ANOTHER BIG LAND DEAL MADE

Ballinger People Buy Quarter of a Million Dollars Worth of Galves County Lands.

Ben S. Long returned a few days ago from Temple where he met some people by appointment and closed a deal by which Long Bros., of this city, buy 17,712 acres of land lying on the county line of Dawson and Gaines Counties. The lands lie west of Lamesa, sixteen miles, and adjoining the Higginbotham land on the west—53,000 acres, 10,000 of which is being put into cultivation and one hundred houses built. The land bought by Long Bros., is a short distance from the C. Slaughter ranch which is now being sold to settlers by the Soash Land Company of Kansas City.

The deal was brought about by J. B. Gregory of Temple, who will represent Long Bros., at that place in the resale of the subdivided tracts to actual settlers.

Long Bros., bought the tract from Capt. W. L. Saye of Comanche, the consideration being about a quarter of a million of dollars. It is a fine agricultural land, four leagues in all, and each league will be cut into blocks of 177 acres each and sold to farmers. Any actual settler may buy as many blocks as he desires.

The deal was closed on March 25th and J. B. Gregory of Temple at once began making arrangements with Long Bros., to place the subdivided tracts upon the market. The deal was made between West Texas people who have come to know the value of lands in this country.—Ballinger Ledger.

It will be remembered by all readers of THE SUCCESS that the Commissioners Court of this county, about a year ago, sold the Schleicher county school land,

containing 4 leagues, or 17,712 acres of land to Capt. W. L. Saye of Comanche for a consideration of \$6.50 per acre or \$115,128, this land lies West of Lamesa about 16 miles and is in Gaines and Dawson county. It will also be remembered that THE SUCCESS advocated the sale of this land to home seekers by cutting it up in small tracts and giving it the proper advertising, but the court thought different and sold the land at the above named price. The above sale speaks for its self and shows the handsome profit that Captain Saye made.

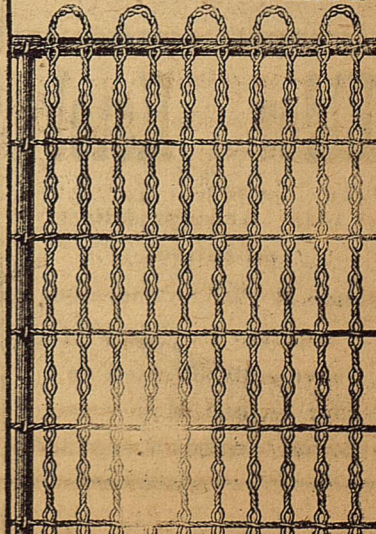

of our State Senator, Hudspeth,
I understand that his most cun-
ning game law was passed, that is
not to allow a person to kill but
one deer, and that to be a buck,
that law might seem good at
first sight but I shall show you
that is one of the most cunning
pieces of law work done for many
years, first the law has declared
a wild game to be the property
of the state and should be the
property of every tax payer in the
state. Now you will see this law
will have a tendency to scare off
people who live away from the
parts of the state where game is
found, but the big ranchman can
kill all they choose as there is no
one to say when they have killed
their one buck. And with Mr.
Hudspeth other bill allowing a
land holder to post his inclosure
up to fifty thousand acres which
law is for the identical purpose
that game law above mentioned
was made for, that is to protect
and conceal the man who lives a-
mong the game and to exclude
all others that they might have
full sway without encountering
people who might be honest en-
ough to report the slaughter of the
deer to the authorities of the law.
I do not claim all the ranchman
destroy deer but to the contrary
I know many of them or not, but
at the same time I know of some
that have killed three for them-
selves and also three for ever-
member of their family and three
for all their neighbors. But there
was no one to say stop, he was in
his own inclosure, no one had a
right to enter, the pasture was
posted, it is to such men that Mr.
Hudspeth intended to protect, it
is not the game that such rotten
laws protect but the man that
violates the law. Mr. Hudspeth
has done several things that I
could not agree with him on, but
his speech in opposition to the
twenty five thousand dollars ap-
propriation to assist the attorney
General to prosecute men who
has bought school land will cover
a multitude of his faults. Many
of us thought the Terral land law
had put a quietus on land litiga-
tion of which at one time was so
rampant that it was almost impos-
sible to get a foot of school land
without being sued by some one,
many times there was no grounds
except to get a few dollars by a
compromise. Often men would
give a few dollars rather than be
bothered with a little pesty law
suit.

Letter to BEAVERS & DEVOE Eldorado, Texas.

Dear Sirs: This happened seven years ago. A man, having three little poultry houses, bought one gallon of each of two paints to paint them; paid \$1.60 for one and \$1.75 for the other, 15 cents difference.

The \$1.60 gallon painted one house, the \$1.75 gallon painted the other two houses. The cost of the paint was: first house \$1.60 second house 87c; third house 87c.
