ORIENT RAILROAD TO BUILD TO ELDORADO BY JULY THE FIRST 1911

Eldorado Must Take \$100,000 Worth of First Mortgage Bonds And Right-of-way Through County and Terminal Grounds

Our railroad committee received a proposition from the Orient headquarters at Kansas City Monday, saying that they would build the Orient road direct from San Angelo to Eldorado by way of Christoval, if Eldorado would take \$100,000 worth of bonds, to be first mortgage bonds.

A. M. Deuney, of Kansas City, was here to represent the Orient people. He agrees that all money subscribed by Schleicher county people would be spent in said county and none would be spent on any other portion of said road. The payments for bonds to be made quarterly, and the last 15 per cent to be paid on the completion of the road and train service to begin not later than July 1st 1911.

This is a good proposition for the Schleicher county people and we believe that the amount asked for can easily be made up, for Orient bonds are now worth 83 cents on the dollar. Our committee has agreed to accept the proposition and have called a mass-meeting for Monday night at the

court house, of course the proposition was accepted, with a proviso, or, now it up to the people to see that the requirements are met.

All citizens are requested to be present Monday night and help towards securing this road remember the time of meeting Monday night November 1st.

A committee will be appointed to canvas the county, so when you are approached by one of the committee don't hesitate but put down your amount freely, those who own land within 15 mile of Eldorado will be greatly benefited. The proposition is up to the people, now the question is, will our people meet the proposition. The Success predicts that the required amount of bonds will be taken in a short while, for these people can't afford to miss an opportunity to get the long looked for Orient.

The time set for the completion of the road into Eldorado will soon pass away. Everybody talk rail road and be at the mass-meeting Monday night. Talk on.

Orient bonds are now selling at \$844.83 This is making the local bond holders feel good over their investment, most all of them being confident that they will be worth par before great length of time elapses.

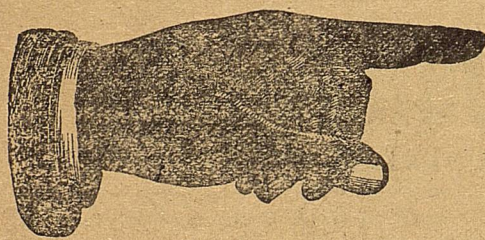

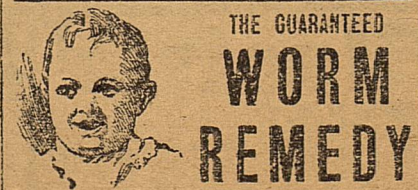

 Paula Valley Okla., Oct. 22, 1909.
 Editor Success:


It may be that a few lines from an Eldorado citizen would interest some of the readers of The Success, I left Eldorado on Oct 13th, for Hamlin Texas, on the K. C. M. & O. Ry. in Jones county, I find crop pretty spotted all a long the line from Hamlin to Okla., and some parts of Okla., crops are very short, all along the Washataw Valley as far as I have been they have a fairly good crop for this year, but not a full crop. The best of corn in the Washataw Valley is light for this part so they tell me, while the Elevator people are very busy shelling corn they say the crop will soon be gathered. Men are at Paula Valley from different parts of Texas, buying corn and shipping it down into Texas for the purpose of feed while they make another crop. I have bought for Hamlin Mill and Elevator Co., 15 000 bushels of shelled corn, and they want 35, 000 more. The most of the buyers are buying ear corn which is worth from 58 to 60 cents on ears here. The cotton crop is fairly good, from one quarter to three quarters of a bale per acre is the way it runs. It has been so dry up here this fall that but few have sown small grain. A fine rain fell here on Tuesday the 19th which gives a very good season for small grain. The Washataw Valley is very rich and fertile soil but it too has its drawbacks, last year it overflowed, this it is to dry, and the mosquito, who is ever ready for a free lunch, is always after you, and then it looks to me like a malarial country, but they say health is good here now but I attribute this to the dry season. Oklahoma is on the list of prohibition but her laws are not enforced as they should be, for I have seen several drunk men since I have been within her borders, but not only do they violate her prohibition laws but all other.
