one of those 24-hour viruses," reported the mother of a young school boy. But is it? The boy may have a food illness.

Reported cases of food borne illness have increased greatly in the last few years. In 1951, 1,700 cases in humans were reported; the figure had jumped to more than 20,000 in 1965. Part of the increase is due to awareness of the problem, said Radora Massey, Extension foods and nutrition specialist with Texas A&M University.

The salmonella bacteria is a major cause of stomach upset and diarrhea. Onset of vomiting and diarrhea usually occurs 8 to 12 hours after eating contaminated foods.

The greatest danger from sal-

monella infection is for young children and elderly people, said Miss Massey.

What can you do to protect your family from this illness? Your first responsibility lies in the way you handle food as it comes from the grocery store.

Poultry is a common source of salmonella infection; yet by taking routine precautions, the homemaker can protect her family. Poultry can be stored one or two days before using in the coldest part of the refrigerator. The cardboard tray and transparent wrapping should be removed, the giblets should be separated from the cavity, and both should be wrapped loosely to allow for circulation of air.

For longer storage poultry should be frozen.

Thawing should be done so that the temperature of poultry stays as low as possible to prevent the growth of bacteria. Bacterial growth increases rapidly at temperatures of 40 degrees F. and above, Miss Massey advised.

Thaw in the refrigerator (2 to 3 days for an 18 pound turkey) or in a paper bag at room temperature. The temperature inside the bag is slightly warmer than the refrigerator, and large turkeys will thaw in about 16 hours.

If thawed at room temperature, the outside is exposed to a high temperature for a long period of time while the inside remains frozen. Poultry can be thawed partially in the refrigerator and completed by immersing it (in a watertight plastic bag) in cold water.

Commercially frozen stuffed poultry should not be thawed before cooking.

The care of utensils is important when working with poultry. The cutting board, knives, sponges, dish cloth and cabinet top should be washed in hot, soapy water.

After cooking, poultry should be refrigerated as soon as possible with any stuffing removed. Keeping cooked turkey (or roast) in the oven or on back of the range between dinner and supper is a dangerous practice.

The first 30 minutes of cooling time is approximately the same in and out of the refrigerator; after that refrigerated food cools much faster.

Bacteria growth will take place much faster at room temperature.

These precautions apply whether preparing for Christmas turkey, fried chicken any day or the chicken barbecued outside in the summer. Follow these good habits of personal hygiene and eliminate food borne illness in your family.

Pie is a universally loved American dessert. "As American as apple pie" is a favorite expression of people the world over who would describe some American characteristic. But, apple pie is not the only good pie, a statement with which you will agree after you have tried these two delights.

Chocolate Almond Pie
6 small chocolate almond bars
16 large marshmallows
1/2 cup milk
1 cup whipping cream.
Baked pastry or graham cracker shell.

Melt candy bars, marshmallows and milk in top of double boiler. Cool thoroughly. Whip cream and fold into candy mixture when cool. Pour into shell. Chill until serving time.

Peek-A-Boo Mincemeat Pie
2 cups mince meat
1/2 cup crushed pineapple, drained
1 cup peeled and diced apples
1/4 cup orange juice
1/4 cup sugar.

Pastry for two 9-inch pies, divided in half.

Combine ingredients. Pour into pastry lined 9-inch pie pan. Moisten edges of bottom crust. Roll pastry for top crust. Cut out six Christmas designs in top pie crust and remove designs. These could be bells, stars, little trees or such. Space cuttings so that each piece of pie will have a cut out. Place the top crust carefully on fruit filled pie; flute edges. Bake at 450 F. for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 325 F. and bake 20 minutes longer. Serves 6.

All fruit pies freeze very well in the unbaked stage. The thawing and baking process then becomes the same thing.

Make a half dozen this week, put them in the freezer and face the holidays with a great big smile.

Martin Luther King's projected journey to Russia to attend a "peace" session which will attract delegates from most of the Communist countries, plus a few others, is expected to lend more encouragement to the Hanoi aggressors in Vietnam.

The Negro leader has been a bitter critic of U. S. resistance to

the Communist aggressors. It will be recalled that King, in the big New York City demonstration that he sponsored a few months ago, assailed the United States as "the greatest purveyor of violence in the world today."

Better known as a civil rights agitator even before the Vietnam war got into the big news, King went from state to state preaching the doctrine of "civil disobedience." While pretending nonviolence, the crusade triggered bloodshed and riots aplenty. He justified violation of laws with which one happens to disagree. His theory is that if such criminal acts help to bring about a change, then it is justified.

This doctrine is as old as the primitive jungle. It is alien and atheistic doctrine that should have no place in American thought—and it must be repudiated. We will not deserve or long enjoy freedom if we permit any compromise of our principles on this issue.

King just completed his 19th jail term for violations of the law. This ex-convict is now planning a massive crusade for more disobedience to law and order. His plan is to disrupt our cities, and impede the pursuits of a majority of our citizens. And he is joined by others.

The Department of Justice has been easy on King, Carmichael and some of the other radicals in the movement. We have sedition laws and laws against encouraging people to violate the draft. The time is overdue for a crackdown on these characters.

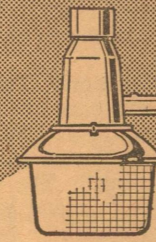

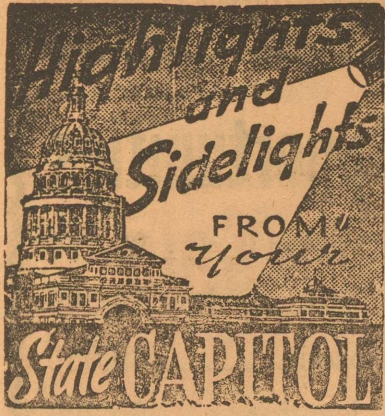

Austin, Tex.—Everybody's talking about the 1968 governor's race. As of this writing, however, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith is the only one who has formally announced.

Secretary of State John L. Hill says he wants to run—and WILL, IF support "continues to crystallize." Adds Hill: "I know the political realities are such that if I am going to run, I ought to announce soon, but I don't want to speculate when."

Uvalde rancher-banker Dolph Briscoe says he definitely is interested but has reached no firm decision.

Although he hasn't announced, former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr made a candidate-like move in demanding that U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, another potential candidate, resign his office should he enter the governor's race.

Austin attorney and former Congressman Joe Kilgore, close friend of Gov. John Connally, says it is unlikely he will be a candidate but he did not close the door.

Other names have been mentioned but no statements have come from them, pro or con, as to their interest in the race.

Courts Speak

Millions of dollars may be added to the Texas Permanent School Fund pending outcome of suit by a San Patricio County man challenging private ownership of 12,066 acres of South Texas oil land, says attorney general's department. Walter C. Atchley, in lawsuit, claims that the state never deeded away land to oil operators and is still owner.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld award of \$117,456 to a six-year-old Austin boy whose leg was cut off by a power mower at a drive-in theater here.

State Supreme Court in a divided (5 to 4) decision held that a San Antonio detective investigator was dismissed on insufficient ground, though he offered for sale

a shot gun reported stolen.

High court rejected appeal of an Edinburg man for release from jail where he is held on order to pay \$17,000 of his Mexican national lottery winnings to a woman who had purchased a half interest in one of his "lucky" tickets.

Supreme Court concluded that a Travis County district judge should not have ordered a new trial of case protesting denial of a new savings and loan association charter in Llano.

Court of Criminal Appeals held that conviction of a man imprisoned for 28 years on forgery and other felony charges cannot stand because he did not have counsel in his 1939 trial.

Smith Appoints

Lieutenant Governor Smith announced these appointments: Sens. Charles Herring of Austin and Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells to Multi-State Tax Compact Advisory Committee.

Sens. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, Criss Cole of Houston, William T. Moore of Bryan, Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and Ralph Hall of Rockwall to joint Interim Highway Safety Committee.

Sens. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, James S. Bates of Edinburg, Creighton, H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock and Murray Watson Jr. of Waco to special committee to study Governmental Immunity with request to recommend whether principle should be continued or abolished.

Sens. William N. Patman of Ganado, Watson and Hazlewood to special Parking and Traffic Committee to study congestion in the state capitol area.

City Sales Tax Success Continues

Five more Texas cities have given overwhelming approval to 1% city sales tax levies.

Huntsville, Uvalde, Seguin, Commerce and Llano voters asked for the tax by margins ranging from two-to-one to eight-to-one.

So far, 33 cities have approved the local revenue-raising method passed by the Legislature this year although it was believed to be highly controversial. Only two, Lufkin and Electra, turned it down.

Next two elections—December 2—are in Galveston and Kilgore. Fifty-six cities will vote on December 5, including Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth.

Bond Programs

Two state agencies are busily planning how best to take advantage of \$275 million worth of authorization voted them by Texas citizens on November 11.

One of the constitutional amendments revived the Veterans Land Program and authorized the issuance of \$200 million in bonds to finance it. Another set up the Park Development Fund and provided for the sale of \$75 million in bonds to finance it.

Veterans Land Board, administrator of the land program, should be ready to begin its operations soon after the votes are formally canvassed on November 28. No friction is anticipated in this for two reasons.

First, the old Veterans Land Program expired only in 1965, so Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is experienced in operating it. Second, there are few complications to work out—the state merely sells the bonds and acquires the money, then asks for applications from veterans, Sadler said veterans should locate tracts they want, then apply for loans after January 15.

But Parks and Wildlife Department is facing a different situation. Bond experts met with department officials last week to give them a "short course" on securities.

Neither agency is planning to sell all the authorized bonds at once. Land Office is talking about \$25 million to \$30 million in the first issue, and though the Parks and Wildlife Commission will have the final say-so, the most popular figure discussed at the meeting was \$10 million.

Land bonds will be 40-year bonds.

Parks bonds are limited to 10 years and will be retired by revenues from entrance fees to state parks. Both have a 4 1/2% constitutional limit on the interest the state may pay, which could complicate their sale.

Job Corps Placements

More than 14,000 Texas young men and women have been employed by the Job Corps.

Since the program began two years ago, about 13,000 male trainees from Gary Job Corps have accepted assignments. The McKinney Job Corps for girls, which began screening applicants in April, already has placed 1,132 on jobs.

Liquor Board Suspends Agents

Coke Stevenson Jr., administrator of Texas Liquor Control Board, suspended two Dallas agents for "remarks" about board operations, and ordered them to a Tuesday, November 28, hearing here.

Action followed distribution of a circular in the capitol area and in Dallas criticizing Stevenson and James E. Dale, Dallas LCB supervisor. Circular also repeated the Baptist General Convention demand for investigation of the Board, Stevenson called the publication "malicious slander".

Dallas State Sen. Oscar Mauzy said he is looking into LCB activities himself following rumors about alleged wrongdoings.

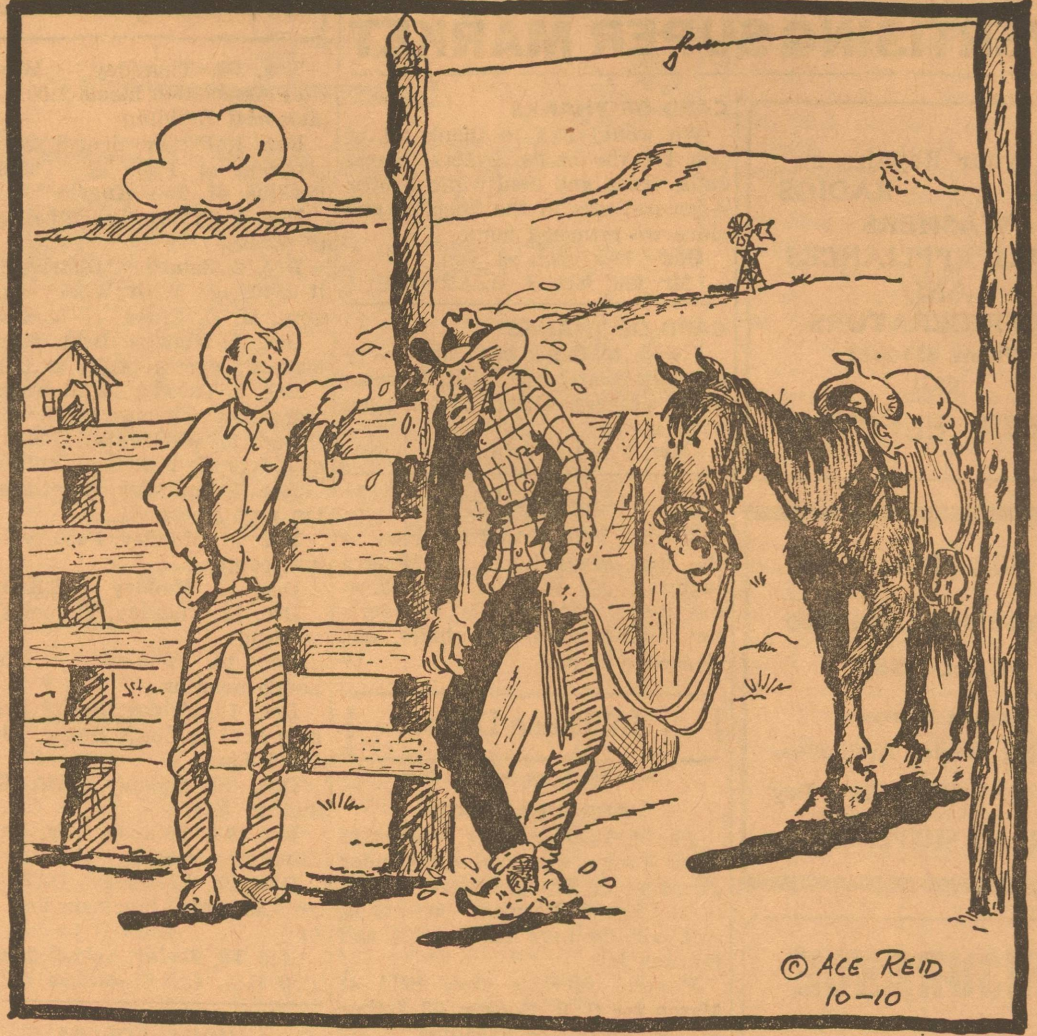

VELVET CRUMB CAKE
- 1 1/3 cups Bisquick
 - 3/4 cup brown sugar (packed)
 - 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/4 teaspoon cloves
 - 1/4 teaspoon allspice
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 3 tablespoons shortening
 - 1 egg
 - 1/2 cup unsweetened applesauce
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/3 cup milk

Topping (below)
Heat oven to 350°. Grease and flour square pan, 8x8x2 inches. In large mixer bowl, stir together dry ingredients. Add shortening, egg, applesauce and vanilla. Beat on low speed 1/2 minute, scraping side and bottom of bowl frequently. Beat 1 minute on medium speed. Stir in milk gradually.

Beat 1/2 minute longer. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 35 to 40 minutes. Serve warm with Topping, 9 servings.

Topping: In chilled bowl, beat 1 1/2 cups whipping cream until stiff. Fold in 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/4 cup chopped nuts and 2 teaspoons sugar.

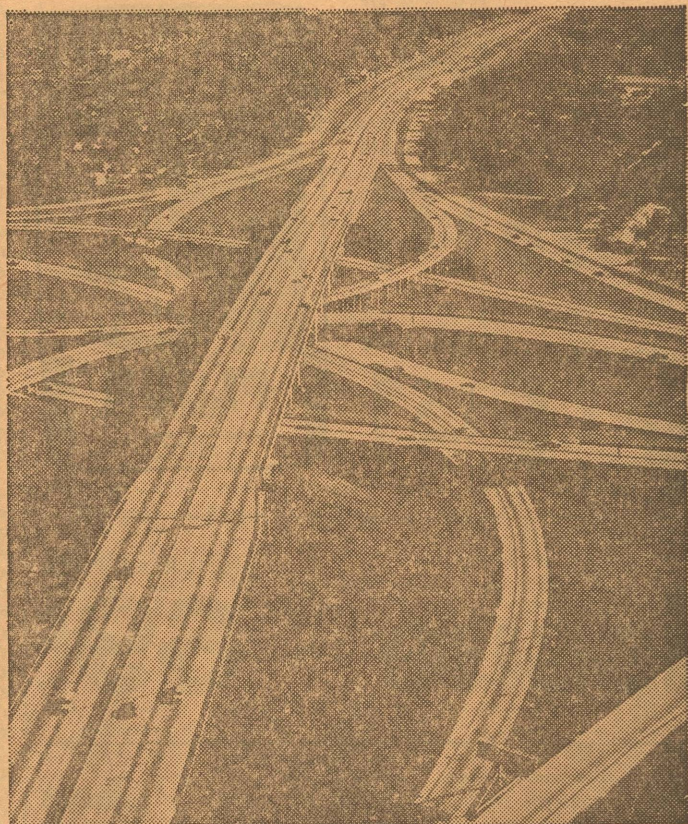
Colorful, tasty trick with applesauce for children: Sprinkle the dish of applesauce with red cinnamon candies. And here's another saucy treat.

- CRANBERRY APPLESAUCE**
- 2 cups fresh cranberries
 - 2 cups sliced apples

Combine cranberries, apples and water; cook until fruit is soft. Put through a colander or strainer; stir in sugar and cook until sugar is dissolved. If desired, sprinkle with grated orange peel.
