SHOOTING ON SHEEN RANCH MONDAY EVENING.

David Sheen came to Eldorado Monday night and told the following account of a shooting at Mrs. Sheen's home on Monday evening between himself and Lewis Hopkins and others on the Sheen ranch 18 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Mr. Sheen had gone to Mrs. Sheen's place late Monday evening on business, accompanied by one of his boys, and while in the home, Lewis Hopkins an employe of Mrs. Sheen interfered in some unfriendly manner which caused Mr. Sheen to go back to the yard where his car was and get his Winchester, Hopkins who had followed to the porch, ordered him to put down the gun and at the same time drew his gun, each man fired at the same time, Hopkins falling to the floor of the porch and Sheen turning to leave on foot and as he fled in a zig zag manner across a field some one from the house fired at him several times one shot striking him slightly in the shoulder making a flesh wound about three inches long and one other striking his hat and glancing along the side of his head.

Mr. Sheen did not know who did the last shooting, but said that he and Hopkins fired one shot each.

Those who went to the Sheen ranch from town say, that Hopkins was shot in the arm above the wrist the bullet ranging up the arm to the shoulder, when Dr. Patton reached Hopkins he found him in a very critical condition from the shock and the loss of blood. One of the Sheen boys is supposed to be the one who shot at Mr. Sheen as he ran away, the boy is about 16 or 15 years old and has been living with his father.

Mr. and Mrs. Sheen had agreed to a separation and a division of property this had been accomplished, but the trouble between Hopkins and Sheen came up over a note that Sheen wrote Mrs. Sheen, in which there is conflicting reports. Mr. Hopkins has been an employe on the Martin ranch some 10 or 12 years, and has been working for Mrs. Sheen since the first of the year.

GEORGE F. HORNSBY HANGED AT BELTON FRIDAY

The press dispatches in the Saturday papers carried an account of the hanging of George F. Hornsby at Belton for the killing of J. N. Weatherby of Brownwood in October 1920.

Hornsby maintained that he was innocent until the last, he professed religion and was baptized in a bathtub in the jail by a Christian Preacher.

He bade the people good bye, and told them if they didn't serve God to get at it at once.

Hornsby was 28 years old and according to his own life lived a life of sin.

DALLAS LAIN KILLED AT BRECKENRIDGE MONDAY

A phone message reached Eldorado Monday stating that Dallas Lain, formerly of Eldorado, was killed at Breckenridge by exploding dynamite Monday morning, Dallas was an honorable young man, a hard worker and the bread and meat for his father and mother.

The remains were brought to San Angelo for burial, Dallas moved to the oil field after being discharged from the army at the close of the war.

We do not mean by this that our trustees have been paying excessive salaries, for they have not. But the valuation put on the property three years ago by an act of the board has dropped back to the valuation placed by the commissioners court, this causes the finances to be short, according to members of the board. But it is the duty of the board to plan the finances and keep the school up to its high standard, the people expect it and The Success believes they will do it.

In Prof. Bruton we have a worthy young man, with an ambition to win, with the ability to win and with the community's co-operation he will finish the building up of our school and keep it among the best in the west.

We commend the untiring efforts of the present Superintendent and his entire faculty for the loyal work during the present session, may those who go

elsewhere, for different reasons, take with them the best wishes of this people.

BUT LOOK WHOSE OX

WAS GORED

Some years ago, a shudder spread over the continent at a proposition, for the relief of agriculture, that government provide storage for grain crops until a glutted market could be relieved and prices resumed normality. The thing was not to be thought of. Financial circles led the hue and cry against such paternalism, and the matter was dropped. The farmer, since as before, has been left to the mercy of the elevator interests, with what result he can tell you.

The recent change in the directorship of the United States mint required an inventory, which shows that Uncle Sam is providing storage for about three billions of dollars in gold owned by private interests, for which it furnishes paper money much more convenient to use. This gold, in coin and bullion, aggregates a third of the estimated world supply, and does not include that "in circulation" in the vaults of banker as reserve. Besides the gold holdings, there are 676 millions of silver and other assets in the various vaults of the mint service.

The difference between the storage of the farmer's grain and the banker's gold would be hard to distinguish, yet one is paternalism, fraught with danger to our institution while the other—is a government function. —The Dearborn Independent.

ADVOCATES WHIPPING FOR PUNISHMENT.

Chicago, April 12.—"Whip your criminals and you find that your professional criminals disappear at once," said Judge William N. Gemmill, who has had sixteen years' experience on the Chicago bench. He was addressing the special law enforcement commission of the American Bar Association, assembled here to discuss of coping with growing crime in all cities.

"Nabby-pabby, sickening sentimentality for outlaws convicted of crime" is one reason for present crime conditions, according to Col. Henry B. Chamberlain, managing director of the Chicago Crime Commission.

"Citizens are losing their respect for the courts," he declared. "They hold bench and bar responsible for abuses which they believe it is the duty of the profession to correct.

"They whip as a punishment for theft and for wife beating in Delaware," said Judge Gemmill, "and in Delaware there are no thieves or wife beaters.

Flogging was extended by the Delaware Legislature to be also a punishment for holdups," said Judge Kavanaugh, "and holdups stopped at once. The same was true of Canada. In Canada, also, flogging is a punishment for criminal assault and very few such crimes occur."

WOOL POOL FOR 1921 CLOSED

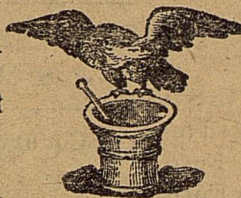
