BEV MCCORMICK BODY BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS

Sunday afternoon the body of Bev McCormick was buried in the Eldorado Cemetery under auspices of the American Legion the Post at Eden in charge of the service.

The body reached San Angelo Friday afternoon and was held at an undertaking parlor until Sunday morning and then brought to the McCormick home in Eldorado.

Four Eldorado cars driven by Frank Bradley, Jim Griffin, Ben Hext and A. T. Wright, went to Eden Saturday afternoon and brought the Eden boys over, reaching Eldorado about noon. The Eden boys assisted by Eldorado and Christoval boys conducted the services. The body was taken to the Methodist Church at 2:30 where a throng of people awaited its coming. Here a short but impressive service was held by Rev. F. G. Clark after which the body was taken to the Cemetery and laid away in its final resting place to be disturbed no more.

The pall-bearers were H. T. Finley, Herman Murchison, Walter Patton, Luke Spurges J. L. Neill, of Eldorado, and Paul Crawford and DeWitt Holland of Christoval, all of whom enlisted in Company H with Bev and some of them was with him on the field of battle.

The military services were the first of the kind ever seen by many of the people here, people from Christoval, Mertzon and Sonora were here to witness and partake in the service, the people of Schleicher County came out in large numbers to pay their last respects to their countryman, who fell on the battle field of Farnse, in protecting the rights of the American people.

The floral offering was most beautiful that were bestowed upon the casket and grave, not only from friends here but all along the route to Eldorado, after the body reached American soil, flowers were placed on the casket of the soldiers in transit.

The funeral cortege was probably the longest ever witnessed in Eldorado.

Bev was killed November 2nd, 1918, nearly three years ago, and by request of his mother the body was brought back to his home for burial, but his mother died in March last and now the two, mother and son, lie in that peaceful sleep in our Cemetery to await the coming of that judgement day, when all who live in Christ Jesus will be gathered together for an eternal home.

Gus Wheat, a well known young ranchman of Edwards county was seriously injured by his horse falling on him on the ranch 20 miles from Rocksprings Thursday of last week. He was alone when the accident occurred about two in the afternoon and was not found until 8 o'clock that night. He had crawled or drug himself on his elbows for some distance towards the ranch house. It was believed his hip was broken and he was taken that night to San Antonio for treatment. --Devil's River News.

DRILLING FOR OIL 17 MILES NORTHEAST OF ELDORADO

J. H. O'Harrow has bought a drill of his own and is now drilling for a pool of oil he saw in a dream underlying his ranch, which is 17 miles northeast of Eldorado, the well is being drilled on block one, survey 61, and is now more than 270 feet deep, Mr. O'Harrow is setting some 5 5-8 inch casing to shut off the water, he expects to go 1,500 or 2,000 feet with the machinery he now has on hand, but thinks the big pool will be punctured before reaching that depth.

TAX COLLECTOR REPORTS ON ASSESSMENTS.

Tax-Assessor W. E. Baker dropped in The Success office and gave us the following information. The number of horses assessed 1921, 3,145 head valued at \$78,660, an increase in number over 1920, of 28 head.

Cattle assessed in 1921, were 88,574, valued at \$764,285, an increase in number over last year of 4,594 head.

Sheep assessed in 1921 were 125,317 head, valued at \$487,863, an increase in number over 1920 of 38,946 head.

Goats assessed 1921 15,967 head, an increase of 410 over 1920.

Total taxable values for 1921, is \$3,848,780, about \$20,000 over last years rendition.

NEWS FROM HIGH SCHOOL.

School has now completed two full months of its term. Most of the pupils have adjusted themselves to changed conditions. Some are probably going to fail to be able to meet these conditions. Those pupils who are unable to meet the conditions of their present grades will be transferred to parallel subjects of the lower grade. This change will take place at the close of this, the third month. Pupils who are deficient in only the one subject at the close of this month will be transferred in only the one subject. Those failing in two or more subjects will be transferred in all subjects. These changes will be necessary for the defense of individuals and classes.

It has been necessary to make some changes in the curriculum since the opening of school. This has been true especially in Spanish. The text book found in the school was not first class for the teaching of the direct method and no other method is acceptable for affiliation. It is going to be very difficult to secure affiliation for this year because of this fact.

There have been a few occasions when teachers have been compelled to be absent. During such absence their places have been filled by competent substitutes. The wages of the substitutes has been decided by the superintendent and paid by the individual teachers.

Report cards are coming to parents each six weeks this year, instead of monthly as heretofore. This change has been found necessary to give the new members of the faculty time to decide upon the worth of pupils before sending out cards. If your child does not present his card at the end of each six weeks, be sure and ask about it. Call his teacher or the superintendent. It will avail much if parents will keep in close touch with teachers of their children.

Pupils in this school through the first six grades are no longer in a crowded condition. Beginning with the seventh grade there exists throughout the remainder of the curriculum a very serious congestion. It will work a great detriment to the entire school until this congestion can be relieved. There can be no permanent relief either until two other teachers can be added to the faculty. These teachers should be a teacher for the seventh grade work and a history teacher for the high school. At present the high school history and the seventh grade work are divided among six or seven different teachers. Such division makes intensive work very difficult for children.

The compulsory attendance law goes into affect by order of the school board the first Monday in next month, Nov. 7th.

After that date every child in the district within the ages of eight and fourteen years and living within two and one half miles of the school will be compelled to be in school for 5 consecutive months. Attendance before this does not count toward compulsory attendance. This attendance law applies to children of Mexican parents also. The Mexican school will open at that time and those children will be put in school for the whole five months.

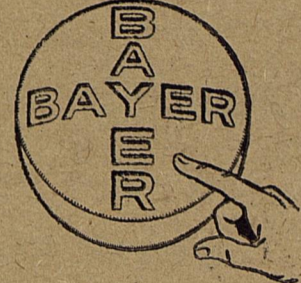
