GRAND JURY FAILS TO INDICT KU KLUX

The Grand Jury, which has been investigating the Lorena tragedy, adjourned Saturday without returning an indictment. However, they severely criticized Sheriff Buchanan and Deputy Sheriff Burton for the manner in which they interfered in the Ku Klux Klan Parade.

Disclaiming any intent to defend the Klan the jury said the men believed that the best interests of society would be served by not returning any bills. Sheriff Buchanan was not able to appear before the body on account of his injuries.

About 150 witnesses were examined in three weeks. It is understood that the jury was divided upon some of the issues involved and that the report was a compromise.

Have you heard the inside story about the "crime" of Thos. L. Blanton of Texas?

Blanton is the man who was censured and almost kicked out of Congress a few days ago because he printed an alleged "indecent" speech in the Congressional Record. On the face of the newspaper reports, it looked as though Blanton was a man of most respectable character, and probably nearly everybody in the country thought he deserved a job.

As a matter of fact, it now seems as though a deliberate attempt has been made by powerful labor union interests to "get" Blanton, because Blanton was trying to clean out the labor union control of the government printing office, which office is supposed to be under civil service rules.

Blanton, in his alleged "indecent" speech, charged that the labor unions had their fee collectors, organizers and walking delegate at work in the government printing office all the time, and that these organizers ARE ON THE GOVERNMENT PAY ROLL.

He charged that the civil service rules are a farce; that a non union printer is not allowed to hold a job in the government shop, that the "union" boss get him fired on some pretext, or "ride" him so constantly that he resigns.

Friends of Representative Blanton say that he hardly could be held responsible for the "indecent letter." This communication came into his possession through the Public Printer, George H. Carter, to whom it was addressed by a non-union man in the form of a sworn statement. This non-union man, Millard French, described in the letter a row he had had with a union man in the government Printing Office on September 3 last. French did not know when he sent the statement to Carter that it ever would be published. Wishing to tell Carter exactly what had happened, he described the quarrel in vigorous fashion, quoting the union man, one Levi Huor Huber's conversation, to say the least, was for its educational and bristled with vile and obscene epithets, embracing not only the non-union man but Public Printer Carter and Representative Blanton himself.

The real facts of Blanton affair have apparently been pretty effectively suppressed. The newspapers give Blanton the worst of it, and have buried the big factor in the case, which was

that Blanton was doing his duty to the public in exposing the efforts of the printer's union to get control of one of the great departments of the government.

When the public discovers what really happened, there is not likely to be much censure for Blanton, except that he exercised poor judgement in allowing an unexpurgated letter to get into the official records. Even at that he didn't have much on "Hell and Maria" Dawes, whose generous official profanity was rewarded by a job as head of the Budget department.

In fact, Representative Blanton probably deserves a vote of thanks instead of one of censure. —Merchant Journal, Topeka, Kansas.

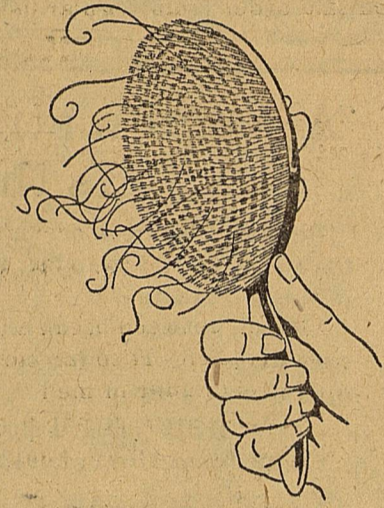

The Story of Our States

XXXVII.—NEBRASKA



THE Indian name for the Platte river was Nebraska, meaning "shallow water," and from this

came the name of the state. A nickname for the state is the Blackwater State.

Of the early Spanish explorations little is known, except that Coronado probably reached the great plain of this region in 1541. More than one hundred and twenty-five years later Father Marquette noted the Platte river on his trip up the Missouri. In the beginning of the Nineteenth century the Lewis and Clark expedition skirted the boundaries of the present state and in 1805, Manuel Lisa established the first known settlement which was a fur trading post at Bellevue. This was just after the Louisiana Purchase had brought Nebraska into United States territory.

Omaha was established as a post of the American Fur company in 1825 and Nebraska City the following year.

With the California gold rush in 1849 many pioneers passed through Nebraska and some stopped and settled there although there was a law forbidding settlements among the Indians. The real colonization boom, however, started with the passing of the Kansas-Nebraska act in 1854, which arranged that these two sections should become free or slave states at the dictate of their inhabitants. The Nebraska territory was then organized and reached from the fortieth to the forty-ninth parallel. In 1861, the region north of 43 was made into Dakota territory. The Idaho territory was also created, which reduced Nebraska to its present size of 77,520 square miles, except for a slight addition in the Northwest which was made in 1882.

In 1867 Nebraska was admitted as the 37th state over the president's veto. It has eight presidential electors. (© by McClure Newspaper Syndicate.)

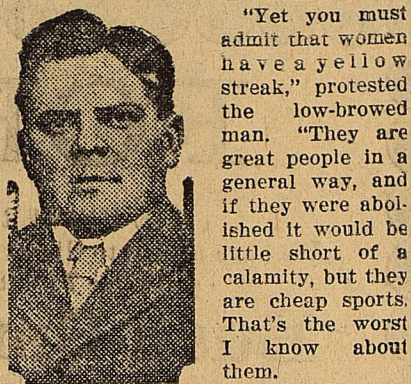
