other year like the last two would break us up, but fortunately there is no need of another year of the kind. Conditions have changed. Everything is better and money is easy to get. It will be best for our customers as well as for us to get back to a cash basis and have no accounts of more than 30 days. And all are drifting that way. A few days ago we asked one of the largest firms in Angelo what they were going to do about Credits. They replied "We cant get good enough to supply our cash trade, so we are not figuring on Credit at all.

And so we are making this request. First, if you owe the Eldorado Hardware Co. anything over 30 days it is Past Due and we need it. Please Pay it Now. Dear heart-broken parents, bereaved children, other loved ones and friends of the deceased: I esteem it an honor indeed to be called upon to speak on this occasion. We are here to pay honor and tribute to the memory of a noble son, an affectionate brother and an upright citizen. Yes, a real fellow cuntryman, of the ancient Knightly type, whose blood has paid the price, and purchased a new for us our American Freedom. Bev McCormick was a true hero, and well may you parents continue to cherish the fond memory of such a brave son. You children, how grateful you should be that he is your own dear borther. Your little city, your county, our great State and Nation are all proud of such a courageous soldier. Yes, France claims him for what he has done for her. England, Italy, Belgium and other nations, and even the people of Germany will see the day, when they will honor the sacred dust of our American heroes, who, by their supreme sacrifice became citizens of the world.

Yes, under the Stars and Stripes he served, and even gave all to preserve and extend freedom and liberty to all the world. That gold star there on your service flag is emblematic of his noble deeds and efficient service.

Brother Bev McCormick was born in Mills County June 29, 1896. He is the youngest of six children and leaves four brothers, one sister and his aged mother and father and a few other distantly related who still survive him.

The days of his boyhood and young manhood were spent in Eldorado. As a child in the home he was kind, obedient and industrious. In school he was loyal, studious, punctual and cheerful.

At the time of the declaration of war with Germany, and at the first draft on June 5, 1917, Bev was not quite 21 years old. Never-the-less, he with nine others of his associates and splendid young men of your fair little city, volunteered to serve their country in that critical hour. This service was purely voluntary on his part.

He first enlisted in Company H which was organized in San Angelo, Texas; which Company was afterwards consolidated with Company M at Camp Bowie. Here this young man received his military education and training. After arriving in France he was soon transferred from the 36th, division to the second division. Five times he had gone "Over the Top" but about eleven o'clock on the night November 2, 1918, while on patrol in what is called "No Man's Land," he made the supreme sacrifice for your liberty and mine. He and his comrade were not far apart when brave Bev was shot. He sank down without a murmur. His comrade laid his gun along by his side, spread his blanket over him and left his body in the care of the Red Cross workers, who buried him on the brow of the hill in Argonne Forest, France, near the border of No Man's Land.

As a soldier Bev was brave and strong, patient and kind, and to his comrades

like a big brother would carry his pack for him in addition to that of his own. He was willing. Among his last words just before going into battle, were: "If it takes my life to win I am glad to give it." Captain Raymond S. Wright of company M 23rd Infantry, Second Division, says: "He met his death on November 2nd, in the Argonne Meuse offensive, the last American drive that resulted in the Armistice on November 11th. This Company was making an attack on a German strong hold near the town of Bugancy when private McCormick was killed. He was a brave and fearless soldier and his action under fire was highly commendable."

It is considered by military men of the world, the greatest honor one can receive is to die in service for his country. This, from a worldly point of view may not be disputed; but the Honor Supreme is to fall in the Service of Our God! And this phrase of Private McCormick's life we shall now review.

In March 1909 the pastor of your church here secured my services in a revival meeting, which began April the 28th, and continued for two weeks or more. On the night of May the 3rd, I preached from Dan. 5: 30, "In that night was Belshazer the king of the Caldeans slain." At the call for penitents three boys came and were saved, and one of them was Bev McCormick. That same night he was baptised and received into the Methodist Church. On Sept. 5th, 1909 I was transferred to Eldorado charge, and for two months was in the home of Bro. and Sister McCormick, and was closely associated with their fine family of children, and never can I forget Bev, the youngest boy. How glad I am that he gave his life to God at that tender age! Yonder in Fort Worth, while in military training he visited often in the home of Brother and sister Rose, and

they say: "He lived a pure clean life." I get this from their own pen. So about ten years, something like half of his short and useful life, was spent in the service of Christ, in the church of God.

So in memory of this brave and courageous soldier, both for his country and for his God, we now do honor, as we gather here this Holy Sabbath day; and this brings us to the text.

"If a man die shall he live again?"

This is humanity's question. For four thousand years this old world was somewhat in doubt as to this question being answered in the affirmative.

But when Jesus came the answer came with him; "He that believeth in me, though he were dead yet shall he live." Jesus said; "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly." "I am come to bring to light Life and Immortality." Martha, Mary dry your tears and take courage, your brother shall live again. You sorrowing loved ones here this morning look up, your dear one shall live again.

Paul says, "We know that if this earthly house of our tabernacle were dissolved we have a building of God, an house not made with hands eternal in the heavens." We should have no use for a building unless we live again. John says: "Beloved now are we the sons of God but it doth not yet appear what we shall be, for we know that when He shall appear we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is." Jesus says: "I go to prepare a place for you and if I go and prepare a place, I will come again and receive you unto myself, that where I am there ye may be also." Why prepare a place for us unless we are to live again and occupy that place.

Thank God we shall live again, but not in the land of sorrow and death but in the glorious

home of the people of God.

Listen to St. John as he stands on the Isle of Patmos: "I heard a great voice out of heaven, saying: 'God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain; for former things are passed away; behold I make all things new.'" Why? Because we shall live again.

Who, but those prejudiced by sin or stupidly ignorant of the Holy Scriptures can fail to see the beautiful foretokens of the resurrection of our bodies, as we read such quotations from sacred revelation; and, as we gaze upon the wonderful changes constantly being made by the invisible hand of God as He reveals Himself in all nature. Hardly a day passes but that some great lesson in nature may be seen that will draw us closer to God if we will but stop and think.

See that angry storm cloud boiling up in the distance like smoke from the infernal regions! Fear creeps over us and we deeply sigh! and breathe a silent prayer for Divine protection. The blackening mass thickens and spreads from right to left. In mighty dashes it starts this way. Soon the sun has disappeared, and darkness settles down over us. The sighing of the mighty tempest is heard all around us as it sweeps valley and hill. In the distance the hurrying thunders are bellowing in the concaves of heaven, the lightning is flashing and blazing from the unfolding clouds, while the falling hail rattles in the cradle of the driving storm! But look! light appears in the west, and the skies were never so bright and clear; the golden rays of the setting sun have burst through the dark cloud, while the cheerful trills of the songsters of forest and field blend with the song of gratitude in our hearts as the last heard murmurs of the retiring tempest dies away.

Now we are passing through one of the dark clouds in the great storm of life! Thick darkness settles down over us as we face the rolling tempest. But it will soon be over. By faith in our risen Christ we behold the dawning of the New and Eternal day, as the light from the Celestial city breaks in upon our souls.

The chemists have demonstrated that a large per cent of the limestone of this old earth is carbon, if this is true, with the great quantities of oils in the earth, and her masses of coal formations, plus the unlimited supplies of explosive gasses, how easy it will be for God to make us a New Earth! Let God but speak and His will is accomplished. At his word the mountain peak and moss covered cliffs will crystalize into diamond beauties that will surpass the glory of the noon day sun, and our rolling prairies will become the gold-paved streets of the new and heavenly city. This is no dream. With God it is a glorious possibility, for ours is the Living God, the God of love; the God of nature; the God of heaven; the God of promise and the God of truth, for He cannot lie, and He said: "Old things shall pass away, all things shall become new. Yes, wars shall cease, and death dealing shall be made into peace. Even death itself shall be new."

You gaze into that stagnant pool of water at your feet, There is nothing in it, so far as we can casually see, but poison, putrefaction and decay; but even while you are meditating it is being lifted up, and tomorrow you may behold it upon the background of the floating clouds, in the beautiful rainbow, arching the heavens, decorated with polished quills and plumes of gold. Yes, it is not only dressed in robes of golden beauty, but on and on it is wafted by the unseen hand of nature's God, cleansed, and purified and transformed, lifted up until it rests yonder on the topmost mountain peak a beautiful flake of snow.

If under the power of nature such a transformation is possible for the poisoned drop of water; what will it do when these corruptible bodies of ours shall put on Immortality. St. Paul says: "Behold I show you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall be changed. 'Yes, God shall speak and the dead shall be raised by the transforming and cleansing power of the resurrection and 'We shall be like Him for we shall see Him as He is.'" Through the telescope of Divine revelation, we see our loved ones who have gone on before, changed, redeemed and glorified, and 'Now they are around the throne of God and serve Him day and night in his temple.'

Dear brother and sister, I trust that you shall no longer feel that your boy lies buried yonder in "No Man's Land," for every inch of this earth is God's earth. David says: "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and they that dwell therein." It seems dark at times as we travel the rugged way, but some day God will make it plain. Some day the old graveyards, with their fallen tombs, moss covered slabs and sunken graves will also be changed. Instead of being loathsome places as many think, I rather believe that even now they are chosen camping grounds of heavenly spirits who watch over the earthly remains of our sacred dead.

This wonderful transforming power was clearly demonstrated before the eyes of St. John as he stood yonder on the Isle of Patmos. Old Jerusalem was changed to the New and heavenly one. You must remember that the old Jerusalem represented the earthly home of God's people and the New one represents the home of the redeemed. This great wonderful day is coming just as surely as our last day on earth is coming. How the world will be startled, and how the righteous will rejoice and shout, "Satisfied, satisfied, awake, awake at last in the likeness of our blessed redeemed."

Do not despair dear sorrowing loved ones, just for a short time his eyes are closed, his voice is silent, his heart is still and his body sleeps. To him the breezes of life have ceased to move

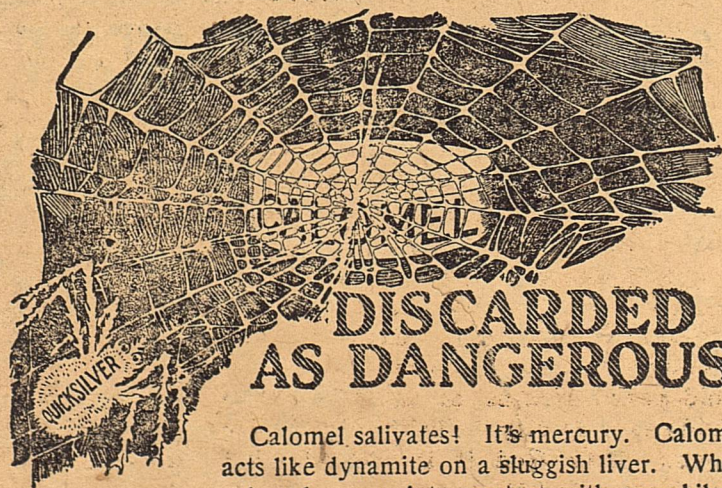

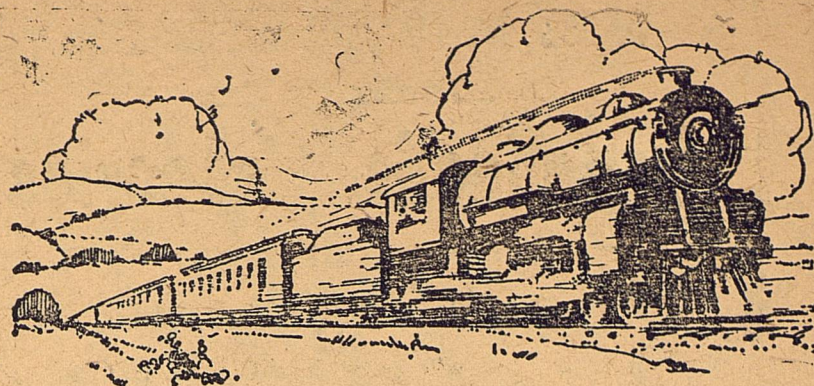

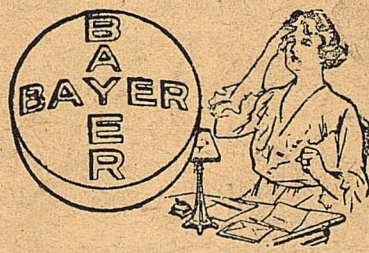
