Eldorado Wants and Will Have the Orient Railway by July 1911

Twenty Thousand Yet to be Raised Committee Appointed to Secure Right-of-way and Remaining \$20,000.

It was announced in last week's Success that a massmeeting of the Eldorado and Schleicher county citizens would be held at the court house Monday night November 1st. The meeting was held and is one that will long be remembered by the present generation of this immediate country, for at this meeting the subscription for one hundred thousand dollars worth of the great Transcontinental Line, the K. C. M. & O Ry., was practically raised. The people rejoice over the fact that Eldorado is soon to be a railroad town, they do not anticipate any trouble in raising the remainder of the bonds.

The house was called to order by Chairmen of the Railroad Committee, W. F. Ford, the object of the meeting stated, Judge M. B. McKnight was then elected Chairman of the meeting, W. W. Barbee elected Secretary. The proposition from the Orient People

Proposition from the Orient People

The Orient agree for right-of-way through Schleicher county, 100 feet in width depot and station terminal, a depot of 300 feet in width by 4000 feet in length, a station building to the extent of One Hundred Thousand Dollars, to be paid for as follows:— 25 per cent January 1st 1910, 25 per cent April 1st 1910, 25 per cent July 1st 1910, 15 per cent October 1st 1910 and the balance, 10 per cent, any time when called after January 1st 1911, no bonds to be delivered until after last call has been paid, all of the money so subscribed and paid in to be used in grading the line between San Angelo and Eldorado, (Schleicher county money to be spent in Schleicher county,) the Railway Company to provide suitable depot and station facilities and inaugurate freight and passenger train service between San Angelo and Eldorado on or before July 1st, 1911, subject to strikes, panics and other unavoidable causes. All Bonds, when delivered to the Committee, to be deposited in The First National Bank of Eldorado and held intact until the Committee decides to distribute to the owners, and in case any of the owners desire to sell, the Railway Company to be given the first opportunity to purchase, at the prevailing market price.

The Chairman then explained of them, saying that within the hour he had sold some of them at 86 1/8 cents on the dollar. Mr Webb's talk was full of enthusiasm and when he had finished, cheers went loud and long for the Orient.

A vote was then taken as to whether the people wanted the Orient as per proposition, the vote was unanimous in favor of the proposition.

A notion made and carried by Joab Campbell that the subscriptions be taken.

Then the Chairman called for those who wanted to subscribe and the Secretary got the amount and his name, for some time the crowd seemed to be mummies, but Hon. W. B. Silliman as usual broke the ice with an \$8,000 subscription for the Eldorado Townsite Company, he stated that he had no interest in the town site of Eldorado or any property near here but he would very much like to see Eldorado and San Angelo connected by rail, his talk was listened to with interest and it made a deep impression on the people as was proven when the subscription list was taken, spelled bound.

Mr. Webb said the Orient first came to San Angelo in 1900 with his enthusiastic pot boiling over about the same proposition as it now makes Eldorado be connected by rail, he would put down \$3,000 for Tomson Bro's this

RELATED TO GREAT EXPLORER

"According to Mr Debridge, his sister married the great explorer years ago, and has been the guiding spirit in his great explorations that have brought him fame and fortune.

"As is natural under the circumstances, Mr. Debridge believes implicitly that Peary discovered the Pole, although he does not harshly denounce Cook, as many of the supporters of Peary do.

"I do not know whether or not Mrs. Peary has ever visited out here but I am inclined to think not.

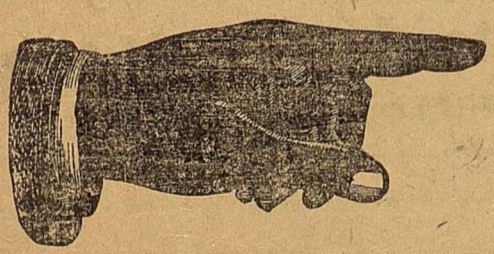

HUNTING SEASON OPENED.

As the hunting season is now open, we will give a synopsis of the game law, and those wanting to hunt will do well to read and remember.
You may kill 25 quail or dove in any day from Nov. 1 to Feb. 1 of any year.
You may kill three buck deer only from Nov. 1st to Jan. 1st of each year.
You may kill three wild turkeys only from Dec. 1st to April 1st of each year.
You may kill in all seasons of the year duck, geese, robins, wild pigeons, snipe, jacksnipe, curlew, Mexican pheasant; bag limit 25 in one day.
You may transport to your home such game as you have lawfully killed by making proper affidavit.
You must not buy or sell any of the wild game or game birds, or kill catch or destroy the eggs, or have in your possession living or dead, any wild song bird except hawks, crows, buzzards, owls, English sparrows, rice birds and black birds.
You may kill rabbits, squirrels, fox, opossum, coons and bear in any number in all seasons.
You must not hunt for any game or birds at night with a lantern, hunting lamp or any other light.
Any person may hunt or kill game during the open season, in the county of his residence, or in the counties adjoining the county of his residence or on land controlled by him without procuring a hunter's license, but they must not hunt beyond the boundaries of their adjoining counties without a license.

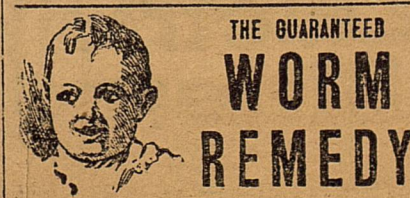
