**Jackson Will Contested.**

SUIT FILED BY MARRY LUNA JACKSON.

From San Angelo Standard.  
The first step in contest of the will left by millionaire Ed. R. Jackson was taken at Sonora Tuesday, when Marry Luna Jackson, through her attorneys, filed suit in the County court of Sutton county to have the document set aside and praying for a redistribution of the estate. Plaintiff claims that she is the lawful wife of Ed. R. Jackson. She was not provided for in the will, which left \$1000,000 to Fannie Jackson, designated by Jackson as "the twelve-year-old child of my friend, Marry Luna;" \$15,000 to John W. Riley; \$5,000 to relatives and kindred, by blood of first and second degrees; \$500 to Chas A. Hill of Nebraska, an uncle; \$500 to other relatives not otherwise provided for in the provisions of the will; and the balances of the estate to the Catholic Church of America for the maintenance of orphanages.

Marry Luna Jackson is represented in the suit filed Tuesday by the law firm of Hudspeth & Gillett, of El Paso. The suit will be heard February 19, when the Jackson will will be offered for probate in the Sutton County court.

The estate left by Ed. Jackson is valued at \$1,200,000. It estimated that \$200,000 will cover amounts bequeathed to friends and relatives, leaving \$1,000,000 for the Catholic Church.

**J. W. Butcher, Interested IN SCHLEICHER COUNTY SECURING DEMONSTRATION FARM.**

From San Angelo Standard  
J. W. Butcher, the Tom Green county agent of the United States Department of Agriculture, believes that the demonstration farm work which is spreading rapidly over West Texas will be extended to include Schleicher county by the opening of the crop planting season. W. B. Silliman, who is one of the men behind the move to secure the services of an expert for that county, has written Mr. Butcher regarding the proper steps to be taken, and the latter replied that it would be necessary for the commissioners to appropriate about \$400, be supplemented by a like amount from the Department of Agriculture, the \$800 to supply the salary of the agent.

Schleicher contains some of the best agricultural land in West Texas, and the county would doubtless find it a paying proposition to employ a farm agent. Wonderful results have been realized in Tom Green from such a step, and arrangements have been made to perpetuate the work. While pledges are being made in various parts of the country to reduce the cotton acreage, a greater acreage is being urged in the Eldorado section as the people there are anxious to justify putting in a gin.

While Mr. Butcher's demonstration work is confined to Tom Green county, he is interested in seeing other counties of this section take up the best methods and will do all he can to encourage them in efforts.

**To The Success.**

I read with much interest Mr. McCormick's note in last week's Success in answer to my letter regarding the reduction of the cotton acreage. Now Mr. McCormick was mistaken in the intent of my letter, I feel the necessity of a gin more keenly I think than any one in Schleicher county, and I feel sure there is not many that will do more towards building a gin here than I will. I still think it would be unfair to our family to raise cotton at a loss in order to build a gin. If last years cotton crop had made as much per acre as it did three years ago, at the present prices paid in San Angelo it would almost bankrupt us, supposed we figure it up and see especially for the poor renters, we had to pay \$1.00 per hundred pounds for picking, say 1600 pounds to each bale, suppose we got 500 pounds lint, sold it at 6c, paid \$4.00 for ginning, fourth for rent, now comes the rub, bale brought \$30.00, \$18 for picking \$4 for ginning, rent \$7.50, total expense in producing this bale of cotton \$27.50, you will readily see the the handsome sum of \$2.50 for the man and his family who loiled 13 month to produce the cotton, there is no disputing the fact that there is at present one over production of cotton, it would seem to me, no better posted than "Ben Hur," that the government and the cotton gamblers have formed a gigantic trust, the government compelling all ginners to furnish monthly reports showing the amount of cotton ginned so the cotton gambler might see just when to play his cards, a further proof of what I say is the prosecution of Brown and Scales of New Orleans, who put the price of cotton up to what it was really worth. Now Mr. Wickersham says he can't see where the "Bears" that put down the price of cotton has done any act to deserve punishment.

I have somewhat digressed from my subject, I do not advocate the entire abolishment of cotton, as it is no easy job for many of us to take up some foreign occupation, many of us was raised as the writer was, i. e., in the cotton patch.

I am thoroughly convinced that we must produce more of our living at home. The writer will plant cotton this year and urge all poor men to do likewise, but be sure you plant enough of feed stuff to produce your meat, butter and eggs, and try to part

company with your paper sack and tin can habits, and now Mr. McCormick come on with your gin we will welcome you not only with our mouths but will assist you financially as well, and with the splendid season we have in the ground I feel sure we can cut our acreage and then give you all the cotton you can gin.

I feel that my efforts have not been in vain since Mr. McCormick has saw fit to give his reasons for not wanting cotton acreage reduced, why not others give us their ideas on this most important subject, there are dozens of competent men who could be of valuable to his fellowman. But some how, just don't, as to the writer he will always be found taking a hand in every movement that has tendency to better mankind also will do my best to futher the progress of our country and when the time comes (if it ever does and may God forbid) that I shall ever speak disparagingly of our beautiful country, then I will steal away to parts unknown, we should not live for self alone.

I must stop as this letter has grown long. There is no end to the good we could do if we only would.

I will try to tell your readers in next week's Success what I think of Demonstration Farm proposition. Ben Hur.

**SAN ANTONIO-ROCKPORT RAILWAY.**

FINANCES ASSURED, CONTRACTS APPROVED, WORK WILL SOON BEGIN

The San Antonio, Rockport & Mexican Railroad Company has completed the financing of its proposed line of railroad from San Antonio to Rockport Tex.

When the entire project is completed it will consist of a line from San Antonio to a point on the Rio Grande near Mission, passing through Crowther, and a branch will be built from Crowther to Rockport and Harbor Island, where a half mile of docks to handle the incoming and outgoing traffic will be built. The project also includes a proposition to construct lines to Tampico and Mexico City, and from

San Antonio to San Angelo. The total proposed mileage is about 2000. The mileage of lines to be built immediately is 370. The proposition involves an expenditure of about \$40,000,000.

Contracts have been approved for the construction of the line, and it is planned to begin work simultaneously at San Antonio and Rockport in February, —Texas Trade Review.

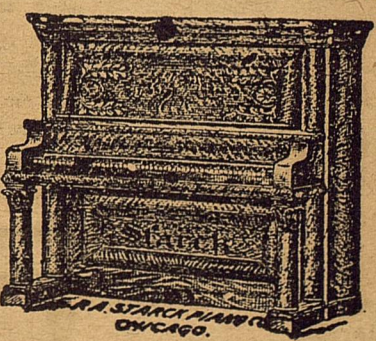
