### RAILROAD MEETING SATURDAY \$42,420 BONUS RAISED.

Saturday, about 4 o'clock the citizens of Eldorado and Schleicher county met at the court house to hear the report of the soliciting committee that had been appointed at a meeting on Saturday before, to solicit subscription for a railroad bonus, first to be offered J. J. Lanin, and if he did not see fit to accept, then to be offered to any one who would build a railroad and have same in operation by September 1st 1910.

Upon hearing the report from the committee it was found that \$42,420 had been subscribed, and most of the large land owners yet to hear from. A committee was then appointed to write Mr. Lanin at once and submit a proposition to him for the citizens of this town. A proposition was made the meeting by J. W. Riley, of San Angelo. Mr. Riley wanted to bond all the land for 15 miles on each side of the proposed route for a sufficient amount to build and equip the road, and let the people own and control the road. The people here, not being prepared to discuss such a proposition, did not consider it, but may on some future date, The meeting then adjourned.

### JUDGE WRIGHT INTRODUCING CONE JOHNSON.

Mr. Johnson was introduced by Judge W. A. Wright, who, with Mayor Paul, occupied a seat on the platform. Judge Wright said that in 1910 the citizens of Texas will have one of the greatest battles in the history of the state to fight out. The fur is going to fly, he said, but it will come from the back of the other bear. It is a question of whether the people will tell their representatives what to do, or whether the representatives will dictate to the people what they are going to do.

"In every great fight there must be a leader. We are not going to have any more lieutenant generals who disobey the wishes of the people. Brown Lee kept his faith, but the gentleman who calls his home at Ozona half the time and El Paso and Val Verde the other half, betrayed a great people, and we don't need him any more. "I wish to introduce to you the general of our forces. He is a man of courage and fights all the way through; he is a man of ability, a constructionist and a statesman—the Hon. Cone Johnson."—Press-News.
