Mr. Russell owned considerable ranch interest in Schleicher County, was one of the early ranch settlers and in partnership in the Bevans & Russell ranch business here. He has amassed a fortune and for the past ten years has lived in San Antonio where he has much inancial interest. He leaves a wife and two daughters to mourn his departure.
