

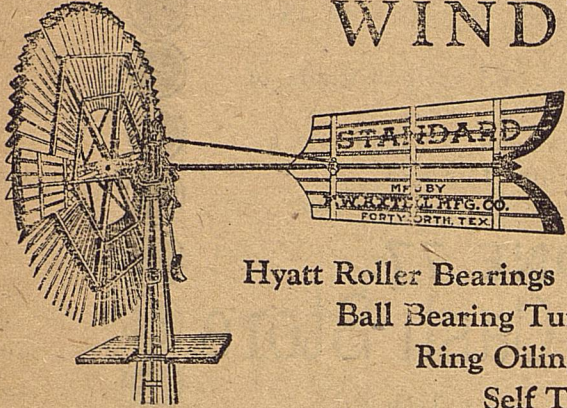

COMMISSIONERS COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The County Engineers report
was approved up to and includ-
ing April 30, 1922.

The Court allowed J. B. Bru-
ton \$150.00 for rock and all
other damages incurred to date.

The following resolution was
adopted by the court.

1. State and federal aid in the
sum of \$115,000 having been
granted Schleicher County for
the completion of bitumens
topping, of the 11.51 miles of
State Highway No. 4, and it being
understood by this court this
grant of the above amount on an
estimated cost of \$179,838.99
is about 64 percent of the total
cost, or 14 percent more than
usually granted in such cases,
and it being further understood
that the reason the State High-
way Commission has deviated
from its usual rule in this case
is that they desire that the
largest amount of county money
possible be retained, after com-
pletion of the present project,
with a view to possibly giving
more aid in the future to Sch-
leicher County and completing
more miles of State Highway
No. 4, be it resolved by the Com-
missioners Court of Schleicher
County.

That funds from the County
Bond issue remaining in county
Treasury after present program
is completed, same being esti-
mated at \$45,757.87, be held in-
tact until such times, not later
than July 1st, 1923, that the
State Highway commission may
notify this County that no ad-
ditional grants of aid may be
made, and that they be released
from this order.

The Treasury and county clerks
reports were approved.

County Judge C. A. Womack
was ordered to apply to the
State Highway Department for
one 10 ton Holt tractor.
