THE FIRST QUARTELY CONFERENCE.

THE VALUE OF EDUCATION.

Dr. Ellis of the department of education of the University of Texas, after taking into consideration the earnings of thousands of men and women of varied educational attainments from illiterates to college graduates, engaged in all the vocations of life, estimates that every day spent in school or college by boys and girls increases their earning capacity when they enter their life's work by nine dollars. According to this estimate each student in school or college earns nine dollars every day while acquiring an education. This is not generally realized by boys and girls or by parents because the pay is not immediately forthcoming.

There are about two hundred children in the Eldorado school, and according to the estimate of Dr. Ellis the school is worth \$1,800 per day in the future earning capacity of the boys and girls in school. Of course, an education will not be worth nine dollars for every day spent in school to every boy and girl, but that is the average. If the school is worth anything like \$1,800 per day by increasing the future earning capacity of the boys and girls in school, the adequate support of the school by the present generations.

During the last year the Eldorado school has been advanced by the State Department of Education from a second class, unaffiliated school to a first class affiliated school. This progress has been made when the schools in other small west Texas towns have either been decreased in their ranking or failed to show much progress. And the Eldorado school has made this progress at less expense, with less equipment and with lower salaries of teachers than other west Texas schools in its class. The graduates of the Eldorado school are making good in the various colleges of the State, and we believe that the school merits the enthusiastic support of Eldorado people.

If the school is to make further progress more room and more equipment must be provided and the salaries paid teacher's must be increased at least to the level of salaries elsewhere. There is no reason why Eldorado can not have the best school in West Texas, but the best school can not be had without more money to meet the expenses of the school.

We note from the Brady Standard that A. D. Wright has purchased some more Brady property, it is strange that some folks can always find a sucker.

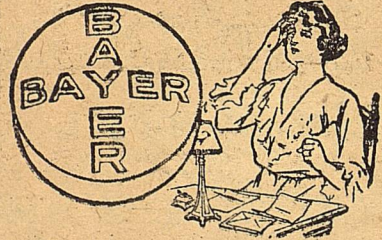
Don't wait until the last day to pay that pole tax, this is election year from constable to president and you may want to vote. The women can vote in the primary if they pay their poll tax.

MORGENTHAU PLEADS FOR HELPING HAND IN THE NEAR EAST

Former Ambassador to Turkey Says America Should Not Let Armenian Allies Starve.

By HENRY MORGENTHAU, Former Ambassador to Turkey and Leader in Near East Relief.

If they were good enough to fight and die for us when we needed their help so sorely, they are good enough now to share some meager little crumbs from our plenty when they have nothing, when hundreds of thousands of them are homeless, unclad, foodless and threatened with extermination by their enemies and our own. Not far from a million Christians have been murdered by their Turkish oppressors. Hungry, terror stricken hundreds of thousands of refugees now look to the United States for succor.

Have Trust in America.

We cannot refuse. Next to their faith in God is their trust in the disinterested good will and generosity of

the American people. They look to us as the human agency to extricate them from the frightful situation in which they have been left as a consequence of the war.

If we should fail to aid them, starvation and the winter's cold would go far to completing the work done by the unspeakable Turk.

I have not seen with my own eyes the misery in which the Armenians now exist. I have been spared that. But the reports which have been brought in by agents of the Near East Relief and by representatives of the Peace Conference paint a picture of wretchedness inconceivable to those who have not a first hand impression of the savagery of the Mussulman.

Exiled From Homes.

Since the beginning of the war the Turkish Armenians have been largely refugees from their homes. A simple agricultural people, they have been exiles from their farms, deprived of all opportunity to support themselves. Year by year their sufferings have increased. Now, a year after fighting has ceased, they are still living the life of nomads, able to continue to keep alive only by virtue of American philanthropy.

These homeless people—"filthy infidels" to the Turk—were good enough to exert their poor might in our behalf while the war was still in the balance. Massacres of a half century had not so broken their spirit that they dared not fight for right and for democracy when justice was the issue. We accepted their aid then. Surely we shall not pass them by without compassion now.

The day has passed when any self respecting man dares permit absorption in his own personal affairs to exclude consideration of his neighbor's well being. No honorable man can knowingly allow his neighbor to hunger or to go unclad. The Christian peoples of the Near East are our neighbors. The money needed to relieve them can be spared without causing any man, woman or child in the United States to suffer.

Must Not Rest on Past.

In other years of our own free will we sent missionaries to Turkey. Our schools and colleges and hospitals have played a wonderful role in humanizing that dark spot in the world. Our ideas, our educational resources, our material equipment, have been leaven in the Near East. Because we have done well in times past we have this great opportunity for the present.

The Armenians have been treated as perhaps no people in history have been treated because they are the spiritual brothers of western races.

Will America help them? There can be but one answer. Their necessity is dire, but our power is great. We are wealthy. We are a member of the family of nations. Our brothers call us. Food, clothes, money, are immediately wanted. If ever unmerited suffering called for succor the plight of the Armenians should be heeded now. A few months more and it may be relief will be too late for those myriads whom only we can save. I shall not fail them.

**MUSCLE SHOALS
NATION'S BULWARK**

Big \$60,000,000 Nitrate Plant
a Defense for Future
Generations.

INSURES NATIONAL DEFENSE

Assurance of Abundant Ameri-
can Explosives a Reason
Why Germany Quit.

One of the chief fortresses of Amer-
ica's new military defense system
which developed out of the World
War is the Ammonium Nitrate Plant
at Muscle Shoals, Alabama, on the
Tennessee River, over three hundred
miles from the seacoast, capable of
turning out 300 tons of high explosives
a day. It assures to the United States
for all time an abundance of ammuni-
tion without which an army is a help-
less encumbrance and it has made
this unlimited supply of explosives
available without resort to raw ma-
terial from outside of the country.

The essential ingredient of all mod-
ern military explosives is nitric acid.
Before the World War, America was
entirely dependent upon Chile for the
supply of nitrate of soda, the only
chemical from which nitric acid can
be made. In case this country became
involved in war with any nation that
could control the sea our foe would
have us at her mercy, for she could
cut off our essential means of striking
back.

Other nations, however, were
equally dependent upon the Chilean
nitrate supply. Germany was pur-
chasing one-third of it. She had ex-
pected to hold the sea with her sub-
marines but failed. But a process
for extracting nitrogen from the air
had been obtained by Germany some
years before from Italian chemists.
This process had been successful in
producing a high grade nitrogenous
fertilizer from which in turn could
be extracted ammonium nitrate. Ger-
many, therefore, fell to manufacturing
ammonium nitrate from the air on a
large scale.

Americans Buy German Secret.

In 1907 an American company, head-
ed by Frank S. Washburn, had secured
the American rights to this process
from Germany and had gone into man-
ufacturing the fertilizer on the Cana-
dian side of the Niagara Falls. When
America found herself in the World
War the Ordnance Department turned
to Mr. Washburn's company for help.
The Air Nitrates Corporation was
formed, with Mr. Washburn at its
head, to build the Muscle Shoals plant.
It was assisted by several other well
known corporations, such as the West-
inghouse Church Kerr Company, which
put up the plant buildings, the perma-
nent city and utilities; the J. G. White
Corporation, which designed and con-
structed the power plant; the Chemi-
cal Construction Company, which de-
signed and built the nitric acid plant,
and the M. W. Kellogg Company, which
furnished the piping and built the
chimneys.

Beginning work in November, 1917,
the big plant and new city at Muscle
Shoals was completed within one
year's time. Had the expected spring
drive of 1919 materialized this one
plant alone would have been able to
supply 13 per cent. of all the high
explosives used by all the Allied ar-
mies on all fronts during that drive,
and the United States was secure for
all time to come against an ammuni-
tion shortage.

When the arrangement was finally
made for building the big air nitrate
plant, work was begun on a power
dam at the same point. This work is
being conducted directly by the United
States Engineering Corps. It will
not be completed, however, for two or
three more years. It was necessary,
therefore, in order to insure imme-
diate operation when the nitrate plant
was completed to construct a \$10,000-
000 steam power plant, one of the larg-
est steam plants for the production of
continuous electric power in the world.
It is pointed out that even had the
water-power plant been completed dur-
ing the war it would have been neces-
sary also to have constructed a steam
plant to insure the nitrate plant work-
ing at full capacity at all times dur-
ing the year.

Plant Worth All It Cost.
Now, this entire job cost the Govern-
ment \$60,000,000. It was put through
at a time when the prices of materials
and labor were at their summit. It
was built at record speed, and speed
costs money. The question naturally
arises, then, as to whether Uncle Sam
got his money's worth.

Tests made after the plant was in
operation showed that ammonium ni-
trate of standard specifications could
be produced at this plant at a cost of
less than one-half the standard fixed
price paid by the Government for am-
monium nitrate produced by the older
methods. This cost is only about one-
fourth to one-fifth the cost of other
high explosives of equal strength.
Compared with the older process for
making ammonium nitrate, the sav-
ings made by this plant would have
paid for the entire plant in about one
and one-half years of operation.
The chief value of the Muscle Shoals
plant, however, will be as a defense to
coming generations.
