On the strength of the new modern hospital which is expected to be formally opened in February, a second physician and surgeon last week decided to cast his fortune here with Dr. Brame and is expected to start his practice in the Eldorado Clinic building on Monday, January 6th.

The new doctor is Phillip Osbourne, recently from the state of Arkansas. Over the past week end he was moving his furniture and household goods into the Gerald Hartgraves ranch house on Menard highway which he has purchased.

Dr. Osbourne, 30, a graduate of the University of Texas Medical School was a flight surgeon in the army and served his internship and residency at the Arkansas Baptist Medical Center in Little Rock, Arkansas. In the meantime Eldorado will be enjoying the services of not one, but two, physicians and surgeons. Dr. Brame gives the credit to the seven-man Schleicher County Hospital District Board of Directors. "It would have been impossible," he said, "to have a second physician here this soon except for the splendid co-operation of the board."





The use of the land according its needs. to its capabilities and treating it according to its needs, has always assured the farmer of the best production attainable from his land. The misuse of land has always tinued misuse and failure to treat lnad according to its needs, can reduce production to the point that farming ceases to be profit-

Using the land according to its capability should be a major concern of each farmer and rancher throughout all America. The factors that govern the soils capability help bear out the importance of using the land within its capability. Very shallow soils with steep slopes and easily erodible soil, would not be capable of producing a good cotton crop. However, soils with this same condition would be capable of supporting a perennial grass.

The determination of land use was not always based on land capability in the pioneer days. Also, at the present time capability determine its use. However, the use of the land according to its capability should be done without fail by every farmer and rancher.

The early day farmers or ranchers located cropland in some instences for convenience. Cultivated fields close to headquarters was

In most cases the land was fairly suited to cultivation. However this land was not always the land with the highest capability.

Today's farmer and rancher have days. the advantage over the pioneers in selecting land for use in accordance with its capability. Soils maps showing the land capability are available to the modern day farmer and rancher. Farmers and ranchers cooperating with their local Soil, Water and Plant Conservation District are furnished a soils map with their conservation plan. Soil Conservation Service Technicians assisting the Soil Conservation Districts, assist district cooperators with their conservation plans.






