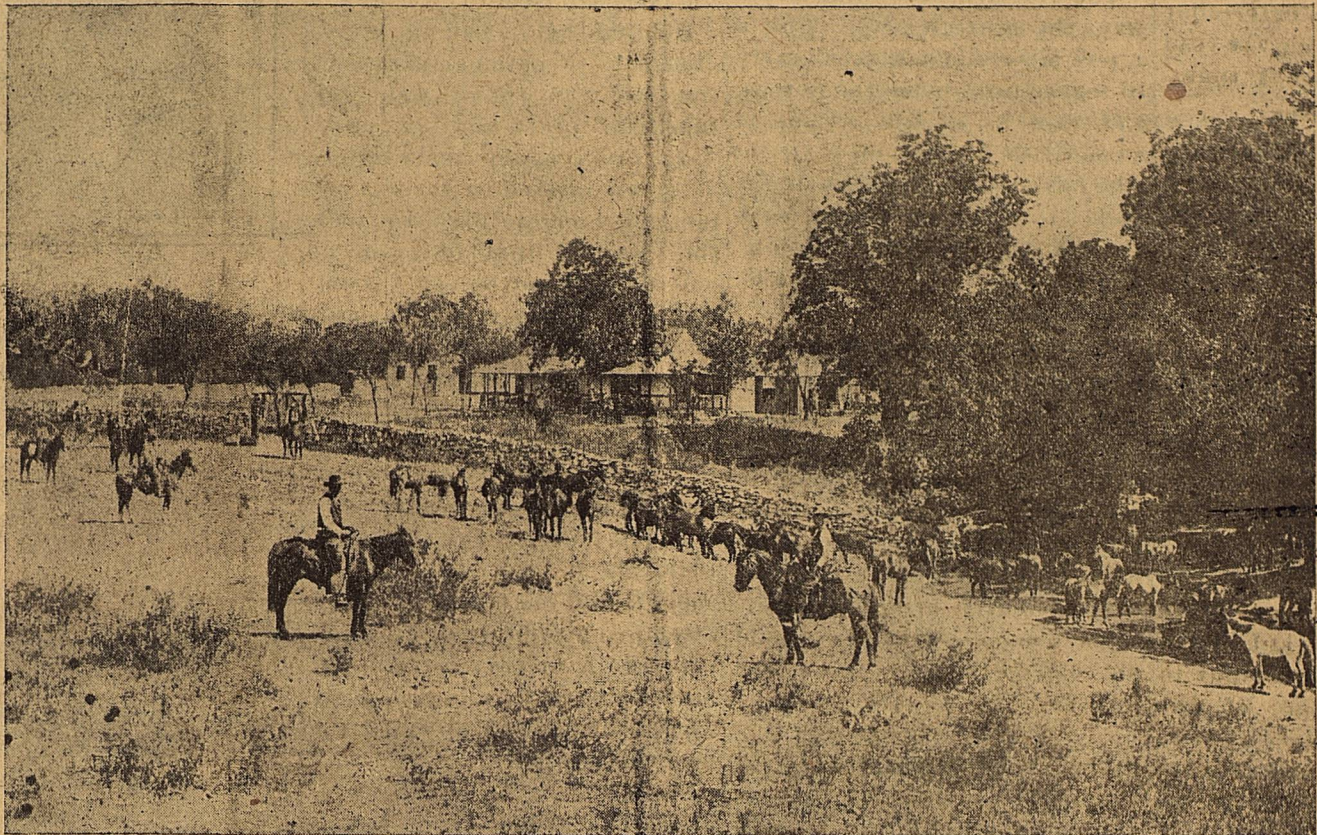

SCHLEICHER COUNTY GETS MORE RAINS.

Schleicher County received an inch rain fall Friday night, this will give splendid season for planting crops and almost mature the early grain crop. The country is already coated with green and the earliest spring in the annals of the country is already here.

TALPA LONG WOOL BRINGS 14 1-2 TO 16 1-2 CENTS.

J. A. Cauthen, buyer of Lam pasas, representing various eastern mills, purchased around 250,000 pounds of long wool at from 14 1-2 to 16 1-2 cents per pound, to be delivered on cars at Talpa.

William Campbell of San Angelo, representing S. Silberman & Sons of Chicago, bought between 25,000 and 30,000 pounds of wool, most of it choice staple, at 16 1-2c, a pound.—San Angelo Standard.

R. M. Halbert reports the sale of his 12 months wool clips at Boston at 28 and 30 cents. The expense of marketing the wool, including two commissions, was 6.65 or nearly 7 cents a pound from the ranch.—Devil's River News.

Ramsey got a letter from his son Hal, Monday, who is at Austin for treatment, from the bite of a skunk some two weeks ago, he said the skunk head which he carried to Austin with him showed to have rabies, Hal reports there were 26 patients there when he got there and 11 more had arrived since he got there. WM. BLACK RANCH SOLD, H. LESLEY JONES PURCHASER.

Wm. Black, who has ranched on the head of the San Saba, in the east portion of Schleicher County, since 1876, has sold the old ranch to his grandson, H. Lesley Jones, of San Antonio.

The Black ranch is one of the first ranches blocked out in this portion of Texas, and for many years was the home of the wandering cowboys, there is hardly an old time cowboy who roamed the hill from 1876, to 1900, who at smootime found refuge in this historical ranch home.

Col. Black now resides in San Antonio, his son Charlie, who has been in charge of the ranch for several years has moved to Barnhart.

COURT FAVORS INSURGENTS

IN W. O. W. FIGHT.

Houston, March 20.—Litigation growing out of the recent Woodmen of the World State convention resulted Saturday in partial defeat for both the so-called loyalist and insurgent elements.

A temporary injunction was granted Judge Charles E. Ashe of the Eleventh District Court, restraining Arthur A. Seal, elected head consul by the loyalist faction, and all other loyalist State officers from acting as such officer pending a hearing on the issues of case.

Holding that he had no jurisdiction as to national affairs of the Woodman, Judge Ashe refused to grant an injunction sought to restrain the national delegates elected by the loyalist factions from acting. He took the position that question of opposing sets of delegates is one for the covering camp the national body, to decide.

The decision regarding State officers was considered a victory for the insurgents, led by Judge R. H. Buck of Fort Worth, whom they elected here as head consul. The insurgent officers were plaintiffs in the case and as there is nothing to prevent them attempting to function as State officers. Attorneys pointed out however that there is but little for the officers to do until the next convention.

Notice of appeal was given by Jacob F. Wolters, leading attorneys for the insurgents were Claud Pollard and John T. Garrison.

Demand was made by the insurgents for the official seal of the order. General Wolters stated that one of the loyalist officers had informed him that the seal could not be located.

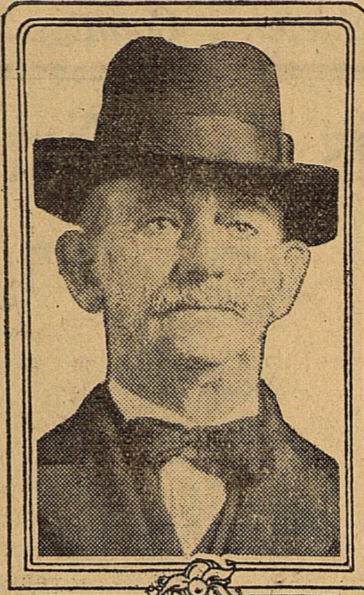

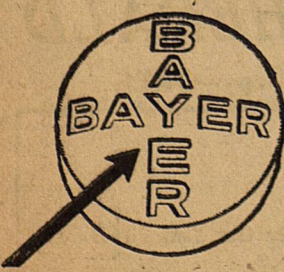

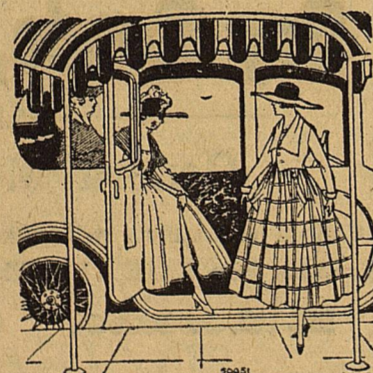
