Collie, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Wilson who live on the Dave DeLong ranch 12 miles northwest of Eldorado, died about eight o'clock Sunday morning at their ranch home, after a continuous suffering for several months, he was a former service man and suffered two attacks of influenza while in the service and relapse after being discharged from which he never recovered. He was 23 years old and moved to this county last fall with his parents, from Smith County.

MAKING WORK EASY

"MRS. SIDEWINDER made a sensible talk at our club meeting yesterday," explained Mrs. Jamesworthy. "She said there are many disagreeable tasks which might be made easy and pleasant if women worked together at them. Things that are tedious when one does them alone, are interesting when done by a crowd. She pointed out that the dandelions are becoming a terrible pest, ruining most of the lawns in towns, and suggested that the women hold dandelion parties."



"I can imagine the rest," said Jamesworthy. "You don't need to hand out the sickening details. A gang of old beldames will come to our place, for instance, and pull about five cents' worth of dandelions and then sit and have a photographer make a large picture of them; after which they'll eat two dollars and eighty cents' worth of ice cream, and a lot of sponge cake and anything you happen to have in the refrigerator. One of the beldames will be appointed a committee to write up the affair for the newspapers, and Mrs. Sidewinder will see that she gets most of the glory as the originator of the scheme, and next spring her husband will be running for alderman on the strength of it."

"Nowadays the women never get down to brass tacks and do real work. They must make a society function out of every little chore they do. They won't carry a dead cat out of the front yard unless there's a photographer on hand to make a group picture of it. If work can be reorganized so it looks like a game they will be industrious enough, otherwise they strike and send communications to the newspapers explaining that no woman should permit herself to be a drudge."

"One able-bodied man will destroy more dandelions in half a day than 18 women will in three weeks. The man takes off his coat and gets down on his marrowbones and pulls dandelions. The 18 women lean against trees and fan themselves with Japanese fans, and try to look like so many Mary Andersons, and wish there was somebody around to set them to music."

"Women are becoming more and more an expensive luxury since they organized themselves into clubs. I have nothing to say against the club idea in itself, Mrs. Jamesworthy. I want to see the females have as good a time as they can, within reasonable limits. The men belong to clubs and lodges, too, but they have halls in which to hold their meetings."

"The women wouldn't enjoy holding a meeting in a hall. They have to assemble in the home of one of their suffering sisters, so they can size up the furniture and fittings, and be able to say, when they go away, that they never saw such execrable taste. And the suffering sister sees that her home is a frost, and she makes up her mind to give her heart-sick husband no rest until he has chartered a string of painters and paper-hangers, decorators and glaziers."

"But this isn't the worst of it. The suffering sister who entertains the club is expected to set up refreshments, and she feels it her duty, as a good sport, to furnish the best the market affords. The last time the ladies of the Busy Bunch club met at this house you bought all the strawberries in town, and at that period strawberries were shipped in from points 5,000 miles away, and when the bill came in, at the end of the month, I had a stroke of paralysis and an attack of paresis. If you get up a dandelion party you will want to buy out the leading confectioner, so I'll advertise for a man to come and do the job."

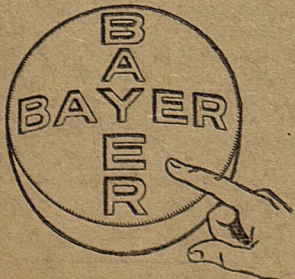

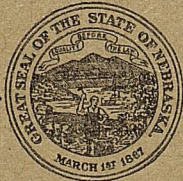

The Story of Our States

XXXVII.—NEBRASKA



THE Indian name for the Platte river was Nebraska, meaning "shallow water" and from this

came the name of the state. A nickname for the state is the Blackwater State.

Of the early Spanish explorations little is known, except that Coronado probably reached the great plain of this region in 1541. More than one hundred and twenty-five years later Father Marquette noted the Platte river on his trip up the Missouri. In the beginning of the Nineteenth century the Lewis and Clark expedition skirted the boundaries of the present state and in 1805, Manuel Lisa established the first known settlement which was a fur trading post at Bellevue. This was just after the Louisiana Purchase had brought Nebraska into United States territory.

Omaha was established as a post of the American Fur company in 1825 and Nebraska City the following year.

With the California gold rush in 1849 many pioneers passed through Nebraska and some stopped and settled there although there was a law forbidding settlements among the Indians. The real colonization boom, however, started with the passing of the Kansas-Nebraska act in 1854, which arranged that these two sections should become free or slave states at the dictate of their inhabitants. The Nebraska territory was then organized and reached from the fortieth to the forty-ninth parallel. In 1861, the region north of 43 was made into Dakota territory. The Idaho territory was also created, which reduced Nebraska to its present size of 77,520 square miles, except for a slight addition in the Northwest which was made in 1882.

In 1867 Nebraska was admitted as the 37th state over the president's veto. It has eight presidential electors.

THE COST OF QUIBBLING

(By Representative Kellis.)

Governor Neff called a second special session of the Thirty-seventh Legislature to convene at 10 o'clock last Wednesday morning, the first called session having adjourned sine die at midnight on Tuesday. This session was made necessary for the reason that the first called session failed to provide for the state educational institution for the next two year.

The Senate and House have been deadlock over the educational bill for more than a week, and though it was thought that an agreement had been reached on the last day, the retrencher were still in the majority and the free conferene report was rejected. The difference between the legislative bodies which made a second special session necessary was the enormous sum of 20 percent on two hundred dollars. The House wanted to cut the salaries of the A. & M. College instructors 20 per cent of all over \$2,200, while the Senate proposed to cut 20 per cents on all salaries received above the amount of \$2,500. The Senate finally agreed to the amount of \$2,400, but the House would not budge, making a diffrence of 20 per cent on two hundred dollars, or \$40 per annum.

It cost the taxpayers of Texas more than a thousand dollars per day for each day the legislature is in session. It has already spent more than a week wrangling over the educational bill, necessitating a special called session, which means that thousands of dollars more must be paid out for mileage in addition to the per diem of the members. Suppose there are 100 professors at A. & M. College who receive more than \$2,400.00 per year (and we do not think there is that number,) that would make \$4,000.00 per year, or \$8,000.00

for the two years, saved to the taxpayers of the state—and lost to the men who deserve it. Eight thousand dollars saved in one instution in two years looks big to the sapoak statesman and his constituency, and he is wont to brag about it in his harrangues during his next campaign; but let us see what it has cost to save that amount of money. The regular session of the Thirty-seventh Legislature appropriated \$200,000.00 to pay mileage, per diom and continuing expenses for a sixty-day session, or more than \$3,300.00 per day was appropriated. Of course it may not have used all this appropriation, but it is safe to say that most of it was paid out. Suppose it cost only \$1,000 per day for each day the legislature is in session, (which sum is below the actual cost) the legislature has already spent more than \$10,000.00 of the people's money in trying to save \$8,000 and the end is not yet in sight.

This may be the workings of an "economical administration," or statesmanship, or back to "normalcy," but we have coined a term that is for more appropriate, which we will not print some of the constituency of the Thirty-seventh be guilty of plagiarism.—Sterling City News Record.

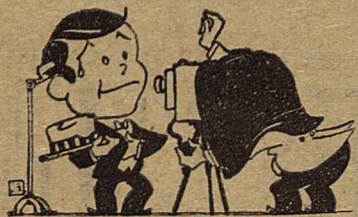

The Story of Our States

By JONATHAN BRACE
XXXI.—CALIFORNIA



THERE is an atmosphere of romance enveloping the early history of California which even encircles the origin of the name. About 1520 a Spanish love story was published in which there was an imaginary island in the Far East called California. Some fifteen years later a party of Spanish adventurers came upon the peninsula which we now call Lower California. Believing that they had discovered a romantic island similar to the one in the novel, they called it California. Later on, the territory to the north became known as Alta California or High California and when it became a state, it was accordingly called California. The first settlers were the Franciscan monks who came up from Mexico and established missions, and many are the legends woven around these pioneer Padres. There shortly grew up Mexican settlements around the missions which the wonderful climate and fertile soil prospered.

The government, while under Mexican control, was more or less independent, and at the outbreak of the Mexican war, Fremont, who was later defeated for the presidency, occupied California. When peace was made in 1848, California became United States territory. That same year gold was discovered in the Sacramento Valley and the rush of people to California began. The population grew so rapidly that in 1850 California was admitted as the thirty-first state of the Union. With 1,315,297 square miles, it is the largest state except Texas. Politically, its power has been rapidly growing. California now has thirteen presidential electors.
